Vicar's Letter

We're beginning a new year in church this month. No, this isn't the January letter a month early! The Church's year begins with Advent, those four weeks of watching and waiting and preparation which take place before the celebration of Christmas. Most of us recognise that December is a time of preparation as we buy presents, decorate houses, send cards and plan festive meals and events. This echoes the church's Advent preparation in as much as there is an eager anticipation of the feast of Christmas, but Advent isn't so much about preparing yourself for one single day, as preparing the whole world for the arrival of Jesus Christ.

The most iconic figure associated with Advent is John the Baptist. He was a cousin

of Jesus, something of a miracle baby born to Elizabeth and Zechariah after years of trying when they were both getting on in years. He was a few months older than Jesus and he too had a charismatic ministry. His ministry began before Jesus' and he paved the way for the message of God's love and forgiveness that Jesus was to bring. John the Baptist probably came across as a bit of a strange fellow, though. He was a critic of contemporary society and attitudes. He was a bit wild in some ways, standing on the edge of society and commenting on the abuses and oppressions he saw. He called for radical change. He wanted people to have a sincere change of heart, to turn to God and to treat one another better. He reminds me of modern day campaigners for change who lobby parliament, initiate huge online movements, travel the world to galvanise passion and concern and anger about the abuses in our world and society: things like climate change, poverty, FGM, access to the world's natural resources, oppression of women and girls and so on. John the Baptist urged a change of heart (repentance), a sort of cleansing and a commitment to put things right in preparation for the arrival of the Messiah in the world. For the church, Advent carries this same imperative. As we prepare for the festivities and enjoyment of Christmas, the call of Advent could stir our hearts to attend to the needs and injustices of the wider world as well. If you receive a request to lobby our MP about unfair trade laws, or make a donation to a charity supporting refugees, or are stirred to pray for peace and justice – why not do it? Together we can make a change, a change which makes the world more like the place of peace, love and justice which God intended. It's what we hope for every time we celebrate the birth of Jesus.

May you know peace and joy in your lives this Christmas time.

Allotment Plot Available – Children's Allotment? One of the allotment plots in Crane's Lane has become available. We would welcome an application from someone who would be willing to lead a project for this to be a Children's Allotment. You would encourage and guide a group of interested village children to cultivate the plot, growing vegetables and/or fruit. We do not have a rigid or fixed idea of how this would work, and would love to hear from anybody who is interested and has a workable proposal. There would be no rental charged, and the plot will be initially cleared to give you a head start.

Alternatively the plot is offered for rental in the usual way. The annual rent is normally £15, but will be reduced to £10 this year as the plot is offered part-way through the season. The tenant will need to sign an agreement which – amongst other things – agrees that the plot will be kept cultivated.

Please contact me if you are interested in either option or would like more information.

Community Led Plan: in accordance with official guidance, the parish council is in the process of reviewing the plan, published two years ago, to assess the extent to which we have achieved the objectives defined in the plan, and to look at what is needed to continue this work. The results will be published in due course.

Local Highways Improvement initiative: we have now learned that our application for this year's funding was only partially successful: we will get a sign and associated road markings in Tinker's Lane to warn North-bound traffic of the Crane's Lane turning, but not the requested speed bumps in Tinker's Lane and Church Lane. We have therefore re-applied for the speed bumps in next year's round of funding.

Permissive path at the old Toft railway bridge: by kind permission of the landowner this continues to be available to walkers and cyclists travelling between Kingston and Toft. It has now been agreed that the parish council's contractor will carry out a regular cut-back of the brambles etc along this path.

John Leonard Frederick Parslow 1935 - 2015

John Parslow was one of the most distinguished ornithologists of his generation, a pioneer in the use of radar in investigating bird migration, a co-founder of the bird observatory in the Scilly Isles, a researcher at Monks Wood into the effects of pesticides on birds of prey, and one of those who helped to draft the Wildlife and Countryside Act of 1981. John worked for the Edward Grey Institute in Oxford, the British Ornithologists' Union, the International Council for Bird Preservation, the British Trust for Ornithology, the Council of Europe, and the Nature Conservancy Council,

finishing his career as Director of Conservation for the RSPB. He was the author of the definitive study Breeding Birds of Britain and Ireland (1973) and co-author, with Richard Fitter and Herman Heinzel, of Collins' Pocket Guide, The Birds of Britain and Europe, still in print and translated into several European languages.

John died peacefully at home on 23rd October, and was buried at the Arbory Trust Woodland Burial Ground in Barton. We publish his Bird List for Orchard Cottage in his memory.

Heidi Allen's November Newsletter

Well, October was an interesting month!

If you are not an active news reader, listener or watcher, you may not know that I made my official maiden speech in Parliament on 20th October. Although I had spoken in the Chamber on many occasions since my election in May, I had not so far made a "formal" speech. A local parish publication is not the place to be political so I won't spend too long talking about its content – but suffice to say I failed miserably to follow the conventions of a maiden speech! Short, yes.... polite, I hope so...but uncontroversial, no!

In brief, I challenged the Government's approach to tax credit reform, requesting that the pace be slowed down and the impact reconsidered. If you'd like to read the full text, you can do so here.....http://www.heidisouthcambs.co.uk/news/heidis-maiden-speech

I would like to say thank you for the overwhelming support I received from South Cambridgeshire constituents. I was literally inundated with emails, letters, tweets and phone calls. It was a challenging time for me with my party, so I am so grateful for your backing. The most pleasing result is that the Chancellor agreed to look at mitigating the effects of the reforms and we will hear his plans in the Autumn statement.

We have had a lot of what we call "sitting Fridays" in Westminster, which means my time in the constituency was restricted in October. However, I was delighted to help open Cottenham's new £640 000 sports pavilion, alongside three-time Paralympic medallist Dan West. This was such a successful community project. It was great to see local builders, engineers and residents come together to deliver a valuable asset for the community. Well done team Cottenham and thank you for the early morning champers!

Later in the month, I met with representatives of the student bodies of Homerton and Girton colleges to discuss the new student finance proposals. It became very clear to me how the way Government communicates change can really make or break the implementation of a policy. Students were concerned about the thought of having more debt as maintenance grants are changed to loans, despite the fact that they would be unlikely to have to pay it back. But it shows we must never forget how people "feel" — it's not just about black and white policy.

On the same day I met with a group of Junior Doctors from Addenbrooke's hospital in light of the proposed changes to contracts. As I listened to the variety of specialisms and careers they were engaged in, it was a useful reminder for me that the word "Junior" is so misleading. These doctors will have up to 10 years of clinical experience

under their belts and are an essential part of our NHS. It is vital any new contract is fit for purpose so I will continue working with them to ensure their voices are heard. Stay well this winter

In the past year as many of one in four residents in Cambridgeshire visited A&E when they could have used an alternative service or looked after themselves at home.

Each visit to A&E costs the local NHS £87, and that's before any treatment is given. When you look at the figures, this costs the local NHS over £4million a year. In turn this is the equivalent cost of 677 hip replacements, or 287 liver transplants or 115 more dementia nurses.

Using A&E when you don't need to can also have a knock-on effect to the rest of the hospital, as busy A&E departments resulted in 500 cancelled operations and procedures because a bed was no longer available, and longer waiting and referral times.

But you can help

- Stay healthy get a flu vaccination if you are eligible
- Look after others check on elderly friends, relatives and neighbours especially
 in spells of cold weather, help them to keep warm and have the medication they
 might need
- Be prepared get your prescriptions in early before the holidays and see your pharmacist or GP for any issues you might be putting off
