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Pope Francis and diplomatic relations between the US and Cuba

ne step closer

On Thursday, 18 September, Pope Francis expressed his satisfaction that, he said, "we have seen two nations, who were estranged for so many years, take a step closer to-gether". The Pontiff was referring the historic decision to restore diplomatic relations between the United States and Cuba.

United States and Cuba. That same day, the Secretary of State, Cardinal Pietro Parolin, told Vatican Radio that Pope Francis played "a critical role" in this de-cision, "because he took the initiat-ive to write to the two presidents in order to invite them to everycome order to invite them to overcome the existing difficulties between the the existing difficulties between the countries and to find an agree-ment". According to the commu-niqué of the Secretariat of State on Wednesday, the Holy Father invited both Presidents "to resolve human-itarian questions of common in-terest, including the situation of certain prisoners, in order to initiate a new phase in relations between a new phase in relations between the two Parties". Furthermore Car-dinal Parolin stated that it had taken "many years" to arrive at this point, explaining that decisions like these come out of "hard work, pa-tience, many small steps forward". In the communiqué, Pope Fran-cis underlined that this decision was "in the interset of the citizene of

"in the interest of the citizens of both countries" and which aims to overcome "the difficulties which have marked their recent history".

Last October the Holy See also received in the Vatican Delegations of the two countries and "provided its good offices to facilitate a con-structive dialogue on delicate mat-ters, resulting in solutions accept-able to both Parties". "The Holy

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See will continue to assure its support for initiatives which both na-tions will undertake to strengthen their bilateral relations and promote the wellbeing of their respective cit-izens".

As Cuba transitions through these future changes, the Archbish-op of Miami, Thomas G. Wenski, expressed his hope that the change "is peaceful and offers real hope for the Cuban people on both sides of the Florida straits".

At the General Audience the Pope looks to the example of the Holy Family in Nazareth A new dawn from the outskirts

With the Incarnation a new history begins and it happens in a family from "a remote village on the outskirts of the Roman Empire". At the General Audience on Wednesday, 17 December, in St Peter's Square, the Pope looked at the simple life in Nazareth as a model for families. He then asked for a moment of silence followed by an Our Father for "the victims of inhumane acts of terrorism which took place in recent days in Australia, Pakistan and Yemen". The following is a translation of the Holy Father's address, which he delivered in Italian.

Dear Brothers and Sisters, Good morning,

The Synod of Bishops on the Fam-ily, recently celebrated, was the first stage of a journey, which will con-clude next October with the celebration of another Assembly on the theme: "The Vocation and Mission of the Family in the Church and [Contemporary] World". The prayer and reflection which must ac-company this journey is required of all the People of God. I would also like the customary meditations of the Wednesday Audiences to be in-cluded in this common journey. I have therefore decided to reflect with you, this year, precisely on the family, on this great gift that the Lord has made to the world from the very beginning, when he entrusted Adam and Eve with the mission to multiply and fill the earth (cf. Gen 1:28); that gift that Jesus con-firmed and sealed in his Gospel.

The nearness of Christmas casts a great light on this mystery. The Incarnation of the Son of God opens a new beginning in the universal history of man and woman. And this new beginning happens within family, in Nazareth. Jesus was born in a family. He could have come in a spectacular way, or as a warrior, an emperor.... No, no: he is born in a family, in a family. This is important: to perceive in the nativ-ity, this beautiful scene.

God chose to come into the world in a human family, which He himself formed. He formed it in a remote village on the outskirts of the Roman Empire. Not in Rome,

which was the capital of the Empire, not in a big city, but on its nearly invisible outskirts, indeed, of little renown. The Gospels also refittle renown. The Gospels also re-call this, almost as an expression: "Can anything good come out of Nazareth?" (Jn 1:46). Perhaps, in many parts of the world, we still talk this way, when we hear the name of some areas on the peri-phery of a big city. And so, right

there, on the outskirts of the great Empire, began the most holy and good story of Jesus among men! And that is where this family was.

And someone might say: "But did this God, who comes to save us, waste 30 years there, in that suburban slum?". He wasted 30 years! He wanted this. Jesus' path was in that family – "and his mother kept all these things in her heart. And Jesus inthings in her heart. And Jesus in-creased in wisdom and in stature, and in favour with God and man" (Lk 2:51-52). He has served as: vice-curate of Santa Edvige della Slesia parish, Chorzów; diocesan moderator of the deaconry for Evangelization of the "Luce Vita" Movement; consultor of the council for pastoral care of the youth, of the committee for the new evan-gelization, and of missionary radio broadcasts.

The Holy Father accepted the resignation Bishop Max John Rodrigues of Hyderabad in Pakistan. It was presented in accord with can. 401 § 1 of the Code of Canon Law (16 Dec.).

The Holy Father appointed Fr Sam-Son Shukardin, OFM, as Bishop of Hyderabad in Pakistan. Until now he has been Vicar General of the same Diocese (16 Dec.).

Bishop-elect Shukardin, 53, was born in Hyderabad, Pakistan. He holds a diploma in art, he graduated in theology and holds a licence in civil law. He made his solemn profession to the Franciscan Order of Friars Minor on 2 August 1991. He was ordained a priest on 10 December 1993. He has served in parish ministry and as procurator of the Franciscan Province, custodian of the Franciscan Order, president of the Conference of Superiors Major in Pakistan, diocesan director of the Commission for Justice and Peace, and director of formation of small Christian communities.

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Consistory set for February

The Pope has convoked a consistory for the creation of new cardinals on 14-15 February. This will be the second consistory of his pontificate. Fr Federico Lombardi, Director of the Holy See Press Office, announced this on Thursday, II December, at a briefing regarding the meeting of the Council of Cardinals, the socalled C9, which was underway. The Council, he said, will also meet again on 9-11 February and then on 12-13 February a consistory will be held with the whole College of Cardinals discuss Curia reform.

As to the Council's recent meeting (9-11 December), Fr Lombardi said that the Pope participated in every session except the morning of the General Audience. Opening with an address by Bishop Secretary Marcello Semeraro, the Council examined the results of the meeting of dicastery heads on 24 November.

At the meeting several proposals and observations were examined, confirming the intention to combine several dicasteries into two: one for laity and the family and another for justice, peace and charity. The process has begun but no final decision has yet been made nor is one expected soon.

made nor is one expected soon. Joseph F.X. Zahra, Deputy Coordinator of the Council for the Economy, participated in the meeting of the Council on Thursday morning. Several members of the commission are working to define the statues of the commission and of the Secretary for the Economy.

The results of the Apostolic Visitation of women religious in the US

From sister to sister

Approximately 50,000 sisters in 341 diocesan and pontifical right institutes were involved in the Apostolic Visitation of the women religious in the United States of America, which took place from 2009-2012. The results of the Visitation were presented in the Holy See Press Office on Tuesday morning, 16 December. Presenting at the conference were Cardinal João Braz de Aviz and Archbishop José Rodríguez Carballo, respectively Prefect and Secretary of the Congregation for the Institutes of Consecrated Life and Societies of Apostolic Life; Mother Mary Clare Millea, Visitator; Sr Sharon Holland, President of the Leadership Conference of Women Religious (LCWR); Sr Agnes Mary Donovan, Coordinator of the Council of Major Superiors of Women Religious (CMSWR); and Fr Thomas Rosica, Assistant to the Visitation Committee.

Committee. Committee. Cardinal Braz de Aviz explained that the Visitation "offered new opportunities for women religious to discover God's presence and salvific action in fruitful communication with other religious, with the Church's pastors and lay faithful". "May the self-assessment and dialogue sparked by the Apostolic Visitation," he said, "continue to bear abundant fruit for the revitalization and strengthening of religious institutes in fidelity to Christ, to the Church and to their founding charisms".

The Cardinal Prefect didn't hide the fact that the Apostolic Visitation was met with "apprehension by some women religious", in fact some decided "not to collaborate fully in the process". Despite this bitterness, the Cardinal expressed his willingness "to engage in respectful and fruitful dialogue with those institutes which were not fully compliant". The dicastery, he said, is committed to collaborating "in the realization of Pope Francis' resolve that 'the feminine genius' find expression in the various settings where important decisions are made, both in the Church and in social structures", as is made clear in *Evangelii Gaudium* (n. 103). Thus in this sense the celebration of the Year of Consecrated Life is a propitious occasion in which they "can work toward that full reconciliation which will offer a radiant and attractive witness of fraternal communion to all".

