Mission & Goals Statement of the Department of Athletics

The Georgetown University Department of Athletics, as part of a university with roots in the Jesuit tradition of education, commits itself to the comprehensive development of the student. The interdependence of the physical, emotional, moral and intellectual aspects of personal growth requires simultaneous and balanced focus. This objective does not imply that each facet of an individual's psychological, social and academic growth is of equal importance. It does require that Georgetown provide the means and encouragement for each person to develop according to his or her own interests and abilities. This is especially true in athletics, whether at the recreational, intercollegiate, intramural or instructional level. In addition to physical development, the Department of Athletics promotes principles of character, development and sportsmanship within the framework of an abiding and broadened commitment to community. Accordingly, the Athletics Department is committed to, fosters and pursues the fair and equitable treatment of both men and women, and the provision of equitable access and opportunities for minority students and institutional personnel.

NCAA Position on Gambling

The NCAA opposes all forms of legal and illegal sports wagering. Sports wagering has the potential to undermine the integrity of sports contests and jeopardizes the welfare of student-athletes and the intercollegiate community. Sports wagering demeans the competition and competitors alike by a message that is contrary to the purposes and meaning of "sport." Sports competition should be appreciated for the inherent benefits related to participation of student-athletes, coaches and institutions in fair contests, not the amount of money wagered on the outcome of the competition. For these reasons, the NCAA membership has adopted specific rules prohibiting athletics department staff members and student-athletes from engaging in gambling activities as they relate to intercollegiate or professional intercollegiate or professional sporting events.

Title IX and NCAA Peer Review

The Georgetown University Athletics Department has undergone two extensive reviews of its athletic programs: an audit by the Department of Education concerning Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972, and Georgetown's inaugural review under the NCAA's new Athletics Certification program. The Department of Education has found Georgetown's athletic programs to be in compliance with Title IX, and the University was certified by the NCAA in November of 1995 and again in 2001.

Anti-Discrimination Policy

In accordance with the requirements of Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972, and Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, and the implementing regulations promulgated under each of these federal statutes, Georgetown University does not discriminate in its programs, activities, or employment practices on the basis of race, color, national origin, sex, age or disability. The University's compliance program under these statutes and regulations is supervised by Rosemary Kilkenny, Special Assistant to the President of Affirmative Action Programs. QUICK FACTS



JOHN J. DEGIOIA UNIVERSITY PRESIDENT

For over three decades, John J. DeGioia has helped to define and strengthen Georgetown University as a premier institution for education and research. Since graduating from the University in 1979, he has served both as a senior administrator and as a faculty member. On July 1, 2001, he became Georgetown's 48th president.

As president, Dr. DeGioia is deeply committed to sustaining academic excellence at Georgetown. He has helped to recruit intellectual leaders to the faculty and secured substantial funding for scholarly research and academic programs.

Under Dr. DeGioia's leadership, the University completed in December 2003 the largest fund-raising effort in University history, the Third Century Campaign. The \$1 billion capital campaign benefited Georgetown's Main, Medical, and Law Center campuses to secure endowment funds for curriculum and faculty support, increase student financial aid, and build and renovate facilities. In 2002-2003, Dr. DeGioia oversaw the largest expansion of campus facilities, with the Southwest Quadrangle - a one million square-foot complex of student housing; study, seminar and music rooms; and a new Jesuit Community Residence - at the forefront.

Dr. DeGioia addresses broader issues in higher education as a Chair of the Board of Directors of Campus Compact and of the Forum for the Future of Higher Education. He also serves as a member of the Board of Directors for the National Association of Independent Colleges and Universities; the Board of Directors for the Association of Jesuit Colleges and Universities; the Executive Committee of the Council on Competitiveness; the Business-Higher Education Forum; the Steering Committee of the Talloires Network; the Big East Conference Executive Committee; and is a Commissioner on the Knight Commission on Intercollegiate Athletics.

To prepare young people for leadership roles in the global community, Dr. DeGioia has expanded opportunities for intercultural and interreligious dialogue, welcomed world leaders to campus, and convened international conferences to address challenging issues. He represents Georgetown at the World Economic Forum, the Council on Foreign Relations, and the U.S. National Commission for UNESCO, where he recently served as Chair of the Education Committee.

Dr. DeGioia has enhanced Georgetown's relationship with the many political, cultural, corporate, and economic resources of Washington, D.C. He serves on the Greater Washington Board of Trade and the Federal City Council. Dr. DeGioia is also a strong supporter of Georgetown's social justice initiatives that seek to improve opportunities for Washington's under-served neighborhoods.

As the first lay president of a Jesuit university, Dr. DeGioia places special emphasis on sustaining and strengthening Georgetown's Catholic and Jesuit identity and its responsibility to serve as a voice and an instrument for justice. He has also been a strong advocate for inter-religious dialogue. He is a member of the Order of Malta, a lay religious order of the Roman Catholic Church dedicated to serving the sick and the poor.

Dr. DeGioia is a Professorial Lecturer in the Department of Philosophy. He earned a bachelor's degree in English from Georgetown University in 1979 and his PhD in Philosophy from the University in 1995. He has most recently taught "Ethics and Global Development," "Human Rights: A Culture in Crisis," and a seminar on "Ways of Knowing."

