Match background

- Fourth all-Spanish UEFA Super Cup after 2006, 2014 and 2015, each involving Sevilla
- Real Madrid beat Sevilla 2-0 in Cardiff in 2014
- · Sevilla are the first team to feature in three consecutive editions
- · Cristiano Ronaldo has scored 22 goals against Sevilla
- Trondheim in Norway stages its first UEFA final

For the third year running, **Sevilla** face Spanish opposition in the <u>UEFA Super Cup</u>, but will hope to emulate their **2006 defeat of Barcelona** rather than the **2014 loss to Real Madrid** and 5-4 extra-time reverse against the Blaugrana 12 months ago in Tbilisi.

UEFA Super Cup pedigree

- Both teams are making a fifth appearance; only Barcelona (9), AC Milan (7) and Liverpool (5) can better or match that
- Madrid played three UEFA Super Cups at Stade Louis II in Monaco before their 2014 defeat of Sevilla in Cardiff.
 Their record is W2 L2:

1998: L0-1 v Chelsea (Monaco)

2000: L1-2 v Galatasaray (aet, Monaco)

2002: W3-1 v Feyenoord (Monaco)

2014: W2-0 v Sevilla (Cardiff)

- Cristiano Ronaldo got both goals in 2014; he has scored 22 times against Sevilla, more than any other club (over 15 games, with five hat-tricks).
- Those two goals leave Ronaldo one off the career UEFA Super Cup record of three, jointly held by eight players including Lionel Messi thanks to his 2015 double versus Sevilla.
- Ronaldo has **96 UEFA club competition goals** in all so could make the century if he matches his feat of four goals at Sevilla in a 6-2 Liga win on 7 May 2011.
- All of Madrid's appearances have come as UEFA Champions League winners, though in 1998 opponents Chelsea were in as UEFA Cup Winners' Cup rather than UEFA Cup/UEFA Europa League holders.
- Sevilla have only ever featured as UEFA Cup/UEFA Europa League winners. Their record is W1 L3:

2006: W3-0 v Barcelona (Monaco)

2007: L1-3 v AC Milan (Monaco)

2014: L0-2 v Real Madrid (Cardiff)

2015: L4-5 v Barcelona (aet, Tbilisi)

- Sevilla's third appearance in as many years is unprecedented.
- · A fourth loss would equal Barcelona's record.
- This is the fourth UEFA Super Cup between two Spanish clubs after 2006, 2014 and 2015.
- There were previously two all-Italian games. AC Milan beat Sampdoria in 1990 but lost to Parma three years later.
- Whatever happens, there will be a **14th Spanish winner** (the next highest is Italy with nine) and the Liga now has 26 appearances (England is closest with 15).
- If Madrid win, European Cup holders would clinch an unprecedented fourth consecutive success. The UEFA Champions League winners triumphed in 1994, 1995 and 1996 while the UEFA Cup Winners' Cup holders were successful on the last three appearances in 1997, 1998 and 1999.
- UEFA Cup winners were then successful in 2000 and 2001 before Madrid ended the five-year losing UEFA Champions League run in 2002.

Head to head

- The sides have **met 177 times** in all competitions, with **Madrid recording 94 wins to Sevilla's 54.** There have been 29 draws.
- In the Liga last season, Sevilla won 3-2 at home in November but Madrid gained revenge 4-0 in March.
- In Sevilla, Madrid suffered their first league defeat of 2015/16. Sergio Ramos scored with an overhead kick in which he was injured, allowing Ciro Immobile, Éver Banega and Fernando Llorente to reply before a James Rodríguez consolation.
- Karim Benzema, Ronaldo, Gareth Bale and Jesé scored in the return.

- Before the 2014 UEFA Super Cup these clubs played in the 1957/58 European Champions Clubs' Cup quarter-final. Madrid ran away with the home first leg 8-0 still a competition record for a last-eight encounter, with Alfredo Di Stéfano scoring four before a 2-2 draw in Seville.
- They have also faced off in the Spanish Super Cup in 2007, Sevilla winning 1-0 at home and 5-3 in Madrid.

Key facts

- Madrid coach Zinédine Zidane was a UEFA Super Cup winner against Feyenoord in 2002.
- Zidane could become the **fifth man to lift the UEFA Super Cup as coach and player** after Josep Guardiola, Carlo Ancelotti, Diego Simeone and Luis Enrique (who between them have triumphed for the last five years).
- Both teams have already picked up UEFA trophies against fellow Spanish sides. Besides Madrid's victory against Sevilla two years ago in Cardiff, they defeated Atlético in the 2014 and 2016 UEFA Champions League finals, and prevailed in the first UEFA Champions League final between clubs representing the same nation, downing Valencia 3-0 at the Stade de France in 2000.
- Sevilla, meanwhile, followed up their 2006 UEFA Super Cup triumph against Barcelona by overcoming Espanyol in the following year's UEFA Cup final. After a 2-2 draw at Hampden Park, Glasgow, Sevilla edged it 3-1 on penalties.
- Overall Madrid have won ten of their 19 games against Spanish teams in Europe, drawing five and losing four.
- Sevilla have won seven of their 18 European matches against Liga opponents, losing eight with three draws.
- Having succumbed to Barcelona in the UEFA Super Cup last season, Sevilla played Athletic Club in the UEFA Europa League quarter-finals. Both legs were 2-1 away wins with Sevilla winning 5-4 on penalties in the home return.

