CAMPAIGNS

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Methodology

Battleground Survey of 1600 Likely 2016 Voters in 4 competitive presidential battleground states.

This survey took place September 10-19. Respondents who voted in the 2012 election, 2014 election, or registered since the 2014 election were selected from the national voter file. Likely voters were determined based on stated intention of voting in 2016. Data shown in this deck is among all 2016 likely voters unless otherwise noted. Margin of error for the full sample = +/-2.45 percentage points at 95% confidence. Margin of error will be higher among subgroups.

Respondents were divided equally among states (n=400) of North Carolina, Nevada, Ohio, and Pennsylvania. Margin of error for each state sample= +/-4.90 percentage points at 95% confidence. Margin of error will be higher among subgroups.

Fifty one percent of respondents were reached by cell phone, in order to account for ever-changing demographics and accurately sample the full electorate in each state.

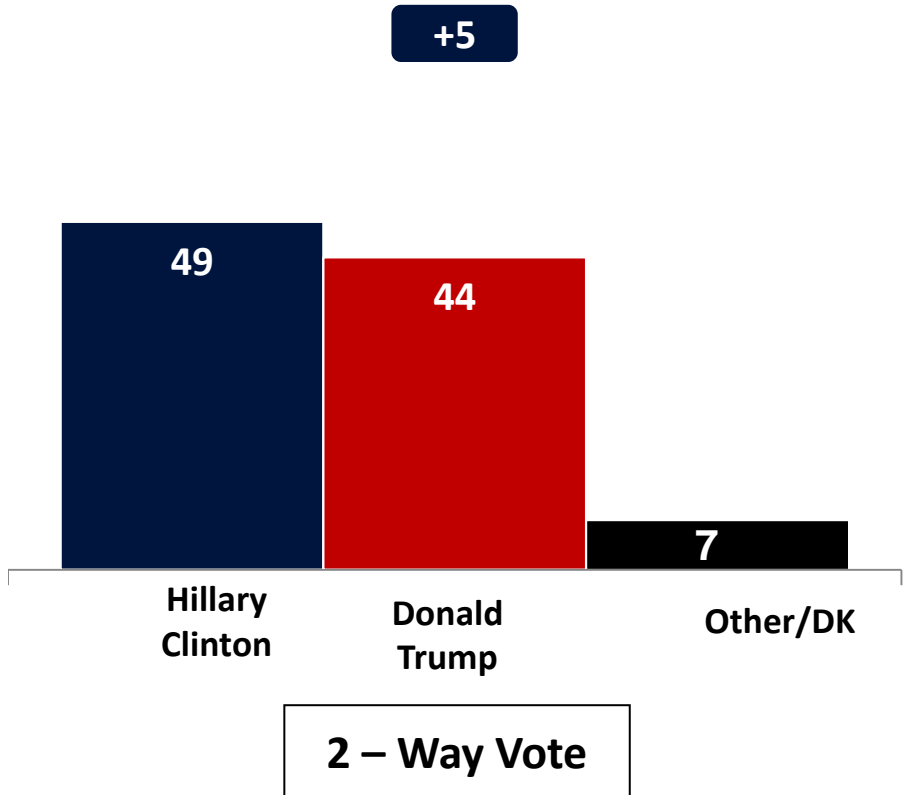
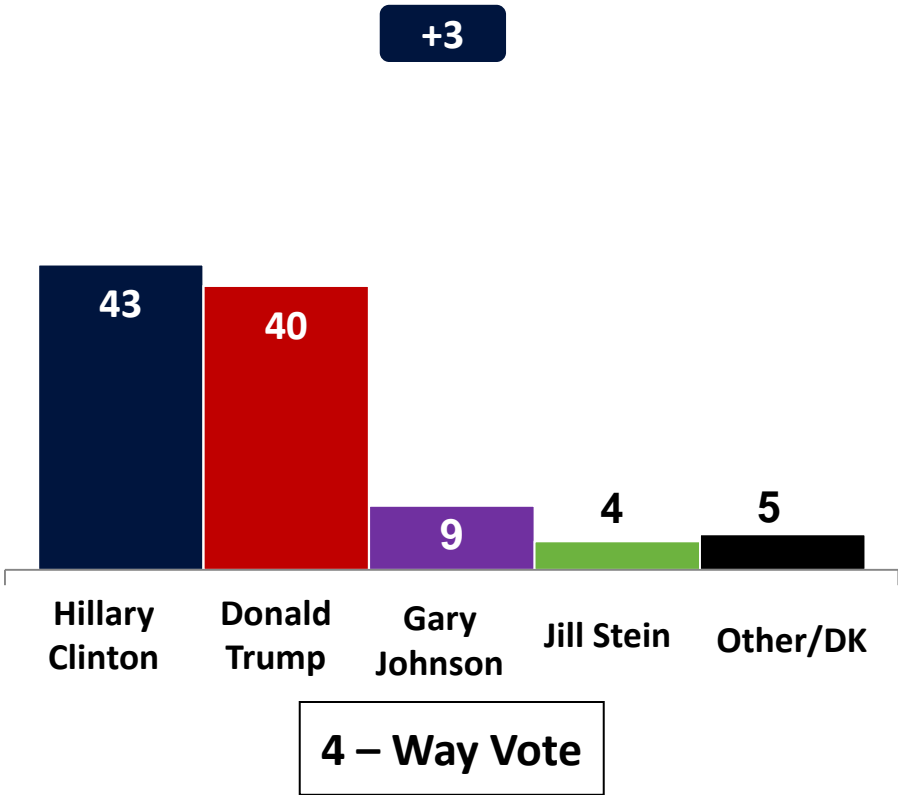
Regression analysis.

A series of fractional logistic regressions were conducted to obtain the marginal effects of the explanatory variable (presidential vote) on outcome variables (associations, statement pairs), representing the change in outcome probabilities estimated for the explanatory variable, all else held equal. No causation is implied by these results.