Prior to his appointment as president, Dr. DeGioia held a variety of senior administrative positions at Georgetown, including senior vice president, responsible for university-wide operations, and dean of student affairs.

In 2004, he was presented with a Lifetime Achievement Award for Excellence in Academia from the Sons of Italy. And he was named a Washingtonian of the Year by The Washingtonian magazine in 2008.

Dr. DeGioia was raised in Orange, Connecticut, and Hanford, California. He and his wife, Theresa Miller DeGioia, a Georgetown alumna, and their son, John Thomas, live in Washington, D.C.



LEE REED DIRECTOR OF INTERCOLLEGIATE ATHLETICS

Lee Reed was named the 17th director of intercollegiate athletics (Francis X. Rienzo chair) at Georgetown University in April 2010. Now entering his fifth year on the Hilltop, Reed's impact and leadership style is reflected in his favorite saying, "Successful athletics programs are COACH driven, STUDENT-ATHLETE centered and ADMINISTRATOR assisted." All strategic decisions in the department reflect this mantra on a daily basis.

Reed oversees one of the largest broad-based intercollegiate athletics programs in the nation with 29 varsity programs and more than 750 student-athletes, a full 10 percent of the undergraduate population at Georgetown. Under his leadership the Hoyas have remained prominent on the national landscape while maintaining their commitment to the values that define the oldest Catholic and Jesuit University in the country.

Georgetown athletic teams have been as competitive off the field as they have been on them. Last year, student-athletes combined to post a 3.2 grade-point average, the highest mark since that figure has been tracked. In addition, 13 teams were recognized by the NCAA for high Academic Progress Rate scores, 94 percent of student-athletes graduated and nearly 300 student-athletes were selected to the BIG EAST Academic Honor Roll, the most in the BIG EAST Conference.

In addition to his administrative oversight, Reed has led the athletics department's ambitious \$125 million fundraising campaign as a part of the University's overall "For Generations to Come" Campaign, which has raised \$95 million already. The largest fundraising effort in GU Athletics history includes \$65M in infrastructure improvements, with the majority of those dollars earmarked for the John R. Thompson Jr. Intercollegiate Athletics Center (IAC), a 144,000 square-foot-practice and training facility that will greatly enhance the support facilities available to Georgetown's student-athletes.

The campaign has also raised \$15 million for endowed scholarships, \$40 million for infrastructure and \$36 million for current use funds. The department set records for ticket sales during the 2012-13 season, raising \$4.2 million, Hoyas Unlimited experienced its seventh-straight year of

increased support in 2013-14 and Georgetown's licensing reached its highest mark since 1999. Improvements have also been made with almost \$2 million in improvements to upgrade Shaw Field, a \$1 million gift to improve baseball and \$300,000 for work done in the varsity weight room.

On the field of play, Georgetown teams continued to be among the best in the BIG EAST Conference and nationally. The Hoyas have finished 66th or higher every year in the Learfield Sports Directors' Cup Standings in each of the last five years.

The women's cross country team won the NCAA Championship in 2011, men's soccer advanced to the National Championship game in 2012 and the sailing program has won multiple national titles during this span. The men's basketball team won the BIG EAST Regular Season title in 2013 and has played in the postseason each year, while the women's basketball team reached the Sweet 16 in 2011. In addition, men's golf, women's soccer and women's lacrosse have also made NCAA Tournament appearances.

Reed continues to be active nationally, serving on the NCAA Championships Cabinet, The John McLendon Foundation Board and the NACDA Executive Committee. He is also a member of the NCAA Basketball Academic Enhancement Group, a working group composed of presidents, chancellors, head coaches, commissioners, athletic directors and faculty athletic representatives, which was established to develop strategies to enhance the academic performance and graduation rates of NCAA Division I men's basketball.

In addition, each summer Reed returns to the classroom to co-teach a graduate level leadership class in the sports industry management program in Georgetown's School of Continuing Studies. He also serves as a mentor in the NCAA Pathways program, is on the advisory board for the LGBTQ Center at Georgetown and is a guest speaker at the NCAA, NACDA and other national programs.

Reed is well-respected nationally, having represented the Horizon League on the NCAA Management Council and as the president of the NCAA I-AAA Athletic Director's

Association in 2007-08. He also served as chairman of the John McLendon Memorial Minority Postgraduate Scholarship Awards committee, which is operated through NACDA, and as a member of the Board of Directors of the Greater Cleveland Sports Commission. In March of 2005, he was named one of the 50 Most Powerful African-Americans in Sports by Black Enterprise magazine.

Reed came to Georgetown after serving as the director of athletics at Cleveland State University in Ohio for eight years. A former basketball standout at Cleveland State, he joined the Vikings Athletics Department in the summer of 2002. Under Reed's leadership, the Viking athletics program moved into the upper ranks of the Horizon League and was recognized as one of the top programs in the state of Ohio. Reed oversaw a department that captured 11 Horizon League Championships, as well as six runner-up finishes in his final three years. In addition, Cleveland State University was represented at the NCAA Championships 15 times during that span.