Then Archbishop Rodríguez Carballo took the floor, offering various details about the visit. He explained that the Visitation involved religious institutes of women which engage in apostolic ministry and which have a generalate, provincialate and/or initial formation program in the United States. Each province of institutes which had more than one province in the United States was considered a separate unit. Therefore 405 entities were considered in the Visitation. The dicastery, the prelate recalled, appointed a woman religious from the United States, Mother Mary Clare Millea, ASCJ, as Apostolic Visitator, "granting her the faculties to design and carry out the Visitation". She, in turn, chose a core team of American religious who assisted her throughout the process. "Not only was the Apostolic Visita

tion vast in its proportions", Archbishop Carballo said, it also examined "diversified expressions of apostolic religious life throughout the country". He then explained that from the beginning "it sought to convey the caring support of the Church in respectful, 'sister-to-sister' dialogue, as modeled in the Gospel account of the Visitation of Mary to her cousin Elizabeth". Emphasis was placed on listening on "the lived reality of the religious, understand their rich heritage, current challenges and future hopes, within the context of the ecclesial community".

The Visitation was divided into four phases. "In the first phase", he said, "266 superiors general (78% of their total number) voluntarily engaged in personal dialogue with the Visitator". Subsequently, all major superiors were asked "to complete a questionnaire requesting empirical data and qualitative information regarding the spiritual, community and ministerial life of the individual institutes".

In it's final phase, Mother Millea submitted a final report to dicastery on the major issues and trends in women's religious life in the United States.

At the press conference Mother Millea herself explained that the Apostolic Visitation offered many opportunities for reflection, dialogue, communion among women religious and their relationship with pastors and laypeople. Religious superiors, including those which had initially resisted, "shared that the process has yielded surprising positive results", especially producing "honest confrontation with the transformative power of the Word of God". Other results include the "deep spiritual conversations" among sisters about the life, witness and message" of the foundresses and founders, and the "increased solidarity among women religious and renewed desire to move beyond attitudes which prevent us from being in communion with one another". Bishops, clergy and lay persons expressed an "outpouring of loving gratitude" for the women religious, which has sparked "new energy and resourcefulness among us and has awakened a renewed interest in the promotion of vocations to the religious life". The Apostolic Visitation – she added – offered "priceless opportunity to renew our commitment to the consecrated life and to place our unique gifts at the service of the Church", especially emerging threats to human dignity, religious freedom and conscience protection.

New members of the Commission for the Protection of Minors appointed

As anticipated, Pope Francis has appointed new members to the Pontifical Commission for the Protection of Minors, chosen from various parts of the world, so as to allow a broad representation of different situations and cultures. The Holy See Press Office announced this on Wednesday, 17 December, in a press release which indicated the complete composition of the Commission as follows:

At the Angelus on Gaudete Sunday

Where joy is at home

"Joy is at home in Jesus". Pope Francis invited the faithful gathered for the Angelus on Sunday, 14 December, to repeat these words, which were written on a sign held high by some children from the Centro oratori romani in St Peter's Square. Many children were present in the square for the traditional blessing of the "Baby Jesus" figurines, for their Christmas nativity scene. On this occasion, in order to help them be "missionaries of joy", the Holy Father gave the faithful a pocket-size prayer book, which the Pope traditionally provides each year on Gaudete Sunday. The following is a translation of the Pope's reflection, which was delivered in Italian.

Dear Brothers and Sisters, Dear Children, Dear Boys and Girls, Good Morning!

For two weeks already, the Season of Advent has been calling us to spiritual vigilance in preparing the way for the Lord who is to come. On this Third Sunday, the Liturgy sets forth another interior attitude by which to live out this time of waiting for the Lord, that is joy. The joy of Jesus, as that sign [held up in St Peter's Square] reads: "Joy is at home in Jesus". That's it, it proposes Jesus' joy to us!

The human heart desires joy. We all desire joy, every family, every people aspires to happiness. But what is the joy that the Christian is called to live out and bear witness to? It is the joy that comes from the *closeness of God*, from his *presence* in our life. From the moment Jesus entered into history, with his birth in Bethlehem, humanity received the seed of the Kingdom of God, like the soil receives the seed, the promise of a future harvest. There is no need to look further! Jesus has come to bring joy to all people for all time. It is not just a hopeful joy or a joy postponed until paradise: as if here on earth we are sad but in paradise we will be filled with joy. No! It is not that, but a joy already real and tangible now, because *Jesus himself is our joy*, and with Jesus joy finds its home, as your sign there says: joy is at home in Jesus. All of us, let us say it: "Joy is at home in Jesus". Once more: "Joy is at home in Jesus". And without Jesus is there joy? No! Well done! He is living, He is the Risen One, and He works in us and among us especially with the Word and the Sacraments.

We who are baptized, children of the Church, we are called to accept ever anew the presence of God among us and to help others to discover Him, or to rediscover what

Father!". God works in mysterious ways. But what was important there was the family! And this was not a waste! They were great saints: Mary, the most holy woman, immaculate, and Joseph, a most rightcous man.... The family.

We are certainly moved by the story of how the adolescent Jesus followed the religious calendar of the community and the social duties; in knowing how, as a young worker, He worked with Joseph; and then how He attended the reading of the Scriptures, in pray-ing the Psalms and in so many othcustoms of daily life. The Goser pels, in their sobriety, make no ref-erence to Jesus' adolescence and leave this task to our loving meditation. Art, literature, music have taken this journey through imagination. It is certainly not difficult to imagine how much mothers could learn from Mary's care for that Son! And how much fathers could glean from the example of Joseph, righteous man, who dedicated his life to supporting and protecting the Child and his wife – his family - in difficult times. Not to mention how much children could be encouraged by the adolescent Jesus to understand the necessity and beauty of cultivating their most profound vocation and of dreaming great dreams! In those 30 years, Je-sus cultivated his vocation, for which the Father had sent him. And in that time, Jesus never be-



came discouraged, but increased in courage in order to carry his mission forward.

Each Christian family can first of all – as Mary and Joseph did – welcome Jesus, listen to Him, speak with Him, guard Him, protect Him, grow with Him; and in this improve the world. Let us make room in our heart and in our day for the Lord. As Mary and Joseph also did, and it was not easy: how many difficulties they had to overcome! They were not a superficial family, they were not an unreal family. The family of Nazareth urges us to rediscover the vocation and mission of the family, of every family. And, what happened in those 30 years in Nazareth, can thus happen to us too: in seeking to make love and not hate normal, making mutual help commonplace, making initial nep connorphace, not indifference or enmity. It is no coincidence, then, that "Nazareth" means "She who keeps", as Mary, who – as the Gospel states – "kept all these things in her heart" (cf. Lk 2:19, 51). Since then, each time there is a family that keeps this mystery, even if it were on the periphery of the world, the mystery of the Son of God, the mystery of Jesus who comes to save us, the mystery is at work. He comes to save the world. And this is the great mission of the family: to make room for Jesus who is coming, to welcome Jesus in the family, in each member: children, husband, wife, grandparents... Jesus is there. Welcome him there, in order that He grow spiritually in the family. May the Lord grant us this grace in these last days of Advent. Thank you.

they have forgotten. It is a most beautiful mission, like that of John the Baptist: to direct the people to Christ – not to ourselves! – for He is the destination to which the human heart tends when it seeks joy and happiness.

In today's liturgy St Paul again indicates the conditions for being "missionaries of joy": praying constantly, always giving thanks to God, giving way to his Spirit, seeking the good and avoiding evil (cf. 1 Thess 5:17-22). If this becomes our lifestyle, then the Good News will be able to enter so many homes and help people and families to rediscover that in Jesus lies salvation. In Him it is possible to find interior peace and the strength to face different life situations every day, even the heaviest and most difficult. No one has ever heard of a sad saint with a mournful face. This is unheard of! It would be a contradiction. The Christian's heart is filled with peace because he knows how to place his joy in the Lord even when going through the difficult moments in life. To have faith does not mean to never have difficult moments but to have the strength to face those moments knowing that we are not alone. And this is the peace that God gives to his children.

With her gaze turned to Christmas already close at hand, the Church invites us to bear witness that Jesus is not a person of the past; He is the Word of God who today continues to illuminate the path of mankind; his gestures – the Sacraments – are the manifestation of the tenderness, consolation and love that the Father bears for every human being. May the Virgin Mary, "Cause of our joy", render us ever more joyous in the Lord, who comes to free us from the many forms of interior and exterior slavery.

