
















The Alabama men's golf program lays claim to a rich tradition on the golf course. From head coaches Conrad Rehling to Dick Spybey to current boss Jay Seawell and players Jerry Pate, Steve Lowery, Spike McRoy, David Kirkpatrick, Marten Olander and Michael Thompson.

The Crimson Tide own two Southeastern Conference Championships with the first coming in 1979 and the latest – 29 years later – in 2008.

Marten Olander (right) captured the highest honor in college golf in 1993, winning the Ben Hogan Award. Maybe the most recognizable name is Alabama golf all-time great Jerry Pate, who won the 1974 United State Amateur. He then went on to capture numerous PGA titles, including the 1976 United States Open Championship and the 1982 The Players Championship.

Alabama has made 17 NCAA postseason appearances and qualified for the NCAA Championship Finals on 11 separate occasions with two top 10 finishes. The Tide have had 11 different players capture 17 All-America honors.

As policy to protect the safety and the privacy of our athletes, the Media Relations office does not give out phone numbers of its student-athletes. Media is prohibited from calling them at home or on their cell phones. Head Coach Jay Seawell may be reached at his office at (205) 348-0383. Seawell has two offices. One is located on the third floor of Coleman Coliseum and his other office is at the Jerry Pate Golf Center at Ol' Colony. The golf team typically practices each weekday, mornings some days and afternoons on others, depending on semester class schedules. Tournament and travel dates will also vary practice times and schedules.

TOURNAMENT INFORMATION

The University of Alabama is the host team for the Jerry Pate National Intercollegiate at Old Overton Club in Birmingham in October. Results will be made available on Alabama's website www.rolltide.com. Results are sent to each school after rounds. Coaches will be given a copy of the day's results following each round at the team hotel. Each school will be mailed two sets of the final results, one for the Media Relations file and one for the coach.

TIDE GOLF RESULTS & INFO

Current stats and releases about the Alabama golf team are available on the Crimson Tide's official athletics website, www.rolltide.com. The Alabama athletics department also offers a subscription based site, www.crimsontradition.com. This site takes the fans a step further, offering inside looks and video on all Crimson Tide sports.

SATELLITE FEEDS

The University of Alabama, through Crimson Tide Sports Marketing, offers a weekly 15-minute satellite video feed consisting of interviews with coaches and athletes, taped highlights and a narrated tape package. The University of Alabama has a weekly radio call-in show, "Hey, Coach!" The show airs on the Crimson Tide Sports Networks on Thursdays in the fall and on Mondays, December through May. It airs from 6 p.m. - 7:30 p.m. CT. Tom Roberts is the host of the show which features live interviews with Alabama's head coaches and student-athletes. During the golf season Tide men's coach Jay Seawell is a guest of the show. The show airs live from Wings Sports Grille in Tuscaloosa.

ALABAMA'S HOME COURSE

Ol' Colony Golf Complex — (7,041 yards, Par 72)

The home to Crimson Tide golf is Ol' Colony Golf Complex, a public course located just minutes from campus. It includes the Jerry Pate Golf Center which is devoted exclusively to the Alabama men's and women's golf teams. The Jerry Pate Golf Center has hitting bays, instructional areas, putting greens, office space and a driving range, all available only to Alabama's golf teams. The Jerry Pate Center officially opened on November 19, 2004. The course at Ol' Colony and the center were both designed by Pate, a U.S. Amateur champion and former UA golfer who had tremendous success on the PGA Tour and is now playing on the PGA's Champions Tour.

As president of The University of Alabama, Dr. Robert E. Witt has committed the University to an ambitious plan for growth and achievement. His goals include increasing enrollment to 28,000 students by 2010 and stimulating significant growth in research in support of economic expansion for the state and nation. Under his leadership, enrollment has reached record levels and academic quality has increased significantly. The University ranks 12th nationally among public universities in the enrollment of National Merit Scholars and leads the nation in the number of students named to USA Today's All-USA College Academic Teams. Since its inception in 2003, the University's Honors College has grown exponentially, enrolling more than 1,000 freshmen in 2007. Dr. Witt has also led a major building program on campus with 20 new facilities opening in the last five years. Private giving to the University is at an all-time high with supporters embracing the "Our Students. Our Future." capital campaign and its major goal of improving scholarship opportunities for deserving students.

Now in his sixth year as president, Dr. Witt came to UA with 35 years experience

in the University of Texas System. He received his B.A. in economics from Bates College, his M.B.A. from Tuck School at Dartmouth College, and his Ph.D. from Penn State University. He currently chairs the board of directors of the West Alabama Chamber of Commerce, serves on

the board of directors of the Black Warrior Council Boy Scouts of America and is a member of the Tuscaloosa County Industrial Development Authority. Dr. Witt and his wife, Sandee, have two grandchildren.



Normally, the naming of a building in your honor would serve as a fitting end to an outstanding career, but Mal Moore's ongoing vision remains focused on two primary objectives: elevating athletic facilities at the Capstone to premier status nationally for all sports and making all Crimson Tide athletic teams competitive at the highest level nationally.

Moore's distinguished record of service to UA began almost 50 years ago when he joined the Crimson Tide football squad as a scholarship player for Coach Paul "Bear" Bryant from 1958-62. He earned a bachelor's degree in sociology in 1962 and a master's in secondary education in 1963. Moore has the distinction of earning seven national championship rings during his career as a player and coach, the first as a member of the Crimson Tide's 1961 national championship team.

During his coaching tenure, Moore served as Coach Bryant's graduate assistant in 1964, then as defensive backfield coach for five years beginning in 1965 before becoming quarterbacks coach from 1971-1982 and taking on additional responsibility as the Tide's first offensive coordinator in 1975. He is the only individual connected with the Alabama coaching staffs, both past and present, to be a part of seven national championships (1961, 1964, 1965, 1973, 1978, 1979, and 1992). After coaching stops at Montana State, Notre Dame and the NFL's

St. Louis and Phoenix Cardinals, Moore returned to Alabama and was named assistant athletics director in 1993 and associate director for external affairs in 1994. He was named director of athletics on Nov. 23, 1999.

Three elements of his story make Mal Moore deserving of a special place in UA athletics history. First, he has been a part of seven national championship football teams (as a player and coach). Second, he's been the leader who brought the UA athletic program into the 21st century in terms of facilities and staffing. Third and, perhaps most importantly, his love for the University of Alabama is unsurpassed.

Now in his 10th year as the Tide's Director of Athletics, Moore made an indelible mark on one of the nation's most storied athletic programs. Alabama's athletic teams have excelled in competition and he directed completion of a \$125 million facilities campaign that revitalized the Crimson Tide's athletic facilities. Moore's leadership, vision and initiative enabled the monumental project to reach fruition.

A 1963 graduate of The University of Alabama, Moore holds both an undergraduate degree in Sociology and a 1964 Master's Degree in Secondary Education from the Capstone. A scholarship player for Coach Paul W. "Bear" Bryant, Moore was a member of Alabama's 1961 national championship team.

Under Moore's direction Alabama's

athletic teams have produced a number of Southeastern Conference titles, including men's basketball, gymnastics, baseball men's golf and softball and SEC tournament titles in both baseball and softball, and an NCAA gymnastics title. Alabama athletes have earned some of the highest honors the SEC and NCAA have to offer, including SEC Athlete of the Year, SEC Scholar-Athlete of the Year, NCAA Top VIII, NCAA Postgraduate Scholarships and NCAA Sportsperson of the Year. These honors are over and above the individual conference and national titles that Alabama athletes continue to bring home to the Capstone.

Coaching football for 31 years, 22 of those at Alabama, provided Moore with a wealth of experience and knowledge in the world of college athletics. Alabama won national championships in 1964, 1965, 1973, 1978, 1979 and 1992 with Moore coordinating all the offensive plays for the last four of those championship teams.

Moore was born December 19, 1939, in Dozier, Ala. He has been married to the former Charlotte Davis of Tuscaloosa since July 20, 1968. They have one daughter, Mrs. Steve (Heather) Cook of Scottsdale, Ariz., a granddaughter, Anna Lee, and a grandson, Charles Cannon.