Reed rejoined the Vikings after spending the previous seven years (1995-2002) at Eastern Michigan University, the last four as associate athletic director for internal affairs.

A four-year letterwinner in men's basketball at Cleveland State, Reed played on teams that compiled a 61-47 mark, serving as team captain for the 1982-83 season. Reed then served as an assistant men's basketball coach at the University of New Mexico from 1984-86. He later received a master's degree in sports administration from UNM in 1994.

HEAD COACH JOHN THOMPSON III



JOHN THOMPSON III HEAD COACH | 11TH SEASON 249-115 AT GEORGETOWN | 317-157 OVERALL

In 11 seasons as the head coach of the program he has been around since his youth, John Thompson III has made his mark not only on the Georgetown men's basketball program, but in the elite circles of college basketball. Thompson, who has been a collegiate head coach for 15 seasons, has compiled several coaching milestones:

- Since his arrival on the Hilltop, the Hoyas have reached the postseason in all 11 seasons.
- Including an appearance in 2015, Georgetown has been selected to the NCAA Tournament in eight of the last 11 seasons.
- In six of the team's eight NCAA Tournament appearances, the Blue & Gray have been seeded among the top four teams, earning three No. 2 seeds (2007, 2008, 2013), two No. 3 seeds (2010, 2012) and a No. 4 seed (2015).
- In 2006-07, Thompson led the program to a 30-7 record as the Hoyas won the BIG EAST Tournament Championship, the NCAA East Regional and advanced to the Final Four for the first time since 1985.
- In 2007-08, the Hoyas won back-to-back BIG EAST Regular Season titles (2006-07, 2007-08), posting a two-year record of 28-6 against conference opponents.
- In 2012-13, the Blue & Gray won the BIG EAST Regular Season Championship, winning 11-straight games at one point, and Thompson was named the BIG EAST Coach of the Year.
- He has led the Hoyas to three appearances in the BIG EAST Tournament Championship game in 11 years.
- He has twice been named the Black Coaches Association (BCA) Male Coach of the Year and was named the 2007 National Association of Basketball Coaches (NABC) Coach of the Year.

Recognized as an outstanding talent evaluator who has been nationally recognized for his in-game coaching, tremendous vision and character, outstanding recruiting and his ability to connect with players, John Thompson III was introduced as Georgetown University's 17th head coach on April 20, 2004.

Thompson arrived on the Hilltop in 2004 with a tremendous pedigree. The second head coach at Georgetown named John Thompson, he is the child of one Hall of Fame coach and the student of another, having played for the legendary Pete Carril as an undergraduate at Princeton.

Off the court, Thompson has been an active member of Georgetown University and a presence in the Washington, D.C. community. He speaks at a variety of alumni events throughout the year and has annually joined the members of the Georgetown University Wall Street Alliance in New York City each October. Through his work with his self-named foundation, the JTIII Foundation (which was founded in 2007), Thompson and his wife, Monica, have worked to aid community-based charities that serve at-risk children and families.

Thompson also has international experience, serving as an assistant coach on the USA Basketball Men's Under-18 National team that competed in the 2008 FIBA Americas U-18 Championship in Argentina.

In 11 years at Georgetown, Thompson has guided the Hoyas to a 249-115 overall record (.684 win percentage) and to a 119-73 record in conference play.

Overall in 15 years as a head coach, including four at his alma mater, Princeton, Thompson has compiled a 317-157 (.669) overall record, with a 164-84 record in

conference play (BIG EAST and Ivy League combined), won six league championships and guided his teams to 12 postseason appearances.

Since arriving on the Hilltop, the Hoyas have advanced to one Final Four (2006-07), won a BIG EAST Tournament title (2006-07), won three BIG EAST regular season titles including back-to-back league titles (2006-07, 2007-08, 2012-13), reached the NCAA Tournament eight times (2005-06, 2006-07, 2007-08, 2009-10, 2010-11, 2011-12, 2012-13 and 2014-15), been invited to the National Invitation Tournament three times (2004-05, 2008-09 and 2013-14) and played in the BIG EAST Tournament Championship game three times.

During that time, Georgetown has been ranked among the top 25 teams in the country for 38-straight weeks and is among the winningest programs in the BIG EAST. In addition, in a span of four years (2006-07 – 2009-10), more Georgetown players (5) were selected in the NBA Draft than any other school in the BIG EAST Conference. He has coached two BIG EAST Players of the Year, five All-Americans, nine First Team All-BIG EAST selections and 28 players who have earned All-BIG EAST accolades. Thompson is also a two-time winner of the Black Coaches Association (BCA) Male Coach of the Year Award and was named the 2007 National Association of Basketball Coaches (NABC) Coach of the Year.

Georgetown finished the 2014-15 season with a 22-11 record, the eighth time the team has won at least 20 games under his direction and the fifth time in the last six years. A win over Florida in the Battle 4 Atlantis, one over Indiana at Madison Square Garden and a win at home against Villanova were among the highlights as Georgetown earned the No. 2 seed in the BIG EAST Tournament. Junior guard D'Vauntes Smith-Rivera,

the preseason BIG EAST Player of the Year, was an All-BIG EAST First Team selection.

