#### YEAR 8 D.A.R.E. PROGRAMME

Over the next three months all Year 8 students will be working on the Police Drug Education module "Dare to Make a Choice". It aims to help young people make responsible choices about their use of drugs and to give them skills to carry out these choices.

The module will be taught by your son's Health teacher, Mrs Sjaane Simpson and the local Police Education Officer, Anna Duncan. Constable Duncan has had special training to work with the teacher in this way. #### MATHS FAIR QUIZ

The year 8 Maths Fair Quiz teams performed exceptionally well at this year's event. Callum Tanner, Michael Putt, Jake Boulton and Jeremy Bridger won the Taranaki wide competition picking up the Trophy for the first time since our last victory in 1991. The second Year 8 team of Nick Dravitzki, Kerr Sharpe-Young, Zac Milner and Matthew O'Neill secured a close and creditable fourth place.

#### YEAR 7 DEBATING TEAM

#### AUSTRALASIAN SCHOOLS SCIENCE COMPETITION

96 students from Francis Douglas Memorial College entered this competition which attracted over 410,000 entries from across Australia, New Zealand and the Pacific region. The boys demonstrated outstanding scientific skills.

The best achievement came from three students; Daniel Burkett (Year 13), Michael Lucas (Year 13) and Simon Velvin (Year 10) who received High Distinction awards.

Four students received Distinction awards; Travis Judd (Year 7), Callum Tanner (Year 8), Robert Crowe (Year 9) and Kyle Crowley (Year 12).

Twenty eight students achieved Credit awards, also a very high standard. There were also 61 participation awards.

The competition assessment includes observing and measuring, interpreting and evaluating data, drawing conclusions and inferences, making predictions, experimental design, reasoning and problem solving. These are all essential skills in science.

# CYCLISTS THROUGH HOSPITAL GROUNDS

A letter has been received from the Taranaki District Health Board reminding all local school students who ride their bicycles through hospital grounds of the potential dangers.

"Speed is a major concern, with some students often seen riding at excessive speeds. Staff at Base Hospital have also complained that students are riding their bicycles against the flow of traffic on the hospital's one-way system. Blind corners also exist (especially at the rear of the hospital) and we ask all students who use the hospital grounds as a thoroughfare are made aware of the threat of oncoming vehicles, as well as their own speed. Normal road rules apply in that vehicles and bikes **must** adhere to the speed limit (20kms) **at all times**. Bikes and cars must also keep to the left. Near misses regularly occur and we ask if you could please raise the above issues with your students for their urgent attention." The letter was signed by Richard Guy, Facilities Overseer at Taranaki District Health Board.
