## Q: Why Creighton?

- Creighton has appeared in 21 of the last 22 NCAA Tournaments, including 17 straight between 1992 and 2008, one of just four teams to make every tournament in that span.
- Creighton has advanced to the College Cup in 1996, 2000, 2002, 2011 and 2012.
- Creighton has captured 13 conference tournament championships: 2012, 2011, 2008, 2006, 2005, 2002, 2000, 1998, 1997, 1995, 1994, 1993, 1992.
- Creighton has captured 12 regular-season conference titles: 2012, 2011, 2010, 2008, 2007, 2006, 2003, 1996, 1995, 1994, 1993, 1992.
- Eight former CU men's soccer players and coaches have been inducted into the Creighton Athletics Hall of Fame in the last 13 years.
- Creighton annually ranks among NCAA leaders in attendance, including the top- 10 in each of the last 10 seasons.
- With Jose Gomez and Andrew Ribeiro each earning First Team honors in 2012, 17 Jays have achieved NSCAA All-America honors.
- In 2014, a state-of-the-art weight room opened inside the Championship Center, located just steps from Morrison Stadium.
- Creighton does not compete in football, making soccer a popular fall sport on campus with strong fan support and large attendance.

## Q: Why Creighton?

- In recent years, the Bluejays were featured in nationally-televised matches on ESPN, Fox Soccer Channel, Fox Sports Net, Big Ten Network and CBS College Sports.
- A dozen Jays have earned conference Player of the Year honors, including Jose Gomez in 2012 and Ethan Finlay in 2010 and 2011.
- Nine Bluejays have claimed conference Defensive Player of the Year recognition, including Andrew Ribeiro in 2012 and the program's only two-time winner, Matt Allen (2006-07).
- Forty-nine Jays have earned 80 First Team all-conference honors.
- CU assistant coach Johnny Torres was named the National Player of the Year in 1996 and 1997.
- Creighton is the only school in college soccer to have at least one player selected in each of the MLS Drafts held since 1996. The Bluejays had two players drafted in the 2014 MLS SuperDraft.
- Fifty Bluejays have gone on to play professional soccer since 1993, including 15 in the last seven seasons.
- Creighton has produced 33 MLS Draft picks since 1996.
- The Bluejays are 191-33-19 (.825) at home since 1990, including 89-17-14 (.800) at Morrison Stadium and 32-5-3 (.838) in conference play at the facility.
- Morrison Stadium's Field Turf Revolution all-weather surface is in perfect condition year round, allowing an ideal feel for training and game play.



## A: Soccer excellence

## Q: Why Creighton?

- Creighton University has been recognized nationally as one of the top campuses for wireless access, a top-ranked university by U.S. News and World Report for 20 years and a "best-neighbor" urban university.
- With a student:faculty ratio of $11: 1$ and an average class size of 24 , Creighton students find it easy to get to know their professors.
- The 139-acre Creighton campus is within walking distance from downtown Omaha. The campus size makes it easy to walk from residence halls to classes, to the dining halls and to Morrison Stadium.
- The campus has undergone extensive expansion and remodeling, resulting in townhome style residence halls for upperclassmen and on-campus athletics facilities, among other projects.
- The Rasmussen Fitness and Sports Center opened in October of 2012 and is utilized as an indoor practice facility by Creighton's soccer teams.
- In 2014 the Championship Center opened on the east campus athletic/fitness/recreation corridor. The 43,000 square-foot Championship Center relocates Athletics from the Vinardi Center/Old Gym, freeing up that space for future use by the University.
- Omaha is home to five Fortune 500 headquarters and is one of the wealthiest per capita cities in the nation, making future opportunities in the area inviting.


Creighton University officially became a member of the BIG EAST Conference at 12:01 a.m. on July 1, 2013. The 2014-15 season will be Creighton's second in the league.

Creighton, alongwithfellow newcomers ButIer and Xavier, joined a BIG EAST that retained DePaul, Georgetown, Marquette, Seton Hall, Providence, Villanova and St. John's. The partnership was announced on March 20, 2013, in New York.
The 2014-15 academic year will be the 36th in the history of the BIG EAST, a league synonymous with men's basketball that has evolved into a well-rounded league that competes nationally at the highest level in sports across the board. BIG EAST basketball squads have captured 13 titles in the last 15 years, including men's (Louisville) and women's (Connecticut) hoop titles in 201213.

Since opening its doors in 1979, the league has won 36 national championships in six different sports and 140 student-athletes have won individual national titles through 2013-14.
All 10 schools reside within a top- 75 media market, including eight schools in a top-35 market.
The BIG EAST became a reality on May 31, 1979, following a meeting of athletic directors from the original seven-school alliance.

| Conference Conference |  | The Creighton soccer program entered a new era in 2003 with the opening of an on-campus soccer facility, the Michael G. Morrison, S.J., Stadium. The Bluejays moved to the facility after playing home games at Tranquility Park in west Omaha from 1990-2002.

The Field Turf Revolution all-weather surface is the first of its kind in the United States and makes the playing surface at the facility one of the finest in the country. With the downtown Omaha skyline to the south, CenturyLink Center Omaha to the east, Ryan Athletic Center to the north, Championship Center to the west, and just blocks from the Old Market, Morrison Stadium places student-athletes in the middle of it all.

Morrison Stadium's seating capacity is 7,500 . Construction on the stadium was completed in 2004 and included a video scoreboard, champions room, nearly 2,000 covered chairback seating, five luxury suites, an enclosed press box, concession stands and a banquet area. An athletic training room and locker rooms were built in the adjacent Ryan Athletic Center, which opened in 2009.

Creighton soccer has enjoyed incredible success at home since its return in 1990. The Bluejays' home record is 191-33-19 for an impressive winning percentage of .825 since 1990. The Bluejays, who annually rank among NCAA leaders in attendance, are 89-17-14 overall and 32-5-3 in conference play all-time at Morrison Stadium. CU is an impressive 67-8-4 at home all-time in regular-season conference play.

The $\$ 13$ million facility hosted its first match on Aug. 29, 2003, and was officially dedicated on Oct. 15, 2004. The stadium also played host to a friendly between the U.S. Women's National Team and Sweden in July 2010 that welcomed a crowd of nearly 6,500 fans, all televised live on ESPN.


Fans have flocked to Morrison Stadium since its inaugural year in 2003. The Bluejays ranked fourth in NCAA average attendance for 2013.

## Rasmussen Fitness \& Sports Center

The Rasmussen Fitness \& Sports Center, a 50,000-square-foot building offering a multipurpose field house with synthetic turf for athletic team practices and intramural sports, was officially opened on Oct. 23, 2012. The men's soccer team utilizes the Rasmussen Center during the season for training during inclement weather situations. In addition to the indoor practice area, the Rasmussen Center offers a suspended two-lane running track and a fitness level furnished with cardio, circuit-training and free-weight equipment for all Creighton students, faculty and staff. Named for Creighton Athletic Director Bruce Rasmussen, the facility was made possible by generous gifts from Ruth and Bill Scott as well as several other donors. The Scotts have been long-time supporters and friends of Creighton. In 1995 the Scotts established a scholarship for international students who enrolled in the School of Medicine. The Nebraska natives have deep roots in the Omaha community and have donated millions of dollars to more than 100 different organizations.

Rasmussen has been with Creighton for 35 years, the last 21 years as athletic director. During his tenure, Creighton's athletic teams have risen to national prominence both on and off the field. Since Rasmussen assumed the role of athletic director, Creighton has won 30 regular-season and 36 conference tournament titles, which have helped lead to 69 postseason appearances. The Bluejays have made the NCAA Tourney in men's soccer in 21 of the past 22 years.

Creighton's reputation as one of the nation's top academic institutions is reflected in the success Bluejay student-athletes have had in the classroom during Rasmussen's service as athletic director. Creighton's baseball, men's basketball, women's basketball, volleyball, men's and women's cross country, women's soccer and men's and women's tennis teams all have received national awards for their academic success. Bluejay student-athletes consistently own collective GPAs of 3.25 or above. Rasmussen was inducted into the Omaha Sports Hall of Fame in 2008. A member of the College World Series of Omaha, Inc., Executive Committee, Rasmussen played a vital role in seeing that Creighton and the city of Omaha remain as hosts of the College World Series.

Fourth-year head coach Elmar Bolowich is 47-15-6 after three seasons in Omaha. In 2014, he leads the Jays in their quest for the program's 22nd NCAA Tournament appearance in the past 23 years.
Despite suffering through several injuries in the 2013 campaign, Creighton compiled a 9-9-2 overall mark after a 2-1 setback against Seattle in an NCAA Tournament First Round match. CU played a lot of tight matches in 2013 as each of the Jays' nine losses came by a single goal.
The Bluejays completed their first season in the BIG EAST Conference with a 4-4-1 mark and a fifth-place finish. Creighton ended its conference slate in Providence with a pair of 2-1 setbacks to the Friars in the regular-season finale and a BIG EAST Tournament quarterfinal.
The Jays climbed as high as No. 1 in the 2013 rankings on September 10 - the first time since 1999 that CU held the top spot. Overall, the Bluejays found themselves ranked in nine NSCAA weekly polls during the regular season.