The Hoyas finished the 2013-14 season with an 18-15 record and advanced to the second round of the NIT. The season started with a regular season trip to play Oregon at Camp Humphreys in South Korea and included an impressive win over Michigan State at Madison Square Garden. Senior guard Markel Starks was named All-BIG EAST First Team, the eighth player to earn first team honors under Thompson.

Georgetown won its third BIG EAST Regular Season title under Thompson during the 2012-13 season, when the team posted a 14-4 conference record to finish atop the league standings. Along the way, the Hoyas won 11-straight games against conference opponents, including a regular season sweep of long-time rival Syracuse. The Hoyas were a No. 2 seed in the NCAA Tournament and finished the year with a 25-7 overall record. Sophomore forward Otto Porter Jr. was named the BIG EAST Player of the Year and earned First Team All-America honors while also being a finalist for the Wooden Award and the Naismith Trophy.

One of his best coaching seasons came during the 2011-12 season, when he guided a young Hoya team that was picked to finish in 10th place in the BIG EAST to a tie for fourth place. Georgetown finished the season with a 24-9 record and was seeded No. 3 in the NCAA Tournament and advanced to the second round. Highlight wins included a 91-88 overtime thriller against then-No. 8 Memphis in the Maui Invitational and an impressive road win at then-No. 4 Louisville to start BIG EAST play. Senior guard Jason Clark was a First Team All-BIG EAST selection and received the league's Sportsmanship Award, while senior center Henry Sims was a Third Team All-BIG EAST selection and Hollis Thompson earned honorable mention accolades.

Georgetown finished the 2010-11 season with a 21-11 record and advanced to the NCAA Tournament for the fifth time in seven years. The Blue & Gray started the season with eight-straight wins, with victories at Old Dominion, winning the Charleston Classic and beating then-No. 9 Missouri, 111-102 in overtime, in one of the best college basketball games of the season. The Hoyas, who earned a first round bye in the BIG EAST Tournament with a 10-8 regular season record in league play, played against a schedule rated No. 1 in the country and were among the top 20 teams in the RPI Ratings. Senior guard Austin Freeman was a First Team All-BIG EAST selection and earned honorable mention All-America honors, while fellow senior Chris Wright was named Third Team All-BIG EAST.

In 2009-10, the Hoyas finished the season with a 23-11 overall record, made a thrilling run to the championship game of the BIG EAST Tournament and were selected as a No.3 seed in the NCAA Tournament. Georgetown was the only school in the country to defeat 2010's NCAA Finalists (Duke and Butler) and was the only school to play three teams that reached the Final Four (Duke, Butler, West Virginia). The team was challenged by a schedule that ranked No. 1 in the country by strength of schedule for much of the season and responded to that with signature wins, including non-conference wins over Temple during ESPN's "24 Hours of College Basketball," Butler at the Jimmy V Classic, Washington during the John Wooden Classic and Duke, in front of a sold-out crowd wearing gray and an audience that included the President and Vice President of the United States. The Hoyas, who finished the season No. 2 in strength of schedule and No. 13 in the RPI ratings, also had impressive conference wins, including a come-from-behind win at home against Connecticut when Austin Freeman scored 28 of his 33 points in the second half and a stirring rout of Villanova in front of a crowd of nearly 10,000 on the day the District was hit with more than two feet of snow. Sophomore center Greg Monroe, who declared for the NBA Draft at the conclusion of the season, was named First Team All-BIG EAST, earned Third Team Associated Press All-America honors and was named the Pete Newell Big Man of the Year by the NABC.

In 2008-09, Georgetown made its fifth-straight post-season appearance under Thompson, advancing to the NIT where the team lost to eventual runner-up Baylor in the first round. The Hoyas finished the season with a 16-15 overall record and were 7-11 in the conference, finishing in 12th place in the BIG EAST

Conference, which was arguably the toughest in the country that season. Georgetown finished the season ranked No. 12 in the country in strength of schedule, posted four wins over top 25 teams, beat two teams that advanced to the Final Four (UConn and Villanova) and two that advanced to the Sweet 16 of the NCAA Tournament (Memphis, Syracuse). Freshman center Greg Monroe was named the BIG EAST Rookie of the Year, becoming the sixth Georgetown player in history to earn the award.

The Hoyas made their third-straight NCAA Tournament appearance during the 2007-08 season, tabbed as the No. 2 seed before losing in the second round. Thompson's team earned a 28-6 (.823) mark, going 15-3 in BIG EAST play to garner its second-consecutive regular season championship, a feat previously unmatched in Hoya history. His team appeared in the national polls all 20 weeks of the season, never dropping lower than 12th and senior Patrick Ewing Jr. earned the inaugural BIG EAST Sixth Man Award.

During his third season as Georgetown's head coach, in 2006-07, Thompson saw his Hoyas win the BIG EAST Regular Season Championship, the BIG EAST Tournament Championship as well as the NCAA East Regional Championship while compiling a 30-7 record. The Hoyas appeared in the national polls 18 times, defeated seven nationally-ranked opponents and compiled a conference record of 13-3. Thompson saw junior Jeff Green named BIG EAST Player of the Year, MVP of the BIG EAST Tournament and MVP of the NCAA East Regional. Green was the fifth player selected in the 2007 NBA Draft.

