WILDCATS TO MAKE 2013 COMMONWEALTH DEBUT VS. MIAMI (OH)

The University of Kentucky football team takes the field at Commonwealth Stadium for the first time this season on Saturday to square off against Miami (Ohio) at Noon ET.

Kentucky is opening the 41st season of football in Commonwealth Stadium. UK has won seven-consecutive home-openers since the 2006 season, adding to its all-time record of 93-23-6 in home debuts. This is the third time in school history that Kentucky has opened its home schedule against Miami (Ohio), holding a 2-1 record in those games.

The Wildcats are coming off a 35-26 loss to WKU last Saturday in the season opener at LP Field in Nashville, Tenn. Eleven Wildcats made their first career starts, including five on offense and six on defense against WKU, which is a school record for most first-time starts in a game dating back to records kept since 1993.

Kentucky has played Miami 12 times in a series that dates back to 1894. UK has a 7-4-1 advantage in the all-time series. The Wildcats will face the RedHawks for the third time in Commonwealth Stadium, and UK is 5-3-1 overall against Miami in Lexington. Kentucky won the last meeting between the two teams during the 2009 season at Paul Brown Stadium in Cincinnati, Ohio.

Miami dropped its season opener to Marshall last weekend as the RedHawks gave up 38 unanswered points to fall 52-14 after being tied 14-14 at halftime.

QUICK NOTES

- Kentucky is in its first season under head coach Mark Stoops, who was hired on Nov. 27, 2012 as the 37th head coach in school history. Since arriving, Stoops has reenergized the UK fan base, evident by a school-record 50,000 fans at the Blue-White Scrimmage earlier this spring.
- Stoops started the fall with 55 returning lettermen, including 12 primary starters from last season. The head coach inherited a young team that has some experience as 31 returners have started a game.
- UK was one of the nation's most inexperienced teams last season as 14 true freshmen - ranking sixth most nationally - saw playing time. A total of 27 freshmen played, including redshirt freshmen, which was fourth most in the country.
- The youth movement continued in game one of the 2013 season as UK had 11 first-time starters in the game against the Hilltoppers, which is a school record for first-time starters in a game according to records kept back to the 1993 season. A total of 10 newcomers (six true freshmen) saw action.
- The Kentucky football program is in its 123rd season of intercollegiate football.
- The Wildcats are entering their 41st season at Commonwealth Stadium, holding a 136-116-4 all-time record.
- UK has an all-time record of 93-23-6 in home openers. The Wildcats have won seven consecutive home openers dating back to the 2006 season.
- Junior wide receiver Demarco Robinson had a good first game for UK with his first career receiving touchdown and 197 all-purpose yards. Robinson ranks first in the SEC in punt return yardage 27 yards per return.
- Senior linebacker Avery Williamson currently leads all SEC players with 14 tackles after his strong game vs. WKU. Williamson now has nine double-digit tackle games in his career including five of his last six games.
- Senior kicker Joe Mansour made the first two field goals of his career vs. WKU from 22 yards and 30 yards.

FIRST SEASON**

- Named the 37th head coach of the Kentucky football program on Nov. 27, 2012
- First task as UK coach was to put together a bright and energetic coaching staff. Accomplished that feat by hiring two of the best up-and-coming coordinators in the game in D.J. Eliot and Neal Brown.
- Inherited a recruiting class ranked in the 60s by the national evaluation services before Stoops and Co. hit the trail hard to sign a top-30 class, securing the highest recruiting class ranking in school history.
- Offseason momentum paved the way for a school record 50,831 fans at UK's spring game - which was the sixth highest spring game attendance in the nation.
- Accomplished major defensive turnarounds at Arizona and Florida State. Full breakdowns at both places below.
- During Stoops' three seasons at FSU, the Seminoles went 10-4, 9-4 and 12-2, including wins over South Carolina in the 2010 Chick-fil-A Bowl, Notre Dame in the 2011 Champs Sports Bowl and Northern Illinois in the 2013 Orange Bowl.
- Developed many players to NFL careers, including Antoine Cason, Michael Johnson, Philip Buchanon, Kelly Jennings, Brandon Meriweather, Ed Reed, Antrel Rolle, Mike Rumph, Sean Taylor and Brian Lee.

