Fox Says 'No' To 'Doctor Who' Pilot

Marketing differences appear to have led to Fox Broadcasting's decision to withdraw from the *Doctor Who* revival pilot project, according to Amblin fan liaisons Randy and Jean-Marc Lofficier.

The Lofficiers write: "With the recent emergence of the WB and UPN networks, Fox now desires to enlarge its audience. They now feel that *Doctor Who* is not 'mainstream' enough, and therefore no longer fits into their plans." In addition, "now that there is a script for the *Doctor Who* pilot, a budget could be drawn up. Unfortunately, Universal (the supplier) and Fox (the buyer) couldn't reach an agreement over the cost of the pilot. The consequences are too complicated and far ranging to speculate about at this time. The producers are busy investigating other options. Philip Segal remarked that this setback is actually being looked upon as good news by others in Hollywood, who are currently interested in *Doctor Who* for their own networks."

The pilot was to have been prepared for a possible May broadcast.

The British Are Coming!

BBC readying two new cable channels for global viewers

It'll be "one if by land and two if by satellite" as the BBC plans to launch its world television news service on U.S. cable TV systems in February.

The New York-based International News Network, headed by Cable News Network co-founder Reese Schonfeld, has reached an agreement with the British broadcaster to distribute BBC World, a 24-hour all-news channel designed to compete head-on internationally with CNN.

"We complement CNN and are distinctive in a number of ways. No one should rely on one news source," said BBC World spokesman Phil Johnstone. "We are providing not just the who, what and when that CNN provides, but the how and the why."

The BBC also hopes to start its general entertainment

channel, BBC Prime, in the United States this year. Both BBC World and BBC Prime were launched in Europe January 26.

BBC Prime programming consists mainly of current programs from the BBC's domestic output, and reruns from the BBC and Thames Television archives. Among the programs listed in BBC Prime's February schedule are Alas Smith and Jones, All Creatures Great and Small, Blake's 7, Bottom, Bread, Doctor Who, EastEnders, Fresh Fields, Just Good Friends, Keeping Up Appearances, KYTV, The Mistress, Mulberry, Never the Twain, One Foot in the Grave, Porridge, and Top of the Pops.

BBC World is essentially the next step in development of BBC World Service Television launched in October 1991 to satellite subscribers in Asia and, later, in Africa.

The items auctioned for the most money were the Encyclopedia of TV Science Fiction, bought by Laura Lyons for \$45, and the print of the Suzan Lovett artwork We Touch... But Never Quite Coincide, bought by Sue Aycock, also for \$45.

Among the other items donated for the auction were: a *Blake's 7* video, various *Doctor Who* hardback and paperback books, and the script from the *Blake's 7* episode *City at the Edge of the World*.

Members also decided to send \$100 of the auction proceeds to the Leigh Arnold Recovery Fund. Arnold, a Blake's 7 fanzine editor, was injured in a fall from a horse last summer, and spent six months in a coma.

Joan and I wandered around Thursday night checking out the panel rooms and all that, and she spotted Paul Darrow. I spotted the bald spot. We were off to a great start...

Opening Ceremonies

This is the first time I've ever attended the opening ceremonies. Usually we're all on the floor at Bill Hupe's table pawing through boxes of zines. But this was the first real chance to get a look at Paul Darrow, the man,

the myth, the Elvis Impersonator.

Three people were chosen at random (not really) to play Guess the Guest. Each guest, out of sight of the audience and contestants, read clues to his or her identity. "I was married to the star of a BBC science fiction series" said an unmistakably voice, unmistakably not Sheelagh Wells. I stroked my "B/A: the Ultimate Adventure" button with smug pleasure. The two of them alternated reading each other's clues.

Rob Grant, one of the creators of Red Dwarf, came out with a shopping bag and after his little "hi, it's great to be here" speech pulled out of the bag his Emmy. As the session drew to a close, Darrow grabbed the Emmy

and fled the stage.