In his second season at the helm, Thompson's Hoyas made their presence felt with a thrilling run to the Sweet 16. This was his fifth trip to the postseason in six years as a head coach. A first-round victory over Northern Iowa and a second-round defeat of Ohio State advanced Georgetown to its first Regional Semifinal since 2001. The Hoyas, who fell just three points shy of a victory over the eventual national champion Florida Gators, ended the year with a 23-10 overall record, earning Thompson the Black Coaches Association's Fritz Pollard Male Coach of the Year Award.

In his inaugural season as GU's head coach, Thompson's approach took a giant leap when he became one of only three coaches in BIG EAST history to defeat a nationally-ranked team in the conference opener. The Hoyas ended up winning 19 games and advanced to the NIT Quarterfinals.

Prior to coaching at Georgetown, Thompson guided Princeton to three Ivy League Championships, two NCAA tournaments and an NIT appearance over his four years as head coach. He amassed a 68-42 record as Princeton's head coach after serving as an assistant coach at Princeton from 1995-2000. As assistant coach, he helped lead the team to a top 10 national ranking and five-consecutive postseason appearances.

Princeton not only made the postseason eight of nine years during Thompson's tenure, but he helped recruit and coach three All-Americans, three Ivy League Players of the Year, two Ivy League Rookies of the Year and 12 First Team All-Ivy League players.

Thompson also played basketball as an undergraduate for the Tigers while majoring in politics. As a forward, he ranks third on Princeton's all-time assist leader list with 358. Playing for legendary coach Pete Carril, Thompson produced with amazing proficiency with 103 assists and just 34 turnovers as a senior. He was co-captain of the 1988 team and shared the B.F. Bunn trophy that year as one of the Tigers' Most Valuable Players.

Thompson, 49, grew up in Washington, D.C., where he graduated from Gonzaga College High School. As a high school senior he was named First Team All-Met by the Washington Post.

Thompson's wife, Monica, is also a Princeton grad (Class of '89). They have three children: Morgan, John Wallace and Matthew.

KEVIN BROADUS ASSISTANT COACH FIFTH SEASON

Kevin Broadus is in his eighth season as a member of the men's basketball staff at Georgetown.

This is Broadus' second stint with Georgetown, as he was a member of Coach John Thompson III's original staff in 2004-05. He rejoined the staff in June 2011 as a special assistant to Coach Thompson and was named an assistant coach in June 2012.

Broadus brings more than 20 years of coaching and recruiting experience to Georgetown. Remaining in the District for most of his professional career, he has coached at five universities in the metro area.

Broadus was the head coach at Binghamton (N.Y.) University for two years, helping to lead the Bearcats to an America East Tournament Championship and

to an appearance in the 2009 NCAA Tournament. Under Broadus' direction, Binghamton won a school-record 23 games that season.

A native of the D.C. region, Broadus played high school basketball at Dunbar in the District and Montgomery Blair in Silver Spring, Md. He left the area for one year to play at Grambling State in Louisiana, but returned home to attend Bowie State, where he lettered for three years and earned his Bachelor of Science in business administration in 1990.

Following graduation Broadus served as assistant coach at Bowie State until 1993, when he returned to D.C. as an assistant at the University of the District of Columbia, where he stayed until 1997. While coaching at UDC, he earned his master's degree in counseling in 1995.

From 1998-2001, he was on the staff at American University. Broadus was an assistant at George Washington University from 2001-04 before joining the Hoyas in 2004-05.

In addition to his extensive coaching experience, Broadus has worked as a summer camp coach and counselor for both the Philadelphia 76ers and the New York Knicks. He also served four years as a research assistant at the National Institutes of Health.

Broadus and his wife, Belinda, have four children, Nicol, Milan, Paris, and Kevin Jr. They reside in Silver Spring, Md.



TAVARAS HARDY ASSISTANT COACH THIRD SEASON

Tavaras Hardy is in his third season as assistant coach with the Georgetown basketball program. He came to the Hilltop in June 2013, replacing Mike Brennan, who was named the head coach at American University.

Hardy came to Georgetown after seven seasons on the staff at Northwestern, where he helped lead the Wildcats to four-consecutive postseason appearances (2009-12) and to consecutive school-record, 20-win seasons in 2009-10 and again in 2010-11. He served as the team's associate head coach the last two years.

Recognized as an outstanding recruiter, Hardy helped mentor John Shurna during his record-break-

ing career as he became a First Team All-Big Ten selection, the conference's leading scorer and Northwestern career leader in scoring. In addition, Drew Crawford was named the 2010 Big Ten Freshman of the Year by the league's media members.

Prior to NU, Hardy spent three years as a head coach for the Illinois Defenders boys' basketball program. Among their many accomplishments, his under-16 team captured the championship of the 2005 Las Vegas Main Event Tournament with a perfect 7-0 record. During that same time period, Hardy also worked in wealth management at JPMorgan Chase and Co.

