Congratulations to all the winners, especially to Skip Arculli who won both the U.S. Singles and the National Open Singles.


and pleasant hospitality afforded visitors and contestants last year at Rossmoor L.B.C. The Pacific Intermountain Division is indeed the host of the coast.

By now the detailed minutes of the Annual Meeting should be on your club bulletin board. Additional copies may be obtained by writing your Division Secretary.

We no longer have Professionalism in our Constitution. Cash prizes can be paid up to \$500 per person per event effective immediately. A dues raise in the amount of \$1 was unanimously approved by the Council. Two new publications are going to be sent to all members. A new book, Lawn Bowling Tactics and Techniques and a Laws of the Game book revised to September 1981. These two items will cost about \$4500 so you can see that the money developed by the raise in dues is being spent for the benefit of all members.

Mr. Frank Petit presented a comprehensive report on a proposed new Constitution which will be made available by the Councilors to Division Executive boards and clubs for final approval. Mr. Petit was thanked for his outstanding work in preparation of this report. Another report prepared with great detail and much research was on methods to be used in selection of players for our International Team by Dr. Edgar Haley and his committee. You will receive more information as to how to apply for International Team consideration from your Councilor or Division Secretary.

Help For Your Green By Edgar Haley, M.D.



Perhaps the greatest compliment one can receive is to be formally recognized by a world body. Within the past 6 months the Canadian Lawn Bowls Council has arranged to send me across Canada on two occasions, visiting every Province for evaluation of bowling greens and to conduct formal meetings on maintenance and construction of bowling greens.

The kindliness, hospitality and the enthusiasm of the Canadian bowlers is without parallel. Each meeting was as a vacuum in the thirst for knowledge, lasting from 6:30 p.m. to midnight and later, with few leaving.

From the follow-up letters and requests for books (the green book on maintenance is the official manual for Canada) it is obvious that the enthusiasm for improved greens is sky-high, and along with it the general morale.

A third trip during the first half of October will be to Ontario alone. Ontario has 166 lawn bowling clubs (compared to the U.S. with 102) and

warrants a special visit to this Province. This will be the third visit to Ontario for the purpose of evaluating and updating greens over the past 4 years.

At the last meeting of the A.L.B.A. Council, September 9th, the possibility of emulating the Canadians was discussed. Much depends upon the wish of the local clubs as to which clubs and when such a project will be made available.

Should your club feel strongly along this line, contact your divisional secretary and it is quite possible that a visit can be made to your club with evaluation and suggestions for improvement in the maintenance plan for your green. The initiative belongs to you.

UNITED STATES CHAMPIONSHIPS

This year Palo Alto achieved the two things for the U.S. Champion-ships which had been its goal from the start: a good playing surface and good hospitality. The reception, in the form of a cocktail party for the Champions, was held in the club house on Sunday evening, September 6th. This was a really splendid affair put on by several ladies of the club with the help of

practically everyone.

The Palo Alto Parks Department extended first class cooperation, and with the help of our club greens committee provided a reliable bowling surface. The transportation was efficiently handled by the club committee using private cars. Everyone was picked up at the airport, delivered to their motel and to the green without delay. The scoreboards were adequately manned with no slip-ups in operation. The markers for the singles were recruited from experienced players and were able to handle everything with eclat and elan with the exception of Ken Degenhardt who drove them crazy with his unique thumbs-up polishing motion. Every time he polished his bowl the marker would signal up or down. This usually happened four times each end!

The play itself was of superior quality. There were many close and exciting games. Please note results below on charts prepared by our Tournament Director Tom Mansfield. The three-way tie in the pairs for runner-

up was never played off. Therefore, as Tournament Chairman, I awarded this place to the team with the most plus points.

On the following Friday, there was the banquet at the Stanford Faculty Club for the presentation of trophies to the Champions. This was preceded by a cocktail party on the walks and verandas surrounding the dining area. Although the Palo Alto club hosted this beautiful affair, the date was chosen to coincide with the start of the National Open. This worked out exceptionally well as there was almost a capacity attendance. A large and beautiful commemorative poster had been made by Pat Higgins and was displayed behind the speakers table. It had previously been used at the opening ceremonies on Sunday.

Rather than have professional entertainment at the banquet, it was decided to limit this feature to the wit and wisdom of the M.C.s as they introduced the various celebrities which included the Mayor of Palo Alto, Mr. Alan Henderson. From all reports this worked out just fine and permitted the affair to terminate at a reasonable hour so contestants could be up bright and early for the start of the National Open next day.

