Overview

Since 1997, the Welsh Language Project (WLP) has been promoting and developing the Welsh language in the Chubut region of Patagonia, Argentina. Every year, three Language Development Officers from Wales spend the period from March to December teaching in Patagonia. They develop the language in the Welsh speaking communities through both formal learning and informal social activities.

There is also a permanent Learning Co-ordinator from Wales based in Patagonia, who is responsible for the quality of teaching.

Another aspect of the project is a network of Patagonian Welsh language tutors in the region. By visiting Wales, attending Welsh language courses and participating in school observation visits, we help maintain the teaching standards and latest methodologies that are implemented in Patagonia.

The Scheme is managed by the Welsh Language Committee, including members from the Welsh Government, the Wales Argentine Society, Menter Patagonia and the Welsh for Adults Centre, School of Welsh, Cardiff University.

The project which consists of reciprocal visits, teaching and training has achieved considerable recognition and success at an international level.

Approach and syllabus

We work in three catchment areas: the Andes, Gaiman and Trelew. We offer a wide range of courses from beginner level to refresher courses for fluent Welsh speakers. We hold these courses in the nursery, primary, secondary and adult sectors.

Welsh Language Development Officers teach a range of courses including Wlpan, Further, Advanced and Mastering. Courses created by The Welsh Centre for Adults, Cardiff University, adapted for Spanish and Welsh contexts, are used.

Funding

The Welsh Government, the Wales Argentina Society (Cymdeithas Cymru-Ariannin) and British Council Wales fund this project, which is part of the International Education Programme. The Chubut government and other bodies also provide funding to support the teaching of Welsh and the wider Welsh community.

History

2015 marks 150 years since the first Welsh settlers arrived in Patagonia.

Wales and Patagonia are bound by tradition, history and language. The permanent settlement of the Chubut Valley and surrounding areas began on 27 July 1865. A total of 153 Welsh settlers arrived aboard the Mimosa.

Now, in the early 21st century, around 50,000 Patagonians are of Welsh descent.

Targets for 2015

- Send three Development Officers to teach and organise Menter Patagonia's languagebased social activities. Within the Valley, the aim has been to recruit a tutor to specialise in developing nursery and primary education in the Andes.
- Employ one Learning Coordinator in Y Wladfa (Welsh Patagonia).
- 1200 learners in Welsh lessons.
- Establish a partnership through Connecting Classrooms.

All of the above targets were met

Key Successes

- Three officers were sent to Patagonia. One to the Andes to undertake 50% teaching and 50% Menter Patagonia work. Two to the Valley, with both teaching for 75% of the time and spending 25% each on Menter Patagonia work.
- A total of 1220 people undertook Welsh courses. (The total in 2014 was 1174) the highest number in the history of the Scheme. This is an increase of 3.9% year-on-year and 25% since the start of the 3-year cycle (2012-2015). (There were 977 people in 2012).
- Welsh for Adults classes have attracted the highest number in the Scheme's history, namely 280 people compared with 279 in 1997 when the Scheme began. There was an increase of 12 people this year but an increase of 104% since the beginning of the current 3-year cycle.

- An increased number of classes 104 compared with 90 in 2014, 83 in 2013 and 79 in 2012. The highest number in the history of the Scheme.
- Connecting Classrooms A partnership was established between Ysgol Gymraeg Gaiman and Ysgol Gymraeg Aberystwyth.
- Significant developments in primary education in the Valley and the Andes. See pages 10 14.
- 14 adults have passed the WJEC's Welsh for Adults examinations at Entry, Foundation, Intermediate and Advanced levels. This year saw learners from Y Wladfa passing examinations at all levels for the very first time. See the outcomes on page 9.
- Contributed to conducting a large number of tours and events by different organisations and groups e.g. The Urdd, Catrin Finch, BBC Orchestra, several theatre companies and of course the First Minister, Carwyn Jones

The total of 1220 is the highest number in the history of the Scheme.

This represents an increase of 3.9% year-on-year and 25% since the start of the 3-year cycle (2012-2015). (977 people in 2012).

There was a total of 573 learners in 1997, when the Scheme officially started, which means that there has been a rise of 113% since then.

The total of 280 represents the highest number of Welsh adult learners since the Scheme began.

The progress made last year in the Andes has been sustained and developed due to the resurrection of courses in a Spanish-medium school in Esquel.

There has been a fall in numbers at primary level in Gaiman due to second language classes and it should be noted that the exciting developments seen this year with Ysgol Gymraeg y Gaiman are highly likely to lead to more children receiving bilingual education.

Despite the fall in Trelew (primary) the figure is very similar to the 2013 figure (82). A possible explanation for this is the financial situation and parents not having the extra income to pay school fees.

The total of 280 represents the highest number in the history of the Scheme. In 1997, there were 279 adult learners. However, it must be remembered that the 'official' Scheme had just started and adults were the main focus of the work, representing nearly half (49%) of all learners. Adults now account for approximately 23% of all learners in Y Wladfa, which is the same percentage as last year. The fact that the Scheme attracts so many people after nearly 20 years is a clear indication that interest remains very strong amongst members of Y Wladfa.

Despite the relatively small increase this year, this should be considered in light of the progress made over the course of five years and, of course, the fact that only 72 adults were learning the language back in 2009.

The above figure shows good progression on the whole between pre-entry courses last year and Wlpan 1 (Entry) this year, with a significant increase in terms of Wlpan 2 (Foundation) and Further (Intermediate). There was a fall in relation to Advanced/Mastering/Proficient numbers but this was to be expected. This year, it was not possible for everyone to attend classes due to all the celebrations marking the 150-year Anniversary, as those individuals were often responsible for organising or coordinating events. This shows that the above total could rise to 300+ in the future, continuing along current lines and attracting the 'fluent' learners back in 2016.

This is the first year in the history of the Scheme to see candidates at all examination levels which shows the status and purpose accorded by learners to sitting an external examination. It is wonderful to be able to praise learners at all levels who have, against all the odds, endeavoured to learn a second language and study for an exam and the local tutors, as well as the officers from Wales, who have worked with the students in order to prepare them for the tests, must be commended. Emyr Davies from the WJEC should also be thanked for allowing us to participate in the examination process.