GAME NOTES VS. MIAMI (OHIO)

SERIES RECORD VS. MIAMI (OHIO)

- Kentucky leads the all-time series against Miami (Ohio) 7-4-1, including a 5-3-1 mark in Lexington. Kentucky won the first five meetings in the series before Miami (Ohio) won four the next five meetings with the two teams tying in 1917. The series is tied 1-1 in games played in Oxford, Ohio, and UK lead 1-0 in games played in Cincinnati.
- The two teams last faced to start the 2009 season at Paul Brown Stadium in Cincinnati with the Wildcats posting a 42-0 victory. More about that game can be found below.
- Miami (Ohio) has won three of the last five meetings in games played in Lexington. Two of the last three meetings in Lexington have been home openers for the Wildcats with each team earning wins.
- Biggest UK win: 47 (47-0) in 1903 in Lexington ... Biggest Miami (Ohio) win: 14 (14-0) in 1920 in Oxford.
- Games decided by 7 points or less: Miami (Ohio) leads 3-2
- Current streak: UK has won two consecutive

SCOUTING MIAMI (OHIO)

- Miami (Ohio) is coming off a 52-14 season-opening loss on the road to the Marshall Thundering Herd. The two teams were tied at 14-14 going into halftime before the Herd scored 38 second-half points to take control of the game and claim the win.
- The RedHawks, which return 47 letterwinners from 2012, including 16 starters (5 offense, 7 defense, 4 special teams), were led offensively in the game by quarterback Austin Boucher, who went 10-for-22 for 165 yards and a touchdown. Steve Marck and Rokeem Williams were the top receivers with Marck catching four passes for 41 yards and a touchdown, while Williams had three catches for 77 yards. Austin Gearing was the leading rusher for the RedHawks carrying the ball six times for 27 yards, while Dawan Scott had two carries for 21 yards.
- Jay Mastin lead the team on the defensive side of the ball with 12 tackles and an interception, while Kent Kern had 13 tackles and 0.5 tackles for loss. J'Terius Brown caused some problems in the backfield with 3.5 tackles for loss and one sack, while Dayonne Nunley had three pass breakups to go along with six tackles.
- The RedHawks went 4-8 last season, including a 3-5 mark in the MAC. This is the third season for MU under head coach Don Treadwell, who has an 8-16 record.

KENTUCKY-MIAMI (OHIO) TIES

- Although they never overlapped in their coaching careers, UK head coach Mark Stoops and Miami (Ohio) head coach Don Treadwell have familiar backgrounds. Stoops was born and raised in Youngstown, Ohio, while Treadwell spent six seasons as an assistant coach at Youngstown State University, winning an NCAA I-AA National Championship.
- Kentucky has 13 players on its 2013 roster from the state of Ohio in Braylon Heard (Youngstown), Tyler Brause (Sycamore), Jared Leet (Powell), Marcus McWilson (Youngstown), Cody Quinn (Middletown), Jaleel Hytchye (Cincinnati), Demitrious Davis (Youngstown), Chris Davis (Youngstown), Matthew Adolph (Dublin), Zach Myers (Miamisburg), Kyle Meadows (West Chester), Teven Eatmon-Nared (Bucyrus) and Kyle Budde (Mason). None of the players are from Oxford.
- Miami (Ohio) has one player on its 2013 roster from the state of Kentucky in Florence, Ky., native Trevan Brown. Brown is a sophomore offensive lineman for the Redhawks out of Boone County High School.

MILESTONES TO WATCH FOR ...