Entering the 2014 season, the Jays rank No. 31 overall in the Preseason NSCAA Top 25 poll and rate No. 35 in the preseason poll released by CollegeSoccerNews in early August. Creighton returns 13 letterwinners and eight starters from last year's team.
Five 2013 All-BIG EAST selections return for the Jays including last year's leading scorer Timo Pitter, senior Jose Ribas, junior Brendan Hines-lke and sophomores Fabian Herbers and Ricardo Perez. The Bluejays welcome 11 newcomers to the squad but lose the services of 2014 MLS Draft selections Eric Miller and Zach Barnes.
Pitter returns to the Bluejays for his junior season as a major offensive threat. He recorded a total of 18 points last year as a sophomore with seven goals and 21 shots on goal. He has 42 career points as a Jay and has been the team's leading scorer in each of the past two seasons.
Herbers joins Pitter on the Bluejays' attack after scoring 10 points and three goals in his freshman campaign. He was second on the team in points, goals, shots and shots on goal.
Perez played in all 20 contests for the Jays as a freshman, starting 10 matches. The midfielder tallied two goals on the season and will be in the mix for a starting spot this fall.
Ribas and Hines-lke both started every game they played last season on defense. Ribas primarily played left back and led the team with six assists. His lone goal came in a 5-1 victory over BIG EAST foe DePaul. Hines-Ike held the defense at center back and played every minute of the season there.
Senior goalkeeper Alex Bolowich spent the majority of the team's minutes in the box last
fall. He started 16 of 20 games for the Bluejays and accumulated a total of 61 saves. He posted a 7-7-1 record and 1.32 goals against average.
Junior Connor Sparrow started four matches for the Jays in goal compiling a 2-2-1 ledger and 0.38 goals against average. The two combined for six shutouts and 79 saves on the year. Reserve keeper Michael Kluver redshirted in 2013 and returns with four years of eligibility.
After suffering a season-ending injury in 2013, senior Sean Kim returns to lead the Jays attack at the forward position. He finished seventh on the team in scoring with six points and a pair of goals despite only playing in the first five matches of the year.
Senior Zaberle Kollie and incoming freshman Ricky Lopez-Espin could also see time at the point of attack this season. Kollie started two

matches and played in 11 for CU a year ago. Lopez-Espin comes to Omaha after leading his USSDA team to the finals and landing a spot on the U.S U-20 Men's National Team.

Junior Christian Blandon leads a young contingent of midfielders into the 2014 season. Blandon finished last season in a tie for fourth on the squad with seven points and three goals despite battling injuries late in the year.

Classmate Myles Englis played in 14 matches for the Jays in 2013 including one start. The midfielder scored both of his goals in November to help spark the Jays late in the season.
Joining Blandon and Englis this season are two junior midfielders from Tyler (Texas) Junior College in Fernando Castellanos and Mike Paye. The pair led the Apaches to the National Junior College Athletics Association (NJCAA)

National Championship in 2012 and return to the title match in 2013. Castellanos was a NJCAA All-American last season. Paye has experience with head coach Elmar Bolowich having played on his youth team in North Carolina with fellow Jays Bolowich and Kollie.
Freshmen round out the midfielder position in Lucas Stauffer, Noah Franke, Jacob Cini and Alex Prusa.
Stauffer enrolled at Creighton in January and trained with the Jays in the spring. A member of the US Futsal National Team, Stauffer was the youngest player in the history of the squad when he joined in fall 2011. He was a teammate of fellow freshman Lopez-Espin at Shattuck-St. Mary's before taking his skills to Denmark to play for a U-19 squad.
Franke comes to Creighton from Orlando City Academy. With six goals and five assists as a junior, he led Olympia High School in assists as a junior. Franke played on the U-23 Orlando City team in the summer. Orlando City will become an MLS franchise by 2015.

Cini spent time with FSV Erlagen Bruck FC in Germany last year. He will battle for minutes alongside redshirt freshman Prusa who returns to the team with four years of eligibility.

Juniors Vincent Keller and Eric DeJulio will join Ribas and Hines-lke on patrol for the defense this season. Keller started 19 of 20 matches for CU last year and finished up the year with four points on four assists. DeJulio scored both of his goals in the final five matches of last season. He saw time in a dozen matches, including seven starts for the Jays in 2013.

Senior David Abidor enrolled early at CU in January to train with the Jays. After spending his first three seasons at Dayton, he has one year of eligibility remaining. Abidor appeared in 51 games for Dayton over three seasons, including 47 starts. The defender collected one half-dozen assists as a Flyer, and earned an AllAmerica First Team selection from the Jewish Sports Review following the 2012 season.
Four freshmen will also compete for time on the back line in Mitch LaGro, Dante Spinelli, Blake McNelis and Jovan Gorman-Carter. All four players come from prestigious academies.

LaGro was a four-year starter for the Solar Chelsea Academy in Dallas and helped lead the team to a fourth-place finish in the 2011 National Championship tournament. Spinelli comes in from the IMG Academy in Florida where he played outside back and in the midfield. McNelis started 17 of 20 matches on defense for USSDA Real Colorado last season. Gorman-Carter most recently played defense with the Minnesota Thunder Academy after training in Paraguay with a U-17 squad.

Elmar Bolowich enters his fourth season at the helm of Creighton men's soccer after leading the Bluejays to their 21st NCAA Tournament appearance in the past 22 seasons.

After three seasons at Creighton, Bolowich owns a 47-15-6 (.735) overall record. He boasts two NCAA College Cups appearances and has already climbed into third overall for most wins in Omaha.

In 2013 he guided the Jays through their inaugural season in the BIG EAST Conference and a tough non-conference slate. Creighton finished the season with a 9-9-2 overall record and a 4-4-1 mark in league play. All nine of CU's downfalls were decided by a single goal.

After battling through a difficult schedule, Creighton came into Selection Monday at No. 29 nationally in the NCAA RPI. As a result, the Jays claimed an at-large NCAA tournament bid for the first time since 2010.

The Bluejays finished 7-2-1 at home in 2013. CU compiled a 4-5-2 mark against Top 50 RPI teams and did not play a match against a team with an RPI below 127.

Seven Jays claimed spots on 2013 All-BIG EAST Teams. Upperclassmen Eric Miller and Zach Barnes earned NSCAA All-Great Lakes Region honors and later were drafted in the 2014 MLS SuperDraft.

The Jays' back-to-back College Cup runs in 2011 and 2012 capped five consecutive College Cup appearances for Bolowich as a head coach.

In 2012 he guided the Bluejays to a 17-4-3 record and their second consecutive appearance in a College Cup. CU entered the 2012 College Cup on a 14-match unbeaten streak before falling 1-0 to eventual national champion Indiana in a national semifinal.

Creighton also won the Missouri Valley Conference (MVC) regularseason and tournament titles for a second straight season. Along the way the Bluejays tied the MVC record for the fewest goals allowed (one) in a Valley season set by CU in 2011.

CU finished the season ranked among the top 20 in four NCAA statistical categories including team goals against average ( 0.8 - No. 18) , shutout percentage ( $0.46-$ No. 18), total goals (39-No. 19) and save percentage ( 0.831 - No. 20). MAC Hermann Trophy finalist Jose Gomez and Andrew Ribeiro were NSCAA All-America selections and CU placed six student-athletes on All-MVC teams.

In 2011, Bolowich put together one of the most successful singleseasons in program history, earning a trip to the NCAA College Cup and posting a 21-2-1 record. Bolowich picked up three coaching honors following his work in 2011, earning the National Soccer Coaches Association of America (NSCAA) Midwest Region Coach of the Year, the Missouri Valley Conference Coaching Staff of the Year and the MLSSoccer.com Coach of the Year, leading Creighton to its first College Cup in nine years.

The Bluejays had four players earn All-America honors at the end of 2011, with Andrew Duran, Ethan Finlay and Brian Holt named to the First Team and Greg Jordan earning a Second Team nod. Ten of 11 Bluejay starters earned MVC honors, as Creighton shared the regular-season title with a 5-1-0 mark, avenging the lone conference regular-season loss to Missouri State in the finals of the MVC Tournament.

Creighton's 21 wins in 2011 marked the second most in a single season, just one win behind the 2000 squad's 22 wins, while making Bolowich the winningest Creighton coach in his first year on the bench.

Creighton Director of Athletics Bruce Rasmussen announced the hiring of Bolowich on Feb. 9, 2011. Bolowich joined the Bluejays following an amazing 22 -year run at North Carolina, during which he helped the Tar Heels to their first national title in program history to conclude the 2001 season. He guided UNC to 15 NCAA Tournament appearances and four College Cups, including three straight trips to college soccer's Final Four in his final three seasons in Chapel Hill. Six of his UNC teams advanced to at least the quarterfinal round of the NCAA Tournament and three teams captured at least a share of the ACC regular-season title in addition to winning the 2000 ACC Tournament championship.

Bolowich is the winningest coach in UNC men's soccer history, posting a 280-144-40 (.647) record during his 22 seasons in Chapel Hill. His 2001 NCAA title team finished 21-4-0; defeating Indiana in the title match. The only national title in program history was good enough to earn him National Coach of the Year honors from the NSCAA.

