The DCMA is located conveniently at the north east corner of Highway 89 and Airport Road (Dufferin County Road #18). Our building was designed to nestle into the natural landscape of rolling hills and farm fields, barns and small hamlets. We are located at the midway point between Shelburne and Alliston. We are the heart of the Dufferin County and boast to be one of the finest community Museums in Ontario.

The DCMA has been given the important responsibility to collect, preserve, present and interpret the history of Dufferin County. Our goal is to create an enjoyable and valuable experience for our visitors. The DCMA collects artifacts and archival material that relates to the historical development of Dufferin County. Our collection includes thousands of archival documents, photographs and artifacts including Canadian glass (including the famous collection, "Corn Flower" glassware) and ceramics, furniture, wagons, machinery, agricultural implements, clothing and guilts.

The DCMA building was designed by the talented and passionate architect Carlos Ventin of Ventin Group Limited in 1994 to house the community's new museum and archives. Part of the design of the DCMA facility was to incorporate sufficient interior space and height to accommodate full sized buildings, salvaged and restored, from Dufferin's past. These include a one and a half story pioneer home from the 1850's, an Orange hall, and a CPR flag station. In the tradition of an old-style barn-raising, when the community pitched in to help build a neighbor's barn, the establishment of the DCMA was achieved through the financial support of the County of Dufferin, the government of Ontario and Canada, as well as individual donors and volunteers in our community.



Welcome to Dufferin County, located in the heart of the Headwaters Region!


Dufferin County is home to the historic towns of Orangeville and Shelburne and the village of Grand Valley; popular resort and recreation areas of Hockley Valley, Luther Marsh, Island Lake, and the Niagara Escarpment (a UNESCO biosphere reserve). We also have the wonderful Bruce Trail winding through the County of Dufferin.

As the keepers of the History of the County Of Dufferin, here is a brief overview of how we came to be...

The County of Dufferin Act was passed by the Ontario legislature in 1874, uniting the townships of Mono and Mulmur from Simcoe County, Melancthon Township from Grey County,

and Amaranth, East Garafraxa and the Village of Orangeville from Wellington County, into a "provisional county." The potential county was named "Dufferin" in honour of the popular Governor General of the day, Frederick Temple Blackwood, Marguis of Dufferin, from County Down in Northern Ireland.

Under the terms of the County of Dufferin Act, Orangeville became the County town. A site for the county buildings was procured and they were substantially completed by the end of 1880. By proclamation, the County of Dufferin came into being on Monday morning, January 24, 1881.



Shelburne achieved incorporated village status in 1879 and had opted into Grey County, with Melancthon Township, until the new county was established. Luther had divided into two townships in 1881, with East Luther joining Dufferin in 1883. Grand Valley achieved village status in 1897.

Launched on a wave of optimism in 1881, the new county soon faced major changes. "Manitoba fever" lured hundreds away to the west, while opportunities in the cities of southern Ontario and the northern United States drew others. Between 1881 and 1921, the population of Dufferin was cut in half.

Rather than a time of desolation, it was a time of consolidation. Dufferin developed a healthy farm economy, with three service centers in Orangeville, Shelburne and Grand Valley. Farm-related organizations flourished. The Women's Institute, Junior Farmers, and 4-H Club activities brought together people from all over the county.

The old interdependence of the rural - urban relationship survived until the 1970s. Since then, with the rapid growth of Orangeville, Shelburne and Grand Valley, and the arrival of a new wave of rural, non-farming residents, the complexion of the county again has modified and there is an increase in the desire to learn about the historical roots of this wonderful County.

Main Exhibit

The staff of the DCMA are proud to present our 2014 Main Exhibit. We hope it will educate and entertain our visitors. It uses some of our more unusual and less displayed artifacts. It speaks to Dufferin's rural agricultural and perhaps less complex past.

Art from the Heart: Folk, Found, Farm and Folly

Every day our eyes pass over hundreds of objects. Most go unnoticed. But within these objects is contained another scene, a quick glimpse of a smaller moment in time.