- The University of Alabama ranked among the top 50 public universities in the nation for the seventh consecutive year in *U.S. News and World Report's* annual college rankings, fall 2007.
- The University of Alabama ranks 12th in the nation among public universities in the enrollment of National Merit Scholars.
- The Center for College Affordability and Productivity ranks The University of Alabama seventh in the nation among public universities in a study published in *Forbes* magazine, May 2008. Criteria included student evaluations, graduation rates, the percentage of students winning top national awards, and professional achievement of graduates.
- Seven University of Alabama students were named to the 2008 *USA Today* All-USA College Academic Team, the most of any school. This year's team brings UA's total for the last six years to 31, a figure that tops all other colleges and universities.
- Enrollment at The University of Alabama reached a record high of 27,052 for fall 2007. The entering freshman class, at 4,538 students, was the largest in UA history.

- The University of Alabama has a dramatic impact on the economy of Alabama, returning three dollars for every one dollar invested in the University by the state. UA each year contributes \$1.8 BILLION to the state's economy.
- The University of Alabama School of Law is ranked 11th among public law schools and 32nd among all law schools in the nation, according to *U.S. News and World Report's* annual "Best Graduate Schools" publication, spring 2008.
- *U.S. News and World Report* ranked the UA School of Social Work 28th among social work programs at public universities and 42nd when both public and private institutions are included in its graduate school rankings, spring 2008.
- UA's undergraduate business program ranked 29th among public undergraduate business schools in *U.S. News and World Report's* annual college rankings, fall 2007, and 48th when private universities are included.
- UA is regularly ranked among the top 100 public universities in *Kiplinger's* annual list of colleges and universities that

combine "great academics and affordable tuition."

- The University of Alabama debate and forensics program has won 16 national debate championships.
- The University of Alabama has produced a total of 15 Rhodes Scholars. And, in the past two decades, we've produced 26 Goldwater Scholars, 13 Hollings Scholars, 6 Truman Scholars, two Javits Fellows, one Udall Scholar and one Portz Scholar.
- One in four freshmen enrolled in UA's Honors College for fall 2007. These 1,066 students scored in the top 2 percent nationally on the ACT.
- For over a decade, UA has been one of the top public flagship universities in the Southeast in enrollment of African-American students. For the 2007-2008 academic year, African-Americans represent 11 percent of the student body.
- This year alone, more than 900 University of Alabama students will receive a total of more than \$2.3 million in scholarships provided by the National Alumni Association.



The home course for the University of Alabama men's and women's golf teams is Tuscaloosa's Ol' Colony Golf Complex. Named one of the "Top 5 Best New Public Courses in America" by Golf Digest in 2001, Ol' Colony Golf Complex certainly lives up to its reputation. The course was designed by former Alabama golfer Jerry Pate and opened in 2000.

It is designated as a First Tee chapter.

The 18-hole course has rolling hills and is heavily wooded with tall pines and soaring oaks. It is sure to test even the most advanced golfer with large bunkers, mature trees and water hazards, including a 25-acre lake, that will test every shot.

All carts are equipped with GPS systems, providing golfers a preview of the course layout, yardage and protips.

Another 18 holes, already designed by Pate, a former University of Alabama golfer who won eight major tournaments on the PGA Tour and is now starring on the Champions Tour, will be a welcome addition in the coming years.

Ol' Colony Golf Complex opened to much acclaim in December 2000 on 597 acres that was once a farm settlement and residence for a mental institution named Boy's Colony. The property, long abandoned by the institution, was tapped the perfect site for a course by the Tuscaloosa County Park & Recreation Authority. A premium driving range and its scenic 18-holes make this public course a must play.



The strength and conditioning staff usually starts its day as early as 6 a.m. and stays as late as 7 p.m. Athletes are required to undergo a daily workout schedule as much as four to five times a week. Some athletes choose to workout before classes begin in the morning while some others work out in the afternoon. These intense workouts insure that Alabama athletes stay in peak competitive form. Conditioning routines vary for different sports, since each requires a different output from different body parts. The Tide's 22,000 square-foot weight room consists of 24 platforms attached to state of the art racks with Eliko bars for power cleans, snatches, back squats, front squats, split jerks and bench press. The mural around the inside of the facility depicts more than 100 years of football and is also displayed on two walls of the football pressbox.





Even with the most physically conditioned athletes, injury can occur. The University of Alabama has a full staff of doctors and athletic trainers ready to lend their expertise to any medical situation so Alabama's athletes can return to play in peak condition as soon as possible.



Bryant Grille, located inside Bryant Hall, is a great place to eat and socialize. A full-service eatery, the Grille is open for breakfast, lunch and dinner and offers a sports environment with flat screen televisions.







The Paul W. Bryant Academic Center is the crown jewel in Alabama's \$125 million Crimson Tradition building initiative. Through the auspices of the Crimson Tradition Fund, Alabama took its former athletic dorm and converted it into a 55,000-square foot, state-of-the-art facility that benefits all 475-plus Crimson Tide student-athletes.

Among the building's many amenities is a 48-seat computer lab with brand new equipment. The computer lab also houses 25 laptop computers that can be checked out by student-athletes for use on road trips. There are math, English, and writing labs as well as individual study rooms. The athletic academic advisor offices are also housed in the building along with several study lounges, two 50-seat classrooms and a 140-seat classroom.

The classrooms have cutting edge teaching devices, including digital overhead projectors and "smart boards" that allow instructors to interact with students on the go. Throughout the building there are 16 information stations that provide student-athletes with news about tutorials, study sessions and even practice schedules.



The Crimson Tide golf team has a history of producing some of the University's best athletes and brightest students. Joseph Sykora, a senior in 2008, is the first three-time winner of the Southeastern Conference Scholar-Athlete of the Year award from men's golf, winning in 2006, 2007 and 2008 with his perfect 4.0 GPA. He is also a three-time ESPN The Magazine Academic All-America, winning in one of the toughest categories, the At-Large division which includes student-athletes from several sports. Sykora finished his Crimson Tide career by capturing the H. Boyd McWorter Award, given to the SEC's student-athlete of the year.

In 2008 the Tide golfers again won the athletic department's award for the men's team with the highest GPA.

Sykora was one of six Crimson Tide golfers named Academic All-SEC in 2008, along with Mark Harrell, Matt Hughes, Ben Moody, Matthew Swan, and Stewart Whitt. Their selection brought to 25 the number of Academic All-SEC golfers Jay Seawell has produced at Alabama.

Standing out in the classroom and playing a year-long sport is a feat not easily achieved. Golfers contend with a season that starts in early September and continues through the first week in June with the NCAA championships.

Despite those demands, Alabama has produced 77 Academic All-SEC golfers since 1985. Joseph Joyner was the first Tide golfer to be named to the Academic All-SEC Honor Roll in 1985. And, in 2004 when the SEC began its first Freshman Academic Honor Roll, Alabama produced two men on the list. Matthew Swan made that team in 2006.

Encouraging academic success is as much a part of Bama's coaching mantra as winning championships. Celebrating academic success is also a priority.

Six Tide men's golfers have won the University of Alabama's highest award for an athlete, The Bryant Award. Michael Thompson is the latest of the winners, taking the trophy in 2008. The award is announced each spring and is given to the top male and top female student-athlete at the University, placing emphasis on athletic achievement, academic achievement and leadership.

Dicky Pride, Marten Olander, Dan Mutert, Allan MacDonald and Michael Thompson are men's golfers who have won the Bryant Award. MacDonald was a 1997 Palmer Cup participant. Olander, an All-American on the golf course and a four-time Academic All-American, won the Ben Hogan Award. Pride is a PGA Tour player. Thompson was a 2007 U.S. Amateur finalist and played in the 2008 Masters and U.S. Open as an amateur as well as the 2008 U.S. Palmer Cup team.

Seawell and assistant coach Scott Limbaugh work closely with the Center for Academic Student Services. Former Tide golfer Lance Walker is an assistant on that staff. CASS monitors the academic progress of each athlete who wears a Crimson Tide uniform and advises the athletes on areas of study that best suit their capabilities and dreams. Study Hall is required for all freshmen and any athletes whose grades aren't Academic All-SEC worthy.