He has led his teams to a top-three finish in at least one national poll six times since 2000 and a top-10 finish nine times in the last 13 seasons, including a No. 3 ranking in the final 2010 NSCAA poll while at North Carolina, and a pair of No. 4 final rankings in both 2011 and 2012 while at Creighton.

Bolowich, a two-time ACC Coach of the Year (2000, 2010), led his teams to ACC regular-season titles in 2000, 2009 and 2010, putting together an unbeaten mark (7-0-1) in the nation's strongest soccer conference in 2010. He is one of only a handful of coaches in NCAA Division I soccer to lead his program to six College Cup appearances.


Over his final three years at UNC, the Tar Heels played in the College Cup each season, posting a 47-14-9 (.736) record in that span. His 2008 team finished as the national runner-up, while the 2009 and 2010 teams fell in the national semifinals. His teams advanced to the NCAA Tournament quarterfinals six times in his final 11 years at North Carolina.

In both 2000 and 2001, he was named the NSCAA South Region Coach of the Year, and in 1999, he was given the National Intercollegiate Soccer Officials Association National Merit award, which is given annually to one college coach whose reputation is recognized by soccer officials as praiseworthy and reflective of the highest standards of professional and ethical behavior.

His remarkable run at North Carolina included 20 NCAA Tournament wins, 16 more than the program had in the 42 years of soccer before his arrival. He coached 14 individuals who earned a combined 21 NSCAA AllAmerica honors, including a trio of All-Americans in 2010. His players garnered 28 ACC First-Team honors and he coached five ACC Rookies of the Year.

In addition to excelling on the field, Bolowich's teams have also put together a sparkling resumé in the classroom. In his last full season at UNC, nine Tar Heels earned a spot on the ACC Academic Honor Roll. The cumulative grade point average of the men's soccer team at UNC annually ranked among the highest of any men's team on the Carolina campus during his tenure. From 2005 to 2010, 11 different men's soccer student-athletes were named Academic All-ACC, including a schoolrecord four on the 2010 squad.

Bolowich not only produces winning collegiate teams, but he has a proven track record of developing young men into international and professional players. Twenty-one players who were coached by Bolowich at UNC played professionally in 2010, including 11 in Major League Soccer and three abroad. In total, Bolowich has coached 41 players who have been selected in MLS drafts since 1996, including a school-record tying
four from Creighton in the 2012 MLS SuperDraft.
Bolowich arrived at North Carolina as a part-time assistant coach in 1986, before becoming a full-time assistant one year later. He was named head coach at UNC in March of 1989, as just the fourth head coach in the history of Tar Heel men's soccer.

A native of Edenkoben, Germany, Bolowich played and coached at the semi-professional level in his native country at Wiesbaden, Mainz and Cuxhaven. He played collegiately and graduated from the University of Mainz (Germany) in 1981 with a diploma in sports education. Prior to his stint at Mainz, he served two years in the German Luftwaffe (Air Force).

In addition to holding a USSF A-License, Bolowich received his coaching license from the German Football Federation in 1981. Bolowich was active in youth soccer in North Carolina, serving as a regional staff coach with the U.S. Soccer Federation's Olympic Development Program for Region III and as Director of Coaching for the North Carolina Youth Soccer Association. He coached the Durham-Chapel Hill Strikers U-19 club team to the 1990 Maguire Cup Final Four and, starting in 2007, he coached the Triangle United Soccer Association's boys Gold team, leading them to three state and regional championships. Triangle United also advanced to two national finals under his guidance.

Bolowich and his wife of more than 26 years, Nina, have a daughter, Alya, and a son, Alex. Alex is a goalkeeper for the Bluejays.

Two-time National Player of the Year and Creighton Athletics Hall of Famer Johnny Torres is back for his eighth season on the Bluejay bench, following a decade-long professional soccer career. Arguably the greatest soccer star in Creighton and Missouri Valley Conference history, Torres played for the Bluejays from 1994-97.

Torres claimed the National Assistant Coach of the Year honor from the National Soccer Coaches Association of America (NSCAA) in January 2012 at the organization's awards banquet. He was also named the NSCAA Midwest Region Assistant Coach of the Year for the second straight year following recognition after the 2011 season. He played an integral role in Creighton's run to back-to-back College Cups as a member of head coach Elmar Bolowich's staff.

In 2013 he helped guide the Jays through their inaugural season in the BIG EAST Conference and a tough non-conference slate. Creighton finished the season with a 9-9-2 overall record and a 4-4-1 mark in league play. Seven Jays claimed spots on 2013 All-BIG EAST Teams. Upperclassmen Eric Miller and Zach Barnes claimed NSCAA All-Great Lakes Region honors and later were drafted in the 2014 MLS SuperDraft.

He helped direct the Bluejays to a 17-4-3 record and their second consecutive appearance in a College Cup In 2012. Creighton won the Missouri Valley Conference (MVC) regular-season and tournament titles for a second straight season. Along the way the Bluejays tied the MVC record for the fewest goals allowed (one) in a Valley season set by CU in 2011. CU entered the 2012 College Cup on a 14-match unbeaten streak before falling 1-0 to national champion Indiana in a semifinal.

Three times in Torres' first five seasons on the Bluejay bench, the Creighton men's soccer staff was honored as the MVC Coaching Staff of
 the Year, earning the nod in 2008, 2010 and 2011. His roles on the coaching staff include scouting, recruiting and training. He also plays a major role in working with student-athletes on service projects in the Omaha area.
Torres himself has always been active in service throughout his collegiate and professional playing days. He visited thousands of youth in the Omaha community in the 1990s. Torres was tabbed the Children's Miracle Network National "Hometown Hero" in 1996. A native of Medellin, Colombia, he was honored by the Omaha City Council with "Johnny Torres Day" on Oct. 27, 1996, in recognition of earning U.S. Citizenship just days before, his community service and his soccer skills.


Torres was named to the MVC All-Centennial Team in 2006 and in 2011 he became the first men's soccer player inducted into the Missouri Valley Conference Hall of Fame. In 1997 he won both the Hermann Trophy and the Missouri Athletic Club Award (prior to the combination of the awards), recognizing him as the National Player of the Year. In 1996, he earned National Player of the Year honors from Soccer America after leading the Bluejays to their first College Cup appearance. When his career ended, he was the Valley's all-time scoring (128 points) and assists (36) leader.

He was the fifth overall pick in the first round of the 1998 MLS Draft by the New England Revolution. He played for the Revolution for four seasons and also played for the Miami Fusion and Chicago Fire of Major League Soccer, before continuing his career in the USL for the Minnesota Thunder and the Milwaukee Wave United, before moving to indoor soccer with the Milwaukee Wave. In 2010, he returned to the professional ranks as a player, leading the Omaha Vipers of the Major Indoor Soccer League (MISL) in goals scored. In 2009, he played on the United States Adult Soccer Association Over 30 championship team - Nebraska 402 - which qualified and participated in the U.S. Open Cup in 2009.

Torres returned to the Creighton campus in the fall of 2007 to complete his undergraduate degree while serving as the Bluejays' undergraduate manager. After receiving the NCAA Degree Completion Award, he earned his degree in social work from Creighton in the spring of 2008.

The 2004 Creighton Athletics Hall of Fame inductee, two-time First Team All-American and three-time First Team All-Region and all-conference selection has a son, Dominic. Torres married Sara Heck in 2013.

Justin Hughes, a former collegiate and professional goalkeeper, remains at Creighton for his fourth season on the Creighton coaching staff. Hughes was a four-year letterwinner at North Carolina, playing under current CU head coach Elmar Bolowich from 2003-06 in Chapel Hill. Following a standout collegiate career, he was drafted by the Colorado Rapids of Major League Soccer and spent two seasons with the Rapids.

In 2013 he helped guide the Jays through their inaugural season in the BIG EAST Conference and a tough non-conference slate. Creighton finished the season with a 9-9-2 overall record and a 4-4-1 mark in league play. Seven Jays claimed spots on 2013 All-BIG EAST Teams. Upperclassmen Eric Miller and Zach Barnes claimed NSCAA All-Great Lakes Region honors and later were drafted in the 2014 MLS SuperDraft.

He assisted Creighton's return to the College Cup in consecutive seasons for the first time in program history as a member of coach Bolowich's staff in 2012. The Bluejays finished the year with a 17-4-3 record and won the Missouri Valley Conference (MVC) regular-season and tournament titles for a second straight season.

He helped the goalkeepers and the Jays' back line maintain incredible defensive numbers in conference. Creighton tied the MVC record for the fewest goals allowed (one) in a Valley season, set by CU just one year earlier. CU entered the 2012 College Cup on a 14-match unbeaten streak before falling $1-0$ to national champion Indiana in a national semifinal.

Hughes works primarily with the goalkeepers at Creighton, coaching All-American Brian Holt in 2011 during the assistant's first season on the Bluejay bench. Holt finished that season with an NCAA record 0.21 goals against average, surrendering just five goals in 24 games. Hughes led the Bluejay keepers to the nation's lead in goals against average (0.20), shutout percentage (0.790) and save percentage (.926).