After the Angelus, the Pope said:

Dear brothers and sisters, I forgot how that phrase went. There it is, let's see: "Joy is at home in Jesus". All together: "Joy is at home in Jesus".

And now I greet with affection the children who have come for the blessing of the "Baby Jesus" figurines, organized by *Centro oratori romani*. My compliments! You have been so good, you were joyful here in the square, my compliments! And now you are carrying a blessed crib. Dear children, I thank you for your presence and I wish you a happy Christmas! When you pray at home before your nativity scenes, remember to also pray for me, as I will remember to do for you. Prayer is the soul's breath: it is important to find moments throughout the day to open your heart to God, even with simple and brief prayers of the Christian people. That is why, today I thought of a gift for all of you here in the square, a surprise, a prayers, for different moments throughout the day and for different situations in life. It's this. Some volunteers will distribute them. Take one each and carry it with you always as an aid to living the whole day with God. And so that we don't forget that message that you wrote on that sign which is so very beautiful: "Joy is at home in Jesus". Well done!

Recipe for the Christmas spirit

Pray, give thanks to God and think of others

In the afternoon of Gaudete Sunday, 14 December, the Holy Father made a parish visit in the Diocese of Rome, celebrating Holy Mass at the Parish of San Giuseppe all'Aurelio and meeting with parishioners. The following is a translation of the Pope's homily, which was delivered in Italian.

On this Sunday, the Church, looks forward to the joy of Christmas, and that is why it is called "Gaudete Sunday". In this season, a time of preparation for Christmas, we wear dark vestments, but today they are pink for the blossoming of Christmas joy. And the joy of Christmas is a special joy; but it is a joy that isn't just for the day of Christmas, it is for the entire life of a Christian. It is a serene and tranquil joy, a joy that forever accompanies the Christian. Even in difficulty moments, in moments of difficulty, this joy becomes peace. When he is a true Christian, the Christian never loses his peace, even in suffering. That peace is a gift from the Lord. Christian joy is a gift from the Lord. Christian joy is lovely, a nice luncheon is good; but this isn't the Christian joy we are talking about today. Christian joy is something else. It brings us together to celebrate, it's true. Thus the Church wants you to understand what Christian joy is.

The Apostle St Paul says to the Thessalonians: "Brothers, rejoice always". And how can I rejoice? He says: "pray constantly, give thanks in all circumstances". We find our Christian joy in prayer, it comes from prayer and from giving thanks to God: "Thank you, Lord, for so many beautiful things!". But there are those who don't know how to give thanks to God; they are always looking for something to lament about. I knew a sister – far from here! – this sister was a good woman, she worked... but her life was about lamenting, complaining about so many things that happened.... You see, in the convent they called her "Sr Lamenta". But a Christian cannot live like this, always looking for something to complain about: "That person has something I don't have.... Did you see what just happened?...". This is not Christian! And it is harmful to find Christians with embittered faces, with a face wry with bitterness, not in peace.





Never, never was there a saint with a mournful face, never! Saints always have joy in their faces. Or at least, amid suffering, a face of peace. The greatest suffering, the martyrdom of Jesus: He always had peace in his face and was concerned about others: his mother, John, the thief... his concern was for others.

To have this Christian joy, first, is prayer; second, to give thanks. And what do I do to give thanks? Reflect on your life and think of the many good things that life has given you: so many. "But, Father, it's true, but I have also received so many bad things!" – "Yes, it's true, it happens to us all. But think of the good things" – "I have a Christian family, Christian parents, thank God I have a job, my family is not suffering of hunger, we are all healthy...". I don't know, so many things, and give thanks to the Lord for this. This accustoms us to joy. Pray, give thanks....

And then, the First Reading suggests another dimension that will help us to have joy. It is to bring others the Good News: We are Christians. "Christian" comes from "Christ", and "Christ" means "anointed". And we too are "anointed". The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because the Lord consecrated me with unction. We are anointed: Christians mean "anointed ones". And why are we anointed? To do what? "He sent me to bring the good news" to whom? "To the poor, to bind up the brokenhearted, to proclaim liberty to the captives, and the opening of the prison to those who are bound; to proclaim the year of the Lord's favor" (cf. Is 6i:1-2). This is the vocation of Christ and the vocation of Christians as well. To go to others, to those in need, whether their needs be material or spiritual.... Many people who suffer anxiety because of family problems.... To bring peace there, to bring the unction of Jesus, the oil of Jesus which does so much good and consoles souls.

Therefore, in order to have this joy in preparation for Christmas, first, pray: "Lord, let me live this Christmas with true joy". Not with the joy of consumerism that leads me to 24 December with anxiety, because "ah, I'm missing this, I'm missing that...". No, this is not the joy of God. Prayer. Second: give thanks to the Lord for the good things he has given us. Third, think of how we can go to others, to those in difficulty and with problems – let us think of the sick, of so many problems - to bring a little unction, peace, joy. This is the joy of the Christian. Agreed? We have 15 days left, a little less: 13 days. In these days, let us pray. But do not forget: let us pray, asking for the joy of Christmas. Let us give thanks to God for the good things that he has given us, above all the faith. This is a wonderful grace. Third, let us think where I can go to bring a little relief, a little peace, to those who suffer. Pray, give thanks and help others. And like this we will arrive at the Birth of the Anointed One, the Christ, as ones anointed in grace, prayer and acts of grace and help towards others.

May Our Lady accompany us on this path towards Christmas. And let there be joy, joy!

Four unforgettable hours

Memories of the afternoon Pope Francis spent with the parishioners of San Giuseppe all'Aurelio will surely remain with them. The key word of the day was *joy*, and there was plenty to go round on Sunday, 14 December.

The parish youth, children and their families were the first to greet him, welcoming him with a spirited song. Pope Francis was made to feel right at home, immediately immersing himself in the embrace of the crowd, trying to shake as many

hands and caress as many little heads as possible, before going up onto the small dais to chat with the children and Sunday School kids.

On behalf of all the youth preparing for Confirmation, a girl assured him of their love and asked for his paternal blessing. A boy asked about the Pope's favourite soccer team, and another asked about his First Communion. He reminisced with them, recalling that this year marked the 70th anniversary of his First Communion. "A long time, eh? I made it on 8 October 1944. Were any of you born?", to which he received a resounding "Nooo!".

After his session with the children, he met with a group of the Roma Community, along with some of the guests in a family assistance shelter. He voiced his best wishes for them, that "there may always be peace in [their] families; that there may be work, and there may be joy", reminding them to never lose hope in difficult times, for the Lord "always awaits us, always".

And this joy was awaited outside by so many people from the balconies and windows of neighbouring buildings. Pope Francis greeted them from afar as he walked in the garden, while the traffic even stopped momentarily, as drivers noticed the Pope giving a blessing on the other side of the gate.

stopped momentarily, as drivers noticed the Pope giving a blessing on the other side of the gate. In the chapel, he then met with people suffering from illnesses, interacting with each of them. He thanked them for their "testimony



of patience, of love of God, of hope in the Lord", and explained that "the Church without the sick would not move forward: You are the strength in the Church". Then, looking up at a balcony, he blessed a group of medical students: "May the Lord bless your hands" in order that they should become good doctors.

Before donning pink vestments to celebrate the Third Sunday of Advent, he spent a bit of time with members of the Giuseppinian Order and then with the most beautiful joy of new life, with approximately 60 newly baptized babies and their families. How to communicate

With words that are free, open and capable of reaching the person

Reawakening words; opening not closing; speaking to the integral person. These were the three tasks of the communicator that Pope Francis indicated on Monday morning, 15 December, as he received in audience in the Paul VI Hall the management, journalists and staff of the TV2000 Broadcasting Network. The following is a translation of the Holy Father's address, which was given in Italian.

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

Good morning. I apologize for the delay, but there were many, many audiences. One audience, I say of half an hour, but then 40 minutes passed, another was the same, and then you pay for it. [Laughs] Another thing: Your Excellency spoke of two motivations, two motives for requesting this audience: you, it is true. But there is a third that you did not say. I think – and this is a personal opinion – that you are a little jealous because I received Corallo and not you [They laugh]. There's a little jealousy there, is there not?

I welcome you and I thank you for your warm reception. I thank the President of the Communication and Culture Foundation and the Director for the greetings they addressed to me. And I greet Lucio, who is in hospital.

You work for the Italian Church's TV, and this is precisely why you are called to carry out your service with greater responsibility. In this regard, I would like to share with you three



thoughts which I have especially at heart about the role of the communicator.