Jon Dever is Alabama's Assistant Athletics Director for Student Services. The CASS center is located in the Bryant Academic Center as is the Champs' Lifeskills program. The Bryant Academics Center, which houses the CASS staff and is a frequent stop in the daily lives of Alabama's student-athletes is the crown jewel in the Alabama athletic department's Crimson Tradition Fund facility enhancement campaign. The renovation project at Bryant Hall was completed for \$10.3 million in 2005.

"This project has been priority one since we started the renovations of our athletic facilities," said UA athletics director Mal Moore. "Academics is at the center of our mission at Alabama and we wanted to create a place that would aid all our student-athletes in their educational pursuits. I feel very strongly that Bryant Hall will benefit every student-athlete, not just during their years at Alabama, but for a lifetime."

Among the building's many amenities is a 48-seat computer lab equipped with brand new equipment. The computer lab has 25 laptop computers available for student-athletes to check out and use on team road trips. The building features math, English and writing labs along with 40 individual study rooms. A pair of 50-seat classrooms and a 140-seat lecture hall are also available.

Located in the lobby of the building is the Crimson Tide Academic Hall of Fame with plaques recognizing all of Alabama's Academic All-American selections.

The University of Alabama's student-athletes receive not only classroom education but leadership education. The CHAMPS (Challenging Athletes' Minds for Personal Success)/Life Skills Program offers a variety of programs geared toward the personal growth and development of student-athletes.

The concept of CHAMPS/Life Skills is to provide the student-athlete with the necessary tools to succeed in sport as well as other areas of life, such as in the classroom, in the community and in the workplace. In 1999 the University of Alabama CHAMPS/Life Skills Program was given the Program of Excellence Award by the Division I-A Athletic Directors' Association.

Alabama calls its own program the T.U.S.K.S. program, borrowing its mascot, the elephant, for the name. It stands for "Tide Uniting in Service, Knowledge and Support," and its programs and goals are geared toward a commitment to academic excellence, athletic excellence, personal development, community service and career development.

An excellent leadership source, Alabama's CHAMPS/Life Skills exposes the Tide's student-athletes to a variety of programs with topics that include alcohol and drug education, time management, personal relationships, stress management, media training, professional career planning and even etiquette.

Stuart serves as advisor for the Student-Athlete Advisory Committee which is composed of at least two student-athletes from every sport. S.A.A.C. is very active on campus and in the Tuscaloosa community, sending student-athletes to schools, churches and organizations and hosting events such as the Halloween Extravaganza which provides kids with a safe place to trick-or-treat and play games, The Gatorade "Get 60" programs which encourages local school children to par-

ticipate in 60 minutes of physical activity a day for 60 days, the Beat Auburn/Beat Hunger food drive that helps stock the Weest Alabama Food Bank, and Project Angel Tree each year where student-athletes and athletics department employees purchase Christmas gifts for children in need.

Alabama's men's golf team is extremely active in the community. It won the athletic department's 2008 Community Outreach award as the team that spent the most hours volunteering and working in the community.

One year removed from its SEC Championship in 29 years, the Alabama men's golf team may be comprised of several new faces, but the goals are still the same.

Last season, Crimson Tide coach Jay Seawell was able to ride the talent and senior leadership of his team throughout a banner year for the Alabama program, all the way to the school's second No. 1 national ranking ever, the SEC Championship and a 13th-place finish at the NCAA Championships.

This year, he finds himself with a roster featuring just two seniors, Matt Hughes and Matthew Swan, and six freshmen, including three true freshmen. Leading the way in the freshman group is Bud Cauley, who ranks 13th nationally in the individual Golfweek/Sagrin Performance Index entering the spring campaign. He played 12 rounds during the fall season at Alabama with five coming in below par.

"We still do have two returning starters which will be helpful," Seawell said. "We are going to depend on some freshmen to play that have never played before, but these guys are highly recruited, highly touted young guys. We want to continue to build Alabama into a national power and we know that we may have to be a little patient in the beginning but by the end of the year I think people will see that there really won't be any drop off."

Swan has provided the leadership for Seawell's Crimson Tide team. The Montgomery, Ala., native was an honorable mention All-American last season and is considered one of the top ball strik-



ers in collegiate golf. Swan ranks 30th nationally in the Golfweek/Sagrin Performance Index entering the spring season. He has played in 41 career tournaments for the Tide and registered 26 top 25 finishes, including nine top 10 finishes.

Hughes also brings a wealth of knowledge and experience on the big stage after finishing 15th at last year's SEC Championship while also competing in the NCAA Regional and NCAA Championship. A 2007 U.S. Amateur participant, Hughes has played 43 career rounds at Alabama.

Alabama's six team championships last season set a school record and included the SEC title. For much of the year, Alabama was the No. 1 team in the country, powered by the Tide's senior-laden lineup, which included All-SEC golfers Mark Harrell and Gator Todd, two-time tournament medalist Joseph Sykora and 2007 U.S. Amateur Finalist and Ping All-American Michael Thompson, who was selected last year as the SEC Golfer of the Year.











Following the leadership of his seniors, Seawell's team swept through the SEC Championships, leading the tournament wire-to-wire, with Thompson capturing SEC Medalist honors with an 8-under par tournament. For his team's work, Seawell was named SEC Coach of the Year.

"They were a great team with a lot of great chemistry, but really good players make coaches look really good," Seawell said. "Talent gets you a good team, but chemistry is why we were great, and that's what we want to try to build here. With freshmen, it's not so hard about golf, it's just building a team and personalities together and it may take a little time. But I like our guys and I like the group we've got."

It hasn't taken Alabama long to find its swing with as many as four freshmen in the Crimson Tide's lineup, vaulting to a No. 3 in the Nike/ Golf World Coaches Poll and No. 4 in the Golfweek/Sagrin Performance Index. No. 1 Georgia is the lone SEC squad ranked ahead of the Tide with No. 9 Arkansas, No. 12 Florida and No. 14 South Carolina trailing the Crimson Tide.

Alabama turned in a strong fall slate, finishing in the top 10 in all four tournaments and the top five in three events. The Crimson Tide also notched a tournament victory, capturing the Jerry year. The Tide opened the year with a sixth-place showing at the Carpet Capital Collegiate, posting an 11-over-par 875. UA then ventured to the site of the 2009 NCAA Championships for the PING/Golfweek Preview where they finished fifth with a 16-over-par 868. Alabama then fired a season-low 10-under-par 830 to win the Jerry Pate National Intercollegiate at the Old Overton Club in Birmingham. The Tide finished the year off with a second-place finish at the Isleworth-UCF Invitational (+20, 884).

The Crimson Tide will compete in four spring tournaments, including the John Hyatt Collegiate, the Puerto Rico Classic in Rio Grande, Puerto Rico, the Callaway Collegiate Match Play and the U.S. Collegiate Championship before the SEC Championship in April and NCAA Regional and Championship play in May, 2009.

Named the University of Alabama's head men's golf coach on July 26, 2002, Jay Seawell has rekindled the proud tradition of the Crimson Tide program and has quickly established Alabama as one of the elite programs in the country during his tenure in Tuscaloosa.

Now in his seventh season at the helm of the Crimson Tide men's golf program, Seawell has his teams routinely ranked among the top 10 in the country while leading UA to five NCAA Tournament appearances and three NCAA Championships berths.

Seawell's last two teams have finished sixth and 13th, respectively, in the NCAA Championships while the 2008 team also captured the school's first Southeastern Conference Championship since 1979. UA success over the past several years has energized the Tide's alumni base and created an excitement for Alabama golf not seen in recent memory.

Alabama's 2007-08 team finished the season ranked No. 3 in the final *Golf World*/NIKE Coaches poll and captured its first Southeastern Conference golf championship in 29 years. Seawell's success at Alabama has caught the attention and respect of his coaching peers who voted him the 2008 SEC Coach of the Year. His 2008 Tide team co-led the nation in team tournament championships with six wins. He has coached Alabama to 13 team tournament championships and five individual championships in seven years, including four medalists in 2007-08. The team also set the school's 54-hole record with the 810 it shot to win the 2007 Jerry Pate National Intercollegiate.

His 2006-07 Alabama team made UA history, catapulting to the nation's No. 1 ranking in all three collegiate polls in September of 2006 and holding on to the top spot in the Coaches' poll from September through early February of 2007. The team won four tournaments and set school scoring records en route to a sixth-place finish at the NCAA Championship and a runner-up showing at the SEC Championships.