- Senior running back Raymond Sanders has 1,176 career rushing yards and needs 74 more to tie Rod Stewart for 25th place on the UK career rushing list.
- Senior running back Jonathan George has 749 career rushing yards and needs just 251 more to become the 34th player in school history with 1,000 career rushing yards.
- Sophomore punter Landon Foster is 8 punts away from qualifying for UK's career punt records. His career average of 42.59 yards per punt over 67 career punts would rank second all-time.
- Junior defensive end Bud Dupree has nine career sacks, needing eight more to tie for fourth most all-time in school history.

MEILINGER SELECTED TO COLLEGE FOOTBALL HALL OF FAME

Steve Meilinger, a two-year first-team All-American who excelled at several positions on offense and defense for the Kentucky Wildcats, has been named to the College Football Hall of Fame.

Meilinger played at Kentucky from 1951-53 under Coach Paul "Bear" Bryant. Meilinger helped the Wildcats to a record of 20-10-3, including an 8-4 mark in 1951 that was capped by a Cotton Bowl win over Texas Christian. UK was ranked in the nation's top 20 all three seasons in the final Associated Press and United Press International rankings. He was a freshman (ineligible to play at that time because of NCAA rules regarding first-year players) on the 1950 Kentucky squad that went 11-1 and is the national champion according to the Sagarin Computer Ratings.

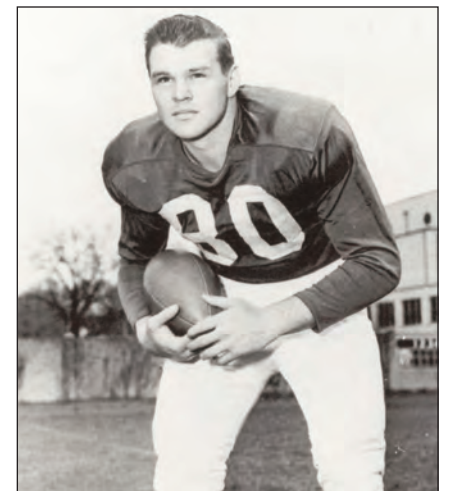
Known as "Mr. Anywhere" for the Wildcats, he split time between end, halfback and quarterback on offense; on defense, he played end, linebacker and defensive back – basically, every position on the field except the interior offensive and defensive lines, a remarkable combination. On special teams, he was a two-year starting punter and also returned punts and returned kickoffs.

Meilinger set Kentucky's career records for pass receptions, receiving yardage and touchdowns with 75 catches for 1,210 yards and 16 touchdowns. He also rushed 134 times for 714 yards and five TDs and passed for 127 yards and a TD. On defense, no tackle stats were kept during that era but he made six pass interceptions.

Meilinger was a first-team All-American as a junior by the Newspaper Enterprise Association and the All-Players team. He was first-team All-America as a senior according to the NEA, American Football Coaches Association/Colliers Magazine and the All-America Board.

On the league level, he was named first-team All-Southeastern Conference all three of his varsity seasons, the first of only five Wildcats in school history to be a three-time first-team All-SEC selection.

ON THIS DATE IN WILDCAT HISTORY

- Saturday marks just the fourth time in program history that Kentucky has played on Sept. 7, holding a 2-1 record all-time on games played on this date.
- This will mark the second time that Kentucky has played Miami (Ohio) on Sept. 7 after taking down the Redhawks 23-20 in Lexington on Sept. 7, 1991.
- One of the most historic games in UK history was played on Sept. 7, 2002 when the Wildcats defeated Texas-El Paso 77-17 for the second-most points ever scored by UK team in a game.
- The Wildcats' lone loss on this date came in 1996 when UK fell to Cincinnati in Cincinnati 24-3.

LAST TIME VS. MIAMI (OHIO)

Kentucky shined on both sides of the ball in the 2009 season opener against Miami (Ohio) as the defense secured its first shutout in 13 years in Cincinnati's Paul Brown Stadium with 41,037 in the stands.

The game marked UK's largest margin of victory in a lidlifter in 25 years and also improved its non-conference winning streak to 15 consecutive games.