He spent the 2010 season as an assistant coach for both the men's and women's soccer teams at Elon University in North Carolina, helping both squads post winning records.

The Wake Forest, N.C., native started all 43 matches he appeared in during his four seasons with the Tar Heels. UNC advanced to the NCAA Tournament in each of his four seasons in Chapel Hill, with Hughes posting two of the top three goals against average marks in school history. As
a junior in 2005, he led the ACC with a 0.50 GAA, the second-best mark in school history at that point. That season included seven shutouts, six of which he posted consecutively to tie a UNC record. He was tabbed to the ACC All-Tournament Team in 2005 as well. As a freshman in 2003, he was in goal for a shutout win over top-ranked Maryland.

Prior to his senior season in 2006, he was named a MAC Hermann Trophy candidate, an honor bestowed upon the top player in collegiate soccer. He finished his career at UNC ranked second in school history with a 0.79 career goals against average. In addition to his play at UNC, he was also a member of the United States U-20 National Team pool, selected as one of 21 players to participate in the 2005 FIFA Youth World Championships in Holland.

Following his successful collegiate career, Hughes spent two seasons with the Colorado Rapids, helping the team to a 2007 Reserve Division title. He was also selected as the recipient of the 2008 Colorado Rapids Community Service Award after making 60 community appearances at schools, soccer clinics and camps. Hughes also spent one season playing for Real Maryland FC of the United Soccer Leagues.

Hughes was a Dean's List honoree and member of the ACC AllAcademic Team before graduating from North Carolina with a double major in exercise and sport science and geography. He earned an MBA from Creighton University in the spring of 2013. He and his wife, Mallory Nicole, were married in the summer of 2012.


Burns, a former Bluejay student-athlete, returns to Creighton after a few years of working in his hometown of Houston, Texas. He was a member of the CU men's soccer team from 2007-10. Burns later earned a degree marketing and international business in 2011 on an Ignatian Leadership \& Service Scholarship.

In summer 2014, he reunited with his former assistant coach Johnny Torres as a member of the Bluejay staff. Burns has worked with the Creighton Soccer Academy as a counselor during four summers in Omaha.

Burns will pursue an MBA while assisting the Jays as a graduate assistant.

## Missouri Valley Conference Regular-Season Champions MVC Tournament Champions 14-3-1 Overall, 4-0-1 MVC



The 1992 Bluejays were ranked as high as No. 2 in the major polls and captured the MVCPlayer of the Year, Newcomer of the Year, Goalkeeper of the Year, Tournament MVP and Coach of the Year.

In the program's third year, the Jays made their inaugural appearance in the NCAA tournament by winning the MVC regular-season and tournament titles. The Jays were ranked second in the final ISAA national rankings. They were one of four teams (Virginia, UCLA, North Carolina State) to receive a first-round bye in the NCAA Tournament. The Jays were upset in their first NCAA Tournament game by SMU, 1-0, on Nov. 21, in front of a then Bluejay single-match record crowd of 3,860 at Tranquility Park. Creighton Hall of Famer, Brian Kamler, was named the MVC Player of the Year and NSCAA Third Team All-American. Kevin Doyle, who later bacame a Creighton assistant coach, was honored as the conference Goalkeeper of the Year. Joining Doyle and Kamler on the the MVC First Team were Keith DeFini, Billy Duranceau and Ira Philson. Paul Lekics was honored as the MVC Freshman of the Year for the Jays and head coach Bob Warming was tabbed as the MVC Coach of the Year.

## 15-5-1 Overall, 5-1-0 MVC

The Jays completed a "three-peat" by clinching their third consecutive MVC regular season and tournament titles. They opened the season with a 10-1-1 mark, before finishing the season with a 15-5-1 record, ranked 22nd in the final ISAA poll. Despite losing 10 starters from the 19-1-0 1993 squad, the Jays began the season 4-0-1 while using five freshman starters, including standouts Johnny Torres, Zion Renfrum and MVC Newcomer of the Year Ross Paule. The 1994 squad became the first Creighton team to win an NCAA Tournament match when it avenged an earlier loss with a 2-1 victory over 16th-ranked Saint Louis on Nov. 20. The Jays then lost a heartbreaking 1-0 match at No. 2 Indiana to conclude their season. Soccer News chose goalkeeper Jay Fitzgerald as a junior AllAmerican, while senior Lance Hill was named First Team All-Midwest. Fitzgerald was also tabbed the MVC Tournament MVP after shutting out Drake in the conference championship match. Paul Lekics and Brent Peterson joined Paule on the MVC First Team.

The Jays won their second straight MVC regular and post-season titles while becoming the first NCAA team to go unbeaten and untied during the regular season since Howard University accomplished the feat in 1974. Creighton's 19 victories to begin the season established what is still a school mark for consecutive wins. The Jays were ranked No. 1 in the country in the adidas/ISAA national poll for the final five weeks of the season, becoming the first Creighton team to earn that recognition since the men's basketball team was ranked No. 1 nationally during the 1942-43 season. For the second year in a row, the Jays received one of the top four overall seeds in the NCAA Tournament. Seniors Brian Kamler and Keith DeFini were named First Team All-Americans by the NSCAA and were finalists for both the Hermann Award and the Missouri Athletic Club "National Player of the Year" award. For the second year in a row, the Jays were ousted in their opening match of the NCAA Tournament, losing 2-1 to Air Force in sudden death overtime.

The first season of the Bret Simon era proved to be more of the same success for the Bluejays, as they clinched an unprecedented fourth consecutive MVC regularseason title, coupled with the tournament title. After dropping two of their first five matches on the year, the Jays rattled off a 12-match unbeaten streak heading into the NCAA Tournament. One of Creighton's wins during the streak came against No. 9 Wisconsin, the eventual national champions. The Jays dropped their first round match in dramatic fashion, falling to William \& Mary, 2-1, in four overtimes, the longest match in Creighton history at the time. Omaha was once again home to the MVC Player of the Year in Paul Lekics. The Jays also claimed the conference defender of the year in Jay Fitzgerald. Five Bluejays were named first-team all-conference, while Mike Bustos and Richard Mulrooney were honored on the MVC All-Newcomer Team.

In its fifth consecutive NCAA Tournament, Creighton advanced to its first College Cup, with three road shutouts over ranked opponents on its way to Richmond, Va. The Jays started the season unbeaten through eight games at 7-0-1, climbing to a No. 2 ranking in the NSCAA Coaches Poll. They were flawless in MVC action, going 5-0-0 for their fifth consecutive conference title, improving their league record to 23-1-2 since 1992. Junior Johnny Torres led the Jays, the MVC and the Midwest Region with 18 goals and 44 points on his way to being recognized as the national player of the year, as named by Soccer America. Torres had a banner year, not only on the pitch, but he earned his U.S. Citizenship, had Oct. 27 proclaimed "Johnny Torres Day" by the Omaha City Council in honor of his soccer skills and community service, was honored by the Children's Miracle Network as a "National Hometown Hero" and was tabbed the top collegiate student-athlete in Nebraska. Goalkeeper Jon Epperson set school records with 11 shutouts and a 0.78 goals against average, while Richard Mulrooney set school and conference records by dishing out 16 assists during the season, including a school-best four assists, Nov. 10 at Eastern Illinois. Four Jays were tabbed First Team All-MVC with Torres and Ross Paule making the All-Midwest team, and Paule bringing home the MVC Player of the Year award. Bret Simon was honored as the MVC "Co-Coach of the Year," in his second season at the helm. The Jays lost their opening match in the College Cup to eventual national champion St. John's.

One year after being honored by Soccer America as the National Player of the Year, Johnny Torres was named Missouri Athletic Club Player of the Year and earned the Hermann Trophy as the National Player of the Year for his stellar efforts during his senior campaign. Torres was also tabbed the MVC Player of the Year. He was a First Team All-American after scoring 13 goals and adding 13 assists for 39 points. The Jays avenged a 1993 loss to Air Force in the NCAA Tournament with a 3-2 overtime victory, but were eliminated by College Cup participant, Saint Louis in the second round. They put together an eight-game winning streak midway through the season, outscoring the opposition 29-2 during that span. David Wright earned the MVC Defensive Player of the Year while being tabbed a First Team All-Region player. Wright was joined by Richard Mulrooney on the team. Following the season, Ross Paule became the first active Creighton player to be selected in the Major League Soccer draft, as he was a second round pick by the Colorado Rapids.

Richard Mulrooney was tabbed the MVC Player of the Year as the Jays won their sixth tournament title in seven years, while finishing second in the regular season. The Jays opened the season with a 1-0 win over fourth-ranked Saint Louis in front of 3,045 fans at Tranquility Park. The Jays once again advanced to the third round of the NCAA Tournament with impressive victories over No. 17 Saint Louis 4-1, and defending national champion, No. 6 UCLA, 2-0. Creighton's season came to an end when College Cup participant, Maryland, knocked off the Bluejays 3-2 on Dec. 5. The Jays also put together their first undefeated season at home since 1990, with a record of 8-0-0 (7-0-1 in 1990). Mulrooney was also named First Team All-America by the NSCAA, before becoming the third overall pick in the MLS draft by the San Jose Clash.