Seawell is producing headline-worthy men, on the course and in the classroom. His golfers are among the most active in the Tuscaloosa com-

munity, volunteering their time at schools and helping host athletic department sponsored events for kids. In 2007-08, the golf team won both of the UA Athletic Department's biggest awards, the Men's Team with the Highest GPA and the Men's Community Service Award.

Golf produced six Academic All-SEC award winners in 2008. Joseph Sykora, was a three-time ESPN The Magazine Academic All-American and was voted by the league's golf coaches as the SEC Scholar-Athlete of the Year for an SEC record three times, winning in 2006, 2007 and 2008. In 2008, Sykora won both the SEC's H. Boyd McWhorter Scholar-Athlete Award (all sports, all males in the league) and the University's Bryant Award as its top male student-athlete of any sport.

Seawell has coached 11 All-Americans during his coaching career, including his latest, Michael Thompson in 2007 and 2008. In 2008 his Alabama golfers were nominated for the sport's highest national awards, including the Ben Hogan Award, the Jack Nicklaus Award and the Byron Nelson Award.

Seawell arrived at the Capstone for the 2002-03 season and quickly established a formula for success. His first Crimson Tide team finished sixth at the SEC Championships, after a ninth-place showing the year before. Alabama also qualified for the NCAA East Regional, only the second appearance in the previous six seasons for the Tide.

The 2003-04 season helped build the foundation for the coming years at Alabama. The Crimson Tide finished 11th at the SEC Championships, but captured its first tournament team title with a win at the Conrad Rehling Invitational and proved it was building for the future.

That future came quickly as the Crimson Tide qualified for not only the NCAA Regionals in 2005, but finished tied for 28th at the NCAA Champi-

onships. It was Alabama's first NCAA Championship appearance since the 1996 season. The Tide posted a sixth-place finish at the NCAA East Regional to qualify.

The Crimson Tide again qualified for NCAA regional play in 2006, finishing 14th at the NCAA West Regional. Alabama also recorded a third-place finish at the SEC Championships, its best at that time since a third-place showing in 1990.

He began his coaching career at Anderson College where he coached from 1991-96, winning five consecutive Region 10 championships. His work earned him five Region Coach of the Year Awards. After briefly leaving Anderson for another career pursuit, Seawell returned to coach Anderson again in 1997-98 then was hired by Augusta State as its head coach prior to the start of 1998-99 season.

He led ASU to four straight NCAA Regional appearances and three trips to the NCAA Championships. Seawell's 2001 team finished seventh at the NCAA Championships before turning in the best finish in school history the following year with a fifth-place showing. He coached three All-Americans during his tenure at ASU, including two-time All-American Jamie Elson and All-American and former Ryder Cup player Oliver Wilson.

Seawell is a 1988 graduate of the University of South Carolina. His degree is in hotel and restaurant management. He lettered on the Gamecocks' golf team and served as the president of USC's Fellowship of Christian Athletes. Seawell and his wife, Stephanie, have three children: Brooke, Jackson and Lauren.



Scott Limbaugh is in his second season as the Crimson Tide's Assistant Golf Coach and brings a wealth of experience as both a coach and a former collegiate golfer. He is also the Director of the Alabama Golf Academy and the Tide's recruiting coordinator.

Hired in July of 2007, Limbaugh was the head golf coach at Huntingdon (Ala.) College for three years (2005, 2006 and 2007) before joining the Crimson Tide's coaching staff prior to the 2007-08 season.

Limbaugh, a Childersburg, Ala., native, was the 2005-06 Eaton/Golf Pride South Region NCAA Division III Coach of the Year. He coached Huntingdon to a fourth-place NCAA Division III men's golf finish in 2007, its best finish in school history. It was Huntingdon's third straight NCAA appearance as Limbaugh's teams qualified all three seasons he was head coach, in 2005, 2006 and 2007. His first Huntingdon team in 2005 finished ninth and the 2006 team finished 15th. His 2006 team was ranked No. 1 for most of the season in Division III.

He produced an All-American in Fairhope's Jacob Collinsworth who finished second individually at the NCAA Division III Championships. Collinsworth is one of three All-Americans Limbaugh produced at Huntingdon.

Limbaugh played collegiately for the Hawks for two seasons after helping lead Central Alabama Community College to two NCAA Junior College National Championships. Limbaugh was a co-captain on that 2000 national champion team for Central Alabama. As a golfer at Huntingdon, he competed at nationals and was team captain in 2002. He is a 2003 graduate of Huntingdon College and was hired as Huntingdon's assistant golf coach upon graduation. He was elevated to head coach in June of 2004.







After an outstanding career as a player for Alabama head coach Jay Seawell, Gator Todd joins the Crimson Tide's coaching staff as a student assistant for the 2008-09 season. Todd will aid the Alabama staff with practice setup and training.

A four-year letterman for the Tide, Todd played in 43 tournaments during his Alabama career while logging 130 total rounds with a 73.55 scoring average. 



Each October 12 of the nation's best men's college golf teams gather in Birmingham, Ala., for the University of Alabama's annual Jerry Pate National Intercollegiate. In addition to hosting a premier field and event, the tournament annually raises some \$20,000 for charities.

The host and tournament namesake is the most successful professional golfer to have worn the Crimson and White, Jerry Pate. The former Tide golfer and current Champions Tour player proudly lends his name and plays an active role - from team selection to presenting the awards trophies.

Pate and Alabama have hosted this event since 1986. Originally, it was held in Pate's hometown of Pensacola, Fla. He moved the tournament to Birmingham's Shoal Creek in 1992 where it remained for five years. In 1997 the JPNI moved to its current home, Birmingham's Old Overton Club.

The strength of the JPNI field makes it a premier team fall gathering. Even the selection committee is a powerful one. The tournament's selection committee has included PGA greats Arnold Palmer, Ben Crenshaw and Mark McCormack. The committee seeks the highest ranked teams from the previous season who are expected to again be in the national title hunt. In the Fall of 2004 Georgia finished fourth at the JPNI but went on that spring to win the NCAA title. The 1995 JPNI champion Arizona State, won the (spring) 1996 NCAA Championship, and fall 1997 JPNI participant UNLV didn't win the JPNI, but went on to win the 1998 NCAA title. The 1994 field included all of the top nine from the 1994 NCAA Championships, including national champion - and 1994 Jerry Pate Champions - Stanford, led by 1994 U.S. Amateur Champion Tiger Woods. Woods was also the 1994 JPNI medalist.

Daphne native Joseph Sykora opened his senior season on the University of Alabama golf team by claiming an international collegiate championship of sorts. Sykora shot 67-66-69/202 to finish 14-under par and four shots better than anyone else in the field at the 2007 TOPY Cup U.S. vs. Japan Intercollegiate Golf Championship. His Crimson Tide team was beaten by a stroke for the team championship. Alabama finished second to Japan's Tohoku Fukushi University, which finished the tournament at 22-under par after shooting the low final round, 283. Tohoku Fukushi shot 283-276-283/842 to win.

Alabama finished 21-under par on the Tanagura Den-Sha Country Club course in Tanagura Town, Japan. Alabama opened the tournament in a tie for third place after shooting 284. The Tide then shot a 15-under 273 as a team in the second round to lead going into the final round. Alabama shot 286 in the third round to finish second of the 10 teams, four of those NCAA contenders and the other six Japanese collegiate powers.

The final team standings saw Tohoku Fukushi University finishing first (842) followed by Alabama (843), No. 1-ranked Stanford (282-276-289/847) at 17-under, Duke (852) at 12-under, Nihon University (856) at 8-under, Chuo Gakuin University (879) at 15-over, Clemson (880) at 16-over, Nagoya University of Commerce (893) at 29-over, Kyushu Tokai University (900) at 36-over, and at 10th Senshu University (901) at 37-over par.

Sykora was the tournament's medalist, winning his second career individual collegiate championship to go with his Jerry Pate National Intercollegiate title in 2006. Though it wasn't a record, his 202 in the final round in Japan found him finishing that tournament at 14-under on the Tanagura club course.