First. The Catholic media has a very challenging mission with regard to social communication: to strive to safeguard it from everything that seeks to twist and bend it to other purposes. Communication has often been subject to propaganda, to the ideologies, to political agenda or to economic and technological control. In the first place what would be good for communication is *parthesia*, that is, the courage to speak to one's face, to speak honestly and freely. If we are truly convinced of what we have to say, the words come. If, instead, we are concerned about tactical aspects – tactical manoeuvering? – our speech will be artificial, and barely communicative, insipid, contrived. And this does not communicate anything. Freedom also includes ready-made fashions,

clichés, prepackaged formulas, which in the end obscure the capacity to communicate. Re-kindle words: Revive words. Because, every word has in itself a spark of fire, of life. Reawaken that spark, that it may shine. Reawaken words: this is the communicator's first task.

Second. Communication should avoid "fillers" and "closures". It "fills" when it tends to saturate our perception with excessive slogans that, rather than setting our thoughts in motion, quells them. It "closes" when, rather than pursuing the long path of comprehension, it prefers the short cut of presenting individuals as if they were able to resolve all problems, or on the contrary as scapegoats on whom to load all responsibility. To reach a solution immediately without making an effort to represent the complexities of real life, is a frequent expedient mistake in communication that is in-

To open and not to close: this is the second task of the communicator, who will be more productive the more he lets himself be led by the action of the Holy Spirit, the only one capable of building unity and harmony.

Third. To speak to the integral per-son: this is the third task of the communicator. Avoiding those things, which, as I have already said, are the sins of the media: misinformation, slander and defamation. These three are the sins of the media. Misinformation, in particular, prompts one to tell only half the facts, and this leads to the incapacity to judge reality accurately. Authentic communication is not concerned with "mak-ing an effect": alternating between catastrophic alarmism and comforting disengagement, two extremes. We see these continually proposed in today's communication, and this is not a good service that the media can offer the public. It is important to speak to the whole person: to the mind and the heart, so that each may be able to see beyond the immediate, beyond a present that risk's being rapid and fearful. Of these three sins - misinformation, slander and defamation – slander seems to be the most insidious, but in the communications media, the most insidious is misinformation, because it leads one to make mistakes, to err; it leads one to believe in just a partial truth.

To reawaken words, to open and not to close, to speak to the integral person brings about this *culture of encounter*, which is so necessary today in an increasingly plural context. Conflicts get us nowhere. Build a culture of encounter. This is a fine task for you. This requires you to be willing not only to give, but also to receive from others.

I know that you are in a phase of rethinking and reorganizing your professional work at the service of the Church. I thank you very much for your work, I thank you for accepting this work. I encourage you in it and I wish you much success. I also know that you have an ongoing relationship with the Vatican Television Center – this is very important to me – which allows you to present the Magisterium and the Pope's activities to Italy. I thank you for what you do with expertise and love of the Gospel. And I thank you for your honest efforts, professional honesty and and rectitude, which you want to permeate your work. It is a path of honesty, that you want to follow.

I entrust you to the protection of Our Lady and of St Gabriel the Archangel, the great communicator: he was the most important communicator: he communicated the great news! And meanwhile, I ask you to continue praying for me, as I need it, and I wish you a Holy and Happy Christmas. And now let us pray to Our Lady, that she bless us. Hail Mary.... "Let all the peoples praise thee, O Lord / Be gracious to us and bless us / and make thy face to shine upon us, / that thy way may be known upon earth, / thy saving power among all nations. / Let the nations be glad and sing for joy, / for thou dost judge the people with equity / and guide the nations upon earth" (cf. Ps 67[66]).

The prayer of the Psalmist, of supplication, of forgiveness and of blessing of the peoples and of nations and, at the same time, of joyous praise, helps to express the spiritual meaning of this celebration. The peoples and nations of our great Latin American homeland, with gratitude and joy, commemorate the Feast of their Patroness, Our Lady of Guadalupe, whose devotion spans from Alaska to Patagonia. Thus from the Archangel Gabriel and St Elizabeth to us, we raise our filial prayer: "Hail Mary, full of grace, the Lord is with you..." (cf. Lk 1:28).

On this Feast of Our Lady of Guadalupe, let us first of all gratefully remember her visit and maternal closeness; let us sing her *Magnificat* with Her; and let us entrust the life of our peoples and the continental mission of the Church to her. So many jumped for joy and hope at her visit and at the gift of her Son, and the perfect disciple of the Lord became the "great missionary who brought the Gospel to our Americas" (cf. *Aparecida Document*, n. 269). The Son of Mary Most Holy, Immaculate Conception, has thus revealed Himself from the beginning of the history of the new peoples as "the most true God, giver of life", the Good News of the filial dignity of all the inhabitants of the Americas. Now, no one is only a servant, but we all are children of one and the same Father, brothers among us and servants in the Servant.

The Holy Mother of God visited these peoples and has wished to remain with them. She mysteriously left her sacred image imprinted on the *tilma* [cloak] of her messenger so we would feel her constant presence, thereby becoming a symbol of Mary's covenant with these peoples, to whom she imparts her soul and tenderness. Through her intercession, the Christian faith began to grow into the most precious treasure

of the soul of the American peoples, whose pearl of great value is Jesus Christ: a patrimony that has been passed on and is manifest still today in the baptism of multitudes of people, in the faith, in hope and charity of many, in the preciosity of popular piety and also in the American ethos which is shown in the awareness of human dignity, in the passion for justice, in solidarity with the poorest and the suffering, in the hope, at times, against all hope.

Today, from here we can continue to praise God for the wonders He has worked in the life of the Latin American peoples. God, in his way, "has hidden these things from the wise and understanding and revealed them to the lowly and humble, to the lowly in heart" (cf. Mt II:25). In the wonders that the Lord has fulfilled in Mary, She recognizes her Son's manner and mode of conduct in salvation history. Overturning worldly judgments, destroying at all costs the idols of power, wealth and success, denouncing selfsufficiency, arrogance and secular messianism which distance people from God, the Marian Canticle professes that God takes pleasure in overturning ideologies and worldly hierarchies. He lifts up the humble, comes to the aid of the poor and the lowly, fills with goodness, with blessings and hope those who trust in his mercy from generation to generation, while He puts down

to generation, while He puts down from their thrones the wealthy, the powerful and the overbearing.

The *Magnificat* thus introduces us to the Beatitudes, the primordial

synthesis and law of the Gospel message. In light of the *Magnificat*, let us feel compelled today to ask for a grace, a wholly Christian grace, that the future of Latin America be forged by the poor and by those who suffer, by the meek, by those who hunger and thirst for rightcousness, by the merciful, by the pure in heart, by the peacemakers, by those who are persecuted for the sake of Christ's name, "for theirs is the kingdom of heaven" (cf. Mt 5:1-11).

May the grace be forged by those who today, are relegated to the category of slaves, of objects to be exploit or simply be rejected, by the idolatrous system of the throwaway culture.

And we make this request because Latin America is the "continent of hope"! For we expect from it new models of development, which link Christian tradition to civil progress, justice and equity to reconciliation, scientific and technological development to human wisdom, fruitful suffering to hopeful joy. This hope can be protected only by great amounts of truth and love, the foundations of all reality, revolutionary engines of an authentic new life.



We place these realities and these hopes on the altar as a gift pleasing to God. Imploring his forgiveness and trusting in his mercy, we celebrate the sacrifice and Paschal vic-

tory of Our Lord Jesus Christ. He is the one Lord, the "liberator" from all our slavery and misery derived from sin. He is the historical cornerstone and was the great rejected One. He calls us to live the true life, a more human life,

to live together as children and brothers, with the doors already open to "a new heaven and a new earth" (Rev 21:1). Let us implore the Most Holy Virgin Mary, as Our Lady of Guadalupe – Mother of God, the Queen and My Lady, "my maiden, my little one", as St Juan Diego called her, and with all the loving names by which we turn to Her in popular piety – let us pray that she continue to accompany, help and protect our peoples. And may she lead by the hand all the And children who go on pilgrimage to those lands to meet her Son, Jesus Christ, Our Lord, present in the Church, in his sacramental nature, especially in the Eucharist, present in the treasure of his Word and in his teaching, present in the holy and faithful People of God, present in those who are suffering and in the lowly in heart. And should we be frightened by such a bold plan or should worldly pusillanimity threaten us, may She return to speak to our heart and enable us to hear her voice, that of Mother, of "Good Mother", of "Great Mother": Why are you afraid? Pope Francis again denounces the hardships of Christians in the Middle East

Fleeing the inhumanity

Pope Francis returned to denouncing the "difficult situation" in the Middle East. In an audience on 12 December in the Clementine Hall, His Beatitude Ignace Youssif III Younan, Patriarch of Antioch for Syrians, along with bishops and faithful of the Syro-Antiochene community, were received by Pope Francis' who called for strengthening efforts to meet the needs of Christians compelled to flee in order to "take shelter from an inhumanity which is throwing entire populations into the streets, leaving them without means of subsistence". The following is a translation of the Holy Father's address which was given in Italian.