Hardy was a four-year letterwinner and three-time most valuable player at Northwestern from 1998-2002. He earned All-Big Ten honors twice, ranks second in games played and is among the top 20 in seven major categories at the school. Hardy graduated from Northwestern in 2002, earning his Bachelor of Arts degree in political science.

Hardy and his wife Billée are the proud parents of Mariah (8), Jasmine (4) and TJ (1).



KEVIN SUTTON ASSISTANT COACH THIRD SEASON

Kevin Sutton joined the men's basketball program on the Hilltop as an assistant coach in June 2013.

Sutton came to Georgetown after two seasons as an assistant coach under Mike Lonergan at George Washington University. He has 28 years of coaching experience including a pair of two-year stints as an assistant coach at both James Madison University and Old Dominion University.

In addition to his collegiate coaching experience, Sutton coached at five nationally-ranked high school programs – Flint Hill Preparatory, Harked Preparatory, St. John's Prospect Hall, Montrose Christian and, most recently, at Montverde Academy in Florida – amassing a 489-102 record and winning two national championships. Sutton has been selected as a coach for USA Basketball on three different occasions. He was an assistant coach at the Hoop Festival for the East team, had a two-year stint with the Junior Developmental Team (U-16), which won a gold medal at the FIBA Americas Tournament in Argentina, and he was the head coach for the Nike/USA Basketball Hoop Summit, a game showcasing the top 10 international players against the top 10 American players.

Sutton has built a reputation of being an outstanding teacher of the game of basketball, helping more than 130 student-athletes earn college scholarships

at all levels. Some of the notable players that Sutton has helped develop include: George Lynch (North Carolina), Arron Bain (Villanova), Randolph Childress (Wake Forest), Cory Alexander (Virginia), Exree Hipp (Maryland), Serge Zwikker (North Carolina), Cameron Dollar (UCLA), Nate James (Duke) and Jason Capel (North Carolina).

Sutton also has more than 20 years of coaching experience at every level of basketball camps and clinics, including the Nike Hoops Jamboree, Nike All-American Camp, Michael Jordan Flight School and the LeBron James Skills Academy, among others.

Sutton and his wife, Beth, have four children, Aaron, Kayleigh, Isaiah and Rileigh.



PATRICK EWING JR. DIRECTOR OF BASKETBALL OPERATIONS FIRST SEASON

Former Georgetown University men's basketball star Patrick Ewing Jr. joined the staff as the director of basketball operations in August 2015.

Ewing Jr. is the son of former Hoya All-American and National Basketball Hall of Famer Patrick Ewing.

"Even as a player, Patrick 'saw' the game through the eyes of a coach," Head Coach John Thompson III said. "I'm very glad to have Patrick come back home and to be part of the staff."

Following his graduation from Georgetown in 2008, Ewing was a second round pick of the Sacramento

Kings in the NBA Draft and he spent time with the Houston Rockets, the New York Knicks and New Orleans Hornets. He also spent time playing overseas, with stops in Germany, Spain, Greece and Qatar.

Ewing was the recipient of the BIG EAST Conference's inaugural Sixth Man of the Year Award as a senior in 2008. He appeared in all 34 games during the 2007-08 season, averaging 6.2 points and 4.2 rebounds per contest. Ewing started the first 10 games of the season, but moved into the sixth man role in January. In 24 games coming off the bench, Ewing averaged 5.7 points and 4.4 rebounds while handing out 25 assists and blocking 12 shots.

A major contributor to Georgetown's success in 2006-07 when the team won the BIG EAST Tournament and advanced to the Final Four, Ewing provided a spark whenever the Hoyas needed it. During BIG EAST play, he had 11 games with at least five points, 14 games with at least three rebounds, six games with at least two assists, three games with at least two blocked shots and four games with at least two steals.

Ewing and his wife, Katie, live in Washington, D.C. and have a son, Patrick III.



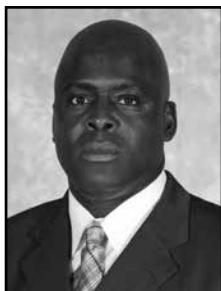
KIMBERLY CURRY

The BIG EAST Conference will forge ahead in 2015-16 for its third year in its current configuration. Founded by Dave Gavitt in 1979, the BIG EAST reorganized in 2013, entering a new era by returning to its basketball-focused heritage. The league's 10 member schools today—Butler University, Creighton University, DePaul University, Georgetown University, Marquette University, Providence College, St. John's University, Seton Hall University, Villanova University, and Xavier University—maintain an unyielding commitment to academic integrity, athletic excellence and community service.

Gavitt, the former Providence College men's basketball coach and athletic director, made the BIG EAST Conference a reality in May of 1979. Providence, St. John's, Georgetown, Syracuse, Seton Hall, Connecticut and Boston College formed the original seven-school alliance, and within the span of just a few years the conference had become a national powerhouse in men's basketball. While the composition of the BIG EAST evolved over the next three decades, the focus of its schools did not waver, reflecting a tradition of broad-based programs led by administrators and coaches who emphasize academic strength and fair play.