One small issue was how to ensure that the certificates reached Y Wladfa, considering current difficulties sending anything in the post due to import rules, so thanks to the kindness of Eirian Wyn Lewis and the crew of travellers, the candidates will receive their certificates! Ysgol Gymraeg y Gaiman

After years of waiting, the school was given official status in 2013 and this year, in July, the school moved to a new building in Gaiman located on the site of the former 415 school.

One major issue faced by the school in the past was the condition and size of its former site. Moving to the new building will allow for better planning and, in terms of the parents, the new building feels like a 'real' school which will certainly give the school greater status. It must be remembered that parents pay a monthly fee of 600 pesos for 10 months of the year in order to

receive a bilingual education, therefore the status and condition of buildings etc are important factors in attracting new people. Indeed, the rise in numbers over the years, despite all the obstacles, is significant so the school should have a thriving future in its new home.

This was in evidence during the monitoring visit in July when new children were seen joining the school within weeks of moving to the new site.

This year, for the very first time, there has been a Year 1 class and during the monitoring visit there were 64 children at the school, with that figure on the rise. As the school grows, it would be possible to educate approximately 150 children ultimately, but it is likely that additional classrooms would have to be built in three or four years in order to achieve this.

However, success can lead to other problems and one obvious challenge facing the teachers has been to ensure that latecomers can integrate with bilingual education successfully without impairing the ability of other children to use the Welsh language. Providing fully bilingual education can be challenging in a situation where not every member of staff is a fluent Welsh speaker. Scheme teachers have given staff lessons and contribute to lessons in order to ensure that the Welsh language is ever present during the day.

The school needs to undertake careful planning in order to ensure that the Welsh language receives the attention it deserves and in discussions with school managers it appears that this will happen. The Scheme itself is able to support them in several ways, including providing practical support to plan the curriculum and make best use of educational and human resources. In 2013, Eluned Jones worked in Ysgol Gymraeg y Gaiman on behalf of the Scheme and worked with them very successfully. In 2015, Eluned moved to the Andes to assist with setting up Ysgol y Cwm mainly. The Scheme is fortunate to be able to appoint her again this year and, in 2016, she will work in Gaiman again focussing on primary education. Such progression and continuity is important and the school will benefit from her vast experience next year.

In 2016 Cylch Ti a Fi for 3 and 4 year olds will be held from 07.50 - 12.30. Reception, Year 1 and Year 2 classes will be held from 07.50 - 14.50.

The school is looking at ways of attracting and keeping children and, to this end, a Clwb Cymraeg (Welsh language Club) was established, which is held twice a week, (Tuesday 17.00-19.00 and Thursday 17.30-19.00). The school's staff and Scheme teachers are responsible for this important development.

Another example of the school's progressive work is its Connecting Classrooms partnership with Ysgol Gymraeg Aberystwyth. A delegation from Wales has already been to Gaiman to observe and exchange ideas and, in January 2016, a teacher from Gaiman will travel to Aberystwyth.

The Scheme has also provided a scholarship for a music teacher at the school so that she can come to Wales and observe in 2016.

This school's importance to the future of the Welsh language in the Valley and in the Welsh-speaking heartland of Y Wladfa cannot be overemphasised. Due to old age, the old cohort of native Welsh speakers is being reduced every year and it is only through bilingual education that we will be able to produce enough Welsh speakers. Without a doubt, there are major challenges in terms of budget, resources, staff and, at times, a lack of understanding amongst the region's education authorities of the nature of bilingual education. The Scheme will need to support each one of these aspects but, in doing so correctly, it is possible to achieve the aim and ensure that the Welsh language has a flourishing future in Gaiman.

Ysgol y Cwm Developments- Autumn 2015

Background

Since 2013, and as a result of the successful work done by the Welsh Language Learning Scheme, work has been ongoing to ensure that there is a live memorial to mark 150 years since the first Welsh settlers arrived in Y Wladfa. Despite a number of interesting and valuable projects, the feeling in Trevelin was that something needed to be done which would secure the future of the language and therefore the culture. The process of working with the Government to create the necessary documentation began and the land opposite the historic chapel was put on the market in order to start building what would be a primary school in the future.

Today, Phase I of the building bears a striking resemblance to a school but the interior needs to be completed, fitting flooring, lighting, toilets, a kitchen, painting, furnishing...Thanks to Cymdeithas Gymraeg Trevelin (Trevelin Welsh Society) we have now reached the stage where we are at: 1.5 million pesos was pledged by the Government but, thus far, despite repeated requests we have only received 33,000. Thanks must also be given to the carpenter Marcelo Roberts who works free of charge and who ensures that we have an expert at hand to go after the workers and local Council.

The greatest issue for us at the moment is the political situation. Should the political landscape change, who knows what may happen to the funding promised. We live in hope but with a high level of uncertainty and as time passes parents must start to search for schools for their children. If the Government does not provide us with the final figure it will be very difficult for us.

How we work today

The Nursery class is currently in attendance every afternoon from 13.40 - 17.00 under the care of the Spanish teacher Jessica Hopkins and with a Welsh-medium colleague working alongside her, Jessica Jones, who has worked with the youngest children for many years and who now sees the fruit of her labour, Eluned Jones, our Scheme officer this year, who is sharing her expertise with us, Iwan Madog who is employed by an individual in order to allow us to offer all the provision we desire this year in such a special year, Eluned Grandis, a former officer, who is now married and lives in the Cwm, and Margarita Green who has attended courses in Wales and who now teaches others, without mentioning the local teachers who provide PE and Music lessons, namely Camila Itxassa and Maria de Oro.

Teamwork is at the heart of everything and we have been so fortunate to find Jessica Hopkins; although she doesn't speak Welsh she understands what we are trying to achieve and supports the project 100%. This year the school employs her so there are significant disadvantages in terms of pension years etc but she is with us. We have produced a list of potential individuals and posts to take to the Government so that they can provide the funding from February onwards, including some hours for Welsh speakers such as teaching partners alongside the Spanish teachers.

We have found a qualified teacher to undertake the role of Head at the school and, despite the fact that she does not speak Welsh, she is close to the community and therefore understands our vision. Another two teachers who are about to leave college have also been to observe in order to see if they support the kind of work we are trying to do and, if salaries are available, it is likely that they will take over the new classes.

