Programs of Study

The School of the Arts offers M.F.A. degrees in film (directing, producing, and screenwriting), theater arts (acting, directing, dramaturgy, playwriting, stage management, and theater management), visual arts (digital media, drawing, new genres, painting, photography, printmaking, and sculpture), and writing (fiction, nonfiction, and poetry). The School of the Arts accepts full-time students only. The Digital Media Center (DMC) offers a selection of courses in interactivity and advanced digital media applications. All DMC courses are interdisciplinary and open to School of the Arts students from all divisions. In addition, the Graduate School of Arts and Sciences offers the Ph.D. degree in drama and theater arts. The M.F.A. degree programs require 60 points of completed course work. All students take a core curriculum, which provides background in the history, theory, and literature of their field, and experience an understanding of the various disciplines taught within each division. During the first two years, students focus on workshops, lectures, and seminars in their particular disciplines. Students in film and theater arts partake in production crew work. Once the 60 points of course work are completed, each student concentrates on producing a thesis and/or completing internships under research arts status. The Division of Theatre Arts requires two professional internships; the Film and Writing Divisions recommend internships.

Research Facilities

The Film Division offers film and video production equipment, digital editing facilities, a sound stage, a screening room, and a film library. The Theatre Division offers two flexible-space theaters and two studios. In addition, there are various performing venues on campus that may be available for student productions. Each visual arts student is assigned a private studio (24-hour access) in Watson Hall on 115th Street and Prentis Hall on 125th Street. In addition, there are various spaces on campus where students have the opportunity to exhibit. The LeRoy Neiman Center for Print Studies provides the optimum environment to expose students to techniques in the production of intaglio, lithography, serigraphy, photography, and computer imaging. The University libraries house more than 6 million books, 4 million microfilms, and more than 26 million manuscripts. The library houses several special collections related to the arts, and it includes the Avery Architecture and Fine Arts Library. Students also have access to the Performing Arts Research Center of the New York Public Library at Lincoln Center as well as the vast holdings of the Central Research Library of the New York Public Library. There are dozens of special collections throughout New York City, such as the Film Study Center of the Museum of Modern Art, the Shubert Archives, and the Collections of the Players Club. New York City offers professional theaters, museums, galleries, movie theaters, concert halls, publishing companies, bookstores, and literary readings.

Financial Aid

The School seeks to work with students in arranging to cover costs through fellowships, scholarships, loans, and work-study. University scholarships, which are awarded by each division based upon merit, are limited. Departmental research assistantships, which carry tuition exemption plus a small stipend, are available, but generally only for second-year students. The Office of Student Affairs helps qualifying students arrange for federal financial aid.

Cost of Study

Tuition and fees for the 2004-05 school year were \$36,400, based on full-time matriculation of 12 to 18 credits.

Living and Housing Costs

The University estimates that students need about \$15,430 to cover living expenses and housing. University Apartment Housing is available to most graduate students, ranging from \$565 to \$1500 monthly, that offer furnished or unfurnished singles, suites, and studios to rent individually or to share. They also offer studio and one-bedroom apartments for married students.

Student Group

Columbia has an enrollment of approximately 22,000; 13,500 are graduate students. The School enrolled 778 full-time students in 2003–04: 318 students in film, 156 in theater arts, 256 in writing, and 48 in visual arts. There were 31 students enrolled in music composition.

Location

Columbia University (including Barnard College and Teacher's College) occupies approximately eighteen square blocks in the Morningside Heights area of Manhattan. Its neighbors include Union Theological Seminary, Jewish Theological Seminary, the Manhattan School of Music, Riverside Church and the Interchurch Center, and the Cathedral of Saint John the Divine, the world's largest Gothic cathedral and home of a progressive arts program. Riverside Park and the Hudson River are a block away. The Upper West Side stretches south along Broadway for sixty blocks to Lincoln Center and beyond to the Theatre District and incorporates vital residential neighborhoods, some of the city's finest restaurants, and several theaters and museums, including the Apollo Theatre, the National Black Theatre, and City College.

The University and The School

Columbia, founded in 1754, is composed of fifteen undergraduate, graduate, and professional schools. In the late nineteenth century, Columbia became the first university to teach theater in the United States and, in 1914, the first to teach film courses. The School of Dramatic Arts and Painting and Sculpture was established in 1948, although the first drawing course was taught as early as 1881. These programs were joined by film, music composition, and writing in 1965 to form the School of the Arts. Columbia also offers undergraduate majors in dance, film studies, theater arts, visual arts, and writing.

Applying

Applications are accepted for the fall semester only. All deadlines are final. The application cost for fall 2006 is \$100 for the online application and \$120 for the paper application. The GRE is not required for application. International students are required to take the TOEFL prior to application; the minimum score required for admission is 600 on the written test, 250 on the computer-based test, and 100 on the Internet-based test.