In December of 2012, the seven BIG EAST schools that do not compete in FBS football—DePaul, Georgetown, Marquette, Providence, St. John's, Seton Hall and Villanova—announced their intention to separate from the conference's football-playing schools and form an independent association. On March 20, 2013, the seven schools reached an agreement that enabled them to retain the BIG EAST name and assume the old conference's long-term agreement with Madison Square Garden to host the BIG EAST Men's Basketball Tournament, one of the premier events in college athletics. The schools also announced the addition of three distinguished institutions sharing the same academic and athletic values—Butler University, Creighton University and Xavier University—and forged a landmark, long-term broadcast partnership with FOX Sports. To complete the transformation, the BIG EAST moved its headquarters from its original location in Providence, R.I., to midtown Manhattan in New York City. The BIG EAST's new era officially began on July 1, 2013, its effective date as the NCAA's 32nd Division I conference.

Val Ackerman, who previously served as founding President of the WNBA, President of USA Basketball and U.S. representative to the International Basketball Federation (FIBA), was named fifth Commissioner of the BIG EAST in conjunction with the conference's 2013 reconfiguration. Under her leadership, the BIG EAST has sought to maintain its reputation for excellence in intercollegiate athletics and has remained influential on the national landscape, with many conference and school administrators now serving on key NCAA committees.

Since its inception in 1979, the BIG EAST has been considered a leader in innovative concepts in promotion, particularly television, and the conference's current relationship with FOX Sports allows that tradition to continue. The BIG EAST has enjoyed a fruitful partnership with FOX Sports and its national cable network, FOX Sports 1, since the 2013-14 academic year, the first under the current multi-year agreement. FOX's wall-to-wall coverage of BIG EAST men's basketball includes complete coverage of all regular season games on FOX, FS1, FS2 and Fox Regional Networks, as well as the BIG EAST Tournament at Madison Square Garden, college basketball's longest-running postseason basketball conference tourney held at the same venue. The BIG EAST and FOX also have established an annual five-game New Year's Marathon at the beginning of conference play. FOX Sports platforms also carry complete coverage of the BIG EAST Women's Basketball Tournament and selected coverage of other Olympic sport championships. BIG EAST institutions are located in seven of the nation's top 35 largest media markets, including New York, Chicago, Philadelphia, Washington, D.C., Indianapolis, Milwaukee and Cincinnati.

The BIG EAST has also increased the visibility of its member school programs with the expansion of the BIG EAST Digital Network (BEDN). When the conference launched BEDN in 2014-15, the league became the first collegiate conference to be hosted on the FOX Sports mobile platform, FOX Sports Go, the app that provides live streaming of FOX Sports content. BEDN will carry 225 live events in 2015-16, with an emphasis on women's basketball and Olympic sport regular season and championship events.

BIG EAST Serves launched in 2014 as the conference's platform to align the academic, health, leadership and service missions of the ten member institutions. Initiatives housed under the BIG EAST Serves umbrella reflect the conference's commitment to developing the complete BIG EAST student-athlete and making a positive contribution to the campus communities of its member schools and to New York City, the conference's headquarters.

BIG EAST student-athletes boast high graduation rates, and the league has always been able to proudly say that many of its best students are also its best athletes. Alex Barlow, the starting guard for the Butler men's basketball team that earned a 2014-15 NCAA bid, won the Senior CLASS Award in his sport for excellence in classroom, community, character and competition. He also won the BIG EAST men's basketball scholar-athlete award for the second year in a row. Katrina Coogan of Georgetown, the 2015 conference women's cross country champion, was a CoSIDA Academic All-American and seven-time cross country and track and field All-American.

In 2014-15, BIG EAST teams earned a total of 31 NCAA bids. Two teams won national championships: Connecticut, an associate member in field hockey, won its second straight NCAA crown, and Denver, an associate member in men's lacrosse, also captured an NCAA title, the first national champion not from the East Coast in that sport. Seven different national postseason championships saw multiple BIG EAST teams participate, including six teams in men's basketball. BIG EAST schools produced 12 CoSIDA Academic All-Americans, including five in soccer (three male, two female).

Current BIG EAST men's basketball programs have enjoyed extraordinary success over the years. Georgetown, Marquette and Villanova have won the national championship, and DePaul, Providence, St. John's and Seton Hall have all made it to the Final Four. The BIG EAST placed three men's basketball teams in the Final Four in 1985—Georgetown, St. John's and Villanova—the only time this has occurred in NCAA history. Over the past 12 years, Butler, Georgetown, Marquette and Villanova have each reached the Final Four, with Butler making two trips. Xavier has also advanced to the Elite Eight twice and the Sweet 16 four other times.

BIG EAST student-athletes have achieved recent success in other sports, as well. A BIG EAST team has won the NCAA women's cross country championship four of the last six years (Villanova won twice; Providence and Georgetown once), with one runner-up finish (Providence). Creighton's men's soccer team has reached the NCAA College Cup in two of the past four seasons, with the Providence men advancing to the semifinals in 2014.

In the 36 years since the original league opened its doors, BIG EAST teams have won 38 national championships in eight different sports. The conference crowned champions in 22 sports in the 2014-15 academic year, with 140 student-athletes winning individual national titles.

