TEAM USA ALL-TIME vs. FINLAND

The United States and Finland are meeting for the 15th time in IIHF Under-18 Men's World Championship history with the U.S. leading the all-time series, 9-1-0-4 (W-OTW-OTL-L). All four losses to Finland came in the preliminary rounds, and three of four setbacks occurred in the first three meetings between the countries (1999, 2000, 2001). The U.S. and Finland have met in the semifinals just once (2010), with the U.S. blanking the Finns, 5-0, in that contest. Team USA scored once in the first frame (**Nick Shore**), twice in the second (**Matt Nieto, Adam Clendening**) and twice more in the third period (Shore, **Jarred Tinordi**). Holding Finland to just 14 shots on goal, **Jack Campbell** earned the shutout after stopping all attempts against. Team USA has outscored Finland, 40-27. Eight contests have been decided by just one goal including the last three matchups (2013, 2014, 2015). The United States and Finland have met in the gold-medal game twice, including last year's dramatic overtime finish. The first time came in 2006, when head coach **John Hynes** led the U.S. to a 3-1 win for Team USA's third gold medal. Finland took a 1-0 lead into the second stanza, but Rhett Rakhshani evened the score at one goal apiece early in the period. **Chris Summers** scored on the power play to seize the lead for the U.S. and **Mike Carman** added an empty-net marker with two seconds left in the third to claim gold. Between the pipes, **Joe Palmer** stopped 30 of 31 shots in the victory for Team USA. Last year, the Finns put the U.S. on notice when they scored 17 seconds into the game. After a scoreless second stanza, the United States was in need of a goal and **Jack Roslovic** responded 8:41 into the third. After 60 minutes couldn't settle the score, overtime was needed. **Colin White** netted the golden goal and the celebration ensued. Team USA wound up outshooting the Finns, 60-20, in the game.

KELLER RECORDS THREE POINTS AS U.S. ROLLS CZECH REPUBLIC IN QUARTERS

After a scoreless first period, in which the U.S. outshot the Czech Republic, 13-2, Team USA broke the deadlock at the 4:50 mark of the middle frame. **Logan Brown** launched a shot that was denied, but **Casey Mittelstadt** buried the rebound to stake the U.S. lead, 1-0. After that, the floodgates opened as the United States added two goals in the second stanza and poured in five more in the third frame. **Clayton Keller** recorded three points (1-2) in the victory, while **Jake Oettinger** stopped all 15 shots he faced.

TEAM USA, WOLL, BLANK SWITZERLAND TO FINISH PRELIMS UNDEFEATED

Joseph Woll stopped all 15 shots he faced as the U.S. Men's National Under-18 Team blanked Switzerland, 4-0, Tuesday (April 19) night at Ralph Engelstad Arena. With the win, Team USA concluded the preliminary round with a 4-0-0-0 (W-OTW-OTL-L) record, earning the top seed in Group A. **Casey Mittelstadt** tallied goals in the first and third periods, while **Kailer Yamamoto** and **Graham McPhee** scored single markers in the victory.

BALANCED SCORING ATTACK PROPELS TEAM USA PAST LATVIA, 12-1

Sixteen different players recorded at least one point with 10 skaters recording multi-point efforts as the U.S. Men's National Under-18 Team downed Latvia, 12-1, Sunday (April 17) evening at Ralph Engelstad Arena. **James Sanchez** and **Joey Anderson** helped staked a 2-0 lead for Team USA after one period of action. After a **Kieffer Bellows** tally, Latvia scored a shorthanded marker that sparked the U.S. offense as they rattled off three goals in the span of 1:09. The second stanza ended 8-1 in favor of the U.S. and four markers in the third period, including two special-team tallies by **Trent Frederic**, finished off the Latvians, 12-1. **Jake Oettinger** got the start in net for the U.S., stopping 22 shots en route to victory.

WOLL STANDS TALL, SIX PLAYERS SCORE IN PRELIM VICTORY OVER SWEDEN

Joseph Woll stopped 34 shots and six different players scored as the U.S. Men's National Under-18 Team defeated Sweden, 6-1, Saturday (April 16) evening at Ralph Engelstad Arena. **Casey Mittelstadt** staked the lead for Team USA late in the first frame. Three second-stanza markers, capped by a shorthanded highlight-reel goal by defenseman **J.D. Greenway**, gave the U.S. the 4-0 lead heading into the final frame. **Logan Brown** helped

spring **Keeghan Howdeshell** for the United States' fifth score and **Joey Anderson's** put-back tally on the power play answered Sweden's lone goal, also potted while enjoying the man advantage. U.S. captain **Ryan Lindgren** and **Kieffer Bellows** also netted goals in the win.