Your Beatitude,

Your Excellencies, Reverend Fathers, Dear Brothers and Sisters!

I cordially greet you and I thank you for your visit. Through you, I can make my greeting reach your communities throughout the world, and express my encouragement particularly to those from Iraq and Syria, who are experiencing times of great suffering and fear in the face of violence. I accompany these sentiments of solidarity and compassion with remembrance in prayer. On this occasion of your gathering in Rome, you have asked me for the opportunity to celebrate a Synod outside the patriarchal territory. I was pleased to agree to facilitate your meeting, designed to recognize the compelling needs of your Church and to respond to the spiritual expectations of the faithful. In particular, you are undertaking a journey of reform for the Divine Liturgy, in service to the Word of God, that He should allow a renewed impetus of devotion. This



work has required an intense and indepth examination of Tradition and much discernment, knowing how sensitive the assembly of faithful is to the great gifts of the Word and of the Eucharist.

Italian Union of the Blind and the Visually Impaired

Lucy's secret

St Lucy, patroness of the blind, was at the centre of the Pope's address to the National Council of the Italian Union of the Blind and Visually Impaired, whom he received in audience on the Saint's Feast Day, Saturday, 13 December, in the Clementine Hall. The following is a translation of the Holy Father's address which was given in Italian.

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

I welcome you and thank you for this meeting. I thank the President, Dr Mario Barbuto, for his words introducing this meeting.

He referred to St Lucy as the patroness of those without sight. This was unexpected, since your association is non-confessional; yet you proposed that our meeting take place today, confirming that this tradition retains a certain significance for you.

I would thus like to mention several human values that the example of St Lucy offers us. I underline: human values. Lucy lived them in an exemplary fashion thanks to her faith in Christ, but they can be shared by all.

First of all, Lucy reminds us of a value which seems to me very important for you too: *courage*. She was a young defenceless woman, however she faced torture and a violent death with great courage, a courage that came to her from the Risen Christ, with whom she was united, and from the Holy Spirit, who dwelt within her.

We all need courage to face the trials of life. People who are blind and visually impaired are in special need of this, so as not to close with in themselves or assume the attitude of a victim. On the contrary, they must open themselves to reality, to others and to society in order to learn to understand and appreciate the abilities that the Lord has placed in each one of us, truly in everyone, without exception! This, however, takes courage, strength of spirit. Therefore, another value that St Lucy brings to mind is the fact that she *was not alone*, but *she belonged to a community*, she was a member of a body of which Christ is the Head, a stone in a building which has

Christ as its the foundation. This aspect is also reflected in human terms. You are an association, and this is a value! An association is not the sum of individuals, it is much more. Today there is great need to experience the associative aspect with joy and commitment, because this moment of history is "at a low ebb", and it's not felt strongly. Be a group, work in solidarity, meet together, share your experiences, share your resources... this is all part of the civic heritage of a people. Often people who live with disadvantages or disabilities can say from their experience to everyone: we are not "monads", we are not meant to be isolated but to form relationships together, to complete each other, help each other, stand together and support each other. The presence of disabled people prompts everyone to form a community or rather, to be a com-munity, that we accept one another with our limitations. Because everyone has abilities, but everyone has limitations too!

Lastly, Lucy tells us that life is made to be given. She lived this out in the supreme form of martyrdom, but the value of *the gift of self* is universal; it is the secret to true happiness. Man does not become completely fulfilled by having or by



doing. One is fulfilled by loving, i.e. by giving of oneself. And this can also be understood as the secret of the name "Lucy": a person is "full of light" to the extent that he or she is a gift to others. In reality, every person is a gift, he or she is a precious gift!

Dear friends, living according to these values today can also bring about misunderstanding; it's tiring to go against the current, but this is not surprising. Testimony always requires paying in the person. Modern societies that focus chiefly on the rights of the "individual" risk forgetting the importance of the community and that of the free gift of self to others. Thus there is still a need to fight, relying on the example and intercession of St Lucy! I hope you do so with courage and with the joy of doing it together.

Thanks". tinues to provoke in our Church displacement of the faithful toward the Eparchies of the diaspora, and this places new pastoral exigencies before you. The challenges, on the one hand, to remain faithful to one's origins; on the other, to integrate into new cultural contexts, working in service to the *salus animarum* and to the common good.

This movement of the faithful toward countries considered safer impoverishes the Christian presence in the Middle East, the land of the prophets, of the first preachers of the Gospel, of martyrs and of so many saints, cradle of the hermits and of monasticism. All this requires you to reflect on the situation of zealous Pastors, as well as of courageous faithful, capable of witnessing to the Gospel in discussion at times difficult, with people of different ethnicities and religions.

So many have fled to take shelter from an inhumanity which is throwing entire populations into the streets, leaving them without means of subsistence. You are trying to coordinate your efforts with other Churches, to respond to the humanitarian needs both of those who remain in their homeland and of those who have sought refuge in other countries.

Now, returning to your sees, you are reinvigorated by this experience of communion felt at the Tombs of the Apostles Peter and Paul; a communion which today finds a special expression here, in raising to the Lord together with Peter's Successor a prayer of gratitude and supplication.

I exhort you, dear Brothers, to persevere in your pastoral commitment and in the ministry of hope in service to the venerable Syro-Catholic Church. With affection, I greet the faithful who are accompanying you, in whom I see the different communities through their representatives. I invite you to take to all the expression of my closeness and of my prayer to the Lord.

While I entrust each one of your communities to the protection of the Mother of God, of St Ignatius of Antioch and of St Ephrem, I wholeheartedly impart to you, to your priests, to your men and women religious, and to all the faithful the Apostolic Blessing, the pledge of peace and consolation from our all Merciful, One and Triune God.

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Audience with a delegation of The Salvation Army

The door to ecumenism

Common faith in Jesus Christ "will become evermore the firm foundation of friendship and cooperation between us". Pope Francis expressed this wish during his audience with a delegation of The Salvation Army, on Friday morning, 12 December. Their meeting was an occasion for the Pope to recall his first ecumenical experience as a boy with his grandmother. The following is a translation of the Holy Father's address which was given in Italian.

Dear Friends,

I extend a warm welcome to you, the leadership of The Salvation Army, well-known to me for its evangelizing and charitable mission. Your visit is the happy outcome of more frequent and fruitful contacts in recent years between The Salvation Army and the Pontifical Council for Promoting Christian Unity, including a series of theological conversations aimed at fostering a

better understanding of one another, mutual respect and regular collaboration. I thank you again for this book of conversations. I earnestly hope that Catholics and Salvationists will continue to offer a common witness to Christ and to the Gospel in a world so much in need of experiencing God's mercy. It needs it!

Catholics and Salvationists, together with other Christians, recognize that those in need have a special place in God's heart, so much so that the Lord Jesus Christ himself became poor for our sake (cf. 2 Cor 8:9). As a result, Catholics and Salvationists often meet in the same peripheries of society. It is my hope that our shared faith in Jesus Christ the Saviour, the one mediator between God and man (cf. 1 Tim 2:5), will become evermore the firm foundation of friendship and cooperation between us.

"The Church which 'goes forth' is a community of missionary disciples who take the first step, who are involved and supportive, who bear fruit and rejoice. An evangelizing community knows that the Lord has taken the initiative: he has loved us first (cf. 1 Jn 4:19), and therefore we can move forward, boldly take the initiative, go out to others, seek those who have fallen away, stand at the crossroads, and welcome the outcast. Such a community has an endless desire to show mercy, the fruit of its own experience of the power of the Father's infinite mercy" (Apostolic Exhortation *Evangelii Gaudium*, 24).

I pray that in today's world all of Christ's disciples will make their contribution with the same conviction and dynamism that The Salvation Army demonstrates in its devoted and highly appreciated service. The differences between Catholics and Salvationists regarding theological and ecclesiological questions need not impede the witness of our shared love of God and love of neighbour, a love which is capable of inspiring a concerted commitment to restoring the dignity of those who live on the margins of society.

