Statement by the Chair

Greetings Sexualities Members! It has been an exciting spring!

In April, I was in Des Moines, Iowa for the Midwest Sociological Society's Annual Meeting when the announcement came that the Iowa Supreme Court struck down the state's gay marriage ban. At the celebration rally in downtown Des Moines, speakers cited Iowa's history of being a bellwether state on civil rights issues. Their remarks seemed prescient. A few days later in April, Vermont legalized same-sex marriage (in addition to its previous civil union laws), in May, the state of Maine legalized gay marriage, followed by New Hampshire in June. Hopefully a trend for equal rights for same-sex partners is gaining momentum in the United States.

We'll have time to share our collective thoughts on these and other sexuality-related developments at the ASA Annual Meeting in San Francisco. We have five fascinating sessions this year that all in some way ask us to think about sexuality studies at a macro-level. Eve Ilana Shapiro and Bernadette Barton have organized a session on Sexuality, Community and Social Change. We have two co-sponsored sessions this year. Salvador Vidal-Ortiz has put together a panel on Transnational Genders and Sexualities in Religious Contexts that is co-sponsored by the Transnational Caucus. Kristen Schilt and Tey Meadow have organized a session on Gender, Sexuality and the State which is co-sponsored by the Sex and Gender Section. Prostitution in the post-industrial age will be discussed during our Author-Meets-Critics session featuring Elizabeth Bernstein and her book *Temporarily Yours: Intimacy, Authenticity and the Commerce of Sex*. Finally, Alison Better, Dana Berkowitz and Reese Kelly have done a superb job of organizing our Section Roundtables. I'd like to thank the Program Committee for their work in putting together an outstanding set of panels.

In addition to the Sexualities Section program, our Section is also helping to support a one-day conference on August 7th in San Francisco. The conference, *Marking 20 Years of AIDS in Sociology: Reflecting Back & Moving Forward,* is sponsored by the Sociologists' AIDS Network (SAN). Steven Epstein, recipient of the ASA's 2009 Distinguished Book Award

The Section would like to congratulate Sexualities Section Council member Steven Epstein on receiving the American Sociological Associations 2009 Distinguished Book Award for *Inclusion: The Politics of Difference in Medical Research* (University of Chicago Press, 2007). *Inclusion: The Politics of Difference in Medical Research* is about the social implications of medical science trying to diversify its population of research subjects. While new inclusive research practices are meant to aid underserved groups, efforts on recruiting and maintaining minority subjects have distracted medical science from the enormous inequalities in medicine and health care that are *socially*, not biologically caused.

Epstein will accept the book award at the ASA awards ceremony in San Francisco on Sunday, August 9th at 4:30pm, following the formal address of ASA president Patricia Hill Collins.

This award commemorates decades of research and writing on sexualities by Professor William Simon (University of Houston) who died on July 21, 2000, and his longtime collaborator, Professor John Gagnon (SUNY-Stony Brook).

Film Review: *No Dumb Questions*

The documentary film by Melissa Regan, *No Dumb Questions* deals with the taboo topic in society and the growing issue in academia of transgenders. Addressing the change Uncle Bill is ready to undertake to be Aunt Barbara, the 24 minute documentary focuses on the perspective of his three nieces and how they come to understand this experience. The girls talk about their reactions, perspectives, and, in relation to the title, their questions as they are first informed about the choice and then again with his eventual visit.

The documentary, as a resource in academia and sociology in particular, I review from three different reference points. As a source of academic knowledge, the documentary is limited, offering no experts to explicate ideas, nor references to statistics, definitions or related sociological concepts. The conceptual connections that can be gleaned from the video will derive from a viewer's own recognition of sociological concepts and social issues, such as the separation between sexuality and gender, as Aunt Barbara is going to be a woman who is attracted to, and in a relationship with another woman. As his brother succinctly shares, "I think...my brother is a lesbian." (Although more theoretical, Monro's (2007) article engages the binary discussion surrounding gender, sex, and sexuality in relation to transgender studies.)

This limitation of its use as an academic reference is minor in terms of the utility of the documentary in an educational setting. The documentary is an excellent tool for developing discussions in the classroom, which can focus on people's personal experiences and/or difficulties in dealing with such social issues by drawing on the niece's questions. The documentary can also generate, as with the quote above about sexuality, an opportunity to engage larger sociological issues, such as the differentiation between sexuality, gender identity and gender. These opportunities exist throughout the video, allowing for consistent references throughout a class, and not limited to the section of the class during which it is shown.

Beyond discussion promotion, the documentary offers numerous examples to help identify sociological concepts, with a strong reference toward socialization, identity formation, and child development. As is documented throughout the video, each daughter has a different response to their Uncle's decision, allowing for references of identity, and gender identity development among the kids. For example, the youngest had no problem with her uncle, even wondering if Aunt Barbara would want to paint her nails with her, displaying her understanding of gender identity as more fluid and changing, as opposed to her sisters who struggled more with the change, referencing more structured notions about gender. The video consistently offers opportunities to identify examples that help students understand difficult social concepts, including referencing behaviors as examples of "doing gender," a prominent issue in the lives of transgender individuals. (Gagne and Tewksbury (1999) engage the connection between "doing gender" and transgender in an older, but relevant article.)

Ultimately, the documentary presents a realistic perspective through a lived experience, which helps to contextualize the issues surrounding transgender individuals and their experiences (Davidson (2006) offers an interesting discussion surrounding the term of transgender). It also helps to generate discussion beyond the experiences of the transgender community. Initiating discussions and offering examples, establishes this video as a useful tool within classroom settings, or any other venue in which education occurs.

Dr. John Vincke of the University of Ghent died on May 27 after a long struggle against a very aggressive sarcoma cancer. Dr. Vincke was a sociologist and Dean of the Faculty of Political and Social Sciences at Ghent, and the author of over 40 articles on gay life in Belgium, on HIV, and social stress and homophobia.