YAMAMOTO, KELLER LEAD CHARGE IN OPENING GAME vs. RUSSIA

Kailer Yamamoto recorded four points (2-2) and **Clayton Keller** scored two goals and added one assist as the U.S. Men's Under-18 National Team downed Russia, 8-2, on Thursday (April 14) at the Ralph Engelstad Arena. Team USA closed the first frame up 2-1 with goals from Keller and **James Sanchez**. A wraparound marker by Russia early in the second stanza tied the game briefly before an outstretched stick save by **Jake Oettinger** helped spark the team. Keller and **Kieffer Bellows** scored 14 seconds apart to stake a 4-2 lead for the U.S. Four tallies by Team USA, two by Yamamoto and single markers by **Joey Anderson** and **Logan Brown**, pushed the final score to 8-2.

COACH COLE ATTEMPTS TO GO THREE-FOR-THREE

The U.S. Men's National Under-18 Team will be led by **Danton Cole**, serving as head coach at his third IIHF Under-18 Men's World Championship. He previously led Team USA to gold-medal finishes in 2012 and 2014 in this event. Cole is currently in his sixth season as one of two head coaches at USA Hockey's National Team Development Program in Plymouth, Michigan. As a player, Cole was a four-year standout at Michigan State University helping the Spartans claim the 1986 NCAA Division I national championship. He also was a member of the U.S. Men's National Team three times (1990, 1991, 1994) and was a seven-year NHL veteran who skated with five teams (Winnipeg, New Jersey, Tampa Bay, New York Islanders, Chicago) over his career, earning a Stanley Cup with the Devils in 1995.

Joining Cole on the bench will be **Chris Luongo**, a first-year assistant coach at the NTDP who also skated with the Spartans from 1985-89. Luongo was previously linked to the University of Alabama-Huntsville men's ice hockey team, serving as head coach from 2010-12. The Michigan State University tie that binds Cole and Luongo together also extends to **Tyler Walsh**, who is completing his second season as intern assistant coach with the NTDP, but closes out his service as assistant coach for the U18s in this tournament. Walsh's grandfather, Ron Mason, coached the Spartans from 1979-2002 and ranks second in wins in college hockey annals. Before his time with USA Hockey, Walsh spent 2013-14 as director of hockey operations at Canisius College.

John Gruden, who was an assistant coach under Cole from 2011-15 at the NTDP, returns to coach in that same capacity at his third IIHF Under-18 Men's World Championship. He was on the staff that claimed the gold at the 2012 and 2014 events. Rounding out the coaching staff is assistant coach **Kevin Reiter**. Now in his third season as national goaltending coach with USA Hockey, Reiter served on both the 2014 and 2015 U.S. Men's National Under-18 Team staffs as Team USA captured first place in each tournament.

TRIO TAKES WORLD STAGE IN SEARCH OF BACK-TO-BACK GOLD MEDALS

Three players from the gold-medal 2015 U.S. Men's National Under-18 Team return for their second IIHF Under-18 Men's World Championship: **Clayton Keller**, **Chad Krys** and **Jake Oettinger**. Keller finished the tournament tied for eighth overall in points, netting four goals and adding five assists in seven games played. The underage forward was named best player for Team USA following a four-point performance (2-2) versus Sweden in a 6-4 preliminary-round victory on April 17, 2015. Krys, who also medaled (bronze) with the 2016 U.S. National Junior Team, skated in seven games last April and tied for the team lead among defensemen with five points (1-5). Oettinger saw action in one pre-tournament game, a 7-2 win over Finland on April 13. The goaltender dressed as backup to Evan Sarthou for the final preliminary bout and each contest in the subsequent medal round.