The Jays made a return trip to the NCAA College Cup behind an even balance of offensive playmakers and a stellar defense. They led the NCAA with 22 wins in 2000, also setting a school record for victories. The Jays appeared in their first national championship match, falling 2-0 to Connecticut. They advanced to the final by knocking off two-time defending national champion, Indiana, 2-1, in three overtimes. The Bluejays cruised through the first three rounds of the tournament on the heels of their defense, which recorded three road shutouts of ranked opponents. Creighton struggled with No. 12 Ohio State to a 1-0 win in the first round, before battling third-ranked San Diego, and the fog, in a 3-0 victory in round two. With a 3-0 win at Virginia on Dec. 2, the Jays earned their second trip to the College Cup. The offense was guided by future MLS first-round draft pick, Brian Mullan. The forward scored 18 goals, along with 13 assists to lead the team with 49 points. Sophomore Mike Tranchilla netted 19 goals, the highest single-season total since 1993, and added nine assists for 47 points. Mullan and defender Peter Henning were tabbed First Team All-MVC, with Mullan also earning Second Team All-America recognition. Mullan, Tranchilla, Ishmael Mintah and goalkeeper Mike Gabb were each named to the College Cup All-Tournament Team for their efforts in Creighton's final four run. Gabb set a school record, playing in net for 2,279 minutes and earning 21 wins in his first campaign as a starter.

Despite a down season by Creighton standards, the Jays were one of five teams to earn their 10th consecutive NCAA Tournament appearance. The Bluejays were joined by Virginia, Indiana, UCLA and St. John's as the only five teams in the nation to appear in every NCAA Tournament over the last decade. Junior Mike Tranchilla led the team on offense with 16 goals and 41 points. His four-goal effort against Evansville on Nov. 9 tied a school record and set a Valley record for goals in a tournament game. Creighton was plagued by injuries all season, including a season-ending injury to 2000 record-setting keeper, Mike Gabb, just four matches into the season. The Jays battled No. 1 SMU to two close matches, falling 4-2 in Dallas on Oct. 14 and then dropping a marathon match in the title bout of the MVC Tournament, 2-1, in four overtimes. Creighton bowed out in the first round of the NCAA Tournament, losing to Massachusetts, 1-0, in Garden City, N.Y. Tranchilla was a First Team All-MVC pick, along with Rob Appel and First Team All-Midwest midfielder David Wagenfuhr.

All-American forward Mike Tranchilla starred on offense and Mike Gabb starred in goal, as the Bluejays returned to the College Cup for the second time in three seasons. The Jays 15-3-2 mark and MVC Tournament championship earned them a first-round bye and an NCAA Tournament home match for the first time since 1995. Creighton topped UW-Milwaukee, snapping the Panthers' 19-game winning streak, in the second round and then traveled to the Northeast to eliminate third-ranked St. John's, 1-0, and sixth-ranked Boston College, 6-2, en route to the third College Cup in school history. The Jays battled Stanford into double overtime in the NCAA semifinals, but the Cardinal scored with just two minutes remaining to end Creighton's season with a 2-1 defeat. Defender Joe Wieland who made two saves in an open Creighton net against Stanford - and Tranchilla were named to the College Cup All-Tournament team. Tranchilla finished fourth in the MAC Hermann Trophy voting for National Player of the Year, while earning First Team All-America, All-Region and All-MVC honors. Tranchilla, the MVC Tournament MVP, closed his career as the all-time MVC leader in goals and points scored. Gabb played every minute in goal for the Bluejays, notching nine shutouts en route to a 0.96 goals against average. Tranchilla, David Wagenfuhr and Mehdi Ballouchy earned First Team All-Region honors, while Luiz Del Monte joined Tranchilla and Wagenfuhr on the MVC First Team.

The Jays led the MVC with a 0.43 goals against average in conference play. Sophomore Matt Wieland was tabbed the MVC Defensive Player of the Year for pacing the defense, while being named to the MVC First-Team and All-Region Second Team. David Wagenfuhr closed out his career by being named a semifinalist for the MAC Hermann Trophy, earning First Team All-MVC and All-Region honors and being tabbed a First Team AllAmerica selection by CollegeSoccerNews. Freshman Michael Kraus became just the third player in school history to lead the team in goals, assists and points. Shane Havens became the first Academic All-American in Bluejay men's soccer history. The Jays moved their home from Tranquility Park in West Omaha to a new on campus soccer facility, Morrison Stadium, and registered a 7-2-2 home mark, opening the facility in front of 3,483 fans against Butler on Aug. 29. The Jays advanced to the NCAA Quarterfinals and came within 25 minutes of returning to the College Cup, but could not hold a 2-0 second-half lead over sixth-ranked St. John's, falling 3-2 to the Red Storm to end the season.

A balanced attack combined with the deepest goalkeeping corps in school history helped guide the Bluejays to their 13th consecutive NCAA Tournament appearance. Seven different Bluejays scored at least three goals and had three assists on the season, led by Julian Nash's nine assists and 21 points. Brian Biggerstaff led the team with eight goals scored, while Nash, Vince Odorisio and Jarod Tarver each found the back of the net six times. Nash was named a semifinalist for the MAC Hermann Trophy, while he and defender Brett Rodriguez were both named to the NSCAA/adidas All-Region First Team and First Team All-Missouri Valley Conference. Matt Wieland earned Second Team All-Region and AllMVC honors and Tony Odorisio was tabbed an honorable mention pick in The Valley. Newcomers Matt Allen and Tim Bohnenkamp were named to the MVC AllFreshman Team. Allen, along with Zac Gibbens and Andrew Brown, gave the Bluejays a trio of talented goalkeepers. Each player started at least three games and appeared in at least four contests, marking the first time in school history the Jays had used three keepers so prevalently. Creighton once again topped the MVC and ranked in the NCAA top 10 in attendance. Michael G. Morrison, S.J., Stadium was officially dedicated on Oct. 15.

For the first time since 1995, the Bluejays captured both the MVC regular-season and tournament titles while posting back-to-back tournament championships for the first time since 1997-98. The Jays' record 10th tournament title lifted them into their 15th straight NCAA tournament. The Bluejays swept the MVC specialty awards for the first time since 1997, as senior Michael Kraus was named Player of the Year and junior goalkeeper Matt Allen was tabbed the Defensive Player of the Year. Ryan Junge joined Kraus and Allen on the MVC First Team, while four players were honored on the Second Team. Allen and the CU defense went over 422 consecutive minutes without allowing a goal during a September span. In one of the most thrilling endings in program history, MVC Tournament MVP Byron Dacy's goal tied the championship match with 4.4 seconds remaining in regulation, and freshman All-American Chris Schuler scored the game-winning goal in the sixth minute of overtime to top Bradley on its home field, 2-1. Junge and Kraus were both taken in the MLS draft, while Pietarti Holopainen signed a professional contract in his home country of Finland following the season. CU's 1-0 win over Drake on Oct. 11 was Bob Warming's 150th victory as the Bluejay head coach.

The Bluejays played host to an NCAA Tournament game for the fourth consecutive season, opening the event with a 3-0 win over Patriot League champion Lafayette. Creighton then went on the road to defeat ACC champion Duke and Big Ten champion Penn State before bowing out of the tournament with a 1-0 loss at Clemson in the quarterfinals. The Jays were joined by Maryland as the only two teams in the nation to advance to three quarterfinals in the four-year span of 2002-05. Matt Wieland was named the MVC Tournament MVP, First Team All-MVC and a consensus All-American, while serving as team captain for the third straight season. Rookie Byron Dacy led the team with nine goals and 27 points, as he was named the MVC Freshman of the Year and earned Freshman All-America honors. The Jays tied a then-school record by posting five straight shutouts - recording 10 shutouts on the year - and went 5-1 against Top 25 teams. For the third straight season, Creighton ranked in the NCAA top 10 in attendance, not including a then-school record 5,743 fans which turned out for an exhibition match with Stanford.

Following their lone regular-season loss, Creighton put together an 11-match unbeaten streak before falling in the MVC Tournament title match to eventual NCAA quarterfinalist and MVC co-champ Bradley. The Bluejays led the MVC with a 0.79 goals against average, with goalkeeper Matt Allen playing every minute in net to become the first player in league history to twice earn MVC Defensive Player of the Year laurels. The Bluejays captured their 10th MVC regular-season championship with a 5-1-1 league mark. The Jays opened the season with four straight shutouts and jumped out to their best start since 1998 en route to cracking the top-10 after not receiving any top-25 votes to start the season. Creighton had the top-scoring offense in the MVC, ranking 15th in the NCAA with 2.0 goals per game, led by MAC Hermann Trophy Semifinalist and MVC Player of the Year Ethan Finlay. The junior finished sixth in the NCAA in goals per game, as his 15 goals and 34 points scored on the season were the most by a Bluejay since 2002. In addition to senior Kyle Deremer, three sophomore midfielders - Dion Acoff, Jose Gomez, Greg Jordan - were each named First Team All-MVC members. Acoff led the MVC and ranked 11th in the NCAA in assists per game, dishing 10 on the season. Rookie defender Tyler Polak was named the MVC Freshman of the Year and a Freshman All-America selection by several publications after playing more minutes than any other CU field player.

