
Neal Zetter will be selling signed copies of his comedy Poetry book, 'Bees in My Bananas'. This will be available to purchase at the price of £5 in the Library.

CAMPION GO-KARTING



Campion Go Karting team were cruelly robbed of a place in the National Final of the British Schools Karting BRITISH SCHOOLS KARTING CHAMPIONSHIP Championship. This would have been the third year

BERLIN VISIT 2014

Year 10 students and staff arrived at school before the crack of dawn on Monday 12th May to embark on our visit to Berlin. Such dedication to their GCSE studies is to be commended! Having waved goodbye to their tired mums, who I hoped were heading back to bed, we headed off to Luton.

Berlin was a lovely city packed with History related to the boys' studies of Nazi Germany and the Cold War. There were huge contrasts in the sites we visited. On the one hand there was the grandeur and beauty of Berlin's imperial past, though this was tempered by the times that our guide informed us that these buildings had been rebuilt after the devastation of the fighting at the end of World War 2 between the Germans and Russian or after the East Germans had pulled them down to make room for the wall they built to divide their city from the west.

On the other hand we visited the sombre slabs of concrete that formed this wall and split communities and families in half for over thirty years. We visited the amazing Olympic Stadium with its classical architecture but were reminded that it was built to celebrate the superiority of one race over another. The beauty of Wansee House with its views over the lake was tempered by the knowledge that in this place people planned, in business-like fashion, how to exterminate six million Jews. Most disturbing of all was the tour of Sachsenhausen Concentration Camp where the Nazis reduced people to numbers and symbols. Its bleakness was haunting. Our guide commented on the boys' attentiveness and co-operation throughout.

Our journey home was disrupted by an air traffic controllers' strike in France which resulted in the cancellation of our flight home. For half of the group we returned to school once again before the crack of dawn on Friday. Great credit is due to the students, especially those who were in Berlin airport for eleven hours! Their behaviour was exemplary and a credit to their parents, the school and most of all themselves. Many other tired travellers came over to compliment them. Miss Elson and I thank them for their support. Also thank you to the parents for their patience. Finally thank you to Miss Elson for the huge amount of planning that she put into the visit which was, despite its bumpy landing, an informative, moving and very worthwhile visit.