Hoyas on the Air

Entering his 42nd season as the "Voice of the Hoyas," Rich Chvotkin will once again call the games this season. Hoya games will be heard on WJFK 106.7 FM. In addition to 106.7 FM, CBS Radio also counts 99.1 FM WNEW and CBS Sports Radio 1580 AM as part of its broadcast family. WJFK-FM The Fan is the radio home of The Sports Junkies in the morning and is the radio home for Major League Baseball's Washington Nationals, as well as the Washington Wizards, the Washington Capitals and D.C. United.

Press Credentials

Georgetown home games are played at Verizon Center (Washington, D.C.) and at McDonough Arena on Georgetown's campus. The Georgetown University Sports Information Office will provide passes on a game-by-game basis to all working press. Press credentials are only available by contacting the Sports Information Office. All credential requests should be sent to Mike "Mex" Carey, Assistant Athletics Director for Communications. Requests can be sent via e-mail to Mex.Carey@georgetown.edu. Passes are limited to working press and seating at press row is assigned on a priority basis. Assigned passes can be picked up at Verizon Center's Press Gate entrance.

Photo Credentials

Photo passes are available for working photographers only and will be issued at the discretion of Assistant Athletics Director for Communications Mike "Mex" Carey. Assigned passes can be picked up at the Press Gate entrance. Photographers are limited to working the designated areas of the end lines and any special needs (remotes, lighting, etc.) must be approved prior to installation.

Radio

Space on press row will be provided to the official station of each visiting team and will be limited to three seats. Since there can only be one official station for any given team, seating for additional radio stations must be arranged in advance through the Georgetown Sports Information Office. Georgetown University has two phone lines available at Verizon Center for each visiting team's radio station. To ensure use of these lines or to arrange for additional lines, visiting radio stations should contact the Georgetown Sports Information Office, at least one week prior to game time.

Post Game

Approximately 10 minutes after the game, head coaches will begin addressing the press. Georgetown players will also be available in the interview room after the game. Any requests for specific players should be addressed to the Sports Information Staff at the end of the game.

Freshmen/Newcomers Interviews

No freshmen nor newcomers will give interviews or pose for pictures during the first semester. Requests for interviews with freshmen/newcomers may be made after January 1.

ATHLETICS COMPLIANCE

The Athletics Compliance Office coordinates the athletics compliance efforts of Georgetown University and acts as a resource and solution center concerning NCAA regulations and compliance issues. The primary functions of the Athletics Compliance Office are to coordinate, administer, monitor and verify the accurate and timely completion of NCAA-required procedures and to assist in maintaining institutional compliance with all NCAA, Conference and University rules. In addition, the Athletics Compliance Office provides educational programming and interpretive support to ensure that all individuals involved with the athletics program fully understand the University's compliance expectations.

The following general information is provided by the Georgetown University Athletics Compliance Office for supporters and friends of Georgetown Athletics as well as prospective student-athletes who may be recruited by Georgetown University.

KEY DEFINITIONS

Prospective Student-Athlete: A prospective student-athlete ("prospect") is a student who has started classes for the ninth grade, regardless whether he or she participates in athletics. A prospective student-athlete maintains his or her identity as a prospect, even after he or she signs a National Letter of Intent or financial aid agreement, until he or she attends the first day of classes of a regular term or participates in an official team practice, whichever is earlier.

Representative of Athletics Interests: A representative of the institution's athletics interests (a.k.a. Booster) is an individual who:

- Has ever made a financial contribution to the athletic department or any organization that promotes Georgetown's athletics (e.g. HOYAS UNLIMITED)
- Is a member of an organization that promotes a HOYA athletic team
- Has or is involved in promoting Georgetown's athletics program in any way
- Has been otherwise in promoting the institution's athletics program

Once an individual is identified as a representative, the person retains that identity forever.

WHO IS PERMITTED TO RECRUIT FOR GEORGETOWN?

Only Georgetown University coaches who have successfully completed the NCAA Recruiting Rules Examination on an annual basis may be involved in the recruitment process. Boosters may not make any recruiting contacts. This includes letters, telephone calls or face-to-face contact on or off campus with a prospect or the prospect's parents.

Representatives of Georgetown's Athletics Interest MAY:

- Offer summer employment to prospective student-athletes who have signed a National Letter of Intent and to enrolled student-athletes, after contacting the Athletics Compliance Office.
- Support Georgetown's athletics program by attending HOYA athletics contests and by making financial contributions to Georgetown athletics.

Representatives of Georgetown's Athletics Interest MAY NOT:

- Be involved in the recruitment of prospective student-athletes in any way
- Provide extra benefits (i.e., discounts, gifts, transportation) to prospective student-athletes, enrolled student-athletes or their parents, legal guardian(s), relatives or friends
- Provide any financial assistance to prospective student-athletes, enrolled student-athletes or their parents, legal guardian(s), relatives or friends

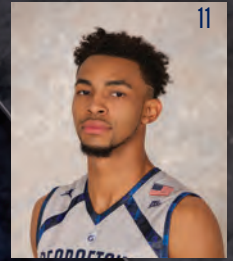
