# Supplies

# ✓3 Yarn: 1 skein Noro Cyochin (180 meters) ✓3 Needles: US 11 double-pointed ✓3 Hook: US G ✓3 4 ½ inch diameter clay pot

one spool of 24 gauge soft brass wire beads

□ 1½ inch brass ring

# Gange

Not necessary as you will be felting the project.

### Stitch Abbreviations

CO	Cast on
ВО	Bind off
K	Knit
Р	Purl
K2tog	Knit two stitches together
St(s)	Stitch(es)
SI st	Slip stitch

# Size

Will fit around a pot that is 4 ½" in diameter.

#### **Directions**

CO 66 sts. Join and work in the round.

Rounds 1 - 7: Knit.

#### Upper edge holes:

Round 8: (BO 2, K4, BO 2, K25) repeat around.

Round 9: (CO 2, K4, CO 2, K25) repeat around.

Rounds 10-21: Knit.

Rounds 22-37: Decrease 2 sts evenly around next round and then every 3<sup>rd</sup>

round until 52 sts remain.

#### **Bottom holes:**

Round 38: K8, BO 9 sts, K8, BO 9 sts, K8, BO 9 sts. 1 stitch will remain on right

needle. (25 sts)

Round 39: (K8, CO 5 sts), repeat around ending with K1 (40 STS).

Round 40: Knit.

Round 41: (K3, K2tog), repeat around (32 STS).

Round 42: Knit.

Round 43: (K2, K2tog), repeat around (24 STS).

Round 44: Knit.

Round 45: (K1, K2tog), repeat around (16 STS).

Round 46: Knit.

Round 47: K2tog around (8 STS).

Cut yarn leaving a tail and pull through remaining stitches.

#### **Gnarly tentacles:**

Pick up 18 sts around a bottom hole.

Rounds 1 - 5: Knit.

Round 6: K2tog thrice, knit to end of round.

Repeat above 6 rounds until 6 sts remain.

You can now work the 6 sts as an I-cord until tentacle is 17-20 inches long.


Cut yarn leaving a tail and pull through remaining sts.


Repeat for other two tentacles.

Weave in all ends.

#### I-cord instructions:

Move all 6 sts onto one needle, \*do not turn, slide sts to right end of needle, working yarn will be attached to last stitch on left end; using  $2^{nd}$  needle, knit all sts; repeat from \*.





Use hot water in a top-loader washing machine. Put knitted urn in a zippered pillowcase and place in washing machine. Run machine, stopping cycle at end of agitation and resetting to agitation cycle repeatedly until urn is felted as desired. Remove from washing machine and mold by rolling top edge. Turn upside down and weave largish knitting needles through the 4 holes around upper edge to preserve hole spaces while drying. Twist tentacles around largish knitting needles and allow to air dry into a gnarly shape.

#### Finishing hanger (see photo):

String beads on to wire and thread wire through top holes to form two hoops. Twist wire ends. Use a G crochet hook to crochet a chain with wire below upper lip of clay pot. Pull tight enough to support pot and join with sl st. Chain 3 lengths of wire chain from chain around lip to brass ring for hanging. Use short pieces of wire to attach felted hanger to the 3 chain lengths.

Air plants look great in this gnarly urn!