Folk objects indicate the particularities of that moment better than any other because they are assembled by untrained artists. Let your eyes delight in their unique combination of colours, skill, and artistry.

The 2014 Main Exhibit will make you notice, too, that manufactured objects produced for everyday use are often designed or embellished in ways that betray a finer art. Lessons learned by great artists eventually work their way into mass-production.


these, made only from the materials available in that period, have a type of honest and simple artistry. Sometimes time is the artist, putting the human into a rough-hewn object.



William J. "Jack" Hughes started his business selling and distributing glassware in 1914. He cut each piece himself with a floral design that he had created. The process was accomplished in five steps which, when repeated, allowed the floral pattern to be consistent and matching on different pieces. The flowers were large and the lush design included a profusion of leaves and joined stems. It was a successful formula relying on Jack Hughes' hard work ethic.

To celebrate the company's century of success the DMCA has mounted a special exhibit of interest not only to the avid "Corn Flower" collectors, but also to the many Canadians who may have a piece of the celebrated glassware in their family home, received as a gift or valued for the memories it evokes. Our exhibit will help them put their treasure in context: when and where the blank was manufactured and when it was cut. It will be informative for owners of one or one hundred pieces of glass. Each piece of "Corn Flower" in the collection has been inspected and identified as the company's authentic product by the company owners, Lois (Hughes) and Pete Kayser. Included are over 1,500 pieces of glass, making this the largest public collection of the product in Canada.

The exhibit has been set up to resemble a "Corn Flower" showroom, or a gift store specializing in "Corn Flower" glassware in various shapes and colours, all cut with the same bold, floral pattern. Rows of cabinets are filled with examples of "Corn Flower" glass from nearly 80 years of production. 





The DCMA Fine Art Collection Exhibit - Gordon Peters

June 28th until August 3rd in the Silo Gallery

Gordon Peters studied art in Montreal and in New York before beginning a 20 year career in Toronto as a commercial artist. During that time he continued to produce artistic works, established himself with artistic associations and painted with and became friends with some of Canada's better known artists of the period. In 1968 he retired and in 1972 moved full time with his wife, Lois, to a home they had built deep in a pine plantation on the Gore Road, just below Highway 9. There he devoted his life to his art and became part of a small group of local relocated artists who were establishing permanent studios in their homes, founding studio tours and presenting co-operative shows locally and elsewhere in Ontario. During this period, Gordon drove the local side roads and captured small scenes of simplicity, colour and beauty.

In 2013 Mr. and Mrs. Peters moved to Shelburne and this exhibit is of favourite and new work, and a few forgotten gems that had accumulated in their home. The collection spans more than 45 years of work and is a combination retrospective, exhibit and sale.

The DCMA is pleased to honour an artist who recognized this area not only as a source of artistic inspiration but also as a place to call home.

"His (Gordon Peters) interest is mainly in the Ontario landscape. He has a smooth sophisticated style. His lines are clean and beautifully drawn. A New Feature Opens This Year!! Tuesday July 1st - 2pm

A popular contemporary television show proclaims that all museums have secrets. Quite possibly they are right, but starting this year our new gazebo exhibit case will be dedicated to showing off ours! As well as what you might expect to find in a community museum collection, the DCMA holds artifacts that are of special significance to Canadian history. These objects may not represent Dufferin County's history, but they do reflect the collections and family artifacts of our diverse residents and patrons. Rarely do you get to see artifacts of such caliber in a museum not surrounded by city noise and traffic.

Some of our artifacts to be exhibited include several personal articles of Prime Minister Sir Wilfrid Laurier, including a silver loving cup presented to him by Governor General Earl Grey in October 1911, following Laurier's electoral defeat and Grey's recall to London. There is, as well, other china used by Prime Minister Laurier.