Two-time All-American forward Ethan Finlay led a high-powered offense while Brian Holt set NCAA, Missouri Valley Conference and program records in his first All-American season in the goal, helping the Bluejays return to the College Cup following a nine-year hiatus. The Bluejays cruised through the regular-season, putting together two eight-match shutout streaks and entering the conference tournament with a 16-2-0 mark. A sweep through the MVC Tournament, knocking off Bradley 1-0 in the semifinal before earning revenge on Missouri State with a 1-0 win in the final at Morrison Stadium, set the Bluejays up with the No. 2 national seed in the NCAA Tournament. Creighton's impressive regular-season earned the team a bye through the first round of the tournament, and gave the Bluejays home field advantage the next three rounds. The Bluejays defeated Northern Illinois 3-0, knocked off No. 13 UC Santa Barbara 2-1 and then out-matched No. 12 South Florida in a 1-0, overtime win on a snowy Sunday afternoon in Omaha. The win advanced the Bluejays to the College Cup, where Creighton played No. 14 Charlotte to a 0-0 tie in Hoover, Ala., with the 49ers advancing to the national title game with a 4-1 edge in the shootout. Holt was named to the NCAA All-Tournament team, just one of dozens of honors the 2011 team picked up. The Bluejays led the nation with four players named to the NSCAA All-America teams, with Holt and Finlay each earning First Team honors and Andrew Duran and Greg Jordan honored on the second team. Duran, Finlay and Holt were also named All-Americans by CollegeSoccerNews. Holt became the program's first Lowe's Senior CLASS Award winner, in addition to his CoSIDA Academic AllAmerica of the Year, First Team All-MVC and MVC Goalkeeper of the Year honors. He combined with the rest of the staff to allow just five goals, setting an NCAA record 0.20 goals against average. Finlay earned CoSIDA Academic All-America, First-Team All-MVC, MVC Player of the Year, as well as being named the runner-up for the Hermann Award, given to the top player in college soccer. In his first season on the Bluejay bench, head coach Elmar Bolowich was named the MVC Coaching Staff of the Year, as well as the NSCAA Midwest Region Coach of the Year. Johnny Torres was named the NSCAA Midwest Region Assistant Coach of the Year.

Creighton finished 2012 with a 17-4-3 mark and its second consecutive appearance in a College Cup. CU won the Missouri Valley Conference (MVC) regular-season and tournament titles for a second straight season. Along the way the Bluejays tied the MVC team record for the fewest goals allowed (one) in a Valley season set by CU in 2011. The Bluejays advanced to the College Cup in consecutive seasons for the first time in program history and recorded their fifth College Cup appearance all-time (1996, 2000, 2002, 2011 and 2012). CU entered the 2012 College Cup on a 14-match unbeaten streak before falling 1-0 to eventual national champion Indiana in a national semifinal. The Bluejays earned a spot in the Final Four after advancing past host No. 7-ranked and No. 4-seeded Connecticut 1-0 in a Dec. 2 NCAA quarterfinal match. The victory snapped UConn's 38 -match home unbeaten streak. On Nov. 25, Creighton slipped past top-ranked and No. 5-seeded Akron 5-4 on penalty kicks after a 1-1 tie on the road in an NCAA Third Round match. On Nov. 18 CU defeated No. 21 Washington 4-2 at home inside Morrison Stadium in an NCAA Second Round match that marked the return of former head coach Jamie Clark, now UW head coach. Creighton made its 20th NCAA Tournament appearance in the past 21 seasons. After a 2-1 MVC tournament victory over SIUE, the Bluejays finished with a 33-8-1 all-time MVC tournament record, the most tournament victories in league history. CU owns more tournament titles, 13, than all other MVC teams combined. Freshman Timo Pitter led the team with 24 points, 10 goals and 34 shots on goal. Senior co-captain Jose Gomez topped CU with nine assists and was second on the Jays with 21 points, six goals and 22 shots on goal. Freshman goalkeeper Jeff Gal finished the season at 13-1-1 after a lone loss in the College Cup. CU finished the season ranked among the top 20 in four NCAA statistical categories including team goals against average ( $0.8-$ No. 18), shutout percentage ( $0.46-$ No. 18), total goals (39-No. 19) and save percentage (0.831-No. 20). MAC Hermann Trophy finalist Gomez and Andrew Ribeiro, were named NSCAA All-America selections and CU placed six student-athletes on MVC All-Conference teams. In the 2013 MLS Supplemental Draft, Toronto FC selected Gomez in the second round with the 38th pick overall and the New York Red Bulls claimed Ribeiro as the 70th selection overall in the fourth round.

Creighton finished the 2013 campaign with a 9-9-2 overall mark. The Bluejays completed their first season in the BIG EAST Conference with a 4-4-1 mark and a fifthplace finish. CU fell 2-1 to No. 4 seed Providence in the BIG EAST quarterfinals. The Jays claimed a spot in the NCAA Tournament for the 21st time in 22 seasons. CU attained the top ranking in the NSCAA poll released on September 10. It marked the Jays' first time back in the top spot since September 1999. Creighton has ranked as high as No. 2 in each of the past three seasons, including last week's poll position.. CU hosted Seattle in a first-round match but fell 2-1 to complete the year. Creighton played a lot of tight matches as each of the Jays' nine losses came by a single goal. CU finished with a 7-2-1 record at home inside Morrison Stadium. The Jays posted the fourth-best attendance mark nationally with over 27,000 fans attending home contests. Seven Bluejays claimed a spot on All-BIG EAST Teams following the regular season. CU senior Zach Barnes earned All-BIG EAST First Team Honors. Junior Jose Ribas along with sophomores Brendan Hines-lke and Timo Pitter claimed All-BIG EAST Second Team accolades. CU senior Bruno Castro won All-BIG EAST Honorable Mention recognition. Creighton freshmen Fabian Herbers and Ricardo Perez won spots on the BIG EAST All-Rookie Team. Creighton had two players drafted in the 2014 MLS SuperDraft. Junior Eric Miller was selected fifth overall by the Montreal Impact to become the sixth first-round selection in program history. D.C. United selected Barnes with the 56th overall pick $n$ the third round of the SuperDraft.

## Creighton History

Founded in 1878, Creighton University is a private university, one of 28 Catholic, Jesuit colleges and universities in the United States.

## Creighton Today

Creighton is nationally recognized as a leading university in the Midwest, known for studentcentered education and significant undergraduate student research opportunities. As a Jesuit university, Creighton is committed to academic excellence and service to others and seeks to create an inclusive, diverse community.

In addition to the College of Arts and Sciences, the University's oldest and largest college, Creighton includes the Heider College of Business, the College of Nursing, the College of Professional Studies, the Graduate School, and the Schools of Dentistry, Law, Medicine, and Pharmacy and Health Professions.
The freshman academic profile places Creighton among the Top 10 private Midwestern universities with more than 4,000 undergraduates and among the Top 10 Catholic universities in the nation.

For the 11th year in a row, Creighton is the No. 1 Midwest regional university in the annual U.S. News \& World Report magazine's college rankings. U. S. News also recognized Creighton for the sixth time as a "best value" university for giving students the best return on their tuition investment. Creighton was also given a nod for its commitment to student success, which acknowledges schools who accept students with well-rounded high school experiences.
The Princeton Review listed Creighton as one of the nation's top 379 colleges and universities in its 2015 college guide and CollegesofDistinction.com named Creighton one of 71 Catholic colleges of distinction for student engagement, quality of teaching, campus vibrancy and graduates' success.

The University has been named for the sixth year to the President's Higher Education Community Service Honor Roll for its volunteerism, student-service-learning and civic engagement as well as meaningful community outcomes. Creighton also has been recognized as an economic driver, community service advocate and urban developer in a Top 10 national ranking.

## Campus Life

Creighton offers more than 200 student clubs and organizations, including academic, athletic, cultural, Greek, political, professional, service, social and spiritual groups, as well as opportunities to work on campus publications.
Nine sophisticated on-campus living environments include two junior/senior townhome residence halls with technologically-rich, furnished apartments and complete kitchens.

Last year, Creighton students took part in more than 389,000 hours of community service at more than 800 local, national and international community organizations.

Creighton welcomes students of all religious beliefs and the University encourages students to participate in retreats, faith-sharing opportunities and multi-faith services.

Students may enroll in Creighton's servicelearning semester in the Dominican Republic, faculty-led courses taught abroad, or study at one of 165 institutions located in 55 countries through exchange or affiliate programs.

Creighton also has campuses outside of the Omaha area, including our School of Medicine Regional Campus at St. Joseph's Hospital and Medical Center in Phoenix; an occupational therapy partnership with the University of Alaska in Anchorage; and a campus for nursing students in Hastings, Neb.

## Student Snapshot

Creighton has more than 8,000 students: More than 4,000 are enrolled as undergraduates and almost 4,000 are in the graduate, law, medical, dental, pharmacy, physical therapy, occupational therapy and professional studies programs.


