


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
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
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
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
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


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
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
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
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
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## PREFACE



T would require a pen dipped in magical fluid and much more space than can be allotted here, to treat adequately, the varying comments upon the first edition of THE MUSICAL BLUE BOOK OF AMERICA. These comments, both kind and unkind, just and unjust, indicate that human ideas and tastes are as numerous as the sands of the sea. What was stated in the first edition concerning the plans to collect the data, should be repeated here. For ten months previous to publishing


the first edition, the Corporation mailed and distributed through its various agents, 10,000 copies of a thirty-two page Prospectus, at a cost of several thousand dollars. Lists were furnished by representative musicians, and while registration in the book imposed no obligations, some failed to send in their data. Apologies were made for the omissions and in the new edition for 1916-1917, it will again be necessary to beg the pardon of those who were overlooked, however, be it said, through no fault of the compiler.

Twice a year—autumn and spring—the world of music witnesses many changes. Over 5,000 individual registrations were published in the first edition of THE MUSICAL BLUE BOOK OF AMERICA, and more than half of these demanded complete rewriting, or additions in order to bring them up to date. Often contrary to their wishes, musicians are compelled to be birds of passage, and this migratory existence may be one reason why we in America never have had an extended biography of living musicians. Before such a work could be completed, more than half of the sketches would be out-of-date. A year book such as THE MUSICAL BLUE BOOK OF AMERICA aims to be, is the only work that can serve the musical profession in a practical way, and more time must elapse before the work is sufficiently advertised to include ALL those who should be enrolled.

Because of the enormous expense entailed in collecting the data and preparing the copy for the book, the directors of THE MUSICAL BLUE BOOK CORPORATION voted at the annual meeting in January, 1916, to charge the nominal sum of One Dollar to non-subscribers who desired to have their names in bold or display type. The response to this plan proved so universally generous, that when the time approached to set up the copy, the names in light-faced type were so few, that to adhere to the plan would have resulted in disfiguring the appearance of the pages. Therefore, it was resolved that a STAR should be affixed to the enrollments of subscribers, those who had paid the Dollar for special type, and also those who had rendered some special service. Should those who paid the Dollar subscribe for the book now that it is issued, the Dollar will be deducted from the regular subscription price.

Elections among the musical clubs are held in the spring, early summer and in the autumn, and because of these various times for holding annual meetings, the compiler has experienced exasperating difficulties in having the latest returns published; the sums for postage would stagger those critics who imagine that a work of this character ought to be compiled for their sole benefit. No STAR is affixed to the musical clubs which subscribed for the first edition, for the reason that the board of officers in many societies has been changed.

Mere words are inadequate to express gratitude for the many kind friends in the United States and Canada who assisted in having the information forwarded. If any credit is due for bringing out the MUSICAL BLUE BOOK OF AMERICA for 1916-17, it belongs to those unselfish men and women who aided the compiler during the past year. Endorsements of the book from these friends of the cause resulted in many subscriptions from college libraries, public libraries and social and political clubs.