Clinton leads Trump across the battleground

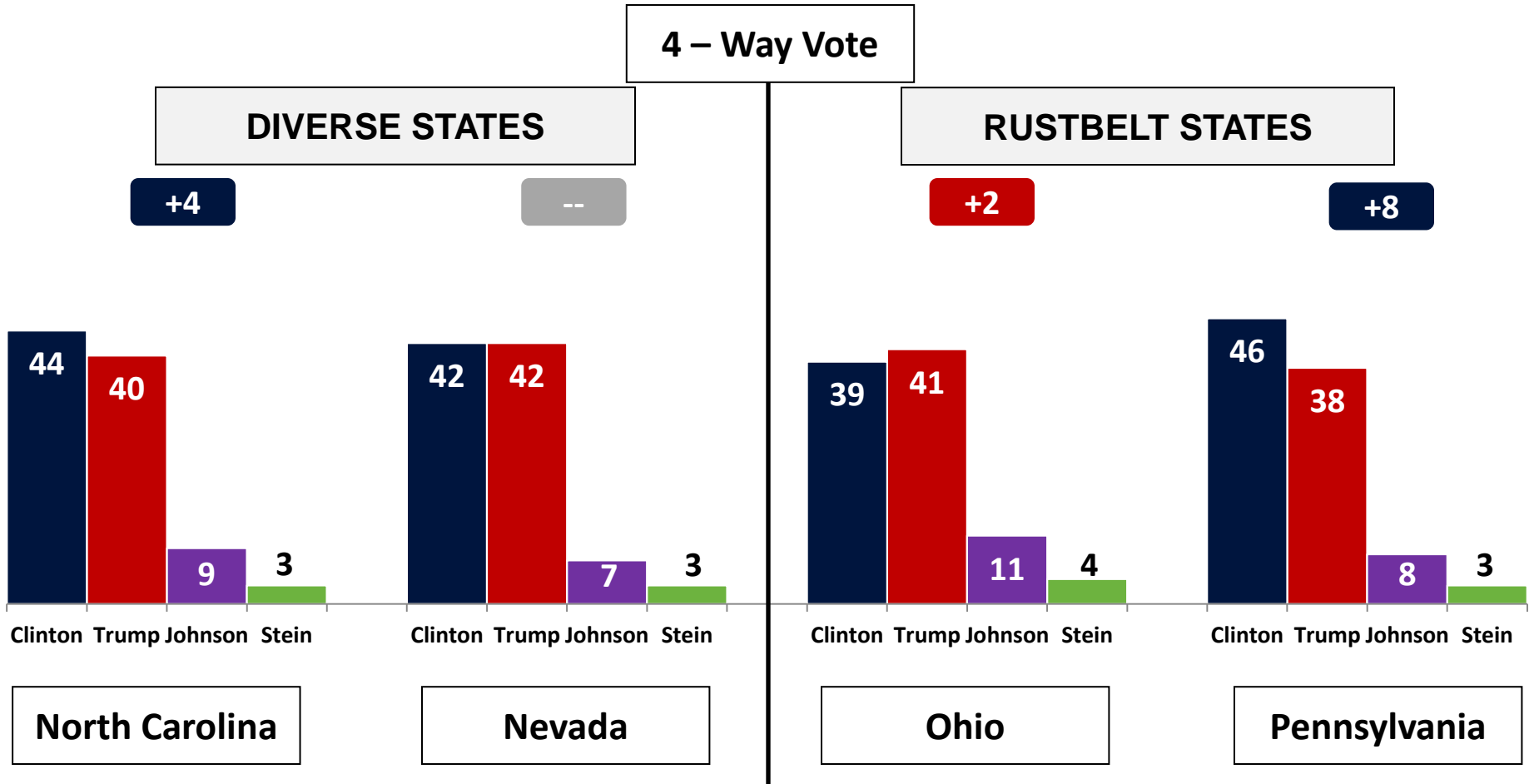

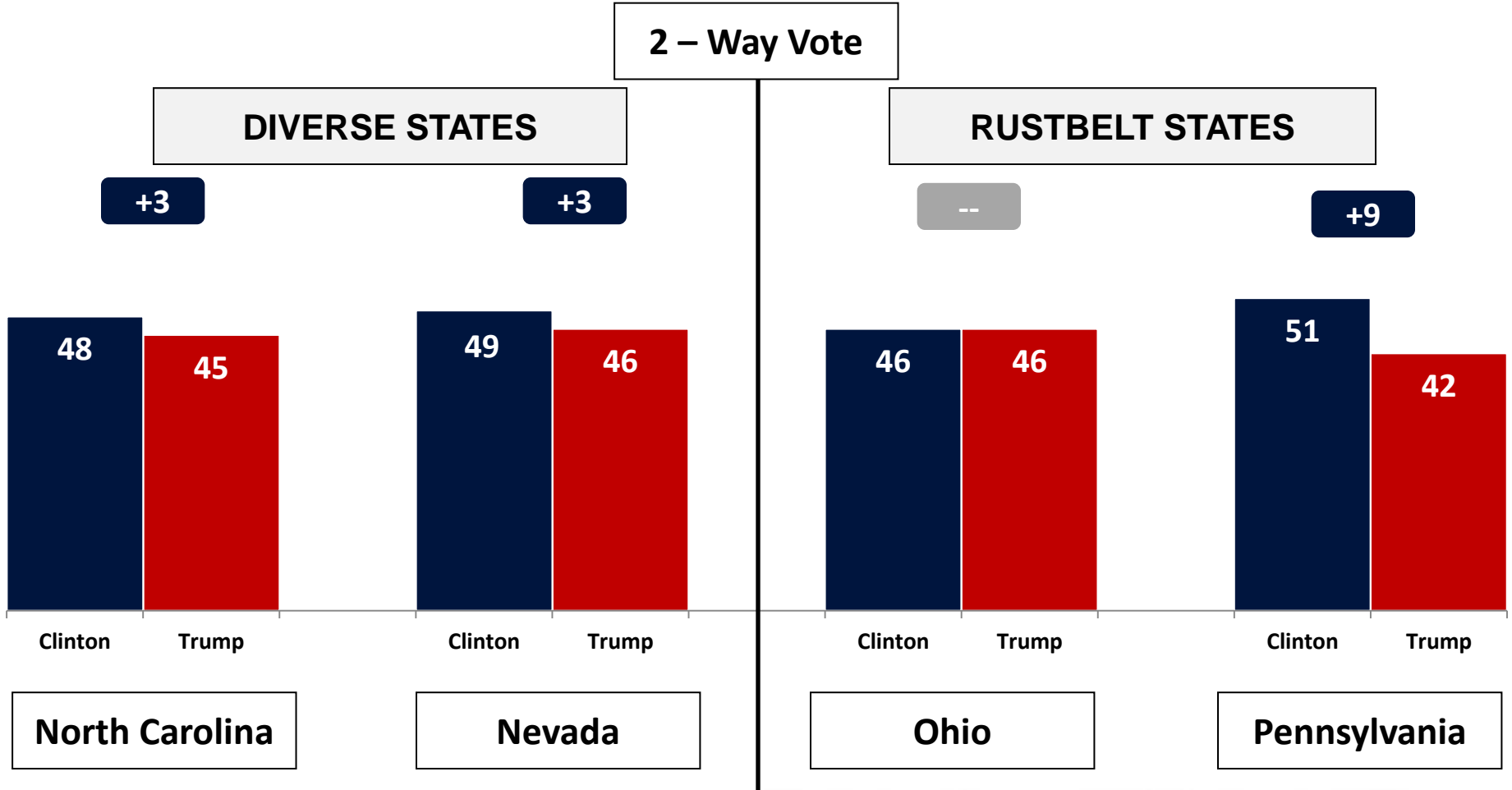

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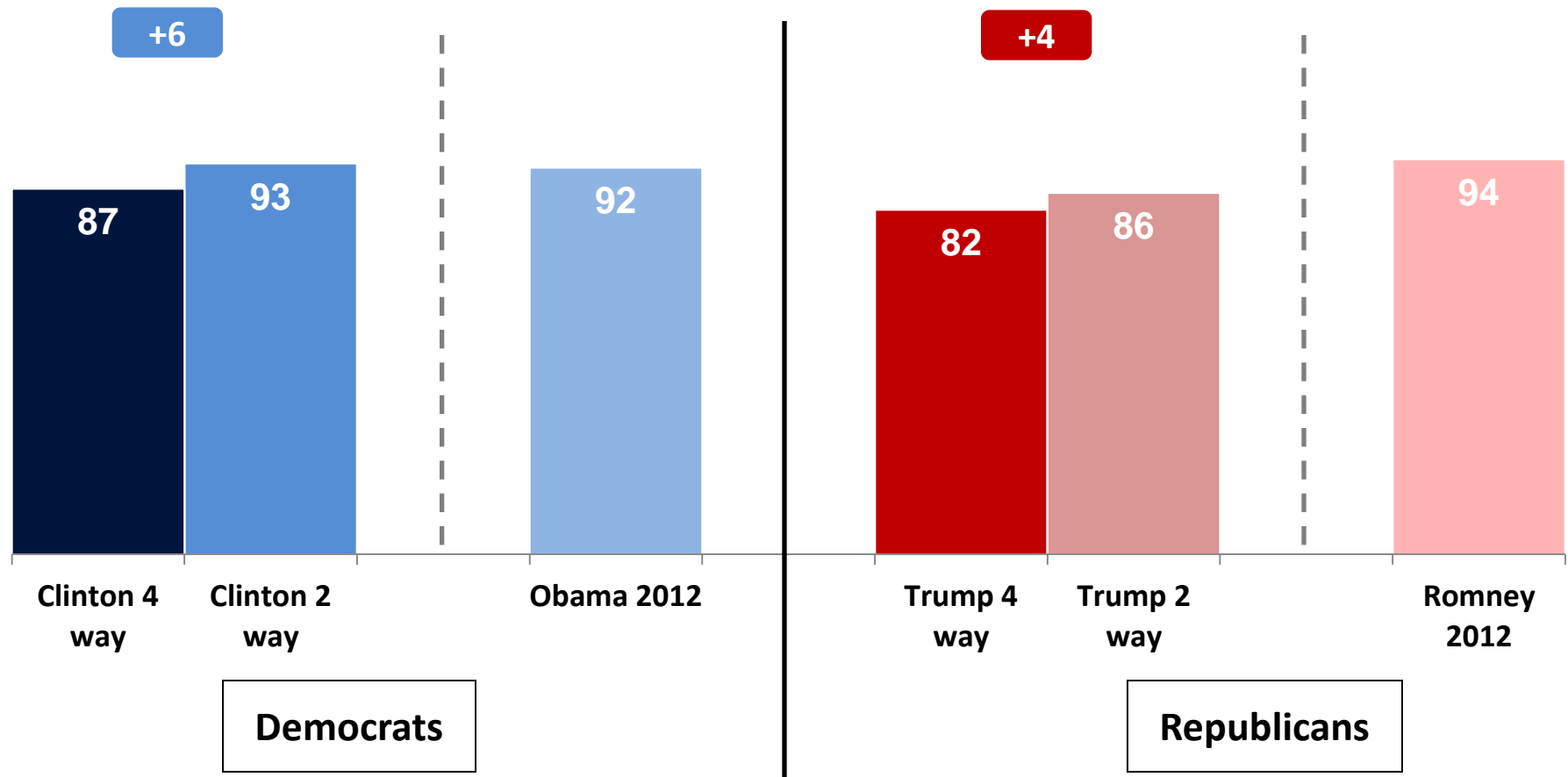
In the two-way ballot, Clinton edges ahead in Nevada