After the teams battled through a scoreless first quarter, UK dominated the rest of the game. Early in the second quarter, safety Calvin Harrison intercepted Miami quarterback Daniel Raudabaugh and returned the ball 42 yards to the Miami 47. That set up a four-play Wildcat scoring drive that culminated in a 27-yard touchdown pass from quarterback Mike Hartline to wide receiver Randall Cobb down the left sideline to give UK a 7-0 lead. After the Kentucky defense forced the RedHawks into a three-and-out possession, the Wildcats started another scoring drive from their 42. Tailback Derrick Locke starred on the seven-play drive, gaining two first downs before capping it off with a 16-yard touchdown from the Wildcat formation to push the score to 14-0.

With less than five minutes to play in the half, Hartline directed another UK touchdown drive. This time wide receiver Chris Matthews took the spotlight, hauling in a 22-yard pass from Hartline for a first down just shy of Miami's red zone. On the next play, the pair teamed up again for a 21-yard score. Matthews' first touchdown of his career at Kentucky gave the Cats a 21-0 advantage going into the locker rooms.

UK's offensive explosion continued in the second half. On the first drive of the third quarter, Hartline connected with Cobb for 34 yards to the Miami 37. Cobb later scored on an 11-yard scramble on a direct snap in the Wildcat formation, giving UK a four-touchdown lead. Midway through the third, cornerback Trevard Lindley picked off Raudabaugh deep in Miami territory, taking the ball 25 yards to the house and increasing the score to 35-0. Tailback Moncell Allen rushed for the Cats' final score of the game to open the fourth stanza – a 9-yard plunge into the end zone yielding the final score.

UK had 488 yards total offense, going over 200 in both rushing and receiving for the first time in two years. Meanwhile, the UK defense limited the RedHawks to 10 first downs and 188 total yards. Lindley, who added three pass breakups to his interception TD, was named Southeastern Conference Defensive Player of the Week.

KENTUCKY VS. THE CURRENT ALIGNMENT OF THE MID-AMERICAN CONFERENCE

- Kentucky is 27-7-1 all-time against teams that make up the current alignment of the Mid-American Conference.
- Miami (Ohio) is the only team UK is scheduled to play this season from the Mid-American Conference.
- This marks the eighth consecutive season that UK has played a team from the current alignment of the Mid-American Conference.

TOUGH SCHEDULE AWAITING YOUNG WILDCATS

The Wildcats consistently play one of the toughest schedules in the nation and 2013 appears to be no different for Mark Stoops and Co. According to numerous online web sites and publications, Kentucky plays one of - if not the - toughest schedules in the country in 2013. In fact, GAMEDAYR.com and Fansided.com rank UK's strength of schedule No. 1 nationally, while 4DOWN20.com ranks it third-hardest and Phil Steele's College Football ranks it ninth-hardest.

- According to the preseason rankings by the Associated Press and USA Today/ESPN Coaches Poll, UK will play five teams that are currently ranked in both polls, including No. 1 Alabama. In fact, Kentucky will have a stretch towards the beginning of the season where they will face No. 9/9 Louisville, then have a bye week before facing No. 10/10 Florida, No. 6/7 South Carolina and No. 1/1 Alabama in consecutive weeks.
- Of UK's 12 opponents this season eight played in a bowl game in 2012, including three teams that played in BCS bowls.

OFFENSIVE HIGHLIGHTS

- The Wildcats scored 26 points in their opener vs. WKU, rushing for 216 yards and passing for 203. It was the first time that Kentucky has rushed for over 200 yards and passed for over 200 yards since 2010 against Vanderbilt.
- UK also had 419 yards of total offense in the season opener, which was the most for a UK offense in a season lid-lifter since 2010.
- UK averaged 6.8 yards per rushing play in the WKU game. When the three quarterback sacks are factored out, the Wildcats averaged 8.0 yards per rush.
- Kentucky was a perfect 4-for-4 in the redzone in the season opener, marking the first time a UK offense had converted every trip into the redzone into points since its 2012 battle against Georgia.
- The Wildcats scored 26 points in the season opener vs. WKU, which is the most in a season opener game for UK since 42 points to start the 2009 season.
- Kentucky is in its first year under new offensive coordinator Neal Brown, who played at Kentucky in the late 1990s, and is bringing back the high-powered "Air Raid" offense that fans saw during that period.
- The basic premise has remind the same in the offense, although Brown and Co. has added new wrinkles. UK will use a spread attack and look to compete a high percentage of passes, focusing on getting the ball to