This was a most successful U.S. Championship affair. The Palo Alto Club went all out to host this event. In the words of their President, Herb Deckert, "It was our pleasure and we hope it was yours."

1981 NATIONAL OPEN TOURNAMENT

The 60th Annual National Open Tournament has come and gone. The results are now a part of United States bowling history. It started on September 12th and ended on September 19th.

Its location was somewhat unusual. Every sixth year the National Open revolves around the United States. This year it was the Pacific Intermountain's (P.I.M.D.) turn to host. It was decided to hold the tournament principally at four clubs on the San Francisco Peninsula, namely San Jose, Santa Clara, Sunnyvale and Palo Alto. The overflow would be sent to San Francisco. San Francisco was cool to cold while the South Bay enjoyed warm to hot weather.

The P.I.M.D. Tournament Committee with Tom Mansfield (San Jose) as its chairman and Ross Shumway (Santa Clara), Bill Cunningham (Rossmoor) and Joe Sheppard (Sunnyvale) as his assistants did an outstanding job. Preparation of the Tournament Roster which included individual directions of club locations and rinks, where to move if winning or loosing, listing of events entered (singles, pairs, triples), partners and where they were from was worthy of an Einstein and obviously constituted many, many hours of meticulous preparation. Their efforts are greatly appreciated. San Francisco's Grainger Hill and his assistants are to be commended for handling the competition on their greens. Palo Alto's green was outstanding with a big plus for their setting, club house, and social amenities. Approximately 45 players had asked for transportation for which three small busses were provided. However, less than a dozen players used these busses which resulted in a loss. (Editor's note-Tom Mansfield, who was in total charge of the tourney, writes that receipts were \$7156.08 and expenditures \$7156.08, thus causing accountants everywhere to turn green with envy. If you would like a detailed copy of this report, write me).

There were 168 singles, 96 pairs, and 80 triples for a total of 256 entrants. P.I.M.D. 97, Southwest 57, I.Central 20, Eastern 18, Southeast 8, Northwest 14, Canada 21, Scotland 2, I.

Wales 1, Australia 12, South Africa 4 and Hawaii 2. Since there was an overflow, 25 late P.I.M.D. entries had to be excluded.

In general, the bowling was of a very high standard, with some surprising wins and close losses. Many former champions and International players participated. Particularly we would like to congratulate Skippy Arculli on his dual singles win in both the United States Championships and the National Open. He was named co-bowler of the tournament along with Henry Leigh who skipped the winning triples team which included Bill Campbell and Syd Whittingslow, and was runner-up in the pairs where he was the lead with Sat Souza skipping. Orville Artist teamed with Bill Craig of Seattle to win the pairs.

An unusual event was the televising of one singles match between Clive Forrester and Orville Artist by Gill Cablevision on the San Jose green. It took two hours with game comments by Frank Souza and John Brown including commercial timeouts. Orville complained that he lost to Clive three times; once while there and twice on the local TV replays. It is hoped that this will be a forerunner of an international bowling event to be televised in the future. It was on this note that the 1981 National Tournament came to a successful conclusion.

in developing a plan to increase interest and participation in lawn bowling.

In all areas the over 65s were numerically dominant. In view of this age distribution, it is not surprising that white collar retirees (business managers, professionals and others) and housewives constituted the most numerous groups.

The most common events mentioned were inter-club and intra-club tournaments, visitations to other clubs, pot luck and other meals and social gatherings for cards and other activities. Some of the many less frequently listed events worth consideration were: open houses, "fun days," a "Sadie Hawkins Day," bingo nights and holiday celebrations.

There was a remarkable variety of programs to obtain new members. Most frequently mentioned were newspaper articles, slide shows for various groups and classes for prospective and new members who had been contacted on a one on one approach.

When asked to give ideas and plans for encouraging lawn bowl participation, few of the clubs made the same points. However, some answers can be grouped roughly as follows:

- more advertising in local papers - contacting newcomers to area
- pass out brochures
- talks, using slides and movies, to groups of senior citizens and others
- cooperate with city organizations such as schools, colleges, and parks
- free lessons
- invite prospective members to greens to try out game
- give them use of club for two weeks
- coordinate "open" bowling with Moose activity dates

Projects to build interest and participation for the sport cost money. This represents a problem since many of the club members are retired with relatively fixed incomes. None of the clubs listed any members who are officers or directors of corporations and foundations. In developing a marketing plan for lawn bowling, it will be necessary to consider programs that appeal to the self-interest of possible corporate funding sources. The Institute will value your advice in this challenging task.