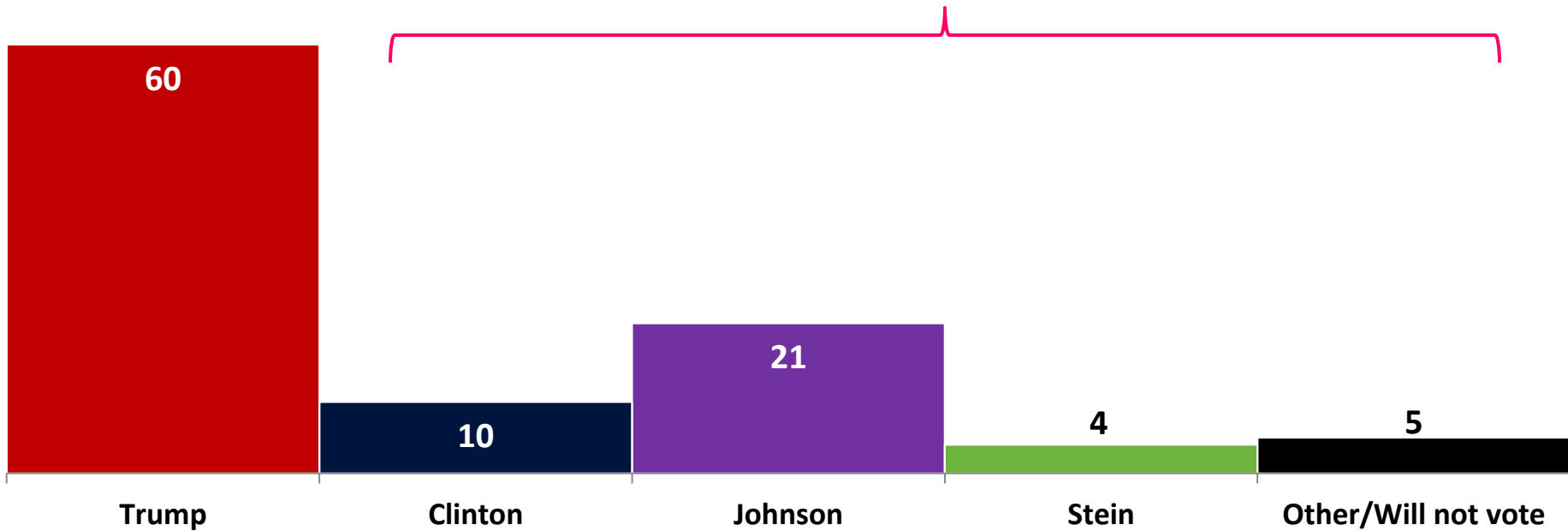

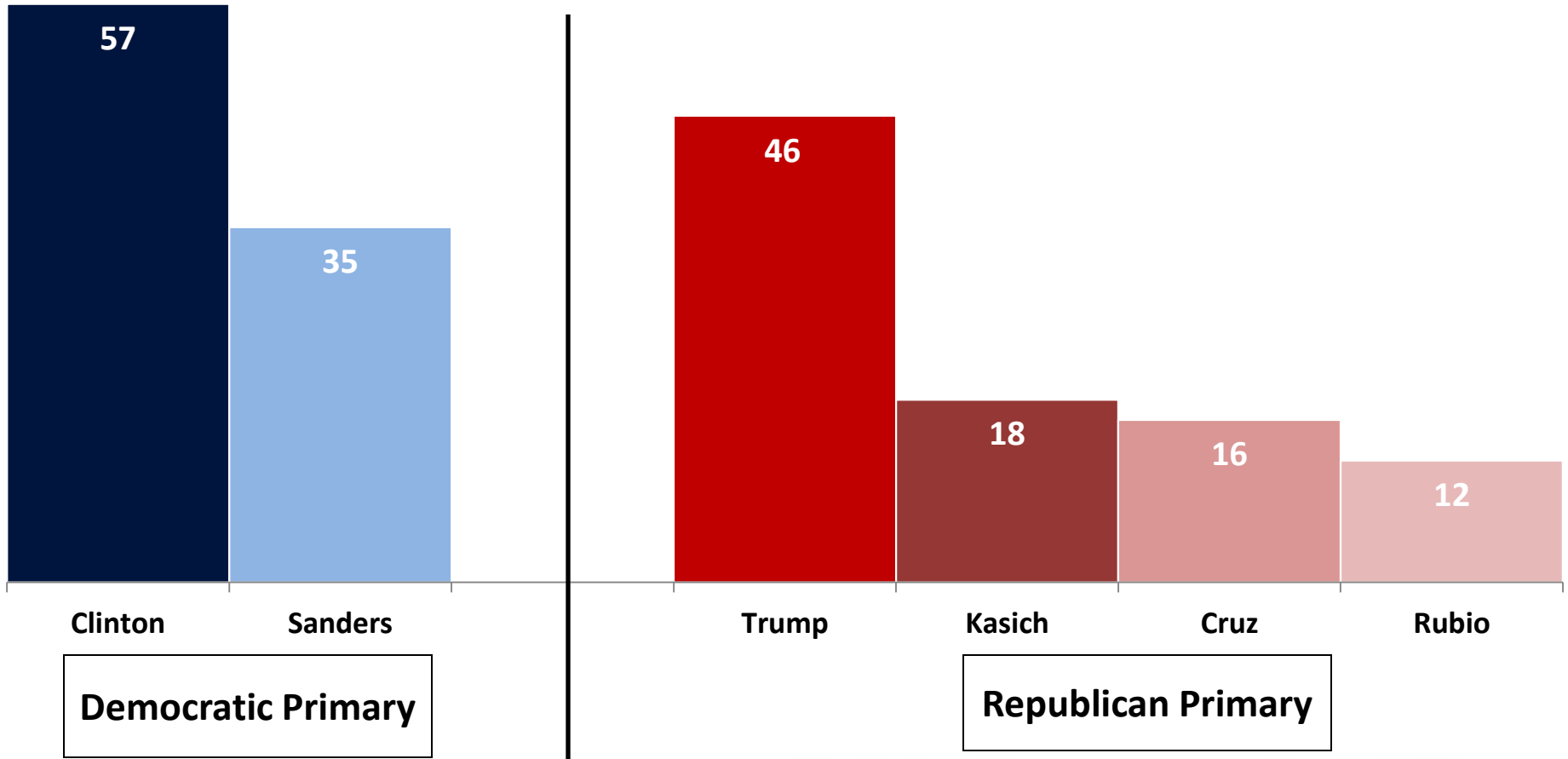

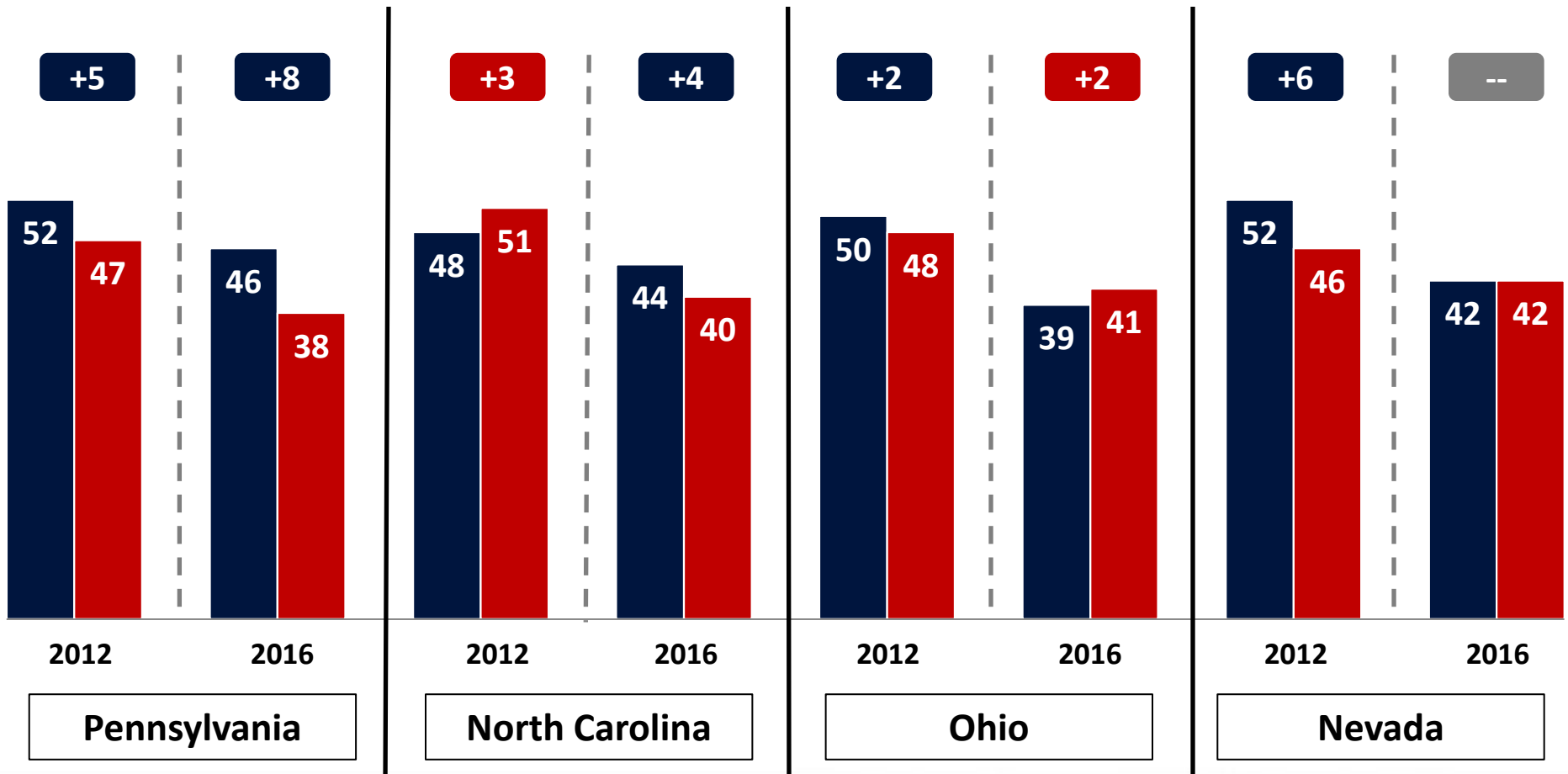
In the race to select a Democratic nominee for president, in the end, have you supported -- Hillary Clinton or Bernie Sanders?

In the race to select a Republican nominee for president, in the end, have you supported..



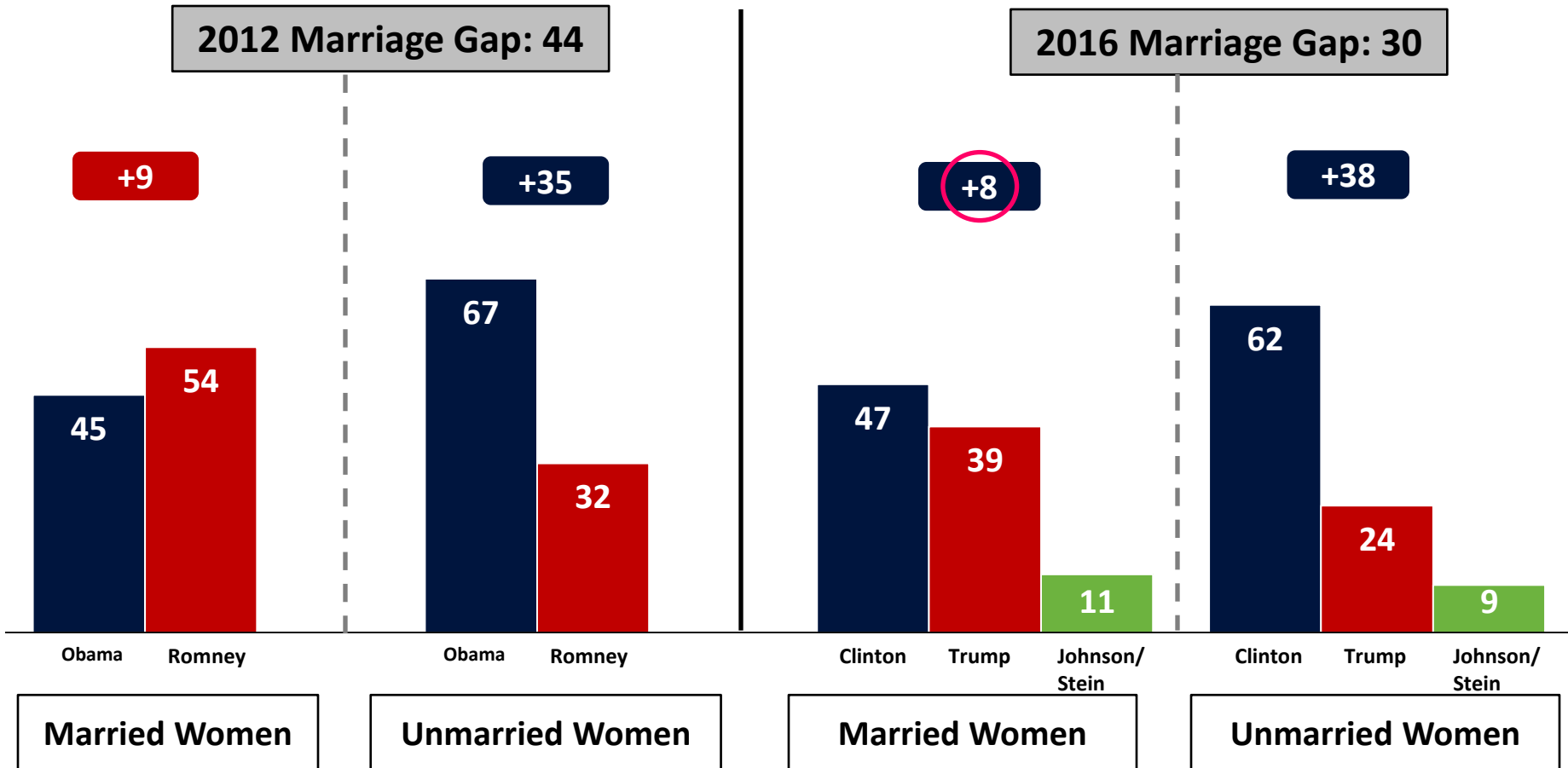
Clinton running better than Obama in Pennsylvania and North Carolina, but not Ohio or Nevada