Commonwealth Stadium

On game day, Commonwealth Stadium often becomes the third-largest city in Kentucky.

- > The Cats are in their 41st season at Commonwealth Stadium.
- > Since its opening in 1973, Kentucky has played 256 games within the friendly confines of Commonwealth Stadium. UK has a 136-116-4 record (.546) in Commonwealth.
- > Since the 1999 expansion, UK has averaged 63,701 fans per game and ranked in the nation's top 30 teams in attendance for 12 seasons. Both the single game and season attendance record has been broken in recent years.
- > The crowd of 71,024 vs. Florida on Oct. 20, 2007 was the largest crowd in the 40-year history of Commonwealth Stadium. The previous stadium record was 71,022 for the 1999 Tennessee game.
- > The playing surface is named C.M. Newton Field in honor of the former UK Director of Athletics.

Commonwealth Stadium Renovations on the Way:

Kentucky has received legislative approval for a \$110 million renovation of football facilities, primarily Commonwealth Stadium. The stadium project features a new look for the exterior of the stadium, redesigned concourses, additional suites, a new press box and upgraded support facilities. Plans are in the design process, with construction expected to begin in 2014 and completion targeted for 2015. Shown above is an artist conception of what the stadium exterior might look like.

Facts and Figures on Commonwealth Stadium:

Seating Capacity: 67,942, including the Commonwealth Suites. With game workers, media, etc., total attendance can exceed 70,000.

Video Boards: Video boards by Daktronics measuring at 39 by 79 feet, each, bring a total of 6,162 square feet of video capability. The video boards put UK among the nation's leaders in video square footage.

Sound System: Sportsound system will deliver pounding bass energy, smooth mid- and high-range frequencies, and high-impact entertainment. Components of the sound system include a main speaker cluster behind the end zone, under-balcony speakers and concourse speakers.

Ribbon Boards: Commonwealth Stadium's interior seating bowl has LED ribbon boards, allowing fans a more enjoyable experience.

Game Day Experiences

The "Cat Walk": Fans are encouraged to greet the team when the Wildcats arrive for the "Cat Walk." The team buses will arrive at the Nutter Field House approximately two hours and 15 minutes before the game and the players will make the "Cat Walk" to their stadium entry point at Gate 1. Fans are encouraged to line up on the sidewalk and cheer the players as they enter the stadium. A siren will be sounded while the team buses are on their way to the stadium. That's the fans' cue to proceed to the Cat Walk area to greet the team.

Wildcat Refuge: Fans of all ages, but especially the younger Wildcats, will enjoy playing at the Wildcat Refuge, located outside of the southwest corner (outside Gate 9) of Commonwealth Stadium. There are five giant inflatable games that are available two hours before kickoff.

UK Marching Band Will Parade Around Stadium: The UK Marching Band will parade around the stadium, beginning approximately one hour prior to kickoff. The band parade will begin at and return to Gate 4.

playmakers in space to operate and move the chains to generate points.

