159:

George Luther Kapeau went to Lahainaluna School (from Honolulu), entering with class of 1833. Attended 4 years. (In list of students in attendance as of Sept. 1, 1834, *Kumu Hawaii* 1(17):132. August 19, 1835.)

He appears on the list of Lahainaluna students in Ka Hae Hawaii (May 19, 1859) as entering in 1837. This seems to have been the year he finished, rather than entered. He is shown on this (1859) list as being "in government service."

Appointed deputy governor of Hawaii island 1846 (Ka Elele Hawaii November 25, 1846). Was deputy governor 1846-1850 (AH records) Governor of Hawaii 1850-1855 (Ibid.)

from Chester S. Lyman, December 9, 1846 (1924. Around the Horn ... and MS journal):

"At his [Capt. Cummings's] store in the village [Kaawaloa] I was introduced to Deputy Gov^T Kapacau [sic; Kapeau] who with the Gov^T [Leleiohoku] came in a boat from Kailua & landed this morning. He is a man of prepossessing appearance apparently about 35, & converses in English

with a good degree of fluency. While at Lahainaluna where he spent 4 years he was distinguished for his skill in engraving, & some of the maps & pictures published at that place were executed by him."

Kapeau died in October of 1860 (AH date, from p. 559 of an 1865 edition of Lorrin Andrews's A Dictionary of the Hawaiian Language, to which is appended an English-Hawaiian Vocabulary and a Chronological Table of Remarkable Events. 1865.)