[He should have taken it from him at blaster point...]

Panels

Over the course of the weekend, he did two panels with Sheelagh and one with Mark Ryan and Phil Rose (both from *Robin of Sherwood*) and Chris Potter (from *Kung Fu*). I'll just summarize...

After all of this — the sheep, the man in drag, kissing Gareth, and some short reference to meeting Liberace in Toronto — I thought there was a definite theme developing...

[Before getting into P.D. (cough... I don't care, I'm not rephrasing that). Anyway, I'd just like to stick in the little rememberance Chris P. gave us all as he went to add cream to his coffee at the panel... Politely drawing everyone's attention, he wondered, "Is cream always like this in America?" and proceeded to 'pour' some in. *glop* *splurt* *dribble*. Many embarrased faces from the hotel staff who scurried the cup off stage...]

He made a lot of Shatner jokes (and told my favorite one, too) and slipped in and out of his Elvis accent.

[Hey, I'm not absolutely wild over Elvis, though I do ap-

preciate the fact that he did have a good singing voice. Elvis impersonations give me the picture of Rosie O'Donnell curling her lip to the side and saying, "Thankyaw. Thankyaw ver' mush." Paul dear has a southern accent that puts me in mind of old, smooth brandy next to a cozy fireplace on a cold winter's night. Not that I drink at all.]

Among the new stories:

Macbeth — asked if the curse plagued his production, he said not really but everyone did get sick. He also told stories about nearly winning the sword fight at the end (he said the guy playing opposite him was scared of him) and some nights being so tired by that point that when MacWhatever says "Turn, hellhound! Surrender!" he was sorely tempted to say "OK" and give him his sword. He also described, with great relish, of rolling about the stage with one of the witches and her asking him to be careful because his dagger was jabbing her. He said he should've told her it wasn't the dagger. (Our comments ranged from "he was just happy to see her" to comments on the size of the average dirk.)

Deadfall — Someone asked about this play, which ended just before Who's 7. It isn't going to the West End. There was something about a sheep's head in a bag (under floorboards?) and the rest of the sheep in a bed. He said he felt like the character Gene Wilder played in Everything You Always Wanted to Know About Sex...

Stick With Me Kid — He's in an episode and plays a character who marries rich widows (pretending to be a friend of the dead husband) and then bumps them off. Actually, he said he played a scumbag. They finally get him by sending an undercover cop — a man in drag and "he married him."

Gareth Thomas — he twice mentioned working with Gareth about a month ago. The first time, in response to a question about Gareth being an asshole, he said he'd "kissed him in Oxford Street" just a few weeks before.

[Sue! I'm shocked at you! Nowhere do you mention his repeated lines about taking those sisters out to dinner (Their treat? Um, in both senses of the word?) Lots of goodnatured jabbing in both the panels; Sheelagh can definitely hold her own; unfortunately my mind is dulled due to Finals week, or I might have been able to recollect specifics...]

But then he smiles... Now if only he wouldn't continually harp on wanting money (a little Avon rubbed off on him?), and stopped smoking. First panel of his that I attended, and he went without for quite some time. When it was brought up, the audience was pleased and asked him to not light up for the sake of his health, but alas.]

Michael Keating — he was asked about keeping in touch with the other cast members and volunteered this about Keating: "I think he's at an unhappy place in his life and unfortunately blames me. He was up for a part in a play and the producer changed his mind." He also told a story about catching Mike and Steven Pacey coming out of a strip club and blackmailing them about tell-

ing their girlfriends.

[Sheelagh said that she'd been keeping in touch with him (she seemed to have just seen everyone and their cousin in the last fortnight) and Paul satisfied the audience by telling her to send MK his regards (forget exactly what sentiment, but regards should be close enough, I think...)]