This year's students come from all 50 states, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico and Guam. In addition, hailing from 38 countries, about 200 international students pursue degrees at Creighton. The most represented countries of origin are China, Colombia, Ecuador, India, Indonesia, Japan, Kuwait, Saudi Arabia and South Korea.

## Our Alumni

More than 60,000 Creighton alumni live in 87 countries, with 30 percent living in Nebraska. The largest number of alumni who live outside the United States reside in Canada, Japan and Malaysia.

## The Creighton Campus

Creighton is committed to being a model livinglearning campus environment. The 139-acre campus is located within walking distance of downtown Omaha and many recreational, cultural and entertainment opportunities. The campus design and master plan have received top awards in landscape and architecture.

Since 2000, Creighton has invested nearly \$280 million in on-campus improvements and planned expansion to create a more vibrant and robust campus:

- Michael G. Morrison, S.J., Stadium, the region's only athletic facility designed exclusively for soccer. The stadium hosts high school, club and international soccer events and a variety of Omaha community events.
- The Hixson-Lied Science Building, the renovated Rigge Science Building and Criss Health Sciences Building form the centerpiece of Creighton's undergraduate and health professions' leading approach to teaching and research.
- Davis Square and Opus Hall are upperclassman townhome residence halls located on the east side of campus.
- The Wayne and Eileen Ryan Athletic Center and D.J. Sokol Arena serves as an on-campus home to CU women's basketball and volleyball. - The Rasmussen Fitness and Sports Center opened in the fall of 2012.
- The Mike and Josie Harper Center became the home of the Heider College of Business in the fall of 2013.
- The Championship Center opened in 2014.

At the center of campus is the heart of the University, the historic and recently restored St. John's Church, as well as the California Street Mall, the Lied Education Center for the Arts, the V.J. and Angela Skutt Student Center and the Kiewit Fitness Center.

The University recently undertook the largest renovation project in its history, with more than $100,000 \mathrm{sq}$. ft. of academic space being remodeled.

## 2013-14 Athletics Highlights

- Creighton became a member of the BIG EAST Conference on July 1, 2013, joining a league that includes Butler, DePaul, Georgetown, Marquette, Providence, Seton Hall, St. John's, Villanova and Xavier.
- Creighton student-athletes owned a GPA of 3.34 in the spring of 2014.
- Three teams (men's soccer, volleyball, men's basketball) reached the NCAA Tournament, giving the Bluejays at least one NCAA team for a 27th straight school year.
- The men's basketball program advanced to the postseason for a 17th consecutive season, while the women's basketball team played in the postseason for the seventh straight year. - The men's soccer team remained the only program with at least one selection in every MLS draft. The program has made five College Cup showings since 1996 (including 2011 and 2012) and 21 of the last 22 NCAA Tournaments.
- Creighton ranked fourth nationally in men's soccer home attendance, fifth in men's basketball, 14th in baseball and 33rd in volleyball attendance in 2013-14.
- Creighton featured the BIG EAST Player of the Year in men's basketball (Doug McDermott), women's basketball (Marissa Janning) and baseball (Reagan Fowler). McDermott would sweep 14 National Player of the Year awards before being chosen 11th overall in NBA Draft. - Baseball won the school's first BIG EAST title, clinching the regular-season crown on the final day of the season.

## History of Billy Bluejay

Billy Bluejay is the official mascot of the Creighton University Athletics Department. Creighton is a private, Jesuit NCAA Division I school in Omaha, Nebraska founded in 1878.

Prior to 1924, with no official athletics nickname, University publications and news media often referred to Creighton athletic teams by the school's colors - the "White and Blue," or vice versa. Because of Creighton's location atop a bluff, the team was occasionally designated unofficially as the "Hilltoppers," but the name lost favor because at least six other teams in the country went by the same nickname. At the behest of Creighton's Athletics Board and Alumni Association, the Omaha Bee newspaper coordinated a public contest in late 1923 to select a nickname and mascot for Creighton University athletic teams. After reviewing 200 entries, the Athletics Board decided upon "Bluejays" because the color of the bird was in keeping with school colors.
The Bluejays were originally depicted by an ornithologically correct rendition of the bird. In 1941, Creighton alumnus Joseph P. Murphy, a 1931 graduate of the College of Business and, at the time, a Creighton journalism professor and the head of its public relations department, designed a graphical image of the bird with a more human stance and expression. Murphy's 1941 design remained largely intact for the past 72 years with only minor revisions. While it is unclear on the exact year the first walking costume mascot modeled after Murphy's 1941 graphical image appeared publicly or the first time the image or mascot were referred to as "Billy Bluejay," many costumes were created, changed/re-designed and replaced over the past seven decades as Billy became a fixture at Creighton Athletics events, roaming the sidelines to cheer on his beloved Bluejays.

In October, 2013, in conjunction with Creighton's move to the BIG EAST Conference, the University unveiled a new Athletics brand - athletic logo, sport-specific logos and corresponding secondary marks designed to increase overall awareness of the Creighton University Bluejays - locally, regionally and nationally. The new logo was designed to build on the history, tradition and love of previous Billy Bluejay icons while maintaining the integrity of the past and establishing the new Creighton Bluejay brand as a distinct and recognizable identity in the BIG EAST.

Creighton Athletics turned to Street Characters to provide an updated Billy Bluejay walking mascot costume, one that was more vibrant, more athletic and one that more closely resembled the new athletics brand. The new-look Billy Bluejay walking mascot costume was complete in early December and he made his first public appearance in front of over 17,000 fans when the Creighton men's basketball team hosted Nebraska on Dec. 8 at CenturyLink Center Omaha.

Think of Omaha as center court: a dynamic and unique destination in the center of the country, full of action. Omaha has this special spirit that fills the city like an arena full of fans whose team just won with a buzzer beater. Excitement abounds for what it has built, what it has accomplished and what's still ahead.

It's a spirit born on the banks of the Missouri River, a city founded in 1854 by land speculators convinced they were at the heart of something new. Soon after, the transcontinental railroad was built and Omaha emerged as a hotbed of activity and new technologies.

There is a great story about Omaha's growth in the early days that really speaks to the pioneering spirit of the city. As Omaha prepared to lay underground cables for telephones, workers were trying to figure out the easiest way to string the lines. Being an inventive bunch, Omahans solved the problem by getting ferrets to help carry the lines through the tunnels. Sounds extraordinary, but it worked. Today, Omaha is at the center of the telecommunications industry. Call for a hotel reservation from anywhere in the U.S. and you are probably calling Omaha. The city is home to the Hyatt, Marriott, Radisson, and Omni reservation centers. That infrastructure is also key to the nation's defense. Offutt Air Force Base, home to STRATCOM, is based here. STRATCOM is the nation's eyes, ears and muscle when it comes to protecting the country.

That spirit is also seen in Omaha's modern day pioneers. Warren Buffett, one of the wealthiest men in the world, is a plainspoken Omaha-born and bred financial pioneer. When Warren speaks, people listen, learn and make money. In fact, as you look at the

five Fortune 500 companies that call Omaha home, they are all innovators: Berkshire Hathaway, Union Pacific, ConAgra Foods, Mutual of Omaha and Peter Kiewit Sons'.

It's not just the business community that embodies that spirit; you can also listen to it, touch it, taste it and feel it when you visit Omaha.

Home to the world's largest indoor rainforest, next to the world's largest indoor desert under the world's largest geodesic dome, Omaha's Henry Doorly Zoo is a can't miss when you're in town. Experience what it's like to go underground and see rare creatures that only come out at night, or surround yourself with sharks as you walk through an 850,000-gallon underwater tunnel. Talk about innovative: The zoo just spent \$6 million on a research facility allowing it to respond to national and international conservation needs.

Omaha's three Smithsonian-affiliated museums offer a diverse cross section of art. Gaze at a 15,000 -pound glass sculpture suspended in the air at the Joslyn Art Museum, hop on board Harry S. Truman's press train at the Durham Museum, or "pilot" a fighter jet at the Strategic Air and Space Museum, home to some of the most prized and rarely displayed military aircraft. Discover how nature can seem brand new as you walk through over 100 acres of lush and rare flora at Lauritzen Gardens, Omaha's botanical center.

Omaha is a mecca to music pioneers, as the city is known by many as the nation's premier hot spot for the indie rock scene. It's home to famed Saddle Creek Records and nationally renowned bands such as Bright Eyes, The Faint and Cursive.

Omaha is a city that never forgets its past. The Old Market is the true merging of old and new. The historic warehouse district was preserved and transformed into the city's art, shopping and dining district. Unique shops and restaurants lining cobblestone streets, it's a place to remember where you've been and where you're going.

The Bob Kerrey Pedestrian Bridge S-curves its way across the Missouri River. This one-of-a-kind structure is the longest pedestrian bridge to link two states.

It's just one more example of how Omaha stays fresh and innovative, all thanks to that indelible pioneering spirit.


## Director of Athletics Bruce Rasmussen

A member of the highly esteemed NCAA Division I Men's Basketball Committee, Bruce Rasmussen enters his 21st year as athletic director, and 35th overall at Creighton University.