This year, due to the presence of Eluned Jones, an expert in young children's work, we have been able to implement a rota system where the children have been attending sessions in both Welsh and Spanish, in the hope that this will also be possible next year too. The cooperation between Jessica Hopkins and Eluned Jones has been crucial to the success of the project this year and is an excellent basis for what will follow.

Once the school is ready, all the language workshops which have taken place at the old Chapel House will be able to move to the new building, in the hope that the old House will be able to be renovated and used as accommodation by the officer coming from Wales and/or volunteers who we hope will come to help us. Everyone is looking forward to teaching in a brand new building but there is much to do still. The hope is to start teaching 2016 lessons in the new building but more funding from the Government would ensure that this happens. There is a lack of places in

schools in Trevelin so this is beneficial as we are solving the issues faced by the town's schools but for a price.

The future

We sent the school's Curriculum Project along with a revised copy of the school's Education Plan to the Government before the elections (25 October) in the hope of receiving a prompt reply with regards to the final figure. Creating a school from nothing is no easy task, especially as we are people who love the language and culture but who have never had to provide a reason for what we do: that is because Chubut Province Government does not have a bilingual schools policy so we have to be 'multi-cultural' and justify what we are seeking to do.

In order to continue good practice, we need input from the Scheme's 2016 officer as well as hours from the Government for the Welsh and Spanish teachers and assistants but, as the 2015 timetable shows, there are a number of funding streams available to us to achieve the work.

You only need to look at the faces of the children as they sing or are given the opportunity to touch a harp or plant seeds or cook to see the value in what we are doing and this is what keeps us going in the face of adversity. The School Committee is a very special group of people and it is hoped that we can build on their work as the school grows. CLARE VAUGHAN

Menter Patagonia

The following objectives were set for Menter Patagonia in 2009:

- 1. Real efforts must be made to make the use of Welsh the norm in a range of social scenarios to extend its use socially.
- 2. A wide range of situations, events and activities where Welsh can be spoken quite naturally must be planned between 10 and 13 hours each week in each location between 20 and 26 hours a week in the Camwy Valley and similarly in the Andes foothills. The following activities could be suggested.
- 3. Activities for nursery children and their parents. This could be an opportunity to engage parents and get them to come to a Welsh class at least one session per week.
- 4. Activities for primary school children sports, crafts, painting and handicraft, games, nature and the environment, folk dancing, singing/drama groups, Saturday morning playgroups, holiday clubs, hobbies etc. (two age levels meeting twice a week).
- 5. Activities for secondary school children Aelwyd yr Urdd, sports, outdoor activities, cultural activities, social activities. (two sessions a week if possible).
- 6. Regular social activities for adults. quizzes, fashion shows, cookery, food tasting, discussion or debating groups, conversational groups, different hobby groups, IT classes for beginners, rambler clubs, cycling, mountaineering, skiing, luncheon club, 'noson lawen' (variety evenings), talks and lectures, folk dancing, picnics, excursions, film nights etc.
- 7. Cooperating with local Welsh societies to inspire them such as the eisteddfod, competition gatherings, the chapels.
- 8. Seeking to extend the visual use of Welsh locally. the radio, museums etc.

The Scheme has funding to employ one person for Menter Patagonia activities. Therefore, in order to ensure that Menter Patagonia has a presence in both areas, the posts are actually 0.5 FTE.

Eluned Jones spent 50% of her time on Menter Patagonia's work in the Andes, whilst Ann-Marie Lewis and Fabio Lewis spent 25% each of their time on Menter Patagonia's work in the Valley.

Menter laith Dyffryn Camwy Events 2015

This has been an exceptionally busy year for Menter Patagonia in the Camwy Valley, with a vast array of different activities taking place in order to promote the use of Welsh in the Valley.

A personal highlight for us has been presenting Patagonia's Learner of the Year Trophy. This is the competition's inaugural year and we are extremely proud of the fact that we have introduced it and that five chose to compete. We very much look forward to announcing the name of the winner in the Eisteddfod. Menter Patagonia is contributing \$1000 pesos as prize money and the Eisteddfod's Committee is presenting a medal.

We have highlighted the need for online Welsh language programming at an international level. S4C has added more programmes to the collection available on S4C clic and all current CYW programmes are available live on CYW TIWB. This is an invaluable tool for developing the verbal skills of the children here. CYW TIWB can be watched in Ysgol y Gaiman and Ysgol yr Hendre Moreno.

As a result, we organised several events in Trelew and in the Centre for Culture in Gaiman to show programmes on Patagonia, e.g. the Huw Edwards programme - Patagonia, and GALESA. GALESA had subtitles and as a result approximately 60 people were present in Gaiman to watch the show and everyone had a slice of Torta Negra on the way in!

We have arranged several Welsh language services this year and have endeavoured to conduct a monthly service at Bethel Chapel in Gaiman. In addition, we have arranged Welsh language services in some of the Welsh language chapels in the Valley - Glan Alaw and Salem, Lle Cul. The response has been superb with the small chapels full to the brim. Another highlight for us will be the Carols and Candles Service in Glan Alaw Chapel in December, where everyone will bring a candle with them. Several individuals from the Welsh-speaking community in the Valley have been happy to lend a hand and we are very grateful to them for doing so!

Elin Fflur and Casi Wyn have been entertaining large crowds in Boru, Trelew, arranged by Menter Patagonia and Welsh Classes in Trelew. These were hugely entertaining evenings which attracted people from outside the usual Welsh circle and a large number of young people were also present!

A series of evenings were held on the History of Wales across the Valley in the company of Frank Holloway, with Tito, Ana and Luned doing the translation. Approximately 40 were present in Porth Madryn.

This year, we have sought to hold events in the Upper Valley. A Fy Ardal I (My Area) day was held in Tir Halen, with Nivia Owen and Leila MacDonald at the helm talking about their experiences of growing up in the area. The Museum was opened for us, along with Tir Gobaith, the historic farm, where we enjoyed socialising with a picnic in the sunshine under the willow trees.

As Menter Patagonia, we also travelled to Llain Las and Bryn Crwn Chapel.

A curry night with a bit of sing-song was held in Ysgol yr Hendre, Moreno.

A pizza night and discussion on Y Fari Lwyd was held by Suzanne Condon from the Welsh for Adults Centre, Cardiff University at Gwalia Lân.