The Quarterbacks:

- Sophomore Jalen Whitlow got the starting nod for Kentucky at quarterback in the season opener, leading UK to two touchdown drives. Whitlow scored the first UK touchdown of the season with his legs when he ran in from 19 yards out. Whitlow finished the game 10-15 in the air for 78 yards, while rushing seven times for 75 yards, which was a career high.
- Fellow sophomore Maxwell Smith came off the bench in the second half to perform well, completing 8-of-13 passes for 125 yards and a touchdown. Smith's pass efficiency is 167.7, which is fifth best in the SEC.
- Smith began the 2012 season as the starter before being injured and taking a medical hardship. In three full games and one series of a fourth game, Smith completed 103 of 150 passes (68.7 percent) for 975 yards and eight touchdowns in 2012.
- Whitlow, who came in as a true freshman to see a majority of the snaps last season, started the final seven games, completing 54 percent of his throws for 801 yards and three touchdowns. He also showed playmaking ability with his feet, rushing for 206 net yards and three TDs.
- Sophomore Patrick Towles and freshman Reese Phillips are the other options at quarterback. Towles completed 19 of 40 passes last season for 233 yards and one touchdown, while Phillips was an early enrollee who played well in the Blue-White Spring Game.

The Receivers and Tight Ends:

- Seven different receivers/tight ends caught a pass in the season opener vs. WKU with junior wide receiver Demarco Robinson leading the way with five catches for 69 yards and a touchdown - the first touchdown of his career.
- Junior college newcomer Javess Blue and tight end Anthony Kendrick also had strong games with three catches apiece. Kendrick had 56 total receiving yards, including a long reception of 27 yards, while Blue had 25 yards in his first game with UK.
- True freshmen Ryan Timmons and Alex Montgomery also caught a pass in the season opener, while sophomore wide receiver A.J. Legree had an 18-yard catch. Timmons also had a 33-yard rush in the game.
- In addition to Kendrick, senior tight end Jordan Aumiller got the start, while junior college transfer Steven Borden caught his first career pass for 13 yards. UK's tight ends corps combined for 69 yards vs. WKU, which is the most since UK's tight ends had over 80 yards receiving vs. Middle Tennessee State in 2008.
- A young team overall, the Wildcats are very young at wide receiver and did not have a returning wideout with a touchdown reception entering the season. UK's top returners from last year include junior Demarco Robinson, who had 28 catches for 297 yards, and sophomores Daryl Collins, 17 catches for 171 yards, and A.J. Legree, 12 catches for 113 yards.

The Running Backs:

- The Wildcats rushed for 216 yards vs. WKU, which is the most rushing yards for UK in a season opener since 2010. Senior Raymond Sanders lead the way with 98 yards on 14 carries, moving into 26th place on UK's all-time rushing list.
- Senior Jonathan George rushed seven times for 12 yards and a touchdown, while freshman Jojo Kemp rushed once for nine yards.
- Kentucky's depth at running back took a hit before fall camp even began when it was announced that sophomore Josh Clemons would miss the 2013 season with an injury. However, UK looks to have plenty of consistent options to fill the void.

The Offensive Line:

- Three of the five starters against WKU were first-time starters for the Wildcats in left guard Teven Eatmon-

- The line blocked well at times in the opener, helping UK rush for 216 yards - the most in a season opener since 2010.

- The Wildcats averaged 6.8 yards per rushing attempt vs. WKU. When quarterback sacks are not included, UK averaged 8.0 yards per rush.

DEFENSIVE HIGHLIGHTS

- In the opener vs. WKU, UK had two players with 10 or more tackles for the first time since Sept. 29, 2012 vs. South Carolina.

- The Kentucky defense was stiff on third down vs. WKU, only allowing the Hilltoppers to convert 2-of-10 third-down chances.

- If there are two coaches that have a proven track record to turn a program defensively it is new UK head coach Mark Stoops and defensive coordinator D.J. Eliot. Stoops' transformations speak for themselves with his impressive turnarounds at Florida State and Arizona, and Eliot, who is entering his first season as a defensive coordinator, has a history of success and is considered one of the brightest young defensive minds in the game.

- Stoops and Eliot use a base 4-3 defensive alignment with the flexibility to play numerous fronts and coverages. At Florida State, the coaches' system was adept against the run and the pass, turning the defense into a championship unit and one of the best defenses in the nation.