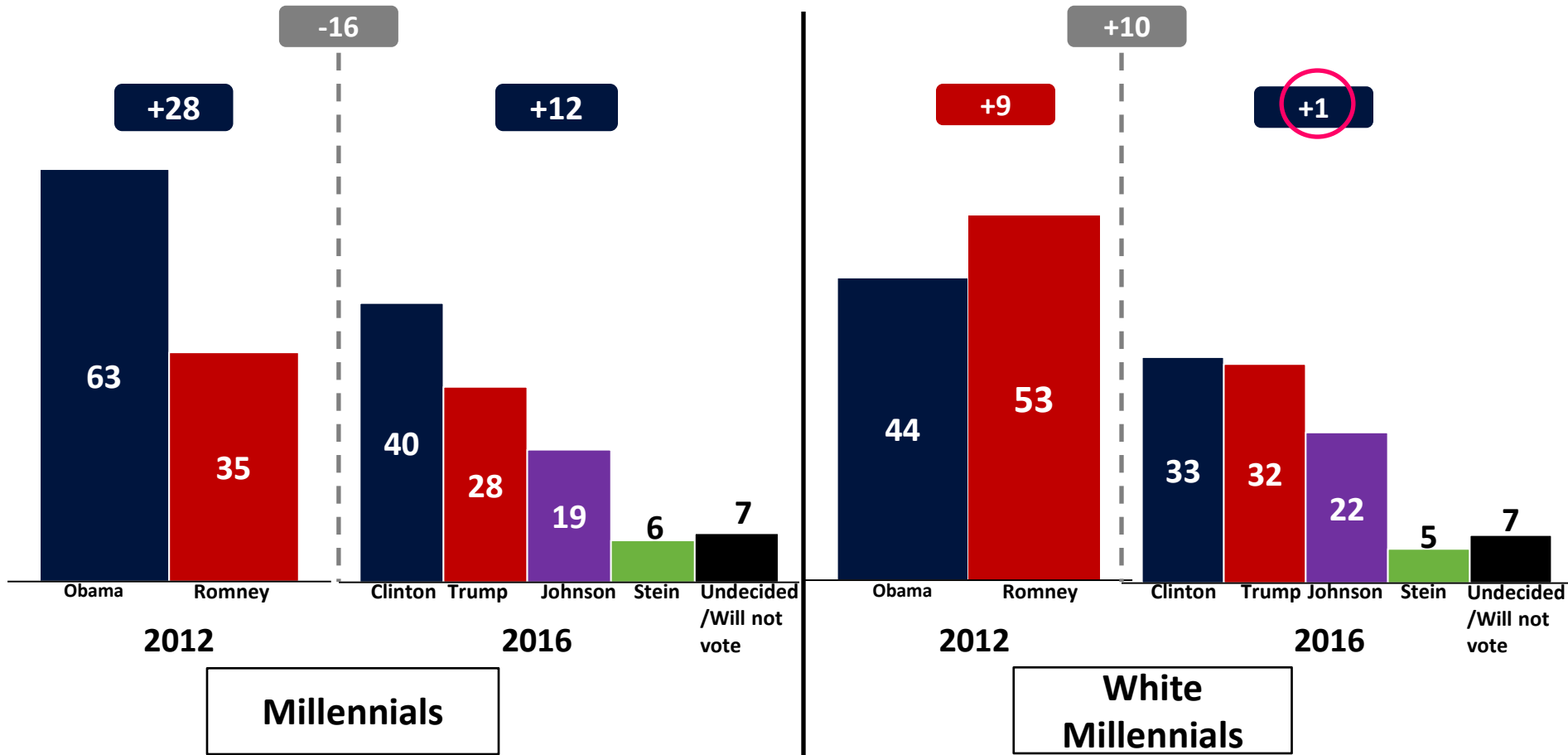
Unmarried women are driving the Clinton women vote and dramatically stronger than 2012

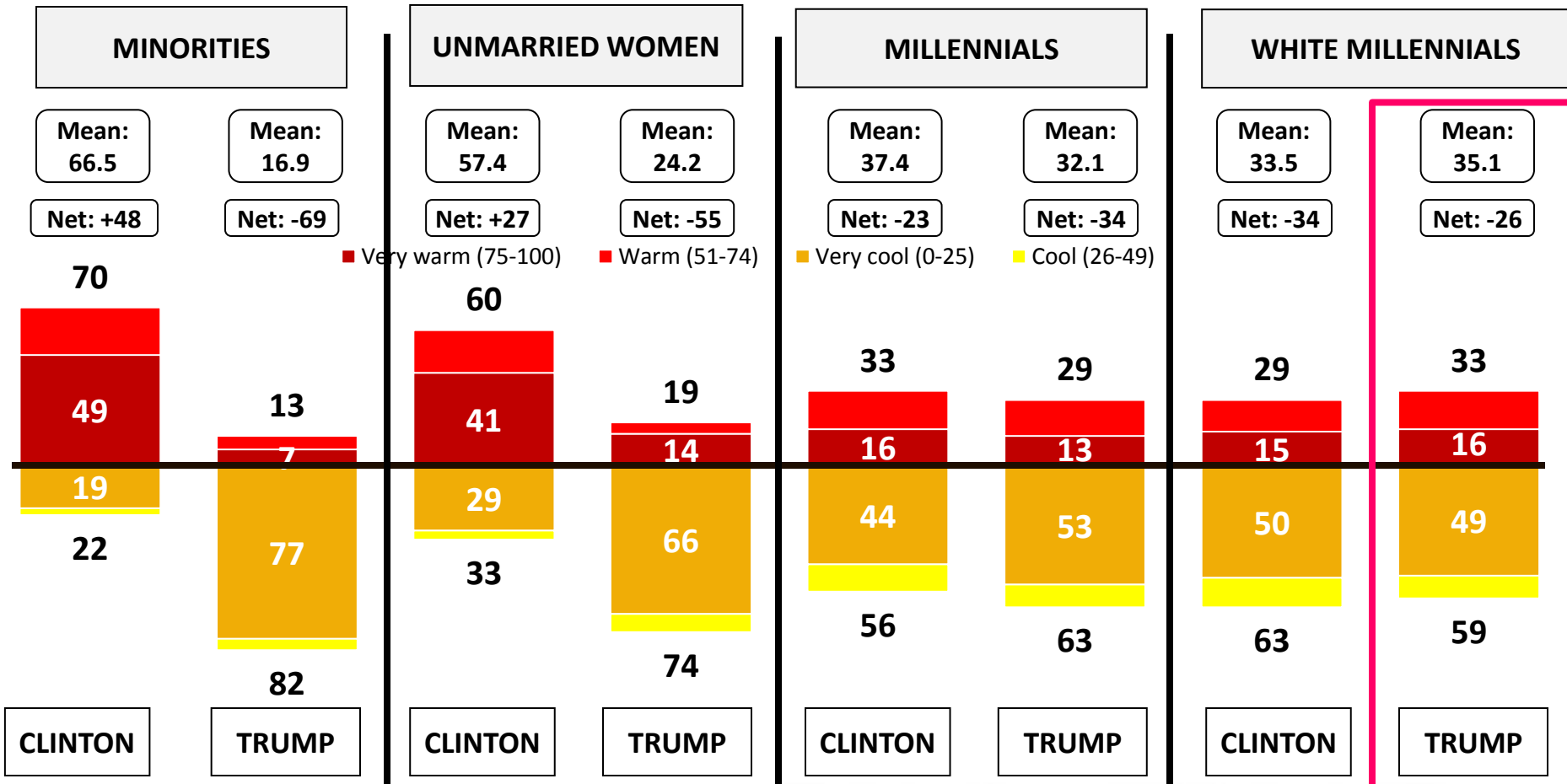

Rising HRC personal favorability with unmarried women and millennials will help in consolidation