A Twmpath (Folk Dance) was also held at Ysgol yr Hendre, Rivadavia under the guidance of Suzanne Condon.

We celebrated Spring Day here by walking around Chiquichano Lake in Trelew, with a tasty mate to finish.

We celebrated Book Day, immediately after arriving here, by going around Gaiman taking pictures of various people with a Welsh book.

We celebrated Shwmae Su'mae Day here and pupils from Coleg Camwy produced and completed a quiz on Wales.

We filmed at the Tir Halen Craft Show and raised awareness of the language amongst non-Welsh speakers. A policeman even spared a few words for the camera!!

Menter y Dyffryn was very busy with translation work, voiceovers, interviews, recordings, and helping local businesses to use a little Welsh in their advertising.

We were responsible for placing a big blackboard outside Tŷ Camwy - Camwy's Welsh Corner - which had an idiom and the word of the week on it alongside advertisements in order to draw pupils' attention to the language. It proved very popular!

As Menter Patagonia, we followed Wales in the Rugby World Cup and Welsh speakers and learners joined us at the Touring Club, Trelew and Genesis, Gaiman to socialise and watch the games! We had a lot of fun!

We have endeavoured to have a Menter Patagonia and family presence at as many 150 events as possible, taking part as and when required, by reading, singing solos in various chapel services and concerts across the Valley. Reading Edwyn Cynrig Roberts' letter in a memorial service on the sand dunes by the caves at Porth Madryn was a very personal and emotional experience for me. Both of us were also members of the Ysgol Gerdd (Music School) Choir and attended several concerts and Eisteddfodau.

Menter Patagonia was busy at the Youth Eisteddfod, translating and adjudicating, and as we approach Eisteddfod Y Wladfa, we will be training, adjudicating, presenting, and responsible for the Learner of the Year ceremony.

As Menter Patagonia, and family, we have attended every Eisteddfod held this year. Eisteddfod Trevelin – competed with the Ysgol Gerdd choir; Eisteddfod Dolavon competing and training individuals for the recitation competitions; Bethel Chapel's Mini Eisteddfod where Ifan and Miriam competed individually and with Ysgol y Gaiman, trained by us; Eisteddfod Mimosa where the children competed and Tito and myself adjudicated the translation work and provided coaching. This is also where the Learner of the Year competition was launched; Youth Eisteddfod training, children competing, adjudicating and translating and Eisteddfod Y Wladfa, where we will once again be training, competing, adjudicating, presenting and responsible for one of the main ceremonies.

We helped organise the Urdd's Trip.

Menter Patagonia helped with a number of visits this year, including undertaking a fair amount of interpreting for people such as Elin Fflur, Casi Wyn, Dafydd Tudur and Berian Ellis from the National Library, the Music adjudicator Eric Jones and his wife, Gwen, Cefyn Burgess from the Wool Museum in Drefach.

Menter Patagonia, along with the Eisteddfod's Committee, were responsible for a visit by the well-known music adjudicator, Eric Jones, who spent six days in Gaiman with his wife, Gwen. We accompanied them around the Valley and spent a wonderful afternoon in Mercante in Nolavon, he conducted his own composition 'O Fab y Dyn' and rehearsed with the Ysgol Gerdd choir.

Special thanks must be given to the women of Dolavon, under the guidance of Nivia Owen, who were kept busy preparing many a delicious tea for visitors to the area - Eric and Gwen Jones, Dafydd Tudur and Berian Ellis. We will also enjoy an afternoon with Hazel Charles Evans shortly. Dolavon Speakers class are reading her book, Siwrne 13, and each one of us has been affected by what we have read. We were all therefore very keen to spend an afternoon with Hazel in order to discuss the book. Hazel has agreed to visit Dolavon and there will be a special tea awaiting her. I would like to underline the importance of arranging events in Dolavon and Tir Halen - there is a very enthusiastic and hard-working crew here!

Several young visitors from Wales have been here during the year and, as Menter Patagonia, they have been welcomed by us, and we have spent a great deal of time in their company. Tŷ Camwy's door is always open, with a mate on the table ready and waiting!

As Menter Patagonia, we assisted with the examinations held in Gaiman.

We helped friends here with the support of friends from Wales - thanks to Catrin Jones for collecting several CDs requested by Graciela Puw for us, for her radio show - Cornel o Gymru yn Chubut.

A Literary Circle was held here at the Centre for Culture and a crew of us came together under the guidance of Esyllt Roberts to discuss some poetry from Eisteddfod Y Wladfa.

As part of the Literary Festival weekend, we organised a very valuable Skype session with some pupils from Ysgol yr Hendre, Trelew. The children thoroughly enjoyed their poetry session with the children's poet laureate, Aneurin Karadog! Tito also did some translation in Gaiman.

Menter Patagonia had a stall at the Agricultural Fair in Gaiman and the Book Fair and events were held to promote the Welsh language there.

We attended several actos with the children to mark significant dates in Gaiman. Ifan was given the opportunity to act as flag bearer on several occasions.

Several socials/picnics were held here to welcome visitors from Wales.

We were very busy with two Welsh women from Gaiman, tidying and painting around the grave of John Lewis, Caernarfon, on the prairie before sharing a picnic together in Welsh at the Indians' Ford! - Spending four days at Ysgol Gymraeg y Gaiman in July working with staff and observing lessons. Once again, it was lovely to visit Ysgol yr Hendre, Trelew and Ysgol Gymraeg y Gaiman during Eisteddfod Y Wladfa in November.
- Close collaboration with Nerys Edwards, Clwyd Theatr Cymru administrator and contact, during preparations and performances of 'Mimosa'.
- Coordinating the Urdd's Patagonia 2015 trip which was very successful as usual. It was a
 pleasure to work with all the local tutors to ensure that everything ran smoothly. I trust that
 the youngsters enjoyed themselves under the guidance of Mared Jones, Leah Dafydd and
 Siôn Lewis.
- Trying to encourage students and tutors from Esquel and Trevelin to maximise every possible
 opportunity, be that sitting an exam, writing a piece for 'Llais yr Andes', applying for a
 scholarship, competing in an Eisteddfod, sending articles to magazines and newspapers,
 passing exams and that Ryan Lloyd won the Tom Gravell scholarship to attend Llandovery
 College in 2016.
- Uploading photos to Menter Patagonia's Facebook page and including each news item too. Sending news to Ceris Gruffydd, Wales-Argentina Society secretary, on a monthly basis. Sending a monthly article to 'Clebran', the Frenni area paper.