Kieffer Bellows' father, Brian, spent 17 seasons (1982-99) in the NHL with five teams and was named to three NHL All-Star Games (1984, 1988, 1992) while also earning an NHL Second All-Star Team nod in 1990. He claimed the Stanley Cup with Montreal in 1993 ... **Logan Brown's** father, Jeff, played 13 seasons (1985-98) in the NHL with seven teams. He is the current head coach of the Ontario Hockey League's Ottawa 67's ... **Trent Frederic's** brother, Grant, plays for the USHL's Green Bay Gamblers ... **J.D. Greenway's** older brother, Jordan, recently concluded his freshman year at Boston University. Following two year's with USA Hockey's National Team Development Program, the elder Greenway helped Team USA earn a gold medal in last year's IIHF Under-18 Men's World Championship in Zug and Lucerne, Switzerland ... **Chad Kry's** father, Mark, was a four-year letterwinner with Boston University (1987-91). He went on to play nine seasons in the AHL, ECHL, IHL and overseas ... **Ryan Lindgren's** brother, Charlie, most recently signed a two-way deal with the NHL's Montreal Canadiens after three seasons with St. Cloud State University. The goaltender, a finalist for the Mike Richter Award, was named NCHC Goaltender of the Year and also tabbed on the 2015-16 NCHC All-Conference First Team list. Charlie played for the USHL's Sioux Falls Stampede prior to his time with the Huskies ... **Will Lockwood's** father, Joseph, played in 147 games for the University of Michigan and also played for Kalamazoo of the IHL ... **Griffin Luce's** father, Scott, is the director of scouting for the NHL's Florida Panthers. Grandfather, Don, is a professional scout for the NHL's Philadelphia Flyers and spent time as a player with five NHL organizations ... **Luke Martin's** brother, Jimmy, spent one year with the USHL's Des Moines Buccaneers before suiting up for Yale University from 2007-11 ... **Graham McPhee's** father, George, was the recipient of the Hobey Baker Memorial Award in 1982 while at Bowling Green State University. He played seven seasons in the NHL with the New York Rangers and New Jersey Devils and is the former general manager of the Washington Capitals ... **Nick Pastujov's** brother, Michael, skates for the U.S. National Under-17 Team, part of USA Hockey's National Team Development Program ... **Kailer Yamamoto's** brother, Keanu, plays for the Western Hockey League's Spokane Chiefs.

TEAM USA NAMES CAPTAINS FOR TOURNAMENT

Defenseman **Ryan Lindgren** will serve as captain of the 2016 U.S. Men's National Under-18 Team. In addition, defensemen **Chad Kry's**, **Griffin Luce** and **Luke Martin** and forward **Joey Anderson** were tabbed alternate captains of the squad. Anderson and Luce will serve as alternate captains for all Team USA home games while Kry's and Martin will serve as alternates for all Team USA away games.

PRE-TOURNAMENT ROUNDUP

Team USA went 2-0 in pre-tournament games held at the National Sports Center in Blaine, Minnesota. On April 8, the line of **Kieffer Bellows**, **Clayton Keller** and **Joey Anderson** accounted for four goals as the U.S. Men's National Under-18 Team downed Finland, 6-1. Keller paced the offense with three tallies, while Bellows and **Will Lockwood** added single markers. The goaltending tandem of **Joseph Woll** and **Jake Oettinger** combined for 27 saves in the victory. On April 10, Keller notched two goals, one shorthanded and one on the power play, as the U.S. defeated Denmark, 5-1. Bellows, **Keeghan Howdeshell** and **Nick Pastujov** also lit the lamp for Team USA, while Woll and Oettinger split time in net once more. The duo kicked out seven shots in the win.

SIXTEEN ON NHL CENTRAL SCOUTING'S FINAL DRAFT RANKINGS

Sixteen members of the U.S. squad were included in the final NHL Central Scouting draft rankings. The list includes defensemen **Ryan Lindgren** (49), **Adam Fox** (50), **Chad Kry's** (53), **Griffin Luce** (70), and **J.D. Greenway** (121), as well as forwards **Logan Brown** (7), **Clayton Keller** (9), **Kieffer Bellows** (10), **Trent Frederic** (47), **Joey Anderson** (56), **Will Lockwood** (108), **Graham McPhee** (110), **Nick Pastujov** (112), **James Sanchez** (146) and **Zach Walker** (166). **Joseph Woll** was ranked fifth among North American goaltenders.

The U.S. Men's National Under-18 Team boasts a tournament-record nine gold medals all-time at the IIHF Under-18 World Championship. Recaps of each gold medal-winning tournament run can be found below.
