## **Tents for Beaver Scouts & Cub Scouts**

If you are on a camp site you will see a huge array of tents. Some are more suitable to the

needs of scouting than others. Each tent is designed based on the purpose and the weather that it will be used.

A small lightweight mountain tent costing hundreds of euro may only last one night with a lodge of beaver scouts playing wrestling at 3 o clock in the morning but will keep a seasoned mountaineer warm and dry for many years when it is being used as designed.



Many groups have invested in equipment and will have many different types of tents in their store, or in back rooms or hanging in cow sheds or stored in the boot of the car. So the question is what type of tents do we need for JamOige?

Tents are typically divided into two groups.

Sleeping Tents & Storage tents

Sleeping tents are also split into two groups.

1. Icelandic tents. These are green ridge shaped heavy canvas tents .



### **Advantages**

Encourages the group system, the whole six/lodge can help put up the tent and sleep together.

You can stand upright in the tent.

It will remain standing and dry (if put up correctly) in most extreme weather.

The Icelandic tent has stood the test of time and will last much longer than Dome tents.

## **Disadvantages**

They are heavy to carry.

In strong winds the cubs / beavers will struggle to hold the poles when putting the tent up.

They are expensive.

#### 2. Dome tents - Dome tents

Dome tents come in many sizes and different materials. In general they are made of lightweight waterproof material, with lightweight fibreglass poles making the shape.



## **Advantages**

They are lightweight

They are all different sizes

## Disadvantages

Usually can't stand up (in the one where you can they often break in high winds).

Don't stand up to much messing (someone falling against the side will rip it)



## **Storage Tents**

The store tent is where all the camping equipment that you don't want exposed to the weather is kept.

It is also a place where the camp kitchen can be located

It can also be a gathering area or feeding area out of the elements (rain, wind & Sun)

On previous JamOige particularly in Ardgillan we had major issues with some of the storage or mess tents. The style of tent that caused the issue was the Party tent (designed to be put up in a back garden for a party). These are frame tents with plastic or light metal poles often with a plastic canvas. The problem arises in a strong wind where the tent is picked up like a parachute, turns sideward's and becomes a missile racing across the field.

We were lucky in Ardgillan that nobody was seriously hurt because of the flying party tents. In our next issue we will go into more detail on what type of storage tent is the best.

## **Green Camping**

One of the principles of this camp and indeed any scout camp are to be aware of the environmental impact of the camp.

Waste, and how we choose to handle it, affects our world's environment—that's YOUR environment. The environment is everything around you including the air, water, land, plants, and man-made things. And since by now you probably know that you need a healthy environment for your own health and happiness, you can understand why effective waste management is so important to YOU and everyone else. The waste we create has to be carefully controlled to be sure that it does not harm your environment and your health.

As part of the camp we aim to use the Three Rs.



Each sub camp will run an environmental challenge that each group will participate in and your group could win the Green Flag .

## **Youth Empowerment**

One of the principals of the scout method is that we operate in small groups. In beaver scouts the colony is divided into lodges and in cub scouts the pack is divided into sixes.

There is leadership opportunities for everyone within this system with each lodge having a lodge leader and each six a sixer. They often provide the information or link from the scouters at beaver scouts or from the sixers council from the cub scouts.

We would encourage each section to use the small group system.

We would aim to hold sixer meetings within the cub sub camps and lodge leader meeting in the beaver sub camps. The sixers would attend on their own while the lodge leaders would be accompanied with a scouter.



## 99 years ago Facts from 1916

Cub Scouts started in Ireland

The 1916 Olympics, cancelled due to war, were scheduled to take place in Berlin.

James Joyce published "A Portrait of the Artist as a Young Man"

Did you know that Dublin and London were in different time zones in 1916? From 1880 until 1916, Ireland and Britain maintained different time zones – Britain of course followed Greenwich Mean Time (GMT), but Ireland followed Dublin Mean Time (DMT), which was precisely 25 minutes behind GMT. The Statutes (Definition of Time) Act, 1880, which legally defined the difference between GMT and DMT, was superseded by the Time (Ireland) Act, 1916, which was "An Act to assimilate the time adopted for use in Ireland to that adopted for use in Great Britain". In other words, DMT was abolished. This change came into effect on October 1st, 1916. However, the Rising began four months earlier on April 24th, at approximately 12 o'clock – Dublin Mean Time. Therefore, when modern commemorations of 1916 begin at midday outside the GPO, they're actually 25 minutes early.

## 39 years ago Facts from 1976

- . Beaver Scouts started in Ireland
- The luxury jet plane, the Concorde, embarked on its first commercial flight in January 1976.
- · The 1976 the Winter Olympics were held in Innsbruck in Austria and the Summer Olympics were held in Montreal, Canada. Nadia Comaneci (from Romania) earned the first of 7 perfect scores of 10 in gymnastics at the event.
- $\cdot$  In Africa, Western Sahara declared independence in 1976 after Spanish Armed forces withdrew from the territory.
- The Apple Computer company was formed on the 1st of April 1976 by Steve Jobbs and Steve Wozniak.
- · In London, Big Ben suffered internal damage and stopped running for over 9 months in 1976.
- · Viking 2 entered into orbit around Mars in 1976. The Viking 2 spacecraft landed at Utopia Planitia on Mars, taking the first close-up color photos of the planet's surface in the same year. The Viking 1 lander successfully landed on Mars in 1976. NASA released the famous "Face on Mars" photo taken by the lander in the same year.
- · Microsoft was officially registered with the Office of the Secretary of the State of New Mexico in the United States in 1976.
- · The world's first laser printer was introduced by IBM in 1976.
- The Irish rock band U2 was formed after drummer Larry Mullen Jr. posted a note seeking members for a band on the notice board of his Dublin school in 1976.
