## LEWIS BROWN, VERBUM DEI JUNIOR CENTER, IS "AAAA" BASKETBALL PLAYER OF YEAR FOR 1972

**I**t took only a moment for United Savings Helms Athletic Foundation's All-Southern California Board of Basketball to name its "AAAA" Division Basketball Player of the Year for 1972, and to nobody's surprise Lewis Brown of Verbum Dei's championship Eagles was accorded the honor by acclamation. Coach Kenny Booker's star junior center, all 6-10, 230 pounds of him, led little Verbum Dei High School to its fourth straight C.I.F., Southern Section title, its second straight in "AAAA" Division play.

For the past two seasons Verbum Dei guard Raymond Lewis was accorded MVP honors in C.I.F., Southern Section action. This season, as over the past two years, Verbum Dei again supplied the premier performer. From his center post, Brown averaged 17.3 points per game and was outstanding at both ends of the court. Only a junior, Brown is expected to lead another strong Eagles team in the race for "AAAA" Divisional honors next year.

As expected, the champion Verbum Dei Eagles and runner-up Pasadena Bulldogs placed the most performers on the three honor teams. Along with Brown on the first team are teammates Dwight Slaughter and Ricky Hawthorne. Pasadena placed star forward Bob Taylor on the first squad, with Malcolm Kennedy and George Tucker being picked for second-team honors. Morningside, La Habra and Los Alamitos each placed two players on the honor teams. Twenty-four high schools are represented on the 31-man "AAAA" Division Team.

The Verbum Dei Eagles have been king of the basketball mountain four years running now, with a strong team coming back in 1973. Coach Booker's Bombers romped through the likes of Montebello (69-57), Servite (72-56), Morningside (63-62, in the Eagles tightest playoff test), Los Alamitos (65-60) and Pasadena in the finals (58-48). Verbum Dei wound up the season with a 30-1 record. Back in 1969 the Eagles were "AA" Division champions defeating Katella 90-87. They followed in 1970 with a 77-69 win over Fermin Lasuen for the "AAA" Division crown and last year took Crescenta Valley into camp 51-42 to start their "AAAA" Division string.

Coach George Terzian's Pasadena Bulldogs also boasted a fine season in '72 finishing up with a 29-2 record. The Bulldogs whipped four playoff opponents before falling before the smooth performing Eagles. Pasadena beat Centennial (65-58), Corona del Mar (62-61 in overtime), Blair (89-62) and La Habra (60-46) before running out of juice in the "AAAA" decider against Verbum Dei.

There are eight lower classmen on the 31-man squad, four on each of the first two teams. Five players are back from last year's honor teams....Lewis Brown and Steve Brooks of Huntington Beach being second-team picks in '71, with Bob Manker of La Habra having been named to last year's third team. Dos Pueblos' Bruce Coldren was a first-team 3A choice in 1971, while Steve Weist of San Marcos was picked on the third-team 3A team last season.

## AMF-VOIT BASKETBALLS FOR HONORED PLAYERS

All-Southern California Board of Basketball all-star team members will be recipients of traditional framed scroll awards from sponsoring United Savings Helms Athletic Foundation. As "AAAA" Division MVP, Lewis Brown will receive the coveted bronze medallion award recognizing him as the outstanding performer in Southern Section 4A basketball for 1972. Awards have been presented to thousands of boys since that time, with many going on to collegiate and professional greatness. All selections made by All-Southern California Board of Basketball are on file in the United Savings Helms library, which is open to the public for research purposes daily.

## KATELLA HIGH GUARD, MARK STEINMEYER, NAMED TOP PLAYER IN "AAA" BASKETBALL FOR 1972...

Katella, a member of the Crestview League and a semi-finalist in the "AAA" Division of the Southern Section CIF playoffs, may not have won top honors in divisional play in 1972, but the scarlet and black Knights from Anaheim had their star player Mark Steinmeyer named Player of the Year in "AAA" Divisional play. Steinmeyer, who was a second-team 3A selection in 1971, received no serious opposition for top-player acclaim, as he averaged 18.3 points per game during the '72 season.

The Crestview League performed in superior fashion over the past season to not only provide the "AAA" Division playoffs with a semi-finalist, but also with a tourney runner-up in second-place league finisher El Modena. Coach Bill Ervin's Vanguarda swept through the upper bracket of play to finally lose to Marmonte League co-champ Camarillo in the finals, 73-71. Katella lost to Camarillo in the semi-final battle in the lower bracket of play, 66-57.

During the playoff rounds Katella disposed of North Riverside (93-59), California (96-68) and Garey (100-85) before Camarillo upended them. El Modena defeated Wilson of La Puente (64-59), Rolling Hills (66-48), San Bernardino (63-58) and Covina (84-64) before the Scorpions of Camarillo edged them in the finale, 73-71.