He and Sheelagh between them also told some classics. It's too bad there isn't a numbering system so I could just say "Quarry Story 14" and you'd all know. Basically, if you've read some interviews or seen any con tapes, you've read/heard the best.

Autographs

We skipped the Friday session in favor of gathering supplies (i.e. wine), but Saturday queued up to get his autograph. I took my hardcover copy of Avon: A Terrible Waste of Time. For the entire time I was in line I was afraid he's ask me what I thought and I'd tell him. But he didn't ask. He gave me a hard time over how to spell my name and then told me to take my clothes off. He says that all the time, so I didn't take it personally. Besides, it was cold in the room. I did, however, take it as a cue to unburden myself about the wretched sex scenes in the book. He still signed it with "love" from him to me, though, right before he latched onto Joan's photo of him in "Rescue" and quickly changed the subject. Some people just can't take constructive criticism. (Beth, by the way, claims I was in fact very polite and constructive so I have a witness that I didn't harass him, no matter what Joan says).

[Alas, I was separated from the group for both this and the photo shoot; I had visiting friends in and out, one from England visiting the other as well... So, I just had to show her the other picture I thought of Paul signing. (the second which is a pic of Blake laughing at Avon after having just dunked him in a lake where they were both cleaning up. I spent the rest of the weekend tormenting my Avonite room- mates with the fact that Paulie loves me and I have it in writing. Ah, irony. And I was wearing about half a dozen Blake buttons, too. Heh heh.

[Hey, I do have mine which with his handwriting looks like "Amanda for Parl Dro" (sniff) So he loves you. I'm a

bondslave! So there. (sneer)]

For the next day, I let Brooke Barker and Leigh Moto'oka talk me into getting him to autograph a copy of Shatner's memoirs, because of all the shots he'd taken at the guy over the weekend (they were just jokes, not insults). Someone suggested giving him a canned ham to autograph, but that was vetoed as too cruel. I wanted to give a pair of pinking shears but then I would've had to explain about *Ten Credit Touch* and the drawings of possible double-bladed serrated weapons. So we went with Shatner's book. It was a lot funnier when we were planning it than the actual execution and it's my fault — I was too hungover to get the most of it and the cameras made me nervous. But it wasn't a total loss — Joan says she got a good shot of the bald spot during that session. (He wrote "The finest book ever written?")

Photographs

Joan and Beth wanted photos of themselves with Paul and Sheelagh and the rest of us wanted to take photos without being in them. I took Joan's picture for her with her camera, turned around to get my own camera and poof, she'd been hustled out the door. It was Sunday, the line wasn't that long, they could've let her stand there for 5 more seconds.

Variety Show

Someone who was sitting close enough to the stage to actually see should describe this, particularly what exactly happened during the radio skit. Joan and I were so far back, I watched the screen at the side so I could see faces. I vaguely remember (I was working up to the hangover at the time) that Darrow was first up and read

Closing Ceremonies

Darrow was the second-to-last to come out on stage and all the others stood up, salaamed to him, and then started doing the wave. I have no idea why.

Pro Dealers' Room

Pretty much the same as usual — lots of *Doctor Who* and *Red Dwarf* stuff, not much *Blake's 7* stuff (although I did get some more issues of the monthly). One of the dealers had the new and improved Programme Guide. It looks just like the old one, even has the same photos in it. We also found the second issue of the Poster Magazine. It's all Tarrant but some of you might be interested...We also got *X Files* tote bags — one side is the series logo, the other says "trustno1". So B7ish, we thought.

Bill had lots of stuff I didn't. Then he had less stuff and I had more stuff. Then the next day he had even less stuff and I had some more stuff. Then I had to stop because I had no more money. Get the picture?

[Beth and I dropped by here and the saintly woman promptly led me over to a table that was selling used fanzines (mostly B7). Snagged a couple. Passed by everything else on the way back to the Fan Dealer's room for the second trip to Bill Hupe's table.]