He finished four shots ahead of Tohoku Fukushi's Yuta Ikeda who finished 10-under (68-69-69/206). Tied for third at 9-under was Alabama's Michael Thompson, who shot 70-66-71/207. UA's Mark Harrell finished 20th at 2-over, carding 74-69-75/218. Matt Hughes was the only player in Alabama's lineup that didn't play in the Crimson Tide's 2006 Carpet Capital Collegiate Classic, but his play down the strech in the final round was the key to the Tide's title defense.

Hughes' play in the final round, a 5-under par round, helped the Crimson Tide capture its second straight Carpet Capital Collegiate Classic title. Alabama won the event on the first hole of a playoff against the University of South Carolina.

"You play the best four out of five scores on the hole, and we played it 2-under, and South Carolina played it 1-under," said Alabama men's golf coach Jay Seawell who collected his fifth Tide team championship in his last 15 tournaments with the win. "Gator (Todd) made a seven or eight footer for birdie to win the playoff."

It was Alabama's second tournament of the 2007-08 season. Alabama shot 292-295-282/869, shooting 6-under in the final round, finishing 5-over par for the tournament to win. South Carolina was second (869) after the playoff, followed by Georgia Tech (870), Auburn (875), Duke (880), Georgia (882), Wake Forest and Tennessee (883), Chattanooga and Texas Tech (886),

East Tennessee State (888), Florida (893), Clemson (897), Augusta State and TCU (898), Georgia State (900), Vanderbilt (901) and North Carolina State (902).

Thirteen of the 18 teams among the field were nationally ranked. The tournament was played at The Farm, a par-72 layout. Play was scheduled to begin on Friday, but five inches of rain in the Rocky Face, Ga., area post-poned the start to Saturday. Teams played two rounds on Saturday and the final round on Sunday.

Alabama won four regular season tournament championships in 2006-07. The Carpet Capital Classic was its first chance to defend one of those titles.

"It was great how we won it today," said Seawell. "It was the first time we've had a come-from-behind victory. We've had the lead in all our other victories. We played to win today. I'm proud of how we played. We played fearless in trying to find a way to win. And we did."

U.S. Amateur finalist Michael Thompson finished second at 5-under par in the final individual standings. The Alabama senior shot 72-70-69/211, carding 3-under on Sunday. Georgia Tech's Chesson Hadley finished 3-shots ahead of Thompson to win it at 8-under, 65-69-74/208.

Hughes finished tied for 10th. He shot 5-under on Sunday and finished even for the 54-holes, shooting 74-75-67/216. It was his best collegiate career finish.

"He birdied eight of his last 10 holes," said Seawell. "I knew Matt could play. We didn't shuffle our lineup just to do anything other than give someone who deserves an opportunity to play, and he made the most of it. He birdied eight of his last 10, and we don't win the golf tournament this week if Matt Hughes wasn't in the lineup. He birdied a playoff hole, too, so technically, he actually birdied nine of his last 11 holes and he eagled a hole in the second round on Saturday."

The other three Tide golfers, who, along with Thompson, were among the five who won the Carpet Capital in 2006 as well, included Mark Harrell who finished tied for 35th after shooting even in the final round (75-75-72/222), Matthew Swan finished tied for 40th (71-75-77/223) and Todd was the hero with the birdie in the playoff, finishing tied for 70th (80-77-74/231).

Firing a school-record and tournament record 42-under finish of 810, the University of Alabama successfully defended its Jerry Pate National Intercollegiate title and produced back-to-back tournament champions with yet another school record as Alabama's Mark Harrell was co-medalist firing a school individual record 198.

The Tide shot 270-268-272/810 to finish 17 shots ahead of UAB who finished second at 827, which is 25-under par. It was only the second time Alabama had won the tournament's championship, 2006 being the first, in this decades old event which annually brings together many of the nation's top-ranked teams.

Alabama, which produced the 2006 JPNI medalist in Joseph Sykora, produced the co-winner in 2007 as senior Mark Harrell finished 15-under par, 198, also a school 54-hole record, to win. Harrell bettered Sykora's school record of 199 that he shot to win in 2006. Harrell shared medalist honors on Tuesday with East Tennessee State's Seamus Power (65-66-67/198). It was the first collegiate championship for Harrell, the Hazlehurst, Ga., native who won the stroke play at the Public Links this past summer. The tournament was played on the par-71 course at Old Overton Club in Birmingham and was hosted by the Crimson Tide.

Three Alabama golfers finished among the top ten individuals. All-American and 2007 U.S. Amateur finalist Michael Thompson shot 67-67-66/200 to finish 13-under par and in a tie with Florida's Billy Horschel for third place. Michael Thompson birdied the 18th hole in the third and final round to help the University of Alabama men's golf team, which was trailing UCLA at one point late in the round, win its third team tournament championship of the 2007-08 season. Alabama successfully defended its 2007 John Hayt Collegiate Invitational Championship by winning it again in 2008. Alabama, ranked No. 2 in the Golf Week/Sagarin rankings and No. 3 in the Golf World Nike Coaches' rankings, shot 290-293-290/873 to finish 9-over par and best the field of 15 teams. It was the third tournament this season, of three possible, where Alabama returned as the defending team champion and the third time it successfully defended its 2007 title. Alabama won four tournament championships last season and returned to play in three of those, winning the Carpet Capital, the Jerry Pate National Intercollegiate and now the John Hayt. The Hayt was Alabama's spring season opener.

"Sawgrass is always fantastic," said Alabama golf coach Jay Seawell whose Crimson Tide teams have won seven team championships in its last 17 tournaments. "Every year I come here this tournament gets better. To be able to come up the 18th fairway and see all of the people around the green, that tells you this is a big time tournament. It's an honor to have this trophy again."

It was Alabama's fifth stroke-play tournament this season, giving it three tournament championships, one second place and a third-place finish since the team opened the season at Japan's Topy Cup on September 4.

Sawgrass Country Club, par 72, was the site of the 2008 John Hayt Collegiate. Alabama won by four shots over UCLA. The Crimson Tide shot 2-over par, 290, in the final round. UCLA shot 1-over to finish 13-over for the tournament (295-293-289/877). Tied for third were team tournament host North Florida and Tennessee (886). Charlotte, which went into the tournament having won all four of its stroke play events in the fall, finished tied for fifth with Florida (889). UAB and Coastal Carolina finished in a tied for seventh (893). Pepperdine and Georgia State finished tied for ninth (894). Matthew Swan became the third different University of Alabama golfer to hoist an individual tournament championship trophy this season and his Crimson Tide teammates held up another team tournament championship trophy, the fourth of the season as Alabama won the Puerto Rico Classic on March 2.

The Tide finished at 10-under par on the par 72 Rio Mar Country Club course in Rio Grande, Puerto Rico, to finish three shots ahead of top fiveranked Oklahoma State. Alabama shot 289-285-280/854 to win its second tournament in a row in just two tournament appearances this spring. It has now tied the mark of four tournament championships it won last season. Alabama won the Carpet Capital Collegiate on September 16, the Jerry Pate National Intercollegiate on October 9 and the John Hayt Intercollegiate on February 19. It has won each of those tournaments using a different lineup.

In Puerto Rico, Alabama used the same lineup that finished sixth at the 2007 NCAA Championships for the first time in the six stroke play events. Swan, a Montgomery native, was among those and claimed his first individual tournament championship when he bested the field of 75 individuals with his 12-under par finish, winning by five shots over Oklahoma State's Rickie Fowler who finished second at 7-under. Swan shot 66-71-67/204 to win

He became the third different Tide golfer to win an individual championship this season. With a 14-under par finish, Joseph Sykora won the Topy Cup, an international tournament in Japan that featured U.S. colleges going against Japanese universities. Mark Harrell was co-champion of the Jerry Pate, setting a school 54-hole record with his 198 score, a 15-under par finish. Only one other time in Alabama golf history have three different golfers won individual championships in the same season. Alabama's 1974 team saw Jerry Pate win two championships and both Alan Pate and Tony Hollifield win individual championships.

Joining Swan in the top 10 individuals at the Puerto Rico classic was his teammate Michael Thompson, winner of four collegiate individual titles as a golfer at Tulane as a freshman and sophomore. The 2007 U.S. Amateur finalist saved his best round for last, shooting 5-under, 67, on Sunday. Thompson finished tied for 10th (74-72-67/213). Sykora shot 68 on Sunday and finished tied for 31st (77-75-68/220). Harrell finished tied for 47th (75-67-82/224) and Gator Todd finished tied at 57th (74-75-778/227).