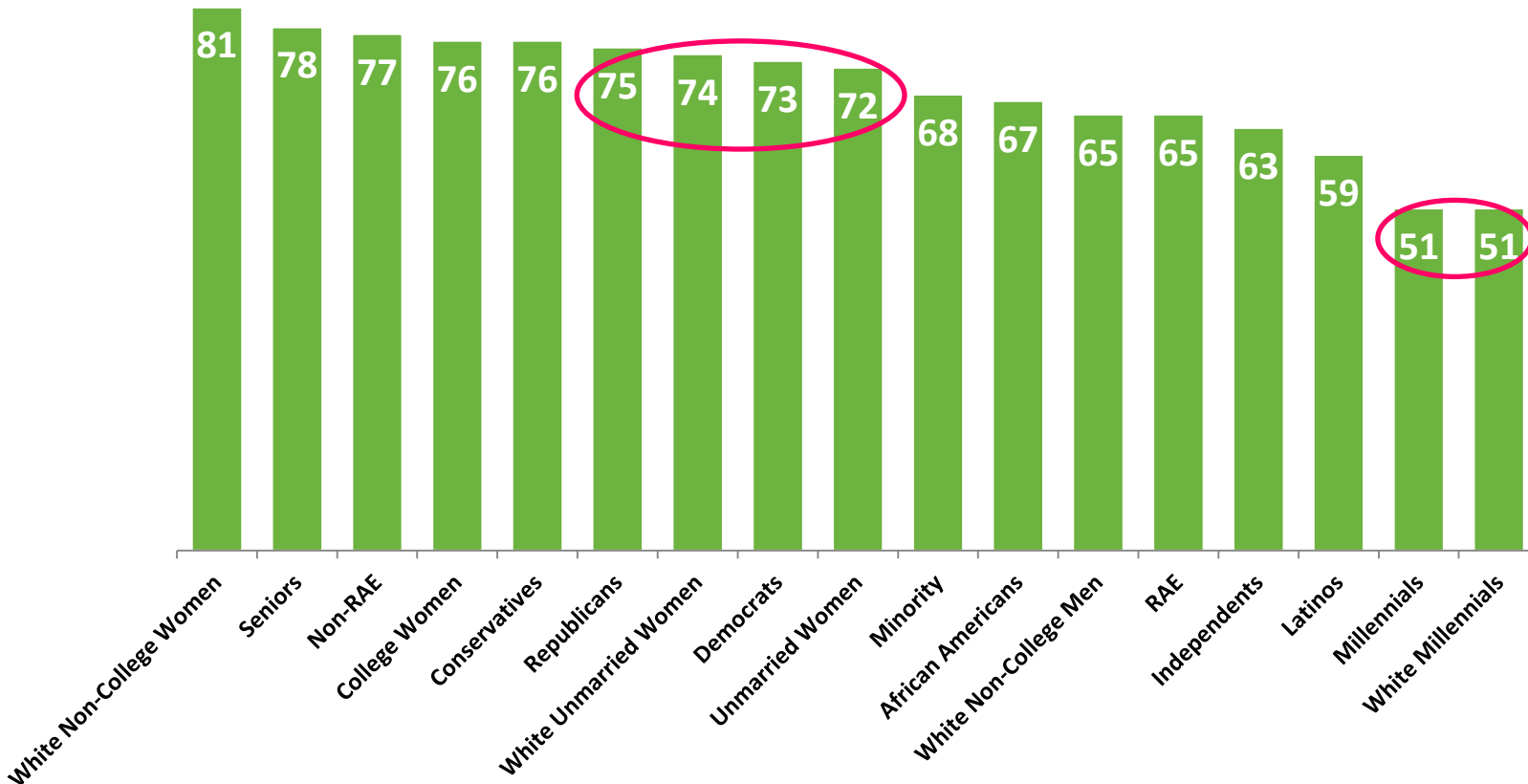

Democrats equal GOP in determination to vote, led by unmarried women, but not millennials

