

The burial ground is on All Souls Lane, the entrance to which is between nos. 145 and 147 Huntingdon Road. There is no access for vehicles so please do not bring your car down the Lane.

Buses Citi 5 & 6 run frequently from the city centre to Huntingdon Road.

OUR AIMS



- To protect and enhance the Parish of the Ascension Burial Ground for the public benefit as a place of remembrance, spirituality, history and nature.
- To ensure continued public access to, and to increase awareness, appreciation and enjoyment of, the Parish of the Ascension Burial Ground within the local community and the wider city.
- To speak and act with Cambridge City Council and other organizations on behalf of all who care for the Parish of the Ascension Burial Ground, particularly those who cherish memories of those buried there.

BRIEF HISTORY

The burial ground was opened in 1869 when the population of Cambridge, as with most Victorian cities, had grown dramatically. The parish of St Giles covered a large area to the north and west of the River Cam within which many scholars, scientists and university staff lived and worked. Thus the burial ground contains the graves of three Nobel prize winners, seven members of the Order of Merit, eight college masters, fifteen knights of the realm and thirty-nine people with entries in the Dictionary of National Biography. It is an ecumenical burial ground, containing not just Anglicans but Non-Conformists and those of many other faiths. The age span of those buried is from one hour to over 104 years.

Perhaps the best known and most visited grave is that of Ludwig Wittgenstein, one of the most important philosophers of the 20th century. The historian Dr Mark Goldie (author of 'A Cambridge Necropolis') has suggested that there is probably '...more IQ lying in this acre than in any other in the country.' In any case, the burial ground is a remarkable and historic site.

Despite the continued growth of the City of Cambridge, the burial ground has remained an oasis of calm and tranquillity, one of the city's 'secret' places. With housing and university development now about to encircle the cemetery, the Friends group has been established to serve as a voice for all who care about this special and unique place.