Team ties

- This will be **Jorge Sampaoli**'s first competitive match in charge of Sevilla. The Argentinian signed a two-year contract to replace Unai Emery, who had been in charge since 2013 and led the club to three successive UEFA Europa Leagues before departing for Paris Saint-Germain.
- **Sergio Ramos** began his career at Sevilla, making his senior debut in a 1-0 Liga reverse at Deportivo La Coruña in 2004. Ramos scored twice in 39 top-flight outings for his home-town club before signing for Madrid in 2005.
- After receiving the gold medal of the city of Seville in May 2014 Ramos was honoured with an on-field tribute at the Ramón Sánchez Pizjuán during Spain's 2-0 international friendly success against Bolivia later the same month.
- New Sevilla signing **Pablo Sarabia** came up the ranks at Madrid from the age of 12 but left seven years later in 2011 for Getafe with just one senior competitive appearance to his name, against Auxerre in a December 2010 UEFA Champions League match as a 72nd-minute substitute for Ronaldo.
- Sevilla goalkeeper David Soria was also in Real Madrid's academy.

- New signing Morata was alongside Lucas Vázquez and Ramos in the Spain squad that lost their title in the round of 16, the same round in which Mateo Kovačić's Croatia fell to Portugal (though Kovačić did play in their 2-1 group defeat of Spain).

- Adil Rami appeared four times in France's run to the final, losing his place after the round of 16 due to suspension and was unable to claim it back.
- Goalkeeper Sergio Rico was an unused squad member for Spain while Yevhen Konoplyanka exited in the group stage with Ukraine.

Trondheim 2016

- While a familiar UEFA Champions League venue, this is the first UEFA club final at Trondheim's Lerkendal Stadion or indeed anywhere in Norway.
- Elsewhere in Norway, Oslo's Ullevaal Stadion staged the 1987 and 1997 UEFA Women's EURO finals.
- Real Madrid won 2-0 here against Rosenborg in the 2005/06 UEFA Champions League second group stage, Sergio Ramos starting.
- Madrid also prevailed 1-0 at the same stage in 1999/2000 but lost 2-0 at Rosenborg in the 1997/98 group stage.
- This is Sevilla's first competitive visit to the stadium.

• Born in Marseille to Algerian immigrant parents, Zidane took his first steps towards footballing superstardom at Cannes, transferring to Bordeaux in 1992. Blossomed into a French international, scoring twice on his debut against the Czech Republic in August 1994.

- Left Bordeaux after helping them reach the 1996 UEFA Cup final and joined Juventus, where he was a Serie A winner and UEFA Champions League runner-up in each of his first two seasons. Lifted no further trophies, however, in his last three campaigns in Turin prior to a then world-record €78m switch to Madrid in 2001.
- Made up for a lack of club silverware by inspiring France to 1998 FIFA World Cup glory scoring two headers in the Saint-Denis final against Brazil and at UEFA EURO 2000, where he was player of the tournament; winner of the Ballon d'Or in 1998, he was also voted FIFA World Player of the Year in 1998, 2000 and 2003.
- Made it third time lucky in the UEFA Champions League final by hitting a spectacular volleyed winner in Madrid's 2-1 victory over Bayer 04 Leverkusen in the 2002 showpiece at Hampden Park. Landed the UEFA Super Cup, European/South American Cup and Spanish Liga the following season.
- Announced his international retirement after UEFA EURO 2004 yet returned a year later and proved inspirational at the 2006 World Cup especially with a virtuoso display in a quarter-final triumph over holders Brazil; however, was dismissed for a headbutt on Marco Materazzi in the final against Italy the last match of his career.
- Stayed at Madrid in an advisory role, becoming assistant to Carlo Ancelotti in 2013/14 the season the club claimed their tenth European title. Took charge of Real Madrid Castilla for the next campaign, and in January 2016 succeeded Rafael Benítez as head coach, promptly leading the club to yet another European Cup that May the seventh to lift the trophy as player and coach.

