Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

Description

The Richard M. Skinner home was built in 1878 and has three stories and a brick basement. (The third floor is full and was finished during the last two years.)

The mansard roof with concave sides and the seven dormer windows, as well as the well defined front central pavilion constitute the architectual features representing the Second Empire school of domestic architecture. There are also Italianate features influencing the structure. A small screened porch, about six feet, was added toward the back and the westside of the first floor during the middle 1900's.

Brackets support the wooden eaves and cornice below the mansard roof. The windows are arched with wooden heads. Dormer windows have wood moulding at the top and center of their arches. The front part of the first floor has a tall window on each side of the round eyebrow-like arched double door entry with glass paneling. There are also several paired windows. There is a wood moulding around the edge of the top of the mansard roof. The roof itself was tin and has been retinned

A veranda extends across the front of the house on the first floor with several columns. The moulding surrounding the top and bottom of the veranda are elaborate and their design was made in West Flushing, Long Island, New York. There is a smaller eastside porch in the back. In the past the house has been painted beige. The architect is Joseph Plummer Bryant of Princeton, Illinois.

The plan of the original house has remained the same with four rooms on each side of the two floors, placed symmetrically about a central hall. Linor alterations and additions were at the back of the house such as: first floor-kitchen and second floor-servants quarters. The interior retains its original oak flooring, staircase to the third floor, mirrored china closet, window shutters with hardware, and six fireplaces.

The proposed site includes a small octagon structure with some windows and a tower-like roof. The floor is brick. It has been known to be used for storing garden tools and wood. At one time there was speculation that summer meals were prepared there.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The proposed site is being submitted because of its achievement in demonstrating the Second Empire Style of domestic architecture, as well as features representing the Italianate period. According to current evidence available, this style had not appeared in the immediate area until this home was built in 1878, Although large homes were being built, they mostly represented the Georgian, and the Gothic, Greek, and Colonial Revival styles. Several years later, in the 1880s, another home was built in town and was modeled after the proposed site which differs. It's central pavilion extending to the center front dormer of the mansard roof is higher than the main roof. The exterior cornices and wood molding differ and are ornate. Previous attempts were made by the owner to earnestly retain the distinctive architectual features of this house and the period it represents, as well as in replacing the building materials. It has been reported by an elderly relative of the former owner that the house's architectual design was patterned after a home in New Jersey.

The architect was Joseph Plummer Bryant (1845-1916) who was born and raised in Frinceton, Illinois (attached is a copy of his obituary with pertinent information). An excerpt states, "When a young man, he took up the profession of architecture, entering the office of one of the best architects in Chicago and remaining in the city for a number of years. Later he came back to Frinceton and opened an office combining with Architecture, surveying and landscape gardening, and continued in this line of work until his health failed. His architectual work was noted for its accuracy and completeness of detail and he planned many public buildings throughout the country, expecially many school buildings."

to be designed by Mr. Bryant. Other have not been identified as yet. Their architectual styles are not the same as the proposed site. ... Mr. Bryant also made the plans and supervised the remodeling of Frinceton High School at about the turn of the century.

The present owners have continued to retain and restore the interior and exterior architectual features. The house is visibly located in town and along Illinois Routes 6 and 26. It's setting is about 120 feet from the street with a surrounding green lawn on which stands an iron cast deer since the 1890s. When viewing the house and the style of architecture one experiences a feeling of a bygone era.