Learning Coordinator's Report

In producing this report, I must start by saying that this year has been an uncharacteristic one! Before the year began, there was some discussion about the celebrations to mark the first Welsh settlers arriving in Patagonia 150 years ago but I don't think anyone expected such a busy year of work and activity. It has been so wonderful to welcome so many people to these communities and I sincerely hope that all those who have visited us have felt the thrill of speaking their own language so far from home. The Centenary was so important to the revival of the language and culture in Y Wladfa and we sincerely hope that the 150-year celebrations have had the same impact on our visitors.

This has meant that there has been far more focus on certain aspects of the Learning Coordinator's work than the usual regimen such as observing classes, preparing material and offering training sessions. Some projects have received a great deal of attention this year in the

hope that they will pay dividends in the future. However, I have been in electronic contact with Luned Gonzalez and tutors in the Valley and Andes on a regular basis and with local tutors wherever practical. It is considered that one of the most important aspects of my work is to act as a liaison for workers from Wales and local tutors in Argentina too and it is important for officers from Wales to know that they have a mentor on the same continent. I understand that other projects sending people from Britain to other countries to work for a period of time encounter problems occasionally as there is no local liaison who understands the situation and that is one thing to be proud of in Y Wladfa.

Although it is not possible to list each and every visit, event, meeting and development here I will seek to elaborate on some aspects which have been important to the Scheme this year.

February 2015

- Meeting with some of the students who planned to sit the Foundation examination in June: as some candidates studied in Northern Argentina and were home for the summer holidays, we, along with their volunteer teacher Grisel Roberts, went about conducting sessions to revise the Wlpan course and prepare for the exam. Also present were young boys from Esquel and adults considering sitting an exam in the future.
- Classes were held via Skype with Foundation candidates living in Mendoza (northern Argentina) and Gaiman. As it was the summer holidays, these individuals had more time to study, so we maximised the time and held classes although we continued until the examinations in June. I would like to build on this in 2016 and extend our provision further through the use of technology.
- Working on Ysgol y Cwm's PEI: when the Scheme began in 1996 nobody considered offering bilingual education in Y Wladfa let alone in a small village in the Andes but, as a result of the Learning Welsh Scheme, self-confidence grew within the Welsh communities and the first bilingual school was established in Trelew and there is now another bilingual school in Gaiman. Ysgol y Cwm will be the third but, in order to achieve recognition from the Government, the school's thinking, aim and methodology must be shown and we, as the school's didactic committee, worked on these papers during the school holidays. (See the piece on Ysgol y Cwm).
 - Although not directly related to my post, but part of the 150-year celebrations, I went to
 the foot of Gorsedd y Cwmwl's peak, which is the mountain looking down on Trevelin,
 quite a challenging trek. There is now a piece of slate on top of the mountain which
 commemorates the initiative.
 - Welcomed Dafydd Wigley, one of the few visitors who was here for the Centenary and who has returned. His wife, Elinor Bennett, had held a fundraiser in Wales to buy a harp for Y Wladfa and as enough money had been raised to buy two, she, along with Gwenan Gibbard, brought one full-size and one practice harp for the Andes and the Valley.
 - Trevelin's Celtic Festival to celebrate St David's Day.

March 2015

- Travelled to the Valley to welcome Valley officers, Ann Marie Lewis and Tito and the children.
 Spent time with them looking at the work and timescales. Attended events at the start of the Valley term and class committee.
- Welcomed the volunteer Frank Holloway. Frank had visited Y Wladfa on holiday and, as a
 retired teacher, he felt that one day he could contribute to the work, so he came with special
 presentations on the history of Wales and shared these with the Welsh society but also with
 local schools, which was a very interesting experience for both parties. He spent time in the
 Andes and the Valley.
- Teaching two classes in Esquel, namely Advanced and Mastering, up to now. The Scheme's
 success has meant that confident tutors are teaching the locals and preparing them for
 examinations, but there is a lack of confidence in terms of higher levels so, due to the
 interest shown by a crew in Esquel and lack of hours on the part of Eluned Jones, I agreed to
 teach two groups, especially as both were considering sitting the Advanced examination in
 2016.

April 2015

- Visit by the Joio crew to film for a theatrical event {150} and the film *Galesa* assisted with arrangements with the locals and local organisations.
- Took part in a walk which was supposed to go from Porth Madryn to Rawson following the footsteps of the first Welsh settlers but, due to bad weather, the journey had to be curtailed only walking along some parts and not camping out on the Prairie.
- Trevelin Eisteddfod leading the Saturday afternoon session and available for simultaneous translation.

May 2015

- Welcomed Elin Fflur to Y Wladfa and helped with arrangements in the Andes.
- Led weekly preparation sessions for the Entry and Foundation examinations for pupils in the Andes.

June 2015

- Entry level and Intermediate level examinations
- Spoke at the Gaiman Book Fair.
- Advanced level and Foundation lefel examinations. As the examinations were split between
 the Andes and the Valley, due to the location of the majority of the candidates, I spent quite a
 bit of time travelling in June!
- Welcomed Isabel Thomas and Steffan Bryn to the Andes, both having won a Santander scholarship offered by the School of Welsh, Cardiff University, to come to Y Wladfa to volunteer. Planned a programme for them. Mentored them during their stay.

July 2015

- Welcomed the BBC who came to film for news programming marking the 150-year anniversary.
- Gŵyl y Glaniad (The Landing Celebration). Travelled to Porth Madryn to take part in the celebrations.
- Welcomed Carwyn Jones to the Andes.
- Welcomed Gareth Kiff to the Andes in his capacity as Academic Director and Chair of the Welsh Language Scheme in Patagonia.
- Welcomed Aled Eirug (Chair of British Council Wales), Mary Godward (British Council in Argentina) and Suzanne Hay (BBC Orchestra). Spent time with Suzanne working on a plan for Catrin Finch's visit to the Andes.

August 2015

- Welcomed the *Mimosa* musical crew which was aimed at bringing together young people and Wales to share the history of the Mimosa. Travelled with them and lent a hand where needed.
- Welcomed Suzanne Condon from Cardiff University as a volunteer.

