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INTRODUCTION

Correspondence, minutes, annual reports, and other materials of the School of Medicine. The records are arranged chronologically by dean and contain information on personnel, the Student Health Service, Crippled Children's Service, the controversy over the location of clinical training, and the physical plant.

DONOR INFORMATION

The records were donated to the Western Historical Manuscript Collection by the School of Medicine on 27 September 1966 (Accession No. 3680). An addition was made by the School of Medicine on 3 October 1968 (Accession No. 3783).

INSTITUTIONAL SKETCH

The University of Missouri Medical School was founded in 1841 with a two year curriculum. It was not until 1899 that a four-year curriculum was established. The American Medical Association, requiring more extensive clinical facilities in 1909, did not approve the last two years of the school's curriculum and they were discontinued. In 1921 the Missouri General Assembly appropriated funds to expand the school. During 1923-1924 McAlester Hall (the existing class room building) was enlarged and University Hospital (Noyes Hall today) was opened. In 1931 a third year of instruction was offered, but the Depression caused a curtailment of funds. The curriculum was reduced to two years in 1932. Not until 1955 were the four years of instruction resumed. The M.D. degree was granted in 1957.

SCOPE AND CONTENT NOTE

The records have been arranged into the following nine series: Andrew Walker McAlester; Clarence Martin Jackson; Guy Lincoln Noyes; Edgar Allen; Dudley Steele Conley; Trawick Hamilton Stubbs; Marcus Pinson Neal; Roscoe LeRoy Pullen; and Miscellaneous.

The bulk of the collection was created after 1946 and consists almost entirely of the papers of the deans of the medical school. The collection is arranged chronologically by dean. Although very little information concerning behind-the-scenes activities is included, important events are documented in the official reports. There is a yearly report on the school for almost every year since 1921.

The effects of the Great Depression are particularly well represented, but there is very little information concerning the years of the world wars. The planning for clinical training and building construction in the early 1920s and 1950s is also well represented. The latter years contain recommendations on potential staff members.