During Rasmussen's tenure, Creighton has risen to prominence with its success on and off the field, impressive facilities and record-breaking fundraising efforts.

For evidence, look no further than four recent projects that continue to change the area athletics' scene. The Wayne and Eileen Ryan Athletic Center and D.J. Sokol Arena opened in 2009 and immediately gave Creighton's women's basketball and volleyball teams a top-notch facility to call home. East of the Ryan Athletic Center is Creighton's new student recreation center that was named the Rasmussen Center in his honor and stands as one of the centerpieces on the Creighton campus. It is located near the Championship Center, which opened in June 2014 and is considered one of the best of its kind. Last but not least is the completion of TD Ameritrade Park Omaha, home to Bluejay baseball and the College World Series, which opened in 2011 to rave reviews.

Those projects add to an overhaul in the school's athletic facilities over the past decade, which has also seen Creighton begin play at three of the finest facilities nationwide -- Michael G. Morrison, S.J., Stadium (soccer) and CenturyLink Center Omaha (men's basketball) and TD Ameritrade Park Omaha (baseball).

Rasmussen also helped lead the charge for one of the biggest moves in school history when the school accepted an invitation into the BIG EAST Conference in March of 2013.

Since Rasmussen assumed the role of athletics director, Creighton has won 30 regular-season and 36 conference tournament titles, which have helped lead to 69 postseason appearances. The Bluejays remain the only school in the 108 -year history of the Missouri Valley Conference to make 16 straight men's basketball postseasons, and have made the NCAA Tournament in men's soccer in 21 of the past 22 years. The Creighton softball team has made six NCAA Tournament appearances in the last 12 years.

Creighton was also recognized with the MVC All-Academic Award in seven of its final nine seasons in the league, including a record 3.37 GPA in the spring of 2012 by student-athletes.

A member of the College World Series of Omaha, Inc., Executive Committee, Rasmussen continues to play a vital role in Creighton and the city of Omaha remaining as host of the College World Series. He was one of six individuals on the CWS Oversight Committee that helped decide the location for the new downtown TD Ameritrade Park Omaha, which will help keep the CWS in Omaha for another 25 years. With Creighton serving as host, the CWS has welcomed more than 300,000 fans in each of the last nine years.

Rasmussen was one of four regional winners from the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics (NACDA) to take home a 2004 GeneralSports TURF Systems AD of the Year Award, and in 2010 was again honored with an Under Armour AD of the Year award by the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics. In 2008, he was inducted into the Omaha Sports Hall of Fame.

Creighton's reputation as one of the nation's top academic institutions is reflected in the success the Bluejay student-athletes have had in the classroom during Rasmussen's service as athletics director. Creighton's baseball, men's basketball, women's basketball, women's golf, volleyball, men's and women's cross country, women's soccer and men's and women's tennis teams all have received national awards for their academic success. Bluejay student-athletes have owned GPAs of 3.30 or above in 16 straight semesters entering the fall of 2014.

Creighton's primary annual athletics fundraising events are the Bluejay Bash and the Bluejay Jamboree. Under Rasmussen's leadership, each of these events continues to raise record-breaking funds for Creighton athletics. Most notably, the 2013 Jamboree generated more than $\$ 400,000$ through its gourmet dinner, raffle and auction.

Rasmussen accepted the associate athletics director position in 1992 after a 12-year run as the winningest coach in Creighton women's basketball history (196-147), culminating in the program's historic 1991-92 season.

The 1992 Western Athletic Conference Coach of the Year, Rasmussen led the 1991-92 Bluejay women to a program-record 28 wins (28-4), the WAC regular-season and tournament championships and a firstround NCAA Tournament victory in the program's first-ever trip to the "Big Dance." With that $28-4$ record in 1991-92, Rasmussen completed his college coaching career with a 196-147 record, good for a .571 winning percentage.

After serving as associate athletics director for two years, 1992-94, Rasmussen was named athletics director on Aug. 1, 1994.

A native of Webster City, lowa, Rasmussen and his wife, Jill, have five children: Megan (29), David (27), John (23), Katie (19) and Grace (16).


## President Timothy R. Lannon, S.J.

Timothy R. Lannon, S.J., is Creighton University's 24th president and the first Creighton alumnus to head the University.

Father Lannon brought his national reputation as a passionate leader in higher education home to his alma mater in 2011 after eight years as the president of Saint Joseph's University in Philadelphia. Prior to that, he served in leadership roles at Marquette University. He spent seven years as the president of Creighton Prep in Omaha.

In his first three years at Creighton, he has advanced the University's Catholic, Jesuit mission by focusing on academic excellence, compassionate care, unwavering faith and service to others. A few highlights of his achievements on behalf of Creighton include:

- Establishing a donor-funded presidential faculty research fund.
- Expanding the teaching affiliation between Creighton's health science programs and the area's largest healthcare organization, turning over clinical operations to a respected partner who shares Creighton's commitment to compassionate healthcare in the Catholic tradition. Through the new partnership, Alegent Creighton Health, Creighton's health science students are enjoying new opportunities in clinical education.
- Launching a space utilization study that resulted in the largest campus renovation project in its history, impacting the Heider College of Business and the College of Arts and Sciences, as well as Student Life.
- Introducing the provost model of academic administration for the University's nine colleges and schools.
- Negotiating Creighton's entry into the BIG EAST Conference.

A native of Mason City, lowa, Father Lannon entered the Society of Jesus in 1977 and was ordained a priest at St. John's Church on Creighton's campus in 1986.

In addition to his undergraduate degree from Creighton, he holds graduate degrees from Weston Jesuit School of Theology, which is now the Boston College School of Theology and Ministry, and Harvard University.


#### Abstract

Academic and Athletic Success - Creighton's student-athletes combined for a 3.32 GPA last spring. The student-athletes also own a 3.34 cumulative GPA. - The NCAA uses a tool for the evaluation of the academic quality of participating programs. The Academic Progress Report is intended to gauge the progress student-athletes are making to degree completion and graduation. In the spring of 2014, Creighton had four teams post multi-year APR scores in the top 10 percent of all squads in their respective sports: women's tennis, women's basketball, volleyball and men's tennis. - Eight Creighton men's soccer student-athletes earned a 3.5 GPA or better during the spring 2014 semester. - Creighton had 147 student-athletes ( 60 percent) make the Dean's List at least once last year, including 75 student-athletes who earned the honor both semesters. - Twenty-eight student-athletes ( 11.4 percent), including two men's soccer players, earned perfect 4.0 GPAs during the spring 2014 semester, and 34 student-athletes overall earned at least one 4.00 GPA during the 2013-14 academic calendar. - 167 student-athletes ( 68.2 percent) earned a 3.0 GPA or better in the spring 2014 semester. - Eight teams (women's basketball, men's cross country, women's cross country, women's golf, softball, men's tennis, rowing, women's tennis) had team GPAs of 3.3 or better last spring and every team owns a cumulative GPA of 2.95 or better. - Creighton owns 38 Capital One/CoSIDA Academic All-American honors all-time. In 2012-13, Megan Bober (Volleyball) and Becca Changstrom (Softball) became the school's latest honorees. - In June of 2014, Creighton opened the Championship Center that is located adjacent to D.J. Sokol Arena and Michael G. Morrison, S.J., Stadium. It serves as the new Creighton Athletics home for strength and conditioning, men's basketball and the academic resource center.

## Credentials

Members of the media needing credentials for men's soccer must contact the Sports Information Office at least 48 hours prior to kickoff. Credentials may be picked up at the Morrison Stadium main entrance on the west side of the facility.

## Press Box and Game Day Media Services

Seating is available for working media in the press box, located at the north end of the second level concourse. Media guides and updated statistics from both schools will be available in the press box. Following the match, a final box score will be made available to media outlets in attendance. A final box score and game summary will be transmitted to requesting media outlets not in attendance.

## Interviews

During the week, all player interviews should be coordinated through the Sports Information Office at 402-280-5801. Interviews with head coach Elmar Bolowich may be arranged by calling the same number on weekday mornings. Media planning to attend practice should call ahead to the sports information office to confirm practice time.

Game-day player interviews, prior to the game, are not permitted. At home and on the road, Bolowich and requested players will be made available on the field after the match following a 10-minute cooling off period.

## Photo Policy

Only accredited photographers on assignment will be issued credentials. Photographers may pick up a copy of the game roster in the press box or upon entering the stadium. Photographers are permitted on field level at both the north and south end of the field and are to remain behind the photographer's line on the turf behind each goal. Photographers are also permitted on field level on the east side of the stadium, however they are NOT allowed on the west side field level where the team benches are located.

From Interstate 29: Take Interstate 29 to the I-480 interchange in lowa. Go west on l-480 across the bridge into Omaha. Take the 14th Street exit which will run into Cass Street. Follow Cass Street to the facility.

From the Airport: From the airport, make a left onto Abbott Drive. Follow Abbott Drive toward downtown, Abbott Drive will change into Cuming Street. Follow Cuming Street to 17th Street. Turn left on 17th Street and follow to the facility.