At the Annual Meeting in Palo Alto this year, it was the decision of the Council that, although it may be a disappointment to those who have applied and taken a test for Official Umpire, we must make a complete new start. Anyone who applied or took the test in the past must reapply. Pictured above is an exact size replica of the National Umpire Association Pin which will be awarded to all those who qualify.

The new test, which will be given orally by the Division Umpire or a responsible person delegated by him, will include questions on everything in the rule book. It is realized that this is different and will be more difficult than the previous test. We want to be like the Marine Corps who advertise, "We want a few good men."

It will not be practical to have five or six Umpires in one club while other clubs in a particular area have none. For this reason, after the applicants have been tested in the Division, the results will be sent to me together with recommendations. I will then grade the applicants and notify them of the results.

- (1) The positive or scoring shots and
- (2) The defensive or tactical shots. The controlled running shot falls under the first category. It is most decidedly a positive, even an aggressive shot and, in the listing, it falls midway between the draw and the drive.

It is not an easy shot to play, demanding a great deal of skill, and, as its name implies, a great deal of control and handling. It is not a shot a beginner can play.

It requires expertise and experience, know-how, and, most important of all, a degree of control which the bowler who has mastered a grooved disciplined delivery like the Clinic delivery can eventually manage with ease.

Wide application and

flexibility: "Probably the favourite shot of most experienced bowlers because of its wide application and flexibility," I wrote in "Bowls the Winning Way", "the controlled running shot is, in fact, a blanket title under which several different shots fall.

It is most often described as a "shot with a metre or two more of running than the draw", but this is perhaps a trifle simplistic.

"It can be used to open up a head, to trail the jack to your back position, to push a bowl through the head and to follow through for shot (the "chop and lie" shot), to play on to a bowl for a "wick" and, as well, to run a bowl through the head without disturbing it.

"Obviously it is one of the most necessary shots in the game and it will often give a player more chances of scoring than will the open draw."

The most valuable shot: Tom Press, one of the Clinic members, wrote about this shot: "The controlled running shot is, in my opinion, the most valuable shot in the repertoire of the accomplished bowler.

The controlled running shot

"If you connect," he believed," your bowl stays in the head; if you fail it is still on the green and can finish as a counter after the second attempt."

But, and this is the strange thing about this shot, the Clinic as a whole believed that most bowlers know very little about how to play the running shot. Most bowlers, it was felt, tend to play the shot with too much weight so that it runs through the head and becomes a wasted bowl or — which is even worse — it may spoil the head which has been building up.

The question of weight, however, is one of judgement, and this is where experience and know-how come in. You have to play a running shot as though you are playing to a longer head and not like a drive. You have to increase your weight but then, obviously, you have to adjust your grass. You have to reduce the angle of your stance in proportion to the amount of increased weight.

For one metre of running the angle approximates that taken for the draw. But, with increasing weight, the angle is reduced according to your judgement until you are standing almost square on for the drive

In other words, the pace of the shot to be played will dictate how much grass you must take.

The controlled running shot, then, is a shot which you can and must practice almost as you would practice the draw. Place the jack at a certain spot on the green, then draw to it.

Then, without moving either the jack or your bowl, deliberately try to add a metre of running to your next bowl.

Play to finish one metre through and, at the same time, adjust your angle of grass fractionally so you still finish in line with the jack.

For your next bowl add two metres of weight and adjust your grass accordingly.

Learn to control your delivery. Learn to master your bowl.

This is the art that makes a champion. This is the secret of the masters, for the controlled running shot can be used with equal effect in singles, pairs and fours.

Not habit-forming: It is a shot which can pay enormous dividends and furthermore, unlike the drive, it is not habit forming!

"We have all seen young players who have become so addicted to the drive," Tom Press has said, "that they lose all control of weight and can no longer draw a shot.

"The running shot calls for the employment of weight and grass as much as does the draw. In brief," he reiterated, "it is a far better shot than the drive because it is a controlled shot."






In spite of my lack of sociability with the members I was elected president of the club for the coming year.



Sun City (Ca.) L.B.C. By Roberta Parra