Jorge Sampaoli

- Jorge Sampaoli's career as a promising midfielder was cut short as a double leg fracture forced him to quit playing at the age of 19. He turned to coaching, working with local amateur sides and gaining notoriety after being photographed shouting instructions at his team from up a tree having been refused entry to the ground.
- Following a spell coaching Argentina de Rosario, the reserve team of former club Newell's, his first professional job came in Peru in 2002 with Juan Aurich. He remained in Peru with Sport Boys before leading Coronel Bolognesi into their first international tournament the Copa Sudamericana in 2006.
- After a disappointing year at Sporting Cristal, Sampaoli left Peru to reinvigorate his career with O'Higgins in Chile, spending three years with the Rancagua outfit. He spent time with Emelec in Ecuador but it was a 2011 move to Universidad de Chile that established his name.
- It was here where the Argentinian cemented his reputation as one of South America's best coaches. His attacking, attractive style brought back-to-back league titles in addition to the Copa Sudamericana, and he also reached the semi-finals of the Copa Libertadores.
- Appointed Chile manager in 2012 and continued to impose his aesthetically-pleasing style at the highest level. Helped knock Spain out of the 2014 FIFA World Cup group stage before succumbing to Brazil on penalties in the round of 16. He led the Roja to their first piece of silverware 12 months later with a Copa América final victory over his native Argentina.

Competition facts

UEFA Super Cup: All-time records

- There have been 40 previous UEFA Super Cup finals, including 15 at Monaco's Stade Louis II from when the showpiece moved to a one-off match on a permanent basis in 1998. The 2013 fixture took place in Prague with the 2014 fixture held in Cardiff and the 2015 game played in Tbilisi.
- Of the 40 previous editions, the team that won the European Cup have triumphed on 21 occasions, most recently FC Barcelona in 2015. Since the UEFA Cup winners began to take part in 2000 following the disbanding of the UEFA Cup Winners' Cup, seven of the 16 finals have been won by the side that lifted the UEFA Cup/UEFA Europa League the preceding season.
- Spain holds the record for the number of times their teams have participated in the competition with 22 entries (FC Barcelona 9, Real Madrid CF 4, Sevilla FC 4, Valencia CF 2, Club Atlético de Madrid 2, Real Zaragoza 1). England have had 15 (Liverpool FC 5, Manchester United FC 3, Nottingham Forest FC 2, Chelsea FC 3, Arsenal FC 1, Aston Villa FC 1), one more than Italy (AC Milan 7, Juventus 2, FC Internazionale Milano 1, Parma FC 1, SS Lazio 1, UC Sampdoria 1).
- Spanish clubs have recorded the most victories with 12 (Barcelona 5, Valencia 2, Atlético 2, Real Madrid 2, Sevilla 1), two more than Italy and four more than England.
- Barcelona's 2015 victory took them level with Milan on five triumphs. Liverpool (three) are in third place.
- Five finals have been decided in extra time, the beneficiaries being Parma (1993, 2-1 versus Milan), Galatasaray SK (2000, 2-1 golden goal victory versus Real Madrid), Liverpool (2005, 3-1 versus PFC CSKA Moskva) and Barcelona twice (2009, 1-0 versus FC Shakhtar Donetsk; 2015, 5-4 v Sevilla FC).
- The 2013 edition was the first to involve a penalty shoot-out, Bayern beating Chelsea 5-4 on penalties after a 2-2 draw in Prague.
- Barcelona became the first side to score five times in a one-off final with their 2015 defeat of Sevilla, eclipsing Atlético's 4-1 defeat of Chelsea in 2012; Liverpool (2001, 2005), Real Madrid (2002), Sevilla (2006) and Milan (2007) all managed three goals.
- Atlético's 2012 win matched Sevilla's three-goal defeat of Barcelona in 2006 as the largest margin of victory.
- There have been four 1-0 results: Chelsea (1998), Lazio (1999) the first two one-off finals Milan (2003) and Barcelona (2009) the victors.
- There has never been a UEFA Super Cup finishing scoreless after 120 minutes.
- Five finals have pitted teams from the same country. Milan beat Sampdoria 3-1 on aggregate in 1990 and lost 2-1 to Parma three years later before the all-Spanish affair between Barcelona and Sevilla in 2006 and Real Madrid's 2014 defeat of Sevilla. In 2015, Barcelona beat Sevilla in Tbilisi.
- The fastest goal came in the 2015 decider when Ever Banega gave Seilla a third-minute lead against Barcelona.
- Falcao (2012, Atlético v Chelsea) and Terry McDermott (1977, Liverpool v Hamburger SV, second leg) are the only players to have scored three times in one UEFA Super Cup game. McDermott's hat-trick was the faster, registered in a 17-minute spell either side of the interval.
- The only own goal seen in a UEFA Super Cup final since it permanently became a one-off match in 1998 came from Feyenoord's Patrick Paauwe 15 minutes into his team's 3-1 reverse to Real Madrid in 2002.
- Manchester United midfielder Paul Scholes became the first player sent off in the history of the competition against FC Zenit in 2008. Porto's Rolando and Fredy Guarín were both dismissed in 2011.

Competition history

The UEFA Super Cup was not staged in three seasons since its 1973 inception. In 1974, following political problems, Bayern of the Federal Republic of Germany did not play 1. FC Magdeburg of the German Democratic Republic. Then, in 1981, Liverpool and FC Dinamo Tbilisi failed to find a date to contest the competition. Following the Heysel tragedy on 29 May 1985, Juventus and Everton FC did not play the 1985 UEFA Super Cup.