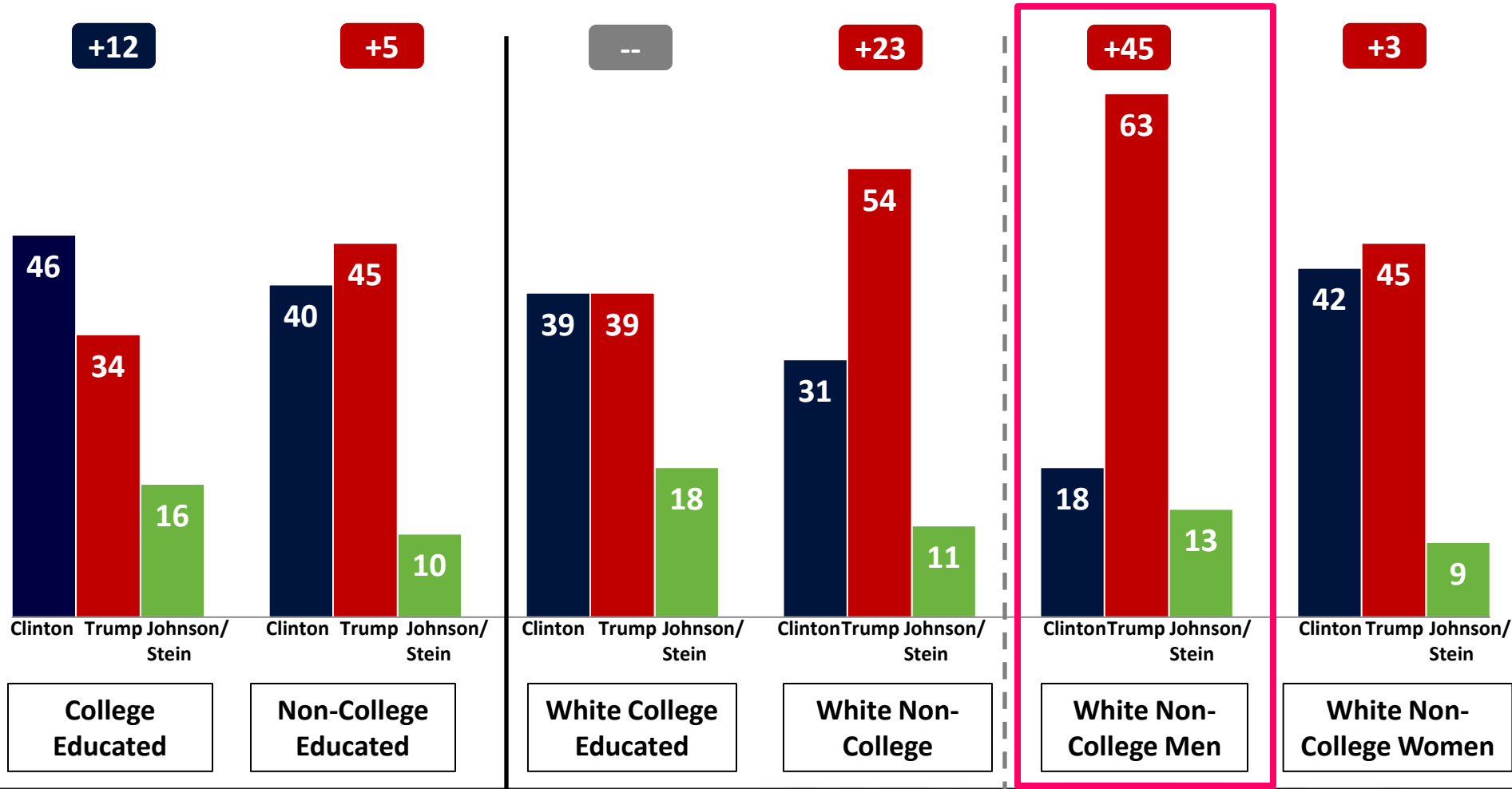

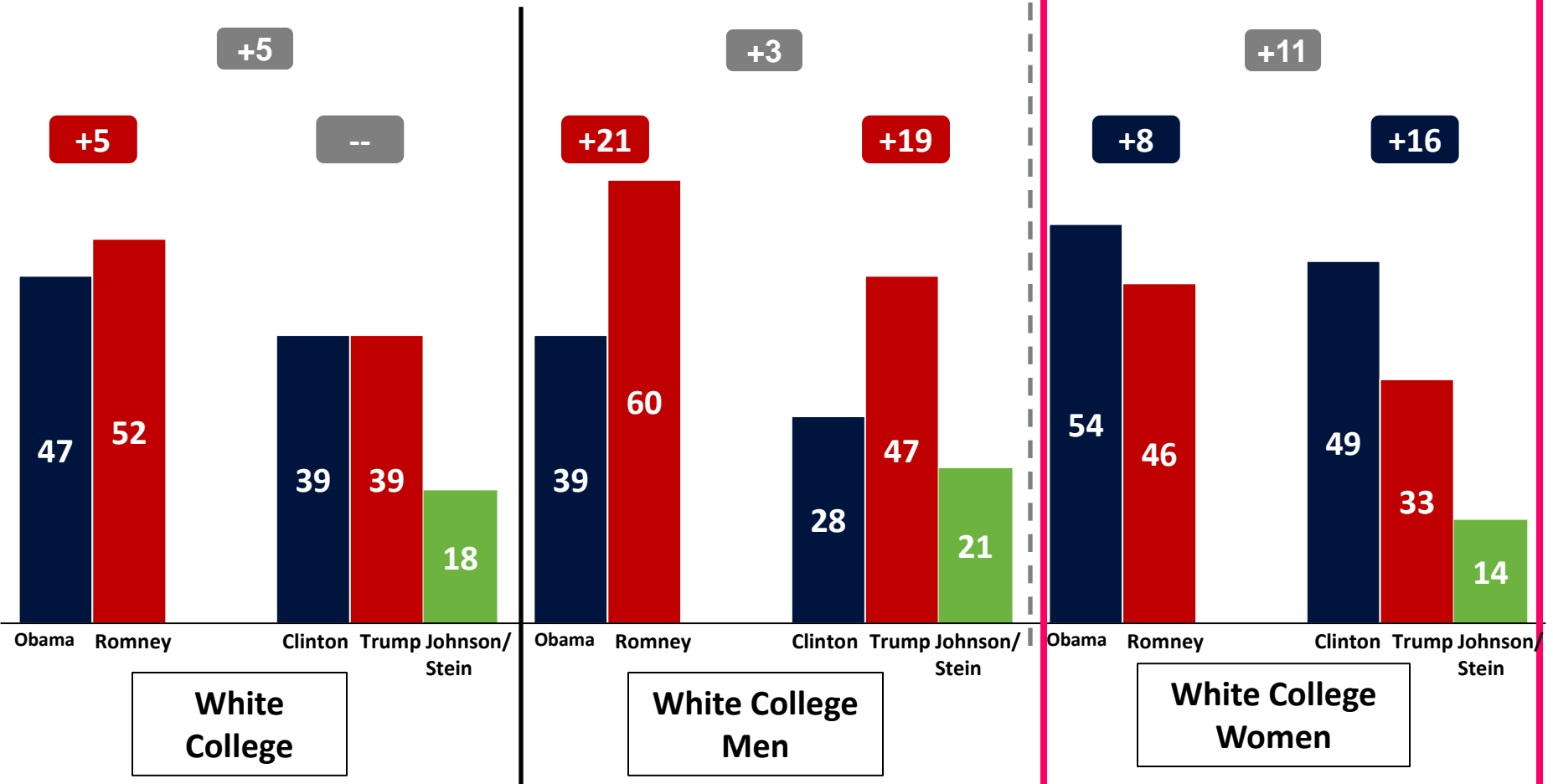

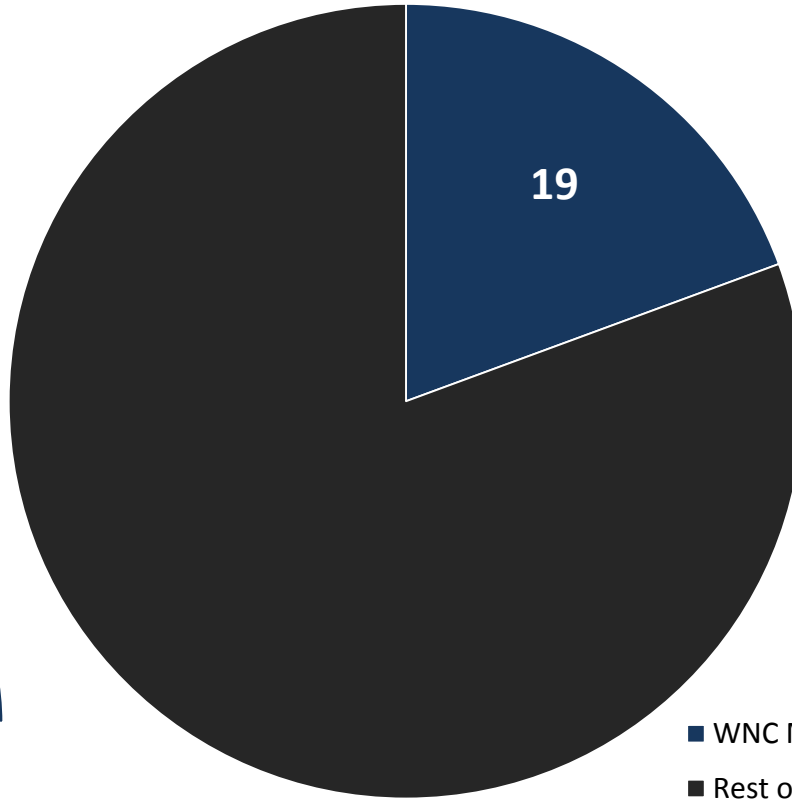

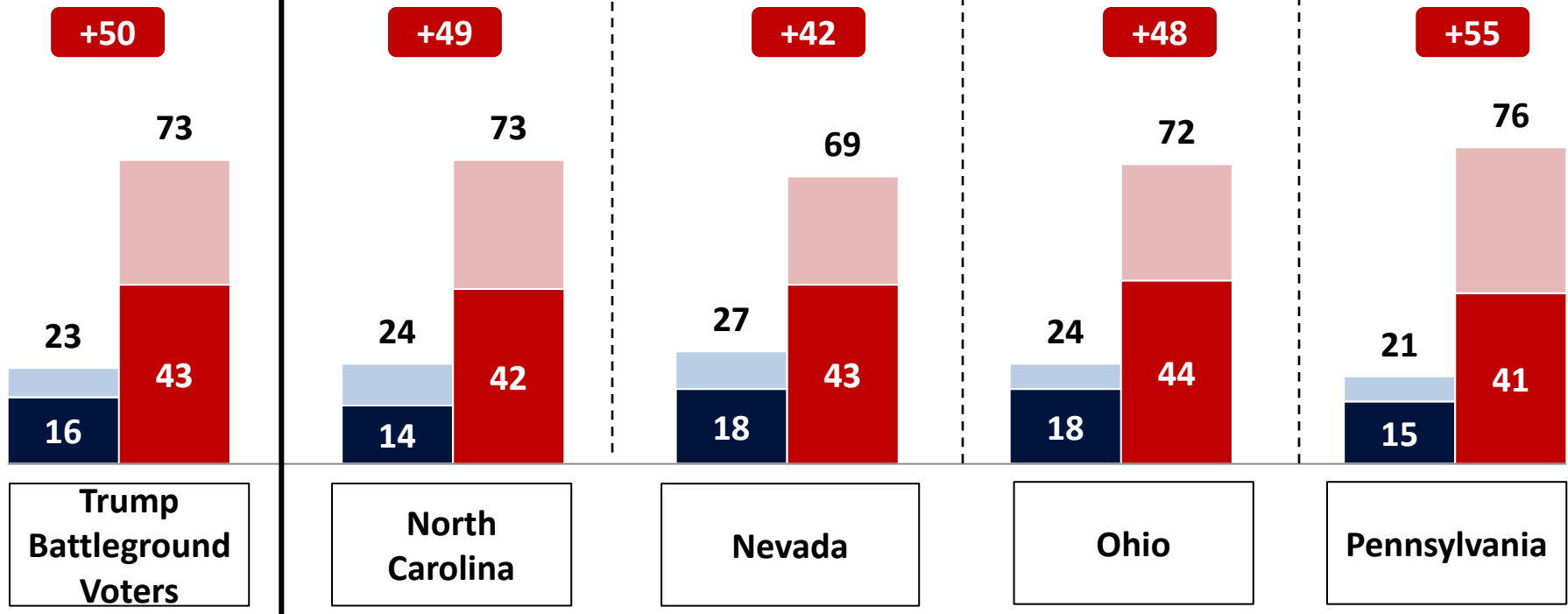

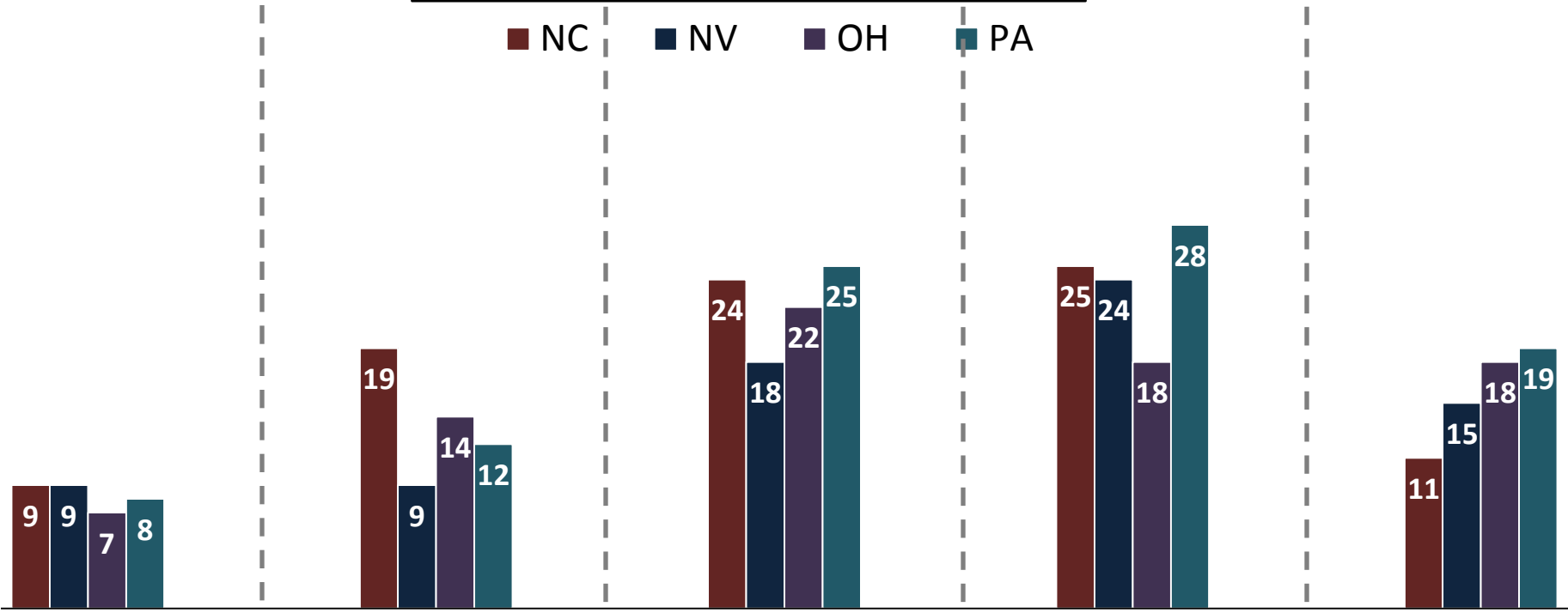

INDEPENDENT AGENDA: People ask me, what do you think about Trump? Honestly, I have my reservations. I object to his vulgarity, particularly toward women and gold star families, and I disagree with many of his proposals, including his plan to ban Muslims. But I certainly don't trust Hillary Clinton. For me, country comes first. So if Donald Trump becomes president, I'll stand up to him. And if Hillary Clinton wins, I'll hold her accountable. I'll fight for limited government, individual freedom, a strong national defense and free-market economy that works for you.

CHECK CLINTON: No matter what side you are on, the stakes couldn't be higher. If Hillary Clinton is elected president, (STATE) will need leaders who will act as a check, not a rubber stamp. Democrats won't oppose higher taxes. They won't oppose more federal spending and oppose increased debts. They won't replace Obama's failed healthcare policies. They won't stop the Supreme Court from going to liberal extremes. And they won't insist the military has the resources it needs to defend us from the many dangers we face. Republicans will.

