Language of Materials Nineteen different languages are represented in the collection. The bulk

of the materials are in English, but there is also a significant amount of

materials in French, German, Japanese and Korean.

Abstract The papers of Nam June Paik measure approximately 55 linear feet

and date from 1832 to 2008, with the bulk of materials dating from 1960 to 2000. The papers document the artist's global career in video and multimedia art. The collection includes the artist's early writings on art, history and technology, performance scores, production notes for videotape and television products, plans for video installations, and documentation of large-scale television projects such as Guadalcanal Requiem (1977/79) and The More the Better (1988). Letters, postcards, telegrams, faxes and notes from friends and business associates reflect Paik's association with a wide international circle of artists, including many of those associated with Fluxus. Biographical materials include vintage photographs, an early affidavit of support from Jonas Mekas for Paik's temporary entry into the United States and the transcript of a 1977 interview conducted by Dick Higgins. Additional materials that provide insight into Paik's career include documentation of early Fluxus performances both before and after Paik's move to New York City in 1964 and printed announcements and programs for exhibitions, festivals, and performances. Also included in the papers are over 400 books and magazines.

Biographical note

Nam June Paik (1932-2006), internationally recognized as the "Father of Video Art," created a large body of work, including video sculptures, installations, performances, videotapes and television productions. His art and ideas embodied a radical new vision for an art form that changed global visual culture.

Born in 1932 in Seoul, Korea, to a wealthy industrial family, Paik and his family fled Korea in 1950 at the outset of the Korean War, first to Hong Kong, then to Japan. Paik graduated from the University of Tokyo in 1956, and then traveled to Germany to pursue his interest in avant-garde music, composition and performance. There he met John Cage and George Maciunas and became a member of the neodada Fluxus movement. In 1963, Paik had his legendary one-artist exhibition at the Galerie Parnass in Wuppertal, Germany, that featured his prepared television sets, which radically altered the look and content of television.

After immigrating to the United States in 1964, he settled in New York City, where he expanded his engagement with video and television, and had exhibitions of his work at the New School, Galerie Bonino, and the Howard Wise Gallery. In 1965, Paik was one of the first artists to use a portable video camcorder. In 1969, he worked with Japanese engineer Shuya Abe to construct an early video-synthesizer that allowed Paik to combine and manipulate images from different sources. The Paik-Abe video synthesizer transformed electronic moving-image making. Paik invented a new artistic medium with television and video, creating an astonishing array of artworks, from his seminal video Global Groove (1973), to his sculptures TV Buddha (1974) and TV Cello (1971); to installations such as TV Garden (1974), Video Fish (1975) and Fin de Siecle II (1989); videotapes Living with Living Theatre (1989) and Guadalcanal Requiem (1977/1979); and global satellite television productions such as Good Morning Mr. Orwell, which broadcast from the Centre Pompidou in Paris and a WNET-TV studio in New York City January 1, 1984.

Paik has been the subject of numerous exhibitions, including the major retrospectives: Nam June Paik, organized by Tate Liverpool and museum kunst palast, Düsseldorf (2011); The Worlds of Nam June Paik organized by the Solomon R. Guggenheim Museum, New York City (2000); and Nam June Paik, organized by the Whitney Museum of American Art (1982). He has been featured in major international art exhibitions including Documenta, the Venice Biennale, and the Whitney Biennial.

In 2009, the Nam June Paik archive was received as a gift from the Nam June Paik estate. The archive is comprised of the papers of the artist (his writings, notes, scores, plans and designs, photographs and assorted print ephemera), his library (books, magazines, trade catalogs, etc.), as well as three dimensional artifacts from his studio (objects, toys, televisions, radios, the artist's desk, etc.) and over 200 videotapes (the artist's single-channel videotapes, installation videotapes, and videotape records of performances and interviews). The three dimensional artifacts from his studio, the videotapes and selected oversized print materials (posters and bound newspapers) are stored offsite from the papers and library materials and are not covered in this finding aid.

Series 2: Correspondence, 1959-2006, 1.5 Linear feet

This series contains incoming and outgoing correspondence including letters, cards, postcards, notes, and faxes from Paik's friends and associates as well as business correspondence from curators, gallery directors, editors, and institutions and organizations, such as WNET/TV Lab with whom he collaborated. Envelopes and enclosures, such as clippings, photographs, and photocopies of articles, have been retained alongside the letters they were sent with. The series also consists of drafts and copies of Nam June Paik's outgoing correspondence (the intended recipient not always identified) and includes the artist's notes and instructions for his studio assistants. Correspondence is described in more detail at the subseries level.

The Correspondence series has been arranged into two subseries:

Subseries 2.1: General and Personal Correspondence, circa 1959-2006

The subseries, General and Personal Correspondence, makes up the bulk of the Correspondence series. This subseries reflects Paik's associations with a wide international circle of artists, including many of those associated with Fluxus. Notable artist correspondents include Mary Bauermeister, John Cage, Karl Otto Götz, Dick Higgins, Ben Vautier, and Wolf Vostell. The art critic Gregory Battcock, wrote while he was collaborating on Paik's single channel video You Can't Lick Stamps in China, signing his letters "Professor G." In addition to ordinary letters, Paik received collages and other forms of mail art from George Brecht, Ken Friedman, Ray Johnson, and Jim McWilliams. Also included is a card from James Tenney that includes one of Tenney's performance scores.

Business correspondence includes letters and faxes from corporations, foundations and publishers, documenting the artist's association with art festivals such as Biennale di Venezia, Documenta 5 (Harald Szeemann) and museums and galleries, including Galeria Bonino and the Carl Solway Gallery. Paik's correspondence includes letters to Howard Klein (Rockefeller Foundation), David Loxton (WNET), Peter Hoenisch (Sony, Germany) and Arthur Køpke, as well as a letter to Grace Glueck, an art critic for the New York Times, concerning the death of Charlotte Moorman.