The Defensive Line:

- Junior college transfer Za'Darius Smith led the defensive line vs. WKU with five tackles and a sack. Smith, who was a highly rated junior college prospect, earned the start in his first career game.

- Junior defensive end Bud Dupree had three tackles and a quarterback hurry in the game. Backup ends TraVaughn Paschal and Jason Hatcher had four tackles and three tackles, respectively.

- Senior defensive tackle Donte Rumph had three tackles and a tackle for loss vs. WKU.

The Linebackers:

- Avery Williamson led Kentucky defense vs. WKU with 14 tackles - his ninth career double-digit tackle game - with a fumble recovery. Williamson now has 208 career tackles.

- Sophomore Khalid Henderson had a career game vs. WKU with a career-high 10 tackles and his first-ever fumble forced.

- Junior Kory Brown, who earned his first career start in the game, made four tackles and a tackle for loss in the first quarter before missing the remainder of the game with an injury.

- Freshman Blake McClain saw his first time as a linebacker/nickelback in the opener with seven tackles and a fumble forced.

The Defensive Backs:

- Sophomore Fred Tiller, who earned his first career start vs. WKU, had seven tackles and a fumble recovery in the game, while safety Ashely Lowery had six tackles.

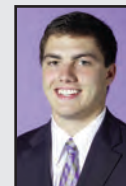

- Sophomore punter Landon Foster punted six times for a 39.5 average, pinning WKU inside the 20-yard line once.
- Junior Demarco Robinson handled most the kick returns vs. WKU with 74 yards from kickoff returns and 54 yards from punt returns. Robinson returned one punt 33 yards.

RECORD-SETTING SPRING GAME IS SIXTH NATIONALLY IN ATTENDANCE

Everyone had heard about the way fans were gobbling up tickets to Kentucky's 2013 Blue/White Spring Game. It seemed a certainty that UK would set a school record for spring game attendance, but even the most optimistic experts could not have predicted the scene on the evening of April 13 in Commonwealth Stadium.

Fans came out early to tailgate, many of them taking advantage of a shuttle to and from Keeneland Race Course. When it was time for the Cat Walk, they lined up nine and 10 deep to cheer on the Wildcats as they walked into the stadium. Gates opened shortly after that and the stands were quickly full.

"I remember going out on the field and thinking, 'This looks like a game,'" Coach Mark Stoops said.

By the first quarter, an estimated 50,831 fans were in

Commonwealth Stadium, shattering the previous school record for spring game attendance by more than 30,000. Just as impressively, the showing gave UK the sixth-largest attendance of any spring game in the nation.

They cheered as the Blue team held on for a 24-23 victory, giving the Cats a taste of what the atmosphere at Commonwealth will be like on Saturdays this fall.

"I really appreciate the fan support, just an unbelievable atmosphere," Stoops said. "I was amazed. You heard the numbers (of tickets distributed) but you never know who is going to show up. It was overwhelming, it was fantastic.

"Our players really felt that, the energy of the Cat Walk. Just to see the stadium, and they (the fans) were energetic and into the game, it was a great feeling. It will help our program."

As Stoops noted, the enthusiasm of the evening is still making an impact on Kentucky football. The coach has noted that recruits who were there on April 13 often commented on the fan turnout and energy.

REMARKABLE RECRUITING

Of all the impact that new coach Mark Stoops and his staff have made in a short period of time, the largest mark undoubtedly has come in recruiting.

It didn't take long for Stoops and staff to establish themselves. Three weeks after being named head coach, Stoops inked two junior-college players, defensive end Za'Darius Smith and tight end Steven Borden. Smith was ranked as the nation's No. 1 strongside end by one national recruiting service. He ended spring practice as a starting end and Borden will be in the mix of receivers who will see game action.

When Stoops took over in late November, UK was ranked in the 60s by the national recruiting services. Despite the late start in recruiting, in only two months there were 14 new commitments and UK's ranking had soared to as high as No. 29 by Rivals.com.