The field of 15 teams included seven nationally ranked teams, including Alabama. Georgia is ranked No. 1 in both the Golfweek and Golf World rankings. Alabama is No. 2/No. 3. Clemson is No. 16/No. 13; Duke No. 13/No. 12; East Tennessee State No. 24/No. 29; and Georgia Tech No. 6/No. 8 and No. 4/No. 5 Oklahoma State.

In the final team results, Alabama was first, 854, followed by Oklahoma State, 857, Georgia, 861, Duke, 863, East Tennessee State, 867, Michigan, 870, Georgia Tech, 871, Clemson, 875, North Carolina State, 876, Virginia Tech, 878, Texas, 881, Northwestern, 884, Kent State, 886, Minnesota, 904, and Purdue, 911.

Senior All-American Michael Thompson shot 3-under par in the final round, missing the individual championship by one stroke, but still led the University of Alabama to a record fifth team tournament championship when at the Schenkel E-Z-Go.

It bettered the school's previous season standard of four team tournament victories on a Jerry Pate led Alabama team in 1974 and four won by the 2007 and 2008 teams.

Alabama won its latest championship by seven strokes, shooting 4-under, 284, as a team to finish 15-under par (285-280-284/849) on the par 72 course at Forest Heights Country Club in Statesboro, Ga. Florida finished second at 8-under, 856. South Carolina also finished under par at 5-under, 859. In fourth was Tennessee, 865, with host Georgia Southern and UAB, 870, in fifth. LSU was in seventh at 871, followed by Kentucky, 877, North Florida, 881, North Carolina, 885, Augusta State, 886, tied at 12th Auburn and Notre Dame, 888, at 14th Michigan State, 890, then Minnesota, 891, North Carolina State, 892, New Mexico, 901, and Boston College, 937.

Thompson flirted with his first collegiate championship at Alabama—he won four individual championships in two seasons as a golfer at Tulane before transferring to Alabama last season. But he came up just short. The Tucson native and 2007 U.S. Amateur finalist, shot 69-71-69/209 to finish 7-under par. South Carolina's George Bryan IV edged him out at 8-under par, aided by a 66 in Saturday's second round to win (73-66-69/208). Thompson has competed in six tournaments this season and has finished among the top 10 individuals in all six with two second-place finishes, two thirds, a fifth and a 10th place finish. All of his finishes have been under par, totaling 38-under.

Junior Matthew Swan, who won his last time out on the course when he took the individual championship at the Puerto Rico Classic and led Alabama to the team title, finished tied for fourth at 5-under par. The Montgomery native shot 71-68-72/211. Athens' Stewart Whitt finished tied for 18th at 1-over par (69-71-77/217). Mark Harrell, Alabama's 2007 U.S. Open participant from Hazlehurst, Ga., finished 4-over and tied for 33rd (76-74-70/220). Matt Hughes of Dalton, Ga., finished tied for 44th at 6-over (79-70-73/222). Gator Todd competed as an individual and finished tied for 28th at 3-over par. The Tide's All-Southeastern Conference golfer from Florence shot 73-72-74/219.

Alabama's latest championship trophy will go alongside the other four it has won this season, the Carpet Capital Collegiate, the Jerry Pate National Intercollegiate, and the John Hayt Intercollegiate. Each championship has come among fields with a minimum of seven Top 25 teams competing. There were seven Top 25 teams competing in the Schenkel E-Z-Go.

The No. 1 Alabama golf team saw it's three tournament winning streak come to an end with a third-place finish at the Unithed State Collegiate Championship. After winning all three of its spring tournaments, three of Alabama's five golfers bogeyed their last hole and Alabama finished at 8-over par.

The Tide opened the tournament, nicknamed the Collegiate Masters, in a three-way tie for fourth at 6-over par on the par-72 Lakeside Course at the Golf Club of Georgia in Alpharetta, Ga. Alabama came back out in the

second round and shot 1-over par to move into second place, just two shots back of Southern California's lead. The Crimson Tide led the tournament briefly in the final round after a front nine where it made the turn at 1-over, but in the end, despite finishing the round at 1-over, couldn't catch Southern California or Oklahoma State who shot 5-under and 7-under in the final round. Fifth-ranked Southern California emerged as the tournament champions, finishing at even par, 294-287-283/864 to win among a field of 15 that included all eight of the nation's top-ranked teams.

Oklahoma State finished second at 3-over, 867. Alabama was third at 8-over, producing rounds of 294-289-289/872. In fourth was host Georgia Tech, 875, followed by Florida State, 977, Texas A&M, 881, UCLA, 882, Georgia State, 883, Georgia, 886, Charlotte, 889, Stanford, 897, East Tennessee 899, Coastal Carolina, 902, Texas, 916, and Brigham Young, 920.

The No. 1 ranked University of Alabama golf team played its final round of the 2007-08 regular season on Tuesday, April 8, finishing seventh at the Morris Williams Intercollegiate.

The two-day, 54-hole tournament was held April 7-8 at the University of Texas Golf Club. Texas, the tournament host, shot 3-over par Tuesday to climb from third to win the tournament at 16-over, shooting 291-290-287/868 on the par 71 course. Fifth-ranked Oklahoma State slipped from first to finish second after shooting 13-over in the final round and scoring 874 for the tournament. UNLV was third, 876, followed by Auburn, 883, Texas Tech and Central Florida, 885, Alabama (301-287-298/886), Louisville, 887, Brigham Young, 880, Pepperdine, 898, TCU, 904, Fresno State, 910, Tulsa, 915, San Diego, 917, and New Mexico, 920.

Alabama played the tournament without its low stroke leader and All-American, Michael Thompson. Thompson is in Augusta, Ga., this week competing as one of the three amateurs in the 2008 Masters Tournament.

Joseph Sykora had Alabama's best finish in Texas. He finished at 6-over par and in a tie for 13th, shooting 70-73-76/219. Next for the Crimson Tide was Matthew Swan who finished a shot back and tied for 17th (80-66-74/220). Matt Hughes finished tied for 29th at 11-over, 76-75-73/234. Mark Harrell finished 14-over and in a tied at 39th (79-73-75/227), and Gator Todd finished tied for 52nd at 17-over (76-76-79/230).

Jay Seawell has produced several firsts for Alabama golf during his tenure as the Crimson Tide's head coach, the biggest of those perhaps came on April 20 as Seawell's team orchestrated yet another first for the Crimson Tide golf program: Alabama swept the 2008 Southeastern Conference Championships.

The Crimson Tide won both the team championship and the individual championship with Michael Thompson capturing medalist honors. Alabama shot 13-under par in the final round at Frederica Golf Club in St. Simons Island, Ga., to win the team title as Thompson shot 65 to finish the tournament 8-under par.

"Michael played unbelievable golf," Seawell said following the Tide's first conference title in 29 years. "A 65 today under all the pressure and everything that's going on, that was a total round today. I'm very proud of him and happy for him. He's been close a couple of times. I know he did it when he was at Tulane, but now we can add a victory for him at the University of Alabama."

The win marks Alabama's sixth team tournament championship of the season out of 10 stroke-play events. It is Alabama's first SEC golf team championship in 29 years and only the second time ever it has won. Alabama's 1979 team won the league title as well. Thompson became only the second Alabama golfer in history to win the SEC's individual championship, a moment 56 years in the making. Bobby Hill won it for Alabama in 1952.

"There's nothing I can describe in words how pumped up we are," said Thompson from the clubhouse after his team won. "We were high-fiving on 18 green, just going nuts. It was crazy. And then one of our former golfers who flies us, he was calling all the guys who played on that 1979 team, and he said that they were all screaming."

Alabama, ranked No. 1 in the Golf World/Nike Coaches' Poll and No. 2 in the Golfweek/Sagarin rankings, led the tournament each day from the first to final round. It finished at 11-under par, scoring 285-293-275/853 to win on the par 72 course, finishing eight shots ahead of second place and No. 10 ranked South Carolina. Six of the 12 teams in the SEC are ranked among the nation's top 13.