Camarillo, co-champions of the Marmonte League along with Hart High, led the parade in placing players on this year's "AAA" all-star teams. Forward Fred Huston was named to the first team; guard Jim McGlamery was a second team selection, while center Tony Smith was named to the third squad. The Scorpions, who finished their season with a 28-3 overall record, whipped Righetti in the playoff's first round (61-55), out-distanced West Covina (86-64), edged Mayfair (62-59), beat Katella (66-57) and then out-fought El Modena in the championship test 73-71.

There are 32 all-star players named to the "AAA" Division three teams, with 25 schools represented. Three players -- Mark Steinmeyer (Katella), Steve Libring (West Covina) and Phil Weinberg (Bellflower) -- are back from last year's selections. Steinmeyer was a second team choice in '71, while Libring and Weinberg were third team choices.

Some nine lower classmen have been named to the three honor teams. As in the case of the "AAAA" Division where eight under classmen received honors, there will be considerable strength back in many of the "AAA" Division schools.

As is usually the case, the "AAA" Division champion team -- in this case Camarillo -- placed more all-star players than any other. Three players are on the club representing the Scorpions, while five high schools landed two performers each. Santa Maria, Covina, El Modena, Katella and Garey are the schools represented by two players. One of the Santa Maria players named to a first team center post is Tim Patterson, younger brother of Steve who was 2A Player of the Year in 1966 and went on to greatness at UCLA.

For having been named "AAA" Division CIF Southern Section Player of the Year, Katella High's Mark Steinmeyer will be recipient of the United Savings Helms bronze medallion award. Coach John McMullen, who piloted the Camarillo Scorpions to the "AAA" title will also be honored with the traditional silver tumbler award. All players named for all-star team honors will be awarded framed scrolls.

Personalities from the field of basketball -- including former stars of the game and collegiate coaches -- will take part in the 35th annual awards ceremonies to be announced within the near future.

## CO-PLAYERS OF YEAR SELECTED IN BOTH "AA" & "A" DIVISIONS FOR '72 BASKETBALL SEASON...

The Murphy High School Nobles, champions of all they surveyed during the 1972 basketball season including titles in both Pioneer League play as well as the "AA" Division of the CIF, had star performers Luther Philyaw and Terry Tate named co-MVPs in 2A basketball for 1972. Tate was a first-team 2A selection last year as a sophomore and is the only junior on this year's first team. Philyaw, an 18.8 point per game guard and the team's playmaker, was considered Tate's equal off coach Leroy Porter's title-winning crew, as two other Murphy players made the two honor teams.

The United Savings Helms Athletic Foundation Board also named co-Players of the Year in "A" Division play for 1972. L.A. Baptist, a team that compiled a phenomenal 26-3 record for 1972, had its star forward Alvin Joseph awarded MVP recognition by the United Savings Helms Board, along with 29 Palms' Kirk Bechtold, a repeater off last year's single A club.

L.A. Baptist coach Paul Smith calls his star 6-7, 190-pound forward "the best big man in CIF single A ... and should be MVP" ... and the board agreed. Bechtold, among the area's top scorers in '72 with a 24.9 point average, is called by his coach Eric Bond... "a prolific scorer and possessed of outstanding ability....a top prospect."

All four players of the year, along with championship coaches Leroy Porter of Murphy and Paul Smith of L.A. Baptist will be recipients of special awards at the 35th annual All-Southern California Board of Basketball Awards Ceremonies to be held early in April. All players named for both "AA" and "A" Division honors will also be presented with special framed scroll awards for their efforts on the basketball floor this past season.

Two A champion Murphy had little difficulty with its playoff competition as evidenced by the tournament scores. The Murphy Nobles actually managed very well against all opposition in 1972, losing only one game all year and that to "AAAA" Division champion Verbum Dei. The Nobles defeated Nordhoff by 14 points (59-45), Cathedral by 17 (73-56), La Canada by 16 and El Dorado in the finals by 10 (69-59).

One A champion L.A. Baptist, architect of a 26-3 season, also managed to run through playoff competition without much trouble. The purple and gold Knights, a free lance entry, knocked over St. Bonaventure by 14 points (81-67), Mojave by 33 (89-56), Bellarmine-Jefferson by 16 points (64-48), Whittier Christian by 12 (66-54) and Valley Christian in the finals by a 17-point margin, 80-63.

Twenty-one players make up the "AA" Division teams, with 14 schools represented. Murphy leads the parade with four players, while runner-up El Dorado landed three performers. Miraloste and South Pasadena placed two players each. There are 17 high schools represented on the 20-player "A" teams, with champion L.A. Baptist, Valley Christian and Bishop Diego placing two players each.

## ALL-STARS TO RECEIVE AMF-VOIT BASKETBALLS