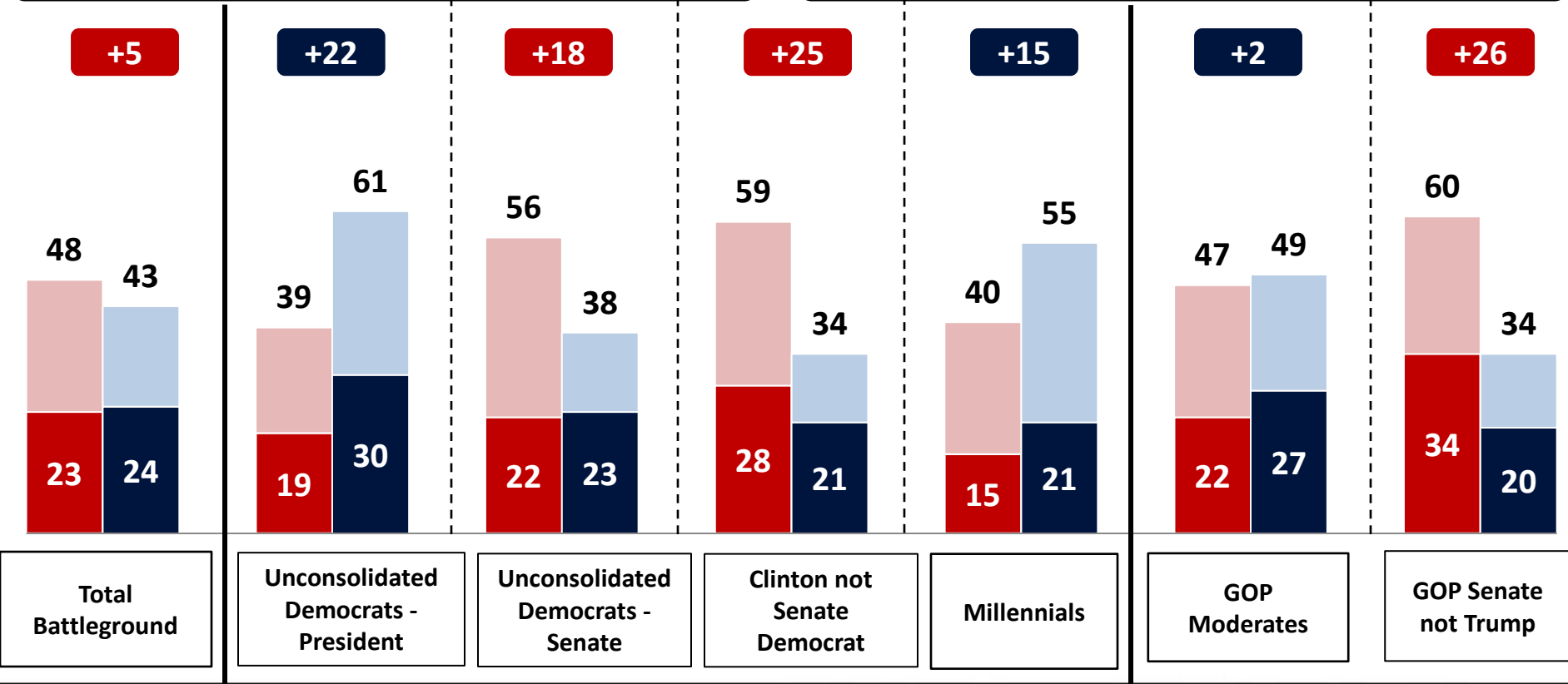

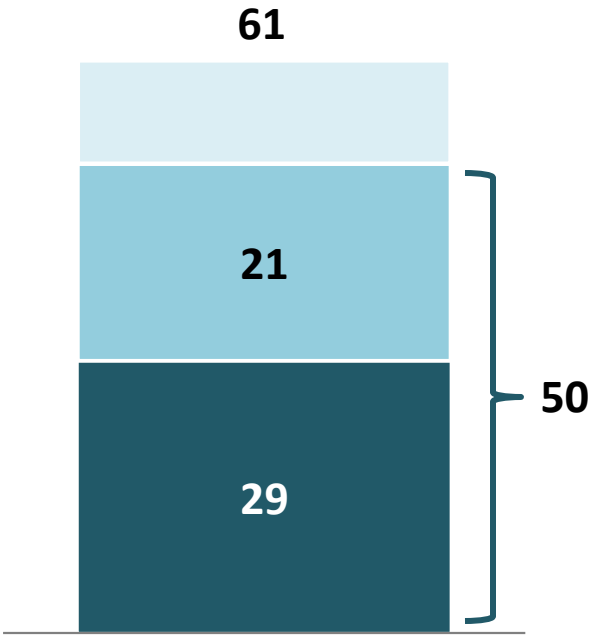

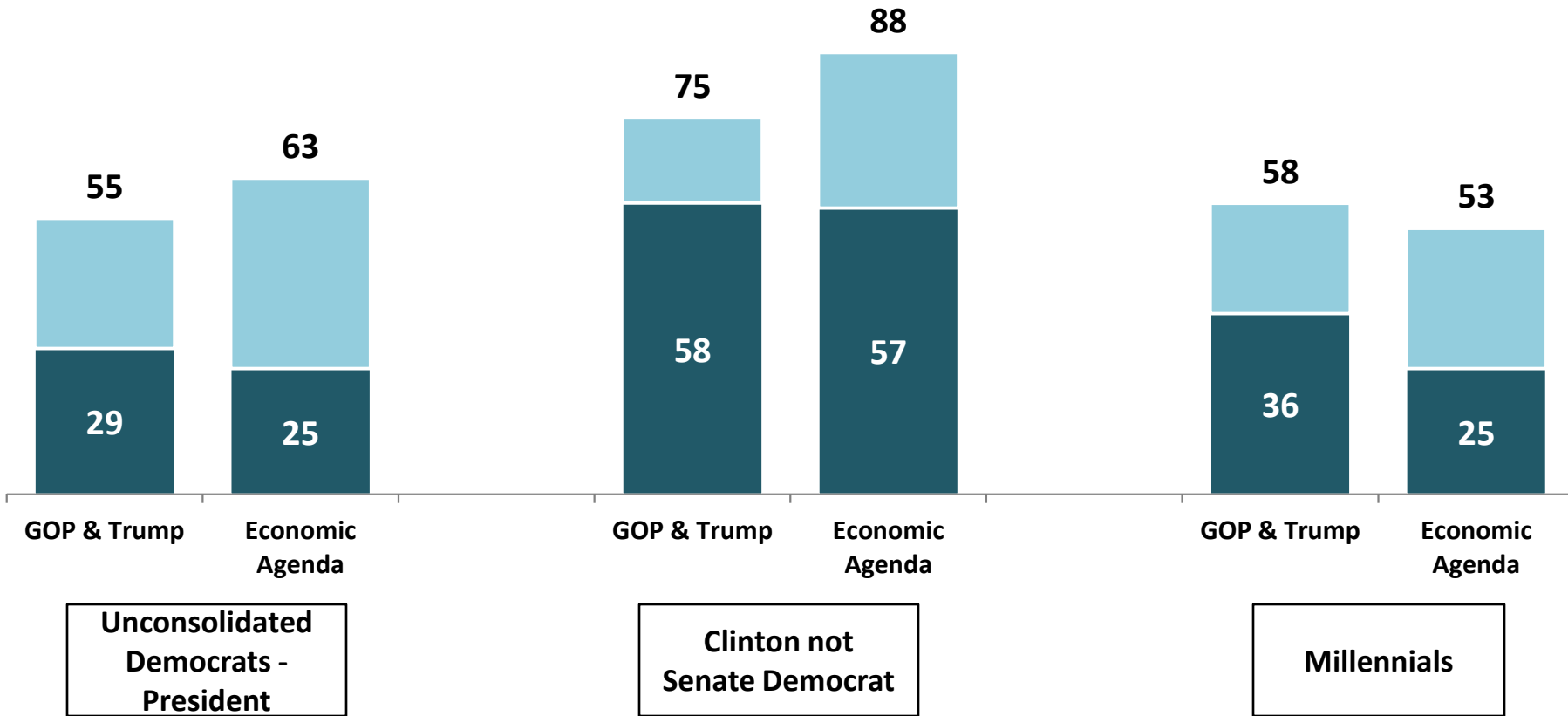


Economic agenda really moves Democratic leaning targets