There is dinnerware that belonged to fur trader and explorer Alexander MacKenzie, the first European to ever reach the Pacific over land at Bella Coola, BC in 1973. There are thirty nine pieces of sterling flatware, all Canadian made and each one initialed for the priests who lived at the Seminaire des Missions Etrangere in Quebec City. Beautiful in its simplicity and rich in history is the 1837 Rebellion prisoner's box made by John McNulty. A portrait of Martimas, a famous Canadian racehorse owned by the Hendrie family, represents not only the animal but also the talent of the artist John Sloan Gordon.

This exhibit has quality and is as quirky and as Canadian as it gets. This case will be an exciting component of your DCMA visit. Local history, Canadian history and an unmatched collection of W.J. Hughes "Corn Flower" glass combine to make your visit not only educational, but also one that will create a lasting memory of an authentic experience in Dufferin County.

The Dufferin County Forest

The DCMA works very closely with the Dufferin County Forest Manager, Caroline Mach, as we share offices. The Dufferin County Forest is a 1,054 ha (2,606 acre) forest divided into thirteen tracts that are located across Dufferin County. It is coordinated by the County of Dufferin through a central office at the Dufferin County Museum, and managed on a sustainable, multi-use basis. The forest serves many important functions including erosion and water control, natural heritage and biodiversity protection, wildlife habitat, outdoor education, recreational opportunities, and support of the rural economy through timber production.

Discover

We are continually improving our information sources, including on-site signs, website, and brochures to facilitate access to some of the best scenery, forests and trails our region has to offer. Each year, a number of special "walks" and information events led by expert staff engage, teach and entertain outdoor enthusiasts of all ages. A self-guided interpretive trail has been established at the Little Tract (west side of Airport Road about 15 km north of Highway 89), and a fully accessible trail has been established at the Hockley Tract (south side of Hockley Road just east of Highway 10).

We Will Have a New Plan

During 2014, the County will be preparing a new comprehensive twenty-year management plan for the Dufferin County Forest. Public comment is invited at any time, but there will be open houses to present the draft plan on May 9 and 10, in conjunction with a public comment period (May 1 to July 31). Information on the plan development will be available from the County Forest office and on the website (www.dufferinmuseum.com/forest).

Dufferin County Forest Management Plan (2015-2035) Open Houses

During 2014, the County of Dufferin is developing a new twentyyear management plan for the 2,600 acre Dufferin County Forest. The County Forest is made up of thirteen tracts located throughout Dufferin County, the largest of which is the 1,492 acre Main Tract located north of the hamlet of Mansfield.

The management plan will guide the use and management of the Dufferin County Forest over the next twenty years (2015-2035) to ensure the health and viability of this important community resource.

Round & about the Museum



By definition (and title) this tour starts and ends at the museum. This convention imposes some limitations and what we might see, but we hope you will explore the many other beautiful and interesting parts of Dufferin County. This tour takes you into nearby parts of Simcoe County as well as exploring central Dufferin.