September 2015

- Welcomed Dafydd Tudur and Berian Ellis from the Casgliad y Werin (The People's Collection) project.
- Spoke about the Welsh language and its history and provided a taster session for teachers and prospective teachers in the FAAPI's annual conference. This year's conference was held in Cordoba and was an opportunity to network and show the existence of the Learning Welsh Scheme. Ana Chiabrando also took part in the sessions as she had won a scholarship to attend the conference during the 150-year celebratory year.

October 2015

- Welcomed the Lighthouse Theatre crew to the Andes.
- Planned a visit by Catrin Finch alongside the British Council in Argentina and the BBC Wales
 Orchestra, welcoming her to the area. Provided simultaneous translation in the workshops
 and concerts. Coordinated her work programme whilst she was here.
- Took part in the string workshops in the Valley offered by the BBC orchestra and provided simultaneous translation where needed.
- Welcomed the Urdd crew on their annual visit.

November 2015

- Welcomed Rosemary Butler, National Assembly for Wales' Presiding Officer, to the Andes on a short visit.
- Eisteddfod Y Wladfa competed, attended and supported.
- Welcomed Siân Thomas to the Andes as a volunteer.
- Welcomed Steffan Phillips to the Andes as a volunteer.
- Trevelin's Anniversary Celebrations.
- End-of-term events in the Valley and Andes.

As well as the special items listed above, I have also been working with the following as part of my routine duties during the school year in Argentina:

- Attending local committees from the centres, including those in the Valley where possible.
- Leading groups involved with language learning planning, creating resources etc.
- Providing learning support as and when required.
- Undertaking administrative work involving scholarships, volunteering, examinations etc. This
 year, two candidates sat the Advanced level examination which meant providing a
 considerable sum of support in preparing them for the folio and recording work. I did this
 during visits to the Valley and online.
- Acting as Chair of Ysgol y Cwm's Committee and Deputy Chair of Trevelin's Welsh Society.
- Arranging work as Language Coordinator for the nursery schools.
- Attending every Welsh language event and Eisteddfod where possible.
- Creating and maintaining a positive working relationship with local tutors and those attached to the Project in the Chubut Region.

Case Studies

Ysgol Gymraeg yr Andes Esquel

My name is Marina. I have worked at Ysgol Gymraeg yr Andes, Esquel for around ten years. I am a Nursery teacher.

This year I am working with Eluned Jones, the teacher from Wales. This is a great opportunity for both of us as we are able to share new ideas and experiences when planning for lessons together.

We teach the children twice a week, on Mondays and Wednesdays, from 6-8pm.

The children enjoy various activities - singing, learning colours, numbers, shapes and painting. But I think they most enjoy looking at books.

In the second group, the children enjoy painting, writing, playing cards and the girls here have also started to read in Welsh! Fantastic!

Welsh lessons are currently held in the Spanish Nursery School "Mundo Disparatado", as construction is taking place on Ysgol Gymraeg yr Andes Esguel. I look forward to seeing the new

building. I thoroughly enjoy working in the Spanish Nursery School as well as Victoria attended the school.

Jam Llaeth

Every Monday night at 22.00 on Radio Pocas Nueces (106.5fm)

Jam Llaeth is a bilingual show which features news, interviews, stories, an opportunity to learn some Welsh and Spanish, and Welsh music. And of course a lot of Welsh music. Some of the teenagers studying Welsh also contribute on a weekly basis.

We are very excited that the programme has restarted. Jam Llaeth began in 1999 with Sioned Hughes, the teacher who was here from Wales. The last programme was broadcast in 2004.

Gŵyl y Glaniad (The Landing Festival) 2015 – Clare Vaughan

Despite attending several celebrations in Porth Madryn since coming to Patagonia, this year was a significant one with a number of events taking place.

The Government's official ceremony

There had been much discussion prior to the event as the Argentinian President and First Minister of Wales would be in attendance in an election year in the country. It was important to go and support the Welsh but it was a surreal experience being surrounded by government supporters with us, at the centre, with a cultural interest but the 'Corazon Pionero' or 'Calon Arloesol' show was worth seeing with local artists alongside actors from Buenos Aires and it was mesmerising.

Gala Concert in Trelew

The city's Spanish theatre was jam-packed to hear local artists and El Sur-co Duo from Trevelin recounting Y Wladfa's history in a very emotional way with the wonderful finale involving the children who are the future of the language and culture singing their hearts out.

28 July 2015

Waking up early to see the ceremony by the statue of the Welsh women and somehow being invited to take part by pushing one of the barrels to the statue of the Indian by the caves! Then seeing crowds of people waiting to greet those representing the first settlers who came ashore in a rowing boat. Then the meeting between both cultures and an exchange between the Indians and the Welsh. Then political speeches by Martin Buzzi, Head of the Region and Carwyn Jones, First Minister. Then a Cymanfa Ganu in a school sport hall and I have to admit that it was very difficult to feel involved in such a large space.

Rushing to Moriah Chapel to commemorate Lewis Jones, one of the city's founders which now bears his name, before moving onto Gaiman where a wonderful tea had been prepared in several of the chapels for the thirsty.

A grand concert to end the day with the Gaiman gymnasium full to the brim with us having to stand on the balcony in order to see the local artists.

Then travelling home by bus overnight in order to be ready to welcome Carwyn Jones to Trevelin as he had decided to accept Buzzi's offer to use his plane to travel over and visit the Andes at least.

29 July 2015 By 14.00 there were representatives from Welsh and Welsh language societies and organisations in the Mill Museum in Trevelin ready to greet the First Minister and it was a pleasant enough hour although it was disappointing that he did not have time to visit the newly built Ysgol y Cwm.

31 July 2015

Concert in Trevelin, dinner in Esquel and plenty of rushing to and fro!

1 August...and the celebrations continue!

A wonderful evening took place at the Esquel gymnasium which showcased the town and area's talents at their best with emotive dancing, Welsh and Spanish singing, old and young and an event which gave a fitting tribute to the first settlers.

'Mimosa' Tour by Clwyd Theatr Cymru

Despite a number of visits this year marking 150 years I believe that this tour stands out in particular due to the collaboration between youngsters from Wales and those fortunate individuals from Y Wladfa, Esquel, to recount the history of both countries. The show was completely professional thanks to the expert hand of Tim Baker and it was an emotional experience for all involved: I cried seeing Mike Winter and Ryan Lloyd alongside their peers acting and singing on stage and recounting the history in such a vivid way.