"It feels fantastic," said Seawell shortly after the win. "It feels just like I thought it would. Unbelievable. I'm really proud of the guys. It was a tight day. The last four holes—we've talked about it—last year our last four holes were kind of our demise here. And this year the four holes were the difference. I am proud of them for how they played. Nobody hands you an SEC Championship. You've got to win it and the guys won it today. I'm really proud of them."

The final team standings saw Alabama finish first at 11-under, 853, followed at 3-under, 861, by South Carolina. No. 2 ranked Georgia finished third at 2-under, 862. Florida was fourth, 872, followed by Mississippi State, 878, Tennessee, 881, Ole Miss, 884, tied at 8th Auburn and LSU, 888, at 10th Vanderbilt, 890, at 11th Kentucky, 893, and at 12th Arkansas, 897.

When Thompson bested the field of 60 golfers, he became the fourth different Alabama golfer to win a collegiate championship this season. Joseph Sykora opened the season by winning the Topy Cup in September. Mark Harrell was co-champion at the Jerry Pate National Intercollegiate in October and Matthew Swan won the Puerto Rico Classic on March 2.

Thompson is perhaps Alabama most decorated golfer, advancing to the U.S. Amateur final in August and playing in the Masters as an amateur just a week ago. But even though the senior from Tucson, Ariz., has finished among the top 10 individuals in all seven of the tournaments he's played for Alabama this season and had seven top 10 finishes as a transfer last season, he had yet to win an individual collegiate championship at Alabama. He won four his freshman and sophomore seasons at Tulane in 2004 and 2005.

"This one feels awesome," said Thompson of his first Alabama collegiate win. "I couldn't have asked for anything better."

Thompson shot 70-73-65/208, with a 7-under par round in the third

round, to finish at 8-under par, four strokes ahead of his teammate, Sykora, who tied for second with South Carolina's George Bryan IV.

"I was making putts," said Thompson when asked what the difference was in Sunday's play. "Yesterday I couldn't make anything. I spent some time on the putting green just trying to get my feel back with my putting and went out today and birdied the first two holes and made like a 50-foot putt on No. 2 for birdie. And after that I just said to myself, 'Okay. Here we go, let's get it going,' because it was a putt I should not have made. I just kind of rode the momentum after that."

Thompson moved from fourth after 36 holes to win. Sykora led the field after both the first and second rounds. He finished tied for second, carding 68-73-71/212 to finish at 4-under par. Finishing tied for 15th were Alabama teammates Mark Harrell and Matt Hughes. Harrell had Alabama's biggest comeback of the tournament, going from a 77 in the second round to shooting 66 in the final round, a score that helped power Alabama's team win. Harrell shot 76-77-66/218. Hughes, playing in his first SEC Championship, shot 72-73-73/218, like Harrell, finishing 2-over par. Rounding out Alabama's win was Swan who shot 76-74-74/224 to finish tied for 37th at 8-over

"We shot 13-under today," said Seawell whose golfers birdied a total of 23 holes on Sunday. "We were 8-under the last four holes. It got good out there. South Carolina made an unbelievable run and then Georgia made one late. I think all that energy may have helped, I don't know what happened. I do think the guys on my team are winners. And when you're a winner, you've got to do what you've got to do to win. The other teams were making birdies so they understood that if they were going to win, they needed to make some and we made a whole bunch of them."

For the third time in Jay Seawell's six seasons as Alabama's head coach, the men's golf team advanced to the NCAA Championships. The Crimson Tide, the third overall seed and the one seed in the region, finished sixth at the 2008 NCAA Central Regional.

Ohio State hosted the regional at its par -71 Scarlet Course in Columbus, Ohio. It was one of three regionals held nationally, each with a field of 27 teams. The top 10 teams from each of the three regionals advanced to the field of 30 teams at the NCAA Championships.

It's the second year in a row Alabama advanced to the final field of 30. Alabama finished sixth at nationals in 2007. The Crimson Tide also advanced to the finals in 2005, finishing 28th. This will be the 11th time Alabama has made it to the championships since its first finals appearance in 1973. With regional and finals appearances combined, Alabama is making its 17th NCAA postseason appearance in school history.

No. 1 ranked Alabama played what Seawell describes as its first disappointing all-around round in the third and final round. Playing under very windy conditions, the Tide shot 25-over par in the final round to finish the regional at 44-over par. It shot 292-295-309/896 for the tournament. The 309 was its highest round this season.

"First of all the course played hard," said Seawell who guided Alabama to the 2008 Southeastern Conference Championship. "I told our guys that today was really the first time that we didn't play well. As a team, it was the first time we've had that where every one of them did not play well. I guess we just got on the wrong side of the course or something. But when it was over, I told them that you can't win a national championship unless you play for it, and what matters most is that even with how we played today, we still made the cut. The dream is still alive."

The NCAA Central Regional posted the highest scores in any of the regionals and was the only one of the three where no team emerged with an under-par finish. Wake Forest won the NCAA Central Regional at 27-over par finish (290-287-302/879), a sharp contrast to the NCAA East Regional in Chattanooga where 11 of the 27 teams finished the tournament under par, led by winner Georgia who won it at 41-under par.

The 10 teams that advanced from the Central Regional included, in scoring order, Wake Forest (879), Oklahoma State (889), Illinois (891), Florida and Louisville (894), Alabama (896), Texas A&M (897), Kent State and Purdue (898) and Indiana (901).

"The regional is different because you're playing to make it in and I think that can cause some struggles because it's all you're out there thinking about," Seawell said. "But our guys are fired up. They'll get the chance to play for a national championship, and they've worked hard all year to get this opportunity."

Oklahoma State's Kevin Tway, son of PGA Tour golfer Bob Tway, was the medalist. He finished 1-over par, shooting 70-69-75/214. Alabama's best finish was by two golfers, Matthew Swan and Mark Harrell who both finished in a tie for 33rd at 12-over par. Swan shot 71-76-78/225 and Harrell shot 70-74-81/225. Matt Hughes was next for Alabama, a shot back at 13-over, after firing rounds of 73-76-77/226 to finish tied for 41st. Joseph Sykora finished tied for 52nd at 14-over, shooting 79-72-76/227. Michael Thompson finished tied for 65th at 16-over par, shooting 78-73-78/229. It marked the first time this season Thompson, the SEC Golfer of the Year and SEC Champion, has finished out of the top 10.

The most successful run in University of Alabama golf officially ended at the 2008 NCAA Championships with a 13th-place finish. The 2007-08 Crimson Tide team played its final round of a season that has included winning a record six team championships and collecting only its second ever Southeastern Conference championship.

Alabama's senior-laden team wrapped up play at the 2008 NCAA Men's Golf Championships, making the final cut of 15 teams from the original field of 30 after 54 holes. It marked the last official collegiate round of golf for All-American Michael Thompson and All-SEC golfer Mark Harrell and two-time tournament champion Joseph Sykora. Alabama also says goodbye to 2007 All-SEC golfer Gator Todd who contributed to the program's success.

During the trophy presentation, Thompson was announced as a first-team Ping All-American.

"It's a class that put Alabama golf on the map," said Alabama head coach Jay Seawell following the final round at the Kampen Course at the Birck Boilermake Golf Complex in West Lafayette, Ind. "We're now sitting here being disappointed at being at the NCAA Championships on the final round (with this finish) when we used to not go to them. I think that's what they did. They made Alabama Golf something people know about. Their character and what they stand for and all the things like that will be, hopefully, what we'll build our program around for years and years to come."

Alabama shot 309-297-297-315/1218 to finish 66-over par in the 72-hole tournament. None of the 15 teams broke 300 in the final round. UCLA won the championship, finishing the tournament at 42-over par to win by a shot over Stanford. UCLA shot 297-293-298-306/1194. Stanford finished second (1195), followed by Southern California (1196), Oklahoma State (1200), Clemson (1201), Kent State (1204), Washington (1208), Charlotte and Georgia (1210), Louisville (1213), Florida (1214), Texas A&M (1216), Alabama (1218), San Diego State (1222) and Middle Tennessee State (1225).

"It was just another brutal day today," said Seawell whose team, along with the 30 others originally gathered at the championships, has been battling wind, the rough, and tough course conditions all week. "The wind was in another direction and it was hard, and we didn't play very well. We were a little disgusted. You'd like to finish up on a better note, but these guys, especially these three seniors, have done something for Alabama golf that we have a chance to build on. I think as soon as the realization that there's not much that we could do out there, when the realized they weren't going to finish 10th or eighth in this wind. And I think when they saw that they couldn't, I think their spirit was gone and we didn't finish very well. But, you know what? The ride has been fantastic: an SEC Championship.