Fan Dealers' Room

Practically empty. Bill Hupe had the usual sprawl of zines but all the good stuff (slash and adult) had to be kept behind the table. There weren't really many new Blake's 7 zines to be had and there were very few zines at all in the room. I think there were only about 7 tables and a couple of them were more SCAish stuff. The Prydonians of Princeton and a Robin of Sherwood group had tables, someone had lots of weaponry and there were maybe one or two miscellaneous collections. I got a nice button of Blake as bounty hunter — a miniature version of the 8x10 photo. Very nice. It went well with the other but-

tons I was wearing — a Blake portrait, "B/A: the Ultimate Adventure," the mandatory "Blake is so unappreciated, poor baby" button, etc. I also picked up a nice sketch of Blake and Avon that we saw T shirts of later. I've forgotten the artist's name... Warren something? Joan and I almost got matching T shirts that said "Psycho Amazon Warbitch from Hell...with an attitude." But we figured why give people fair warning. Since there was little enough to throw money at, I overbid on a full set of Morgan's Boy tapes. EP, off the air copies converted from PAL to NTSC. There a re a few lines and blips, like any off the air tape, but much better than what I had and all the episodes.

Video Rooms

I was very sorry to have missed the episode of *The Saint* with Paulie in it. Anyone got a copy? We also watched a lot of videos and episodes in our room. Not as many as last year, since we didn't have the Blake shrine we did last year. I did leave a small spot on the TV screen while pointing to my favorite shot in *Killer*, though.

[My two almost-innocents (which we also subjected to a few episodes in our room) got their first glimpse of B7 music vids whilst I languished in the autograph line (I do **not** wait for autographs normally. But I made an exception. I would for Michael K. as well. **Perhaps** Gareth T. Oh, all right, I probably would. But that's all.) Then, fresh from the photo shoot and the purring incident, what do I walk into? Orbit. The shuttle. The return trip. Orac's line. (smile at Fate)]

'Who' Books Back On U.S. Bookshelves

Peter Darvill-Evans. Virgin Publishing

For several months, Doctor Who fans in the U.S. have had difficulties obtaining Doctor Who books. All-Consuming Fire, published in Britain in June 1994, was the last New Adventure on sale in the U.S. American fans were deprived of the launch of the Missing Adventures, and of the new non-fiction titles such as The Seventies and The First Doctor Handbook.

This interruption of normal service came about because Virgin Publishing was in the throes of changing its system of distribution in the U.S., We apologise to everyone who has been disappointed, or frustrated, in trying to obtain Doctor Who books.

Now for the good news.

First, the next five New Adventures (Blood Harvest, Strange England, First Frontier, St. Anthony's Fire, and Falls The Shadow) were shipped to the U.S. last year, and have now been distributed. This has been done under the old system, with Carol Publishing acting as distributor in the U.S.

Second, from January 1st, 1995, Doctor Who books will be handled by London Bridge, a new company spe-

cialising in the distribution of selected Bucephalus, Time Of Your Life British books in the U.S. With a warehouse in New York state, and teams of trade salespeople operating in every state, including Hawaii and Alaska, the availability of Doctor Who books should be better than ever before. Retailers in every corner of the United States can now order Doctor Who books easily and reliably.

The first books distributed by London Bridge will be available in American stores in March. The U.S. schedule from March to June is:

Non-Fiction: The First Doctor Handbook

By June, the Missing Adventures will have "caught up" with the New Adventures, and from then on, one of each series will be released each month, matching the UK publishing schedule, but always a couple of months behind.

We are confident that, now that the changeover hiatus is over, London Bridge will provide an excellent distribution service, and that Doctor Who books will be widely available across the whole of the U.S.

Final note: keen-eved followers of the New Adventures will have noticed that Parasite, published in the U.K. in December, 1994, managed to slip through the net. This will be released in the U.S. in July, 1995, a little out of the correct sequence, but otherwise unharmed.