- Out the museum gate, turn right: head north on Airport Road (Sixth Line of Mulmur township).
- As you head into Mulmur township, a sweeping panorama opens before you. The long rolling hills plunge down into sudden little valleys with the small streams of the Headwaters region.
- At the first intersection, turn right: head east on Five Side road, Mulmur. The village of Stanton was once a thriving service village for southern Mulmur. The Old Stanton Store located in John A. Love's general store is a reminder of this heritage. Across the corner is a former hotel built in 1863 by Win Hand, one of two in the village. It was only a hotel for about 20 years. For most of its life it was a carpenter's shop. Stanton once had a court house where the Circuit Judge presided. The substantial two room school house indicates the size of the local population. Ahead and on the right, you will glimpse a substantial stone house. This is the "fort" where local women and children sheltered during the hysteria of the local Fenian Raid scare.
- At the next intersection, turn right: south on 7th Line of Mulmur. Note the historic farmsteads, and in particular the stone houses. On the right, you will see St. Luke's Cemetery, the oldest in the community. Although the ruins in the middle were an Anglican church, the graveyard was used by all denominations. The farm on the right was the home of Mary and Captain John Little, the first settlers in Mulmur in 1827.
- At Highway 89, turn left: east on Highway 89. This intersection was the village of Mulmur, the first settlement in the township. Head east into the village of Rosemont. It straddles two counties and four townships. The village is famous for great food – at The Globe Hotel for fine dining and the Rosemont General Store for snack and take-away. Continue east on Highway 89 for about 6 kilometers. You will go around a hill. On top was Trinity Church and cemetery, a remnant of the community of Arlington. Down the hill, turn right at the intersection: head south on Fifth line of Adjala. The Church of the Immaculate Conception and adjoining rectory are the heart of the old parish of North Adjala. The substantial Catholic presence in Adjala supposedly resulted from an arrangement between Bishop Macdonnell and Bishop Strachan directing Catholic settlement to Adjala and Protestants to neighboring Mono.
- Continue south on the Fifth Line, up and over the hill. Surprising vistas open up before you, first to the east and farther south to the west, with the Niagara Escarpment in the distance. Watch for the mill and feed business and the substantial dairy farm that is Sheldon Creek Dairy.
- Continue south crossing 25, 20 Side road to 15 Side road aka Simcoe County Road 1. If you're thirsty, turn left and head down the road to the celebrated Loretto Tavern. Otherwise, turn right and proceed to the first corner.
- Turn right, and head north on the Fourth Line to 20 Side road. Turn left: head west on 20 Side road. The pavement will end, but continue west. Enjoy the scenery as you start to rise back into highlands of Dufferin. At the Mono-Adjala town line, you are in



the old settlement of Wesley. A church and cemetery, post office, and Mills' furniture shop were located here.

- Continue west on 20 Side road in Mono to the next intersection: 7th Line. Here is the old church of St. Paul's and old school house. [Side tour (recommended): this is a trip up a dead end road - but the scenery is well worth the drive. Spot the lonesome stone ruins of the old McCabe home and the magnificent vista behind them.]
- Continue west on 20 Side road in Mono. Cross over Airport Road on to County Road 8, Mono Centre Road. Follow the road past historic Relessey Church with its unusual tower. The building still does not have hydro or heating. Ahead are the Niagara Escarpment and to the right the Round Rock, an outlier that creates a spectacular valley locally called The Ravine. Follow the road to Mono Centre village built under the edge of the Escarpment. The Mono Cliffs Inn and Peter's Cellar Pub are well worth a visit.
- At the "T" intersection, turn right, head north through the village, up the hill. The village cemetery lies at the top of the hill. The earliest burial dates to 1836. At the intersection, turn left head west on 20 Side road. Follow the road west, jogging to the right at Hurontario Street. Hurontario was the original survey line for this area. Mono was surveyed by two surveyors, and they didn't quite meet up at the base line, hence the jog. Continue west to Highway 10.
- Turn right, head north on Highway 10. You will pass through the old community of Elba at the base of its significant hill, and

continue to Primrose, the fast food capital of Dufferin County. Count the eateries located around this corner!

- Cross over Highway 89 and continue north on the Prince of Wales Road aka County Road 19. Wind past Primrose school, down the hill into the Boyne River valley, past the old site of Ponton Mills and through the Boyne Valley Provincial Park. Up on the table land again are a number of working farms. Continue to the second intersection.
- Cross over County Road 17, continue north on the Prince of Wales Road. Go carefully as the road winds and drops down into the Pine River Valley, and ends abruptly at a stop sign.
- Turn right: head east on River Road. Follow the pavement as it winds north and east along the Pine River. This area was settled rather late after the area was lumbered out. Reach Terra Nova an old lumbering town. The Terra Nova Pub on the corner serves up good food, great service and fine refreshments.
- Option 1: Continue east on Mulmur Side road #20 to Airport Road.
- Option 2: (recommended) Head north on the 2nd line of Mulmur, up the hill to the intersection at Ruskview on Jade Mountain. Enjoy the spectacular view, then head east on County Road 21 to Airport Road.
- At Airport Road, turn right, head south on Airport Road, back to the museum.