To the European Meeting on Youth Ministry

A need to rediscover the Gospel

On Thursday, 11 December, 20 years since it was first held in Rome, the Fourth European Meeting on Youth Ministry, sponsored by the Pontifical Council for the Laity, opened at the International Pontifical College Maria Mater Ecclesiae. The following is a translation of the Pope's message written in Italian to participants, who came from 32 countries.



To Venerable Brother Cardinal STANISŁAW RYŁKO President of the Pontifical Council for the Laity

I address my cordial greeting to you, to the Bishops, to the national leaders and to the young people gathered these days in Rome for the Fourth European Meeting on Youth Ministry, sponsored by the Pontifical Council for the Laity in cooperation with the Council of European Bishops' Conferences on the theme: A young Church witnessing to the joy of the Gospel.

Ing to the joy of the Gospel. After the three meetings during the gos, you have resumed "walking together through the streets of Europe". Along the way, I invite you to recognize that, as we are talking and discussing together, Jesus himself draws near and walks with us (cf. Lk 24:15). Like the disciples in Emmaus, let us allow Him to open our eyes in order to recognize Him, helping us find in Him the meaning of this difficult but exciting piece of history that is being given to us to live together.

You, who work in the field of youth ministry, are doing valuable work for the Church. Young people need this service: adults and mature peers in the faith who accompany them on their journey, helping them to find the path that leads to Christ. Much more than promoting a series of activities *for* young people, this ministry consists in walking *with* them, accompanying them personally in the complex and sometimes difficult situations in which they are immersed.

Youth ministry is called to gather the questions of young people today, and starting from them, to bring a true and honest dialogue in order to bring Christ into their life. In this sense, a true dialogue can be made by those who have a *personal relationship* with the Lord Jesus, which overflows into the relationship with brothers and sisters.

This is the reason you have come together, to create a European "network" of acquaintances and friendships, thanks to which the continent's youth ministry leaders may share experiences attained "in the field" and the questions that stem from them. We are well aware that



there is much to do. I ask you to never tire of proclaiming the Gospel, through your life and your word: today's Europe needs to rediscover it!

I would like to therefore encourage you to consider the present reality of European young people through the gaze of Christ. May He teach us to see not only challenges and problems, but to recognize the many seeds of love and of hope scattered on the soil of this continent, which has given to the Church a great number of men and women saints, and many of these are young people! Let us not forget that we have been assigned the task of sowing, but it is God who gives growth to the seeds we scatter (cf. r Cor 3:7).

As you sow the Word of the Lord in this vast field that is the European youth, you have the opportunity to account for the hope that is in you, with gentleness and reverence (cf. 1 Pet 3:15). You can help young people to realize that faith is not compared to reason, and thus accompany them to become joyous leaders of evangelization to their peers.

Lastly, dear friends, in this year which at the same time draws attention to the family and to consecrated life, youth ministry is called to propose to young people a journey of vocational discernment, in order to prepare oneself to follow Jesus on the path of conjugal and familial life or on that of special consecration to the service of the Kingdom of God.

I pray to the Lord, through the intercession of the Holy Virgin, in order that the work of these days may bear a wealth of fruit for your undertaking in youth ministry and, even before, for your journey of holiness, for it is holiness the enables the Church to grow and opens hearts to welcome the Gospel. I ask you to please pray for me and I bless you with affection.

Thursday, 11 December

God's lullaby

God, out of his love for us, is like a mother who tenderly sings us lullabies and isn't afraid to even act "foolish". Francis thus called attention to the "temptation to commodify grace", affirming that: "If we had the courage to open our heart to God's tenderness, how much spiritual freedom we would have!". To have this experience, the Pope recommended we open the Bible and read the passage from the Prophet Isaiah read during Mass at Santa Marta on Thursday: Chapter 41, verses 13-20.

"The Prophet Isaiah speaks of salvation, of how God saves his people, and returns to that image, to that reality that is precisely God's closeness to his people", the Pontiff began. After all, "God saves by drawing near; He doesn't save from a distance: He draws near and walks with his people". This is the salvation of God, Pope Francis explained. Similarly "in the Book of Deuteronomy, He said clearly to the people: 'tell me, what nation has a God as near to it as you?' None!".

Thus, "it's precisely God's nearness to those his people that makes salvation". It is a "nearness which advances, progresses up to taking on our humanity". And "in this verse there is something that might perhaps make us smile a bit, but it's wonderful", Francis explained. His nearness is so great "that God appears here as a mother, like a mother chatting with her child: a mother when she sings a lullaby to her child, using a childlike voice and making herself little like the child and speaking with a childlike tone, to the point of acting foolish". The Scripture reads in part: "Fear not, you worm Jacob'. And how often does a mother say such things to a child while caressing him?". The Scripture continues: "Behold, I will make of you a threshing sledge, new...". In other words, Pope Francis said, "I'll make you big...!". And like this, the mother "caresses him, and brings him closer to her".

And God does this too. This is God's tenderness. "He is so close to us that He expresses himself with this tenderness, the tenderness of a mother". It's the same "even when the child doesn't want his mother and moves away, cries", as Jesus, seeing Jerusalem from the mountain, "cried, because his people had distanced themselves". God, however, "appears with a mother's approach: closeness".

Francis affirmed that "this is the grace of God". Indeed, he said, "when we speak of grace, we are speaking of this nearness". In other words, "when one says: I am in a state of grace, I am close to the Lord or I allow the Lord to draw near me: that is grace!". However, "often times, in order to be certain, we want to control this grace, as if a child were to say to his mother: be good, be quiet now, I know you love me". And "the mother continues to say those things, which are funny, but it's love, the love that is always expressed this way". Does the child make his mother stop? "No! He lets himself be loved, because he's a child. Similarly, when Jesus speaks of the kingdom of heaven, He is like a child allowing himself to be loved by God". And "this is grace!".

Francis then highlighted that in history and also in life, we often "have the temptation to commodify grace", meaning to change "this grace which is the closeness, the nearness of God's heart" into "a commodity or something controllable". Because "we want to control grace". Therefore, "when we speak of grace, we are tempted to say: I have so much grace, yes, I am in grace!' What does that mean, that you are close to the Lord? 'No, I also have a clean soul, I'm in grace!''. What happens though, is that "this most beautiful truth of God's closeness slips into spiritual bookkeeping: 'No, I'll do this because this will give me 300 days of grace...'." With this type of reasoning, grace is reduced to "a commodity".

Historically, the Pope explained, "God's closeness to his people was betrayed, through this selfish attitude of wanting to control this grace, to commodify it". Francis gave the examples of "the parties in the time of Jesus". He first drew on the example of the Pharisees, who believed that "grace lay precisely in making law, following law and when there was doubt, to make another in order to clarify that law". But in so doing, "they ended up with 300, 400 commandments". However, "when a mother caresses her child, she when a doesn't do this: it's freely given". The Pharisees, on the contrary, took what God had freely given and "carved out a path of holiness that enslaved them". This is why "Jesus reproached them: 'You who place such a burden on the shoulders of the people...', too many laws!". As a result, they rendered "God's grace, this nearness, commodified"

Then there were the Sadducees, the Pope continued, who believed that "the grace of God was to 'coexist politically, the people with the occupiers, and to make political pacts'", arguing that "we're fine, the people are carrying on, let's go this way... This is a grace, we are in God's grace since we are able to go on...". But Jesus reproached them for this too.

There were also the Essenes, who "were good, truly exceptional, but they were so fearful, they took no risks and they went into the monastery to pray". And thus "that grace which leads forward, that nearness of God became closure as monks in a monastery, but not with the grace of God".

From their song, however, "the zealots thought that God's grace was precisely that war of liberation, the freedom fighters of Israel". This was "also another way of commodifying grace". However, the Pope indicated, "God's grace is something else: it's nearness, it's tenderness". He then proposed a rule that's always useful: "if, in your relationship with the Lord, you don't feel that He loves you with tenderness", this means that "you are still missing something, you still don't understand what grace is, you still haven't received the grace that is this closeness".