Folders are arranged alphabetically according to the surname of the individual or the name of the institution, with single correspondent folders following the group folders of the appropriate letter. This series includes project files (artificially created) and the artist's own "source files." The project files, artificially created by the archivist processing the collection, consist primarily of documentation in the form of proposals, budgets, correspondence, and printed material from several of Paik's single channel video works such as Bye-Bye Kipling, Don't Lick Stamps for China and Suite 212. There are also files on video productions related to Seoul Olympics; unrealized projects such as the Brandenburg Concerto with Joseph Beuys; and folders containing punch cards, computer printouts, and reference manuals related to Paik's work at Bell Telephone Laboratories in the mid-1960s.

Source files are a small group of files that maintain the original order created by the artist. They contain a mixture of photographs, correspondence, writings, and newspaper and magazine clippings. Some folders are titled (among them "Charlotte" and "Time-Life"); others are untitled. Although it is not certain, Paik may have collected, arranged, and retained these items as potential source material for realized or unrealized projects.

Subseries 10.2: Announcements, Booklets, Flyers, circa 1964 - 2004

This subseries consists announcements and programs for exhibitions, festivals, performances, public television programming, as well as institutional brochures, such as calendars or bulletins that include information about exhibitions or programs. The bulk of the items in this subseries reference exhibitions, performances, video works, installations, that feature Paik (either as a solo exhibition/performer or as a featured artist/performer in a group exhibition or event). They also include program announcements for performances and screenings of Paik's single channel videos on public television and at repertory theaters such as Anthology Film Archive.

Examples of items found in this series include the announcement for Robot Opera; announcements for Paik's single channel videos Merce by Merce, Suite 212, and Tribute to John Cage on WNET (New York PBS station channel 13); and flyers for several New York Avant Garde Festivals (from

1964-1968) by Charlotte Moorman. Performance announcements include those for 1960s performances with Charlotte Moorman, including one flyer for Opera Sextronique. There is also a post-card size announcement for Paik and Joseph Beuys's 1978 tribute to Fluxus founder, In Memoriam George Maciunas and, of note, an unopened box of video cards for Piano duet by Joseph Beuys and Nam June Paik in Memoriam George Maciunas, produced by Watarai Gallery, Tokyo, 1981.

There are also announcements, booklets, flyers and programs for exhibitions, performances and installations by numerous others artists, including Shigeko Kubota, Joseph Beuys, Robert Filliou, and Yoko Ono.

Folders for events, exhibitions, installations or performances are arranged in chronological order. Those featuring Nam June Paik appear first, followed by other artist's solo or group exhibitions, programs, festivals and performances.

Subseries 10.5: Clippings, circa 1871 - 2001 (bulk 1963-2001)

The subseries includes clippings from newspapers, books and magazines that pertain to Nam June Paik and his career. Included are published reviews of solo and group exhibitions in which he was a participant. There are also clippings that appear to have been compiled by the artist as possible source materials for his writings or artistic creations.

In addition, there are clippings about the arts in general (visual arts, media arts, music, film and literature); clippings on current and historic world news events, and articles related to technology, computers and television, and other specific topics. Much like newspaper clippings, magazine clippings can be broken down into similar subject areas, but there are also clippings from various sources including fashion magazines such as Vogue (both French and American) that may have served as visual source materials for the artist.

There are also a number of clippings that were sleeved in loose scrapbook pages and these have been retained in their original order to retain context. The sleeved scrapbook materials include newspaper and magazine clippings; as well as exhibition and performance announcements and fliers, and a typescript performance score.

Clippings about Paik and Charlotte Moorman from two German language newspapers are particularly fragile with large tears. There is also a scrapbook (made from a wire bound sketchbook) that contains clippings from Asian language newspapers from the early 1980s.

Unfortunately there were two folders of magazine and newspaper clippings that were too damaged to photocopy. They consisted of pages from Variety, February 26, 1975 (pages 21-22, 29-30, 35-36, and 43-44), the New York Times, March 2, 1975, Section 2, and Westside News, 1967 (Vol. XIII, no. 30).

Arrangement note

The voluminous files of clippings are generally arranged by subject and then sorted by date, language or publication title. Folders for events, installations or performances featuring Nam June Paik appear first. These are followed by folders of clippings featuring other artists or the arts in general (including dance recitals, concerts, and film festivals) not (apparently) featuring Paik; and then by general news and or topic such as articles on science, television and technology and images of women. Clippings that may

have served as source materials for Nam June Paik (including folders of cartoons and nineteenth century color plates) are arranged at the end of the subseries.

In addition to the loose clippings found in this series, entire newspapers or sections of newspapers can be found in Series 14 of this collection.

This series contains nearly 400 paperback and hardbound books and exhibition catalogs. These publications reflect the artist's interest in art, film, media and technology, music, philosophy and religion, science and mathematics, and history. There are also books on travel and tourism, on health (diabetes and nutrition books), and a few reference publications (including dictionaries and quotation books). Most of the books are in English, but there are also books in Chinese, Dutch, French, German, Hebrew, Icelandic, Italian, Japanese, Korean, Spanish and Thai. The earliest book in the collection is a Picture History Portfolio from 1923.

Also found in this series are library call slips, presumably from Nam June Paik, requesting books from the New York Public Library and the Rockefeller Foundation library; book publisher catalogs and advertisements; and book jackets for which corresponding books could not be found in Paik's library. In addition, there are a few photocopied articles and chapters from books and journals, such as Harper's Weekly and Scientific American, and reprints of articles concerning the arts, literature, science and technology.