If we wish to see Y Wladfa celebrate its 200-year anniversary we need more projects which bring young people from both countries together in terms of culture and friendship to create links which will continue in the future.

'Mimosa' Tour Band by Clwyd Theatre Cymru

Llais yr Andes article by Dylan Williams (translation)

It is very difficult to put into words one of the best experiences of my life as an actor and indeed on a personal level. It's difficult to believe that only a few weeks ago I was on the other side of the world with a crew from Wales and two young lads from Esquel performing in 'Mimosa' in a place called Patagonia.

Back in February of this year I was honoured to be invited to an audition with the director, Tim Baker, Clwyd Theatr Cymru, for a new project called 'Mimosa'. I was already excited to be able to catch up with Tim as he was a director who had given me many opportunities in the past and, as a director and friend, had shown faith in me as an actor. We had worked together on a number of productions in the past for this special theatre company in Mold.

I got even more excited when Tim shared his vision for this new project. He talked about his magical trip to Patagonia four years previously and the inspiration for the piece, namely a picture of Kate Jones' grave, one of the first cohorts. He found her name on the list of travellers to sail aboard the Mimosa, as well as her husband William Jones 'Y Bedol' and their two young daughters, Mary Ann and Jane. It then became apparent that years of further research had been undertaken to piece together Kate and William's story, along with many other travellers, including Rachel and Aaron Jenkins, in order to recreate the world and experiences of the first cohort of settlers, starting with their decision to leave Wales for good and embark on an extraordinary journey from the Liverpool docks on a small clipper ship in 1865 to South America and a place called Patagonia.

At the end of April, I started rehearsing at Theatr Clwyd having been chosen to take part in this project, which was an enormous privilege. Joining me in rehearsals were my fellow actors, Hanna Jarman, Tom Blumberg and Bethany Gwyn. Also joining us and Tim was Emyr John, the assistant director, and I must thank him wholeheartedly for his work with Tim and the cast throughout rehearsals. It was also great to be working with the exceptional composer, Dyfan Jones, once again. His spell-binding songs, with lyrics by Tudur Dylan Jones, would once again prove to be the lifeblood of this drama and would have a resounding impact on Tim Baker's complex script.

Following an extremely busy rehearsal period, preparing the drama in both Welsh and English in the short space of three and a half weeks, we started to tour Wales, and with each performance it became very clear, from the warm reception across Wales, that we were part of a very special project. Then we returned to Mold to perform the show for four weeks, with evening performances and morning and matinee performances for hundreds of schoolchildren from across north Wales.

Then we went to Glan-llyn to meet 16 youngsters from Wales and two young lads from Esquel, Mike Winter and Ryan Lloyd. Clwyd Theatr Cymru 'Theatre for Young People' had formed a partnership with the Urdd for the next part of the project. This partnership would become extremely worthwhile, and following this project, a partnership which has secured its status as a crucial network, both culturally and nationally, for the future of the Welsh language and our young people across the world. Therefore, we are deeply grateful to Clwyd Theatr Cymru and the Urdd for this vision, and to lestyn and Bethan, the Urdd's care officers, for all their work, spirit and humour along the way. And we are deeply grateful to all the young people for their sheer commitment, resolve and sense of enjoyment throughout the project.

Thinking about the project, it was interesting and important to remember that we were in Bala rehearsing. Bala was the place William and Kate Jones left for good to follow their dream of a better life in Patagonia. This area is also steeped in Welsh history as we are also only a stone's throw away from the deep waters as we remember Tryweryn. So, in the space of only two weeks, we restarted rehearsals with the young people, and as each day went by watched and noticed how this amazing story gripped them just as it had gripped us as a professional cast and audiences across Wales already.

Our first two performances as a cast took place at the National Eisteddfod in Meifod, with the Theatre full to the brim, and everyone on their feet and in tears. The same reaction was experienced in the Chapter, Cardiff, with everyone now appreciating the significance of this drama.

Then, at long last, on Sunday 9th August we embarked on the next important chapter in the history of this project, and left for South America (but not by boat) flying to Buenos Aires and then going on to Patagonia! We arrived in Trelew first, then Porth Madryn and Gaiman. There were four shows in these areas and nobody expected the reaction we got. The welcome we experienced was absolutely amazing and we are deeply grateful to the whole community. Everyone was on their feet and in tears and there was a feeling that we had come home with the tale. Of course it was important to recount this story to everyone, but in their heart of hearts everyone knew that the response experienced in these towns in Patagonia was different somehow. The same response was shared by the Welsh, Argentinian Welsh and non-Welsh speakers along with descendents of that first cohort as everyone saw the images in the narrative and felt the wave of emotion presented on stage. We were recounting the history of the Welsh in Patagonia to the Welsh in Patagonia, and by doing so, as Tim Baker, our director, said 'having the privilege of becoming part of that story'. And as a cast we understood the significance of this story more and more every day as we were able to visit the landing site in Porth Madryn, and stand on the beach singing our anthem to Patagonia. See the graves of many descendants in Gaiman, including the grave of Kate Jones of course, who inspired the story and was the muse of our director Tim Baker.

Crossing the prairie then for our final two shows in Esquel and Trevelin, with the same warm and special welcome, and the response just as powerful and emotional, with tears flowing from all

corners on the final night when the descendents of the first cohort were asked to stand at the end of the show. They and everyone else were given a round of applause, which I thought would never stop, before everyone joined together to sing Hen Wlad fy Nhadau. We are so grateful to the communities of Esquel and Trevelin.

Not only was it the end of the road in Esquel and Trevelin but we were also returning two of their sons. We are extremely grateful to the families of Mike Winter and Ryan Lloyd for their warm welcome and their huge support towards the project whilst in Esquel and Trevelin. We are also thankful to both families for the privilege of meeting and working with their sons. They are two kind, gracious, mature and able young men. Two young men who we hope will be friends for life. Thank you Mike and Ryan!