Francis then shared one of his experiences in the field, recalling when, many years ago, a woman ap-proached him and said: "Father, I have ask a question because I don't know whether or not I have to make confession". He continued, recounting the woman's words: "My husband and I went to our friends' wedding and there was a Mass, and we said: is it okay, this Mass, Sat-urday evening? Does it pass? Is it valid for Sunday? You know, Father, that the Readings weren't Sunday's, they were for the wedding and I don't know if this was valid or if I mortally sinned because I didn't go to another Mass on Sunday". In asking this question, Pope Francis recalled, "that woman was suffering". And so "I said to that woman: 'the Lord loves you so much: you went, you received communion, you were with Jesus.... Yes, so be calm, the Lord is not a merchant, the Lord loves, He is near'"

Francis then spoke of St Paul, who "reacted forcibly against this spirituality of the law". The law spirituality of the law". The law read, "I'm righteous if I do this, this, this. If I don't do this, I'm not righteous". Instead, however, "you are righteous because God has come close to you, because God caresses you, because God says these beautiful things to you with tenderness: this is our justice, this nearness of God, this tenderness, this loce". And "our God is so good" that He runs the "risk of seeming foolish to us". Indeed, the Pope affirmed, "if we had the courage to open our heart to this tenderness of God, how much spiritual freedom we would have! How much!". He then concluded with some practical advice: "Today, if you have a little time at home, pick up the Bible: Isaiah, Chapter 41, from verse 13 to 20, sev-en verses. Read it!", he said, "in order to enter more deeply into the experience of "this tenderness of God", of "this God who sings to each one of us a lullaby, like a mother".

Monday, 15 December

Darkness of the heart

"I ask the Lord for the grace that our heart may be simple, bright with the truth He gives us, and this way we can be kind, forgiving, understanding with others, big-hearted with people, merciful". This was Pope Francis' concluding prayer at morning Mass on Monday. "Never condemn", he said. "If you want to condemn, condemn yourself. Never limp with both legs, as Elijah says, trying to take advantage of situations". On the contrary, we must ask "the Lord for grace, that He grant us this inner light, that He concince us that He alone is the rock", and not those things we treat as important. We must ask "that He expand our heart, in order that we can relate to the problems of many people, and that He grant us the grace to feel ourselves as sinners".

The source of the Holy Father's remarks was the day's Reading from the Gospel according to Matthew (a1:23-27), wherein Jesus takes issue with those who look at people's spontaneous faith with formalism and norms which are often unhelpful. The Pontiff introduced his reflection by recalling that when Jesus entered Jerusalem on Palm Sunday and "the children sang: 'Hosanna to the Son of David'', some of the "doctors of the law wanted to silence them". But Jesus said: "They cannot be silenced; if they don't cry out, the rocks will cry out!". The Lord then "healed many people" and when He was hungry, He went to a fig tree that had no fruit, and He cursed it: "May no one ever eat fruit from you again". Afterwards the tree withered away, and when his disciples noted this miracle, Jesus replied: "If you have faith, you will do the same and more!".

In essence, Francis said, Jesus "preached about faith. Then He returned to the temple, healed many people, many sick, and cast out those who were doing business, selling, changing money". And this is when, witnessing these things, "the chief priests, the doctors of the law took courage and approached Him", asking: "By what authority are you doing these things? We are here and command in the temple". Thus, Jesus answered "with inner zeal, with great acuity", in order to reach "the heart of these people". These were people "who had an insecure heart, a heart which adapted somewhat to circumstances, a heart which, according to the moment, went to one side or the other".

It might be considered "a diplomatic heart", but to the Pontiff this definition is inaccurate, "because diplomacy is a very noble profession, a profession which brings people together, a profession for making peace"; while "these people weren't doing this". Theirs was instead "a hypocritical heart". To them, "the truth didn't matter". They pursued their own interests "according to how the wind was blowing". In other words, "they were weather vanes, all of them". They had "an incon-



sistent heart, and negotiated everything: inner freedom, faith, homeland. To them what mattered in situations was a good outcome; they were *situationalists*, men who adapted to the trends: 'the wind is coming from there, let's go there'. This was their heart: they took advantage of situations".

What's described in the Gospel scene, Pope Francis explained, is one of these situations where they they tried to take advantage. "They saw a weakness at that moment" or perhaps they imagined it, and decided "this is the time", and thus came the question: "Where is your authority?". Evidently "they felt fairly strong". But once again, Jesus caught them off guard. He "didn't argue with them" but reassured them, saying "yes, yes, I will tell you, but first tell me this", and He asked them about John the Baptist. Thus Jesus answered a question with a question, "and this weakened them" to the point that his interlocutors "didn't know where to turm".

And here Pope Francis linked his discussion to the Collect prayer from the opening of Mass, which asked the Lord to "cast light on the darkness of our hearts". In effect, the people that the Gospel spoke of "had such darkness in their heart". Of course, "they observed the law: on the Sabbath they didn't walk more than 100 metres and they never went to the table without washing their hands and performing ablu-tions"; they were "very law-abiding, very firm in their ways". However, the Pope urged, "this is true only in appearances. They were strong, but outwardly. They were cast in plaster. The heart was very weak, they didn't know what they believed in. And this is why their life was, the outward portion, completely regulated; but their heart went from one side to the other: a weak heart and flesh of plaster, strong, hard".

Jesus, on the contrary, "teaches us that Christians must have a strong, steadfast heart, which grows upon the rock that is Christ", and which moves with prudence. Indeed, the Pontiff continued, "you don't negotiate with the heart, you don't negotiate with the rock. The rock is Christ, it isn't negotiated! This is the drama of the hypocrisy of these people. And Jesus never negotiated his heart as the Son of the Father, but He was open with people, looking for ways to help". The others, rather, said: "You can't do this; our discipline, our doctrine says that you can't do this". And they asked Him: "Why are your disciples eating grain in the field and walking on the Sabbath? You can't do this". In other words, "they were rigid in their dis-

cipline" and believed: "The discipline is not to be touched, it's sacred".

Francis then added a personal recollection, linked to his childhood, "when Pope Pius XII freed us from that very heavy cross of the Euchar-istic fast. You couldn't even drink a drop of water" – not even while brushing your teeth. The Bishop of Rome confided that "as a child, I went to confess that I had taken Communion, because I believed that drop of water had gone inside" Therefore, when Pope Pacelli "changed the discipline – 'Ah, heresy! He touched the discipline of the Church!' – so many Pharisees were scandalized". Because Pius XII did what Jesus had done: "he saw the needs of the people: The poor people, with such zeall'. These priests who were saying three Masses, the last one at one o'clock, after midday, fasting. And these Pharisees were like this - 'our discipline' – rigid in the flesh, but as Jesus says, 'decayed in the heart', weak until decayed. Darkness in the heart"

And here lies "the tragedy of these people" whom Jesus de-nounced: "Hypocrites, you go where the wind blows, to take advantage!". In fact, they "were always trying to benefit from something". Pope Francis warned that this can also happen in our life: "Sometimes, when I've seen a Christian man or woman like this, with a weak heart, not firm, not steadfast on the rock, and with with so much outward rigidity, I have asked the Lord: throw down a ba-nana peel in front of him, so he takes a good slip, is ashamed of being a sinner and thus encounters You, who are the Saviour". After all, "so many times a sin can shame us" and allow us to "encounter the Lord, who forgives us".

"The Bible says: 'the heart of man is a thing of mystery'", the Pontiff continued, "who can understand it?". And this is why, he concluded, we have asked today, "Lord, cast light on the darkness of our hearts; that our hearts may be steadfast in faith". Just like those of the simple people in the Gospel scene: people who "didn't make a mistake, because the doctors of the law knew they couldn't say: 'No, John's Baptism doesn't come from heaven!', because the people knew, they had that sense of faith, which came from heaven".

Tuesday, 16 December

They shall be first

The basic condition for walking the "path of salvation" is a "contrite heart", one that is capable of recog-

nizing its own sins. Thus, the Lord's "judgment" will not be one to frighten, but to offer hope. For this reason, the two Readings that Pope Francis reflected on during Mass at Santa Marta on Tuesday, have the very "structure of a judgment".

The Pope first referred to the passage from the Book of the Prophet Zephaniah (3:1-2, 9-13), which begins with a threat: "Woe to the city, rebellious and polluted", and then a judgment: "to the tyrannical city", the city that "hears no voice, accepts no correction; In the Lord she has not trusted, to her God she has not drawn near". Those people are sentenced: the "sentence" is expressed in the term "woe". For the others, there is instead a promise: "I will change and purify the lips of the peoples", the prophet writes. "From beyond the rivers of Ethiopia", those who pray to me "will bring me offerings. On that day you need not be ashamed of all your deeds, your rebellious actions against me".