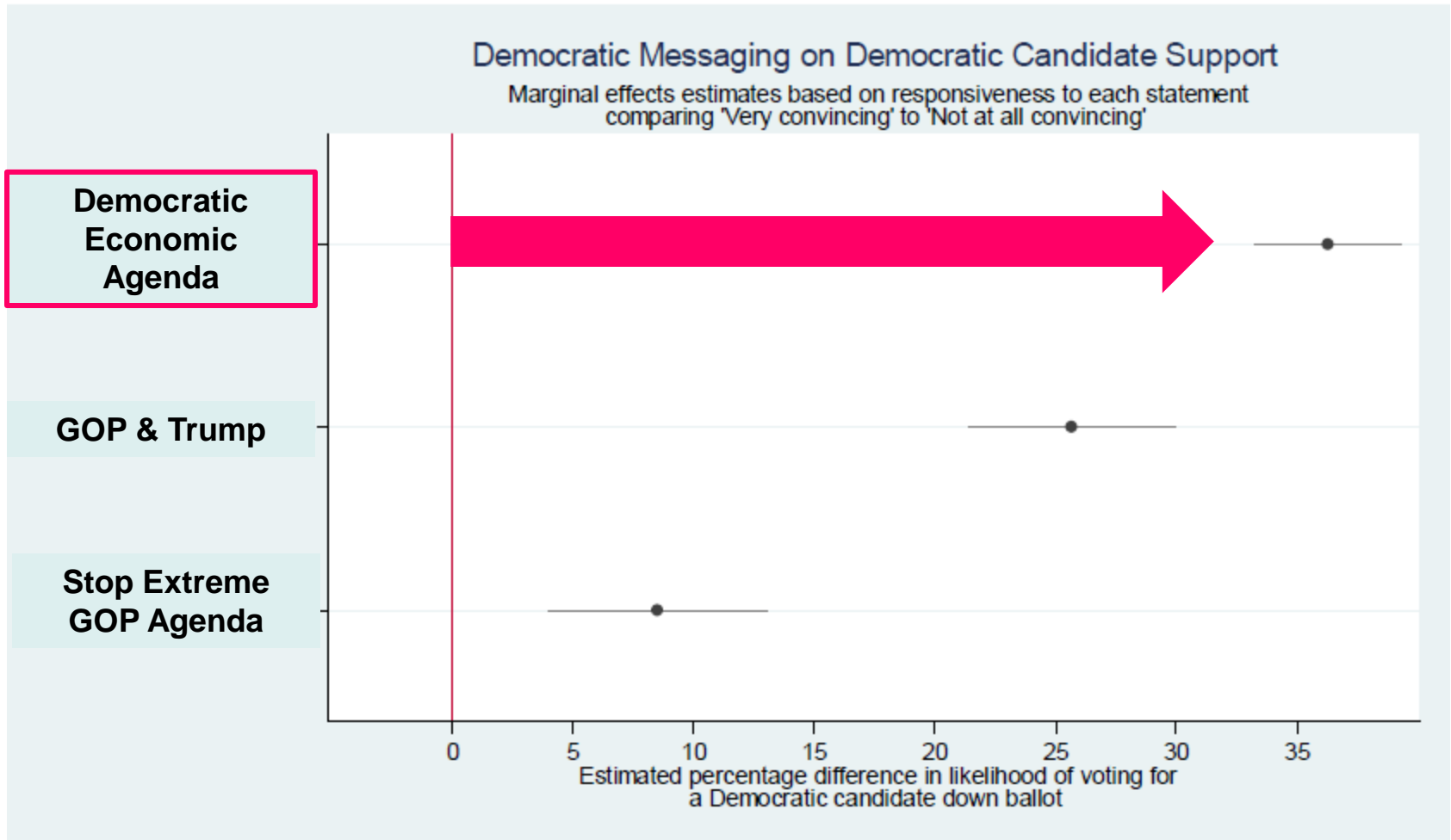

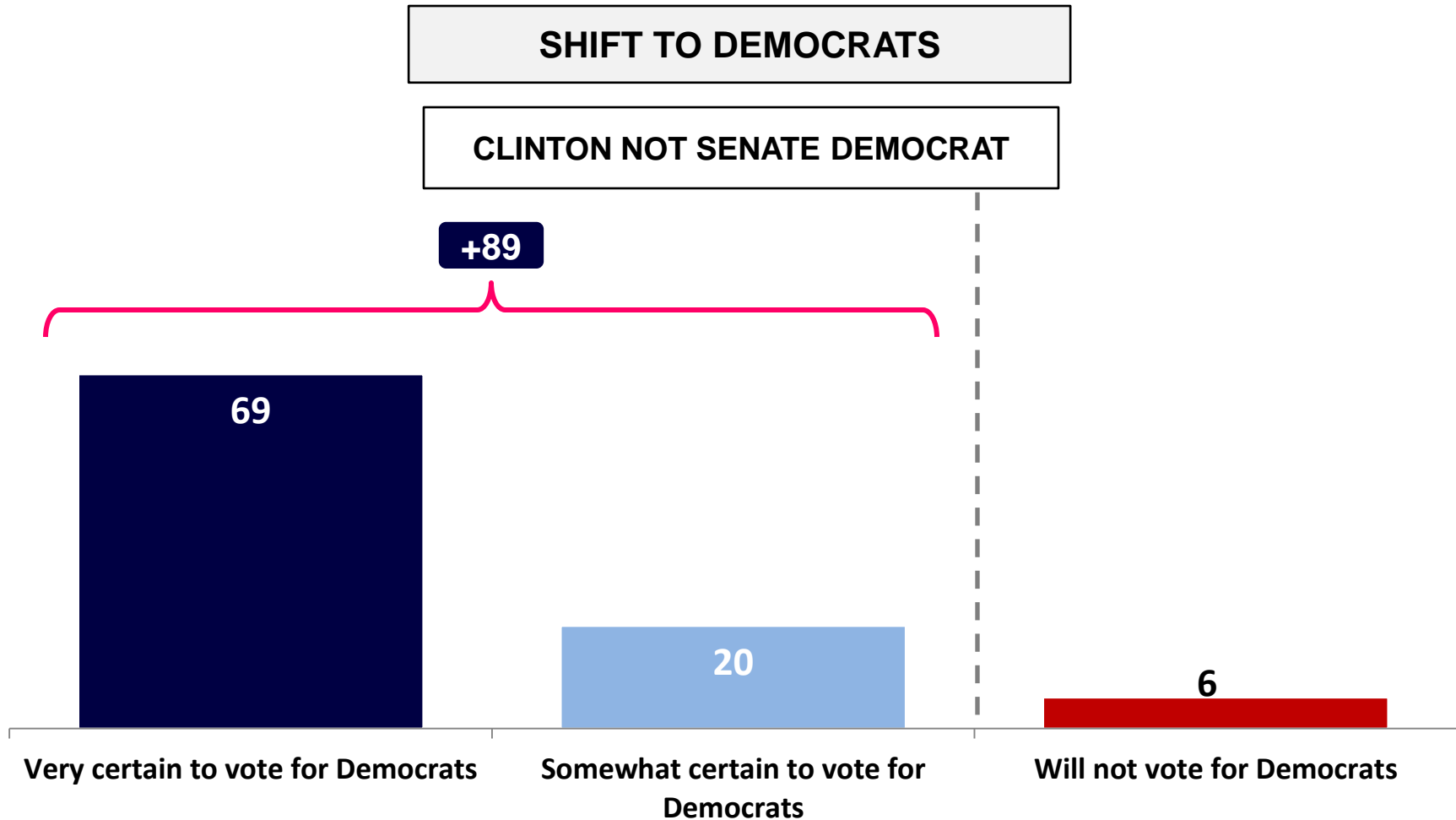

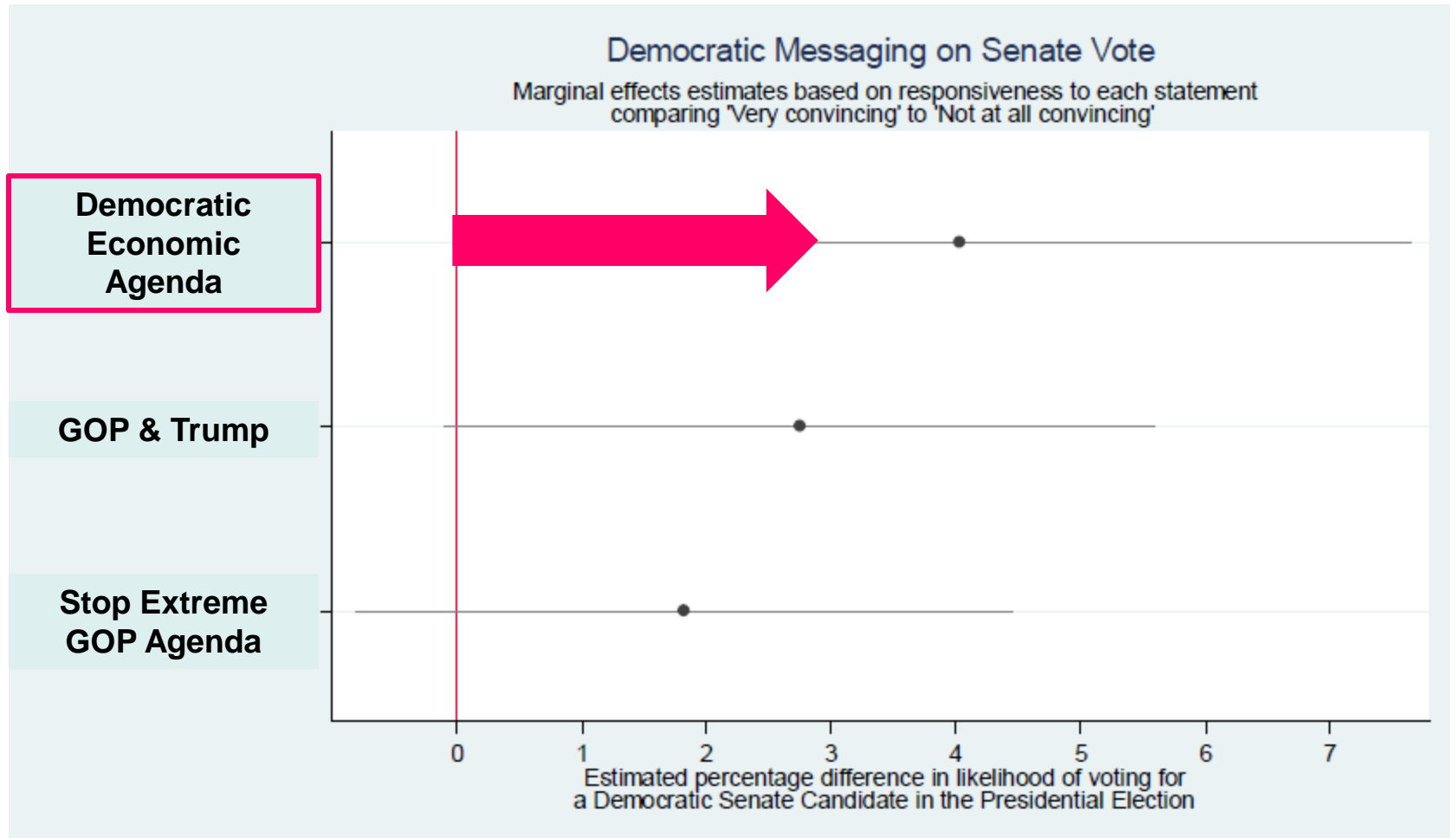


Unconsolidated voters ready to vote for Dems down-ballot