So what next? Well, with thanks to the Welsh community in Trelew, Porth Madryn, Gaiman, Esquel and Trefelin, there is talk of returning there to recount more of their history. I really do hope that happens. The history and message conveyed by this drama struck a chord with each and every one of us and, as we headed home, we all hoped that we had sparked some kind of revival. This story began 150 years ago, when the first settlers left their homes to create a new Wales far far away. This initial cohort of approximately 150 people endured a horrendous journey lasting 60 days aboard the small clipper ship, the Mimosa. Upon arrival and finding nothing but dust and desert they chose to continue and not turn back, not give up. They irrigated the land, built schools, chapels, communities which could live, pray and love in their own language, the Welsh language, in a place called Patagonia.

And this is the whole purpose of the initiative by Clwyd Theatr Cymru and the Urdd in my opinion. Holding up a mirror through art to the Welsh in Wales and the Welsh in Patagonia so that we can continue on with the journey and appreciate the importance of securing the future of the language. A network has now been established between Clwyd Theatr Cymru and the Urdd with the entire Welsh society in Patagonia, and it is through this relationship and network that the work may continue. The initiative shown by the first settlers and the generations that followed must be celebrated every day, and those of us here now must continue with that. As written by Tim Baker: "The initiative must continue, we must succeed, we cannot fail!"

I would like to end by also thanking the incredible team at Clwyd Theatr Cymru for their work bringing this show to life. Thanks to Alex Robertson for his stage design and to the design and manufacturing department for their work. A special thanks also to the costume department at Clwyd Theatr Cymru. Thanks to the technical team at the Theatre who accompanied us on the journey, Cassey driver and Tom Biglin. And a huge thanks to the coordinator of the 'Theatre for Young People' department, Nerys Edwards, for her unrelenting work.

I would also like to personally thank my fellow actors, Hanna Jarman, Tom Blumberg and Bethany Gwyn, for an incredible and emotional five months, and to all the youngsters for working with us.

I would like to end with the words of Tim Baker which resonated with each and every one of us as cast members and also audience members on this incredible journey, in Mold, Anglesey, Pontypridd, Merthyr, Meifod, Mwldan, Felinfach, Liverpool, Builth Wells. From Caernarfon to Gaiman, Trelew to Trevelin, Porth Madryn to Esquel.

"Dyfodol, Rhyddid, Gobaith, Ffydd!" (Future, Liberty, Hope, Faith)

2014 Recommendations : A Progress Report

1) Support efforts to establish and sustain bilingual primary education in Gaiman and Trevelin.

The Scheme has certainly been central to efforts in this crucial area.

2) Build on the significant progress achieved in 2014 and all the interest ignited by the 2015 celebrations in order to increase numbers at all levels. The marketing approaches used this year should continue.

Once again a number of learners progressed and during a busy year.

3) Work with the local and federal government in order to access more Spanish medium schools.

Progress has been seen in the Andes mainly due to the revival of second language lessons in School 24 Esquel. This work could definitely be developed in the future but not at the expense of bilingual schools.

4) Continue to offer bitesize courses which are open to the public and in workplaces in order to create and develop new audiences.

These courses were very successful once again and in the section on Welsh for Adults it is shown that they led to a significant number of learners at Entry level once again.

5) Reinforce and increase numbers on Welsh for Adults courses at Foundation and especially Intermediate level.

This has happened - see page 7

6) Help to promote and maintain Connecting Classrooms partnerships and seek to establish a new partnership between the Andes and a school in Wales. The lack of funding available to send teachers to observe in Wales is a blow to the scheme. However, these partnerships can be used in order to achieve this aim.

A Connecting Classrooms partnership was created between Ysgol Gymraeg y Gaiman and Ysgol Gymraeg Aberystwyth.

7) Historically, due to the generosity of the Argentine Welsh Society and a charitable fund it has been possible for many decades to send Welsh learners to Wales each year to attend a Cardiff University Welsh for Adults Centre Summer Course, as well as sending teachers over to observe - see point 6 above.

The importance of this cannot be overemphasised. Almost 60 people have attended the Summer Course over the last decade and approximately 80% of native Welsh teachers have learnt Welsh or improved their Welsh on these courses. However, due to the economic climate, this source of funding is no longer available to us. Losing a constant flow of confident Welsh speakers returning to Y Wladfa each year would be a huge blow to the future of the Welsh language here. As a result, and in the face of a lack of additional funding in the foreseeable future, the local committees will need to consider local fundraising initiatives, as was arranged at the start of the Scheme, in order to contribute to securing this important tradition.

From 2016 onwards, due to exceptional work by members of the Society, it is hoped that scholarships may be offered to two or three students to study in Cardiff. It should also be noted that one learner won a scholarship offered by Aberystwyth University to attend a Welsh course in July 2015.

2015 Recommendations

- 1) Children. Support crucial primary developments in the Valley and the Andes. During 2016 there will be a primary expert in the Valley to assist Ysgol Gymraeg y Gaiman.
- 2) Funding. The recommendations found in the 2013 annual report referred to the funding crisis faced by the Scheme. This situation is ongoing. For 10 years or more, the Scheme has been in receipt of the same levels of funding and in a country where inflation is around 30%. It is a miracle that numbers continue to rise, with that in mind, but this rise will not continue unless more funding is available in order to provide a living wage for officers from Wales to go over there and to compensate all the local tutors reasonably. Officers cannot currently serve communities such as Madryn and Comodoro Rivadavia sufficiently due to all the activities taking place in the Valley. The Scheme could grow and develop in these areas but another office will be required. For a relatively small cost, this could make a big difference to the future of the Welsh language in Y Wladfa.
- 3) Welsh for Adults. Since targeting this important area at a strategic level numbers have risen significantly. All the celebrations in 2015 have attracted a new audience and have reminded old audiences of their roots. As a result of this and the Scheme's strategic efforts, there are more adult learners this year than ever before and, for the first time, learners sat WJEC examinations at all levels. However, we must not rest on our laurels. Steps must be taken to ensure that learners move from one level to the next, especially in 2016 between Pre-entry and Entry (Wlpan 1) and from Intermediate to Advanced.
- 4) Observations and Learning Scholarships. In 2016 one teacher will observe in primary schools in Wales and this work needs to continue. Funding must also be sought to send learners on intensive courses in Wales.
- 5) Partnerships. Educational expertise and resources are required within the primary sector in order to ensure the success of the new schools. This can only be achieved by creating strategic partnerships.