NEW COORDINATORS RIDING WAVE OF SUCCESS

Kentucky's new offensive and defensive coordinators, Neal Brown and D.J. Eliot, come to Lexington riding a wave of success in recent seasons.

coach the last three years at Texas Tech. In all three seasons, Tech ranked in the nation's top-seven teams in passing offense, top 15 in total offense and top 25 in scoring offense, and increased production in all three categories each year since 2010. TTU finished the 2012 season scoring 37.5 points per game, passing for 355.9 yards per game, and piling up 495.8 total offensive yards per game.

Eliot served as defensive ends coach under coordinator Mark Stoops the last three seasons at Florida State. The FSU defense zoomed from 108th in the nation in total defense in 2009, the year before their arrival, to second in the nation in that category last season. The 2012 FSU defense allowed a mere 254.1 yards per game.

With Stoops having resigned to assume the Kentucky head coaching post in December, Eliot took over as defensive coordinator for FSU during the 2013 Orange Bowl. FSU's opponent was Northern Illinois, which entered the game averaging more than 40 points and 485 yards per game. Under Eliot's guidance, the FSU defense limited the Huskies to only 10 points and 259 total yards.

GEORGE, MITCHELL, WILLIAMSON VISIT ETHIOPIA

Three UK seniors, running back Jonathan George, offensive guard Kevin Mitchell and linebacker Avery Williamson, enjoyed an interesting experience in May as the Wildcats traveled to Ethiopia for an educational/service trip.

Guided by UK senior associate director of athletics Jason Schlafer, the players visited families, played with children, distributed food and did work projects. George told the most poignant story.

"We visited a leprosy community and there was an older man who didn't have any legs," George recalled. "He walked around with flip-flops on his hands and he used his hands to get around with. We were bagging food and charcoal for the people and he came in and started helping with his hands. He helped us bag the food that wasn't just for him but for other people as well. He had a bike that he rode on and pedaled with his hands and that's how he got around."

WARFORD TAKEN IN THIRD ROUND OF NFL DRAFT

Kentucky had one player selected in April's National Football League draft, offensive guard Larry Warford, who was tabbed in the third round by the Detroit Lions. Four other Wildcats signed free-agent contracts. During the last six years, 45 Wildcats have been drafted or signed as free agents.

Western Kentucky got ahead early and withstood a fourth-quarter Kentucky rally as the Hilltoppers won the season opener – UK's first game under new coach Mark Stoops – by a tally of 35-26.

The teams traded scores in the first half and WKU went into halftime with a 21-17 lead. WKU tallied three 3-yard touchdown runs while the Wildcats got a 22-yard field goal by Joe Mansour, a 19-yard touchdown run by quarterback Jalen Whitlow and a five-yard TD by running back Jonathan George. The Hilltoppers increased the advantage to 35-17 early in the fourth quarter before the Wildcats rallied.

Quarterback Maxwell Smith entered the game and directed a pair of scoring drives, ending with a 30-yard Mansour field goal and a 34-yard touchdown pass to Demarco Robinson, but it was not enough as WKU held on to win.

Kentucky had good balance on offense, with more than 200 yards rushing and passing, the first time the Wildcats had done both in the same game since the 2010 season. As the starting QB, Whitlow completed 10 of 15 passes for 78 yards and also rushed for a career-high 75 yards and a touchdown. Smith completed 8 of 13 for 125 yards and a TD. Raymond Sanders led the ground game with 98 rushing yards.

Senior linebacker Avery Williamson led the Kentucky defense with 14 tackles, the ninth double-figure game of his career. He also had a fumble recovery, one of two fumbles recovered by the Cats. Linebacker Khalid Henderson had a career-high 10 tackles and caused a fumble.

Wide receiver Demarco Robinson turned in a fine all-around performance. He led UK in receiving with five catches for 69 yards, including a 34-yard TD, and also provided spark on special teams with two punt returns for 54 yards and a 24.7 average on kickoff returns.