The first one in 29 years, so I am very proud of them and what they've done for our University of Alabama. There will always be a special place in my heart for them."

UCLA's Kevin Chappell was the NCAA medalist, winning at 2-under and by three shots over Indiana individual qualifier Jorge Campillo.

Thompson, who finished tied for fourth in 2007 at nationals, finished tied for 29th in 2008. He shot 16-over par (76-74-75-79/304). Swan and Harrell finished tied for 38th at 18-over. Swan carded 75-79-74-78/306. Harrell shot 79-73-75-79/306). Sykora finished tied for 64th at 25-over (79-82-73-79/313) and Hughes finished 80th at 37-over (90-71-82-82/329).

Alabama started the fourth and final round on the No. 10 tee and turned at 13-over par. At the midway point of the round, Alabama was tied for eighth with Thompson and Swan turning at 2-over par, Harrell turning at 4-over par, Sykora at 5-over and Hughes at 7-over after nine holes. By round's end, Swan came in with Alabama's best round, 6-over, 78. Three golfers came in at 7-over par, 79, including Thompson, Harrell and Sykora. Hughes shot 10-over par, 82.

"It was rough," said Swan, a Montgomery, Ala., native who, like Hughes, is a junior this season and will return for his final season next year. "It definitely wasn't what we wanted. But it was just real rough. The wind was blowing so hard and it just kind of beat you up all day, the course did. There was one hole that I could hardly even get to the fairway. It was fun but it kind of wasn't fun because the course was set up so hard. It was playing so hard with the wind. I think we're all kind of glad to get out of here. We're ready to go home."

Swan produced the round's low score for Alabama and also the highlight of the round when he made eagle on No. 15, a par 4. Swan made eagle in a practice round on No. 18 earlier in the week as well.

"I just holed out," said Swan of the eagle. "It was actually the second time this week. I holed out in the practice round as well. So I holed that one out and on one of the par three's I hit it to about half a foot. Then I had another ball that would have gone in but the flag stick wasn't in straight and it bounced out to about an inch."

For Thompson it meant an end to a quick career at Alabama. He transferred into the Alabama program his junior season in 2006-07 after Tulane, where he was an All-Conference USA golfer as a freshman and a sophomore, dropped men's golf. All-SEC last season, he led Alabama and won the SEC Championship in April, becoming Alabama's first league medalist in over 50 years. The league's coaches gave him their nod as the 2008 SEC Golfer of the Year, making him only the second Tide golfer ever to win that honor, joining PGA player Steve Lowery with that accolade. He was one of three finalists for the 2008 Ben Hogan Award that goes to the top golfer from all levels of collegiate golf, and he played in the 2008 Masters as an amateur. He will represent the United States on the Palmer Cup team in June right after he plays in the U.S. Open, and the Tucson, Ariz., native was a finalist at the 2007 U.S. Amateur.

"It is when I think about it. When I was out there it wasn't," said Thompson when asked following his final collegiate round if it was an emotional experience. "I actually got really lucky today. I got paired with Derek Fathauer (of Louisville) who I'd played in the quarterfinals of the U.S. Amateur, and a really good friend of mine, one of my teammates from Tulane plays for Louisville, so I know him real well. I was having a great time, just talking, chatting it up. Asking each other what we're going to do in the next year because we've both graduated. I guess that was good for me. It made me relax a little bit. But it really didn't help me play any better because the course was playing so ridiculously hard. It's just a tough day."

Though the team was disappointed with their final finish, Swan said this was a group that will always stand out and a season that will stand out.

"We really had an awesome time," Swan said. "We had such a close team, all of us got along. We always had a good time, every tournament. And winning was awesome. We won six times. We'll always remember that but we'll remember the fun we had together, all the guys. With it being the senior year for so many of the guys, knowing that going in, it was a real good year."

Thompson planned to return home to Tucson just days after nationals then drive from there to San Diego for his play in the 2008 U.S. Open. He likens the course he played at the NCAA Championships to a U.S. Open level challenge.

"This course is harder than any U.S. Open I've ever seen," said Thompson. "My dad just told me that Lanny Wadkins' son is playing in this tournament and Lanny said that he, in all of his years on the professional tour, he's never seen a golf course like this. Coming from a veteran like him who has played all of the hardest golf courses in the world, to me, the sooner I

can forget about this golf course, the better. It's just one of those courses where you play well you still get bad breaks and still shoot a lot and that's exactly what happened to me. Even without the wind, you have to hit really good golf shots. And the way they have the rough set up this week it's almost borderline unfair, especially with the wind. The wind really makes it extremely tough. You saw when it wasn't windy the first couple of days, it was kind of scorable but still very hard. I don't know. For a national championship it seems a little bit too hard. But everybody's got to play the same course. Unfortunately, we didn't play too well."

HOW IT WORKS

Each May, the NCAA hosts six regionals, which are spread around the country and provide for exciting golf from coast to coast. The six-regional format is new for the 2009 NCAA Championships and replaces the old three-regional system.

Each of the six regional sites will qualify five teams for the NCAA Championship Finals, being held at Inverness Club in Toledo, Ohio, on May 27-30. Those 30 teams will then play 54 holes of stroke play, with the individual champion being declared at that point. The top eight teams after the 54 holes of stroke play will then move on to match play and be seeded according to their finish in the stroke play portion. The No. 1 team will face the No. 8 team, No. 2 will face No. 7, No. 3 vs. No. 6 and No. 4 vs. No. 5. The team that wins three rounds of match play will be crowned the national champion.

Teams are selected for regional competition based upon their overall tournament finishes and head-to-head finishes against other teams that are in their region. Selection is made by a regional committee made up of head coaches.

From 1989 through the 2008 NCAA Championships, the finals consisted of 72 holes of play with a cut after 54 holes to the top 15 teams.

With 10 NCAA Team championships, the Southeastern Conference is one of the country's most successful collegiate leagues as well as a training grounds for professional golf. Not only is the league fielding national champion teams, but its rosters are filled with All-Americans, top amateurs and future professional golf successes.

SEC member Georgia won the 2005 and 1999 NCAA championships. Florida won its fourth national title in 2001 and LSU claimed four national team titles between 1940 and 1955. The league's six individual national golf champions include Fred Haas, Jr. (LSU) in 1937, Earl Steward (LSU) 1941, George Hamer (Georgia) 1946, R.H. Sikes (Arkansas) 1963, Bob Murphy (Florida) 1966, Chip Spratlin (Auburn) 1995 and Nick Gilliam (Florida) in 2001.

Representing the conference proudly, Alabama has been ranked as the nation's No. 1 collegiate team as recently as the 2008 season and has advanced to play in the NCAA Championship team finals 11 times, in 1973, 1974, 1975, 1981, 1983, 1992, 1993,1996, 2005, 2007 and 2008. It advanced to NCAA regional post-season play in 1991, 1994, 1997, 2002, 2003 and 2006 as well, giving Alabama a total of 17 NCAA postseason appearances.

The SEC has been holding an annual conference championship in men's golf since 1937. Alabama began competing for the golf title for the first time in 1965. Alabama has won the league's championship twice, in 2008 and 1979. Bama's Michael Thompson also was the SEC medalist in 2008.

Twelve schools make up the SEC's membership. Two, South Carolina and Arkansas, were added to the SEC beginning in the Fall of 1991. SEC members also include the University of Alabama, Auburn University, the University of Florida, the University of Georgia, the University of Kentucky, Louisiana State University, the University of Mississippi (Ole Miss), Mississippi State University, the University of Tennessee and Vanderbilt University.

From 1937-39 and from 1940-65, the SEC Championships were held as a part of the Southern Intercollegiate. Beginning in 1966, sites began to rotate as the conference held its own separate tournament. It has been held at Sea Island, Ga., since 2001. From 1969-78 the team title was determined by the five low scores of six players over 54 holes. Previously, four scores were used with play ranging from 18 to 72 holes. Beginning in 1979, the team title has been determined by the four low scores of the five players representing each school.