Who was Zephaniah talking about? He was speaking about those who drew near "to the Lord because the Lord had forgiven", the Pope explained. These people were "the saved ones"; the others were "the proud, who didn't hear the voice of the Lord, who didn't accept correction, didn't trust in the Lord".

To the penitent, who were capable of recognizing: "Yes, we are sinners", Francis highlighted, the Lord reserved forgiveness and addressed "this word, which is one of those hope-filled [words] of the Old Testament: 'I will leave as a remnant in your midst a people humble and lowly, who shall take refuge in the name of the Lord".

Here the Pope identified "the three characteristics of the faithful People of God: humility, poverty and trust in the Lord". And this is "the path of salvation". The others, however, "heard no voice, accepted no correction, and did not trust in the Lord", and therefore "they cannot receive salvation": they are "closed" to salvation, the Holy Father explained.

The same thing happens today: "When we see the holy People of God, who are humble, who have their treasure in the faith in the Lord, in the trust in the Lord; the humble, poor people who confide in the Lord", here we meet "the saved ones", for "this is the path" that the Church must take.

A similar dynamic is found in the day's Reading from the Gospel of Mathew (21:28-32), in which Jesus also proposes "to the chief priests, to the elders, the elders, of the people", to the entire "inetwork' of people who waged war", a "judgment" to reflect upon. He presented them the case of the two sons whom the father asks to go to work in the vine-yard. One answers: "I won't go to the field. I don't want to". But then he goes. Meanwhile the other says: "Yes, sir", but then thinks: "The old man has no strength, I'll do what I want, he can't punish me". And therefore, "he doesn't go, he doesn't obev".

Jesus asks his interlocutors: "Which of the two did his father's will?". Was it "the first, the one who said 'no", the rebellious one who later "thought of his father" and decided to obey, or was it the second? At this point Jesus offers his judgment: "Amen, I say to you, tax collectors and prostitutes are entering the Kingdom of God before you". They "will be the first". And He explains why: "When John came to you in the way of righteousness, you did not believe him'. You didn't listen to John: the baptism of penitence.... The tax collectors and prostitutes, however, believed. You, on the contrary, saw these things but then you didn't repent a bit".

What "did these people do" to deserve this judgment? "They didn't listen", the Pope explained, "to the Lord's voice, they didn't accept correction, they didn't trust in the Lord". One could ask: "But Father, what a scandal that Jesus said this, that the tax collectors, who betrayed the homeland because they collected taxes to pay the Romans". Will they really "go first to the Kingdom of Heaven?". And the same for "the prostitutes, who are throw-away women"? And finally, "Lord, have you gone mad? We are pure, we are Čatholics, we partake in communion every day, we go to Mass". And yet, Francis underscored, they "will go first if your heart is not a contrite heart". And "if you have not listened to the Lord, haven't accepted correction, haven't trusted in Him", then yours is not a contrite heart.

The Lord, the Pontiff continued, doesn't want these "hypocrites who were scandalized" by what "Jesus said about the tax collectors and about the prostitutes, but then secretly went to them, whether to unleash their passions or to do business". They considered themselves "pure", but in reality, "the Lord doesn't want them".

Today's liturgy makes us think about this judgment which is "a judgment that gives us hope when we look at our sins". Indeed, all of us, "we are sinners". Every one of us is well aware of our list of sins; however, Francis said, each one of us can say: "Lord, I offer You my sins, the only thing that we can offer You".

In order to better understand this, the Pontiff recalled the "life of a saint who was very generous" and offered everything to the Lord: "The Lord asked him for something and he did it". The saint always listened and always followed the Lord's will. Yet the Lord once said to him: "You still haven't given me one thing". And he, "who was so good", answered: "But, Lord, what haven't I given You? I've given you my life, I work for the poor, I work for the catechesis, I work here, I work there...". The Lord pressed on: "You haven't given me one thing". And the saint repeated, "What Lord?". And the Lord concluded, "Your sins".

And this was the lesson the Pope wanted to highlight: that, when we are able to say: "Lord, these are my sins, they aren't this man's or that woman's.... They're mine. You take them. This way I'll be saved". When we are able to do this, then "we will be that beautiful people – 'the humble and poor people' – who trust in the name of the Lord". Courageous strategy

More attention to women's employment

In a message sent to the festival taking place in Riva del Garda, Italy, on the theme "The Ecosystem Life and Work. Women's Employment and Fertility, Prosperity and Economic Growth", Pope Francis invokes "an extraordinary and courageous policy to promote the family", recalling that "the country's economic recovery can also begin here". "The scourge of unemployment", he said, "young people, should also be considered and resolved in this perspective". Dear Brothers and Sisters,

On the occasion of the Festival of the Family scheduled in Riva del Garda on the theme "The Ecosystem Life and Work. Women's Employment and Fertility, Prosperity and Economic Growth", I would like to greet and express my appreciation to the organizers, the relators and to all the participants for their commitment to promoting the family. In these days, as citizens, as Christians, as families and associations of families, coming from different professions and backgrounds, you sharing your experiences, concerns and plans. I wish you a successful meeting!

The theme being addressed, which continues and concludes a series of reflections on other aspects that you have discussed in previous sessions, is very important. You aim to provide points for reflection and operational paths in order that the family may play an increasingly active role in the social, cultural and political contexts of the country. Indeed, you are well aware of the irreplaceable and fundamental position that the family holds, both in civil society and in the ecclesial community. The future of humanity passes through the family, and for this reason it necessary to allow it is to play its proper role. However, it does not suffice to re-emphasize the importance of the family and affirm its rights: it is necessary to consider in a practical way how the duties of the family and those of society can be articulated, especially with re-

Audience with the Prime Minister of Italy

On Saturday morning, 13 December, the Holy Father received H.E. Mr Matteo Renzi, Prime Minister of the Italian Republic, on an official visit. Following the audience, Mr Renzi met with Secretary of State, Cardinal Pietro Parolin, accompanied by Archbishop Dominique Mamberti, Secretary for Relations with States.

The discussions took place in a se-

rene and cordial atmosphere. Attention focused on, among other issues, the current context of persistent difficulties of an economic and social nature, with negative consequences especially in relation to youth employment. In addition, the importance of education to promote the future of new generations was emphasized. Various themes relating to international politics were then considered, and the Parties shared their serious concerns for the gradual worsening of



conflicts in the Middle East. With regard to the term of the Italian Presidency of the European Union, the Parties affirmed the importance of the themes mentioned by the Holy Father during his recent address to the European Parliament in Strasbourg. These were held to be fundamental to the harmonious development of European peoples. Finally, the Parties renewed their commitment to continuing their joint cooperation to resolve various issues of a bilateral nature. spect to the relationship between professional and family life. The family has its

own mission, at the service of its members, of its own development, of life; the family has rights and thus needs support and guarantees that enable it to exercise them. On the other hand, the family also

has duties to society; in other words, the family must offer its cooperation in service to the community. This is a privileged sphere in which to practice harmonious solidarity and subsidiarity, that is to say synergy between public and private, between business and family. Precisely be-cause of the commitment and responsibility which having and educating children requires, families need appropriate assistance from public bodies and from businesses, from the standpoint of mutual cooperation. The troubling demo-graphic trend requires, an ex-traordinary and courageous policy to promote the family by all the interested parties. The country's economic recovery can also begin here. The scourge of unemployment, especially of young people, should also be considered and resolved in this perspective. The shortage of employ-ment disheartens the person, who feels worthless in his own eyes, and impoverishes society, which lacks the contribution of a viable and willing work force.

I am thinking of the development of family policies, of all that con-cerns the legal and social status of families in general and the assistance that must be offered to those who are materially and morally disadvantaged. In particular, attention must be given to women's employ-ment. Many women feel the need to be better recognized with respect to their rights, to the value of the tasks they normally carry out in the vari-ous sectors of social and professional life, and with respect to their aspirations within the family and within receiving society. Some of them are weary and nearly crushed by the volume of duties and tasks, without sufficient help and understanding. Provision must be made to ensure that no woman, due to economic need, not be forced into a job that is too hard with hours that are overly burdensome, on top of all adds to all her responsibilities as homemaker and educator of the children. But above all, it must be considered that the woman's commitments, on all levels of family life, also constitute an incomparable contribution to the life and future of society.

Dear friends, I hope that the Festival of the Family bears the hopedfor fruit and, while I assure you of my remembrance in prayer, I willingly impart the Apostolic Blessing, in support of every proposal and
