A speedy forward who represented the county but suffered from poor health and was advised by doctors to give up football in November 1890, although he turned out in a few subsequent friendlies in goal before moving down to Brighton. His total of first-team appearances for the club was 14, in which he scored eight goals, and an older brother appeared with him in two of the friendlies. His father was the minister of what is now known as Beechen Grove Baptist Church, and he himself later became a Baptist minister.

A First Division goalkeeper at 16, and at the time Coventry City's youngest-ever first-team player, Perry Suckling went on to win England caps at two levels, and was eventually brought to Watford immediately after the halcyon era of Tony Coton and David James. He's one of the few modern goalkeepers who have been beaten nine times in a Premier League or Football League match, which occurred in a Crystal Palace fixture at Liverpool.

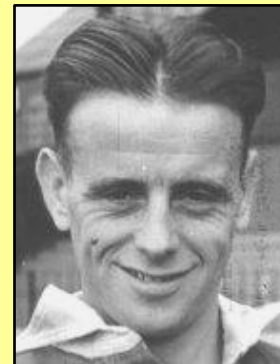

In terms of a misfortune at the very start of a professional football career there can be few fates more cruel than the broken leg which Hugh Surtees suffered in the 1946/47 pre-season public trial match. He recovered to make his Football League début just over a year later on the left wing, but soon lost his place and in his last season-and-a-half at Vicarage Road appeared at that level only twice more. He later worked in the town as a motor mechanic.

At Lincoln City Bobby Svarc was a playing colleague of Graham Taylor, in whose initial ten-year Watford régime he was the only man to be engaged on loan. The move backfired after 37 minutes of action when he suffered an injury which ended his career as a foraging striker with a good scoring record. He had been signed by Jim Smith for Boston United, Colchester United and Blackburn Rovers. A Jehovah's Witness of Czech descent, he went in the burglar-alarm business in Blackburn.

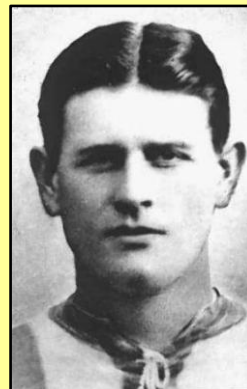

A *sine die* suspension for a breach of discipline (Jimmy Broad was sacked at the same time) ended Jack Swan's Watford career as an experienced, hard-shooting goalscorer. He had earlier, in September 1922, been suspended by Leeds United for going AWOL, but became that club's top-scorer when it took the Second Division title the following season. He played for Huddersfield Town in the 1919/20 FA Cup Final. Of all Watford players, only Jack Barnes has lived longer.

Brian Talbot joined Watford as chairman of the Professional Footballers' Association, an England 'B' captain, holder of six Full caps, the first man ever to have won FA Cup winner's medals in consecutive seasons with different clubs, which he did with Ipswich Town and Arsenal, and was a member of the latter club's side which was beaten in the Final of the 1979/80 European Cup Winners' Cup. A strong and energetic midfielder with a long career encompassing nearly six hundred Football League appearances, he created League history at Aldershot by being simultaneously a player and a director. As a manager he took Hibernians to the Maltese league championship in 1993/94 and 1994/95, and led Rushden & Diamonds into the Football League, in which his son Danny played under his management.

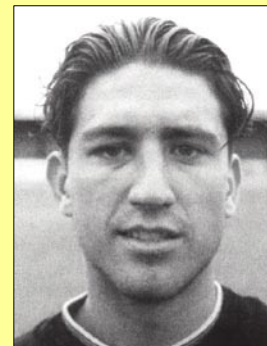

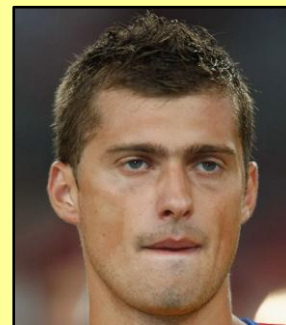

A few weeks into the 2014/15 season an error-strewn start against AFC Bournemouth came to an end for Gabriel Tamas within half-an-hour of the kick-off when he sustained a serious injury. He never played for the club again and his contract was cancelled four months later. He was an experienced player with 63 Full international caps in a career which was littered with frequent and serious disciplinary problems, and following his departure from Vicarage Road he was sacked by Steaua Bucureşti within a few months of signing a two-year contract.

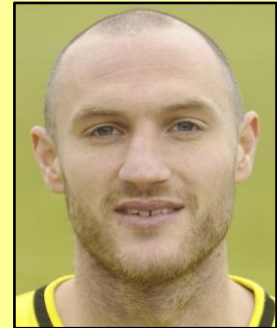

A giant of a centre-half who formed a sound partnership with Adrian Mariappa at the heart of Watford's defence before a serious injury brought an end to 62 successive Football League appearances. Although controversially involved in an incident when with Birmingham City, in which Arsenal's Eduardo suffered an appalling leg injury, Martin Taylor's style of play was not, despite his physical bulk, a conspicuously aggressive one, but encompassed a thoughtful and intelligent approach.

After being head of school at Aldenham in 1893, 'Toby' Taylor became a significant footballing figure in his university days, as a Cambridge blue in three consecutive seasons, honorary secretary in the second of them and captain in the third (1897/98). For West Herts, in addition to his cup appearances he scored nine goals in nine pre-Southern League first-team friendlies, and as well as scoring 38 times in 54 games for Corinthians he served on that club's committee. 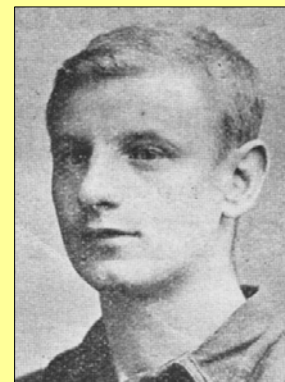

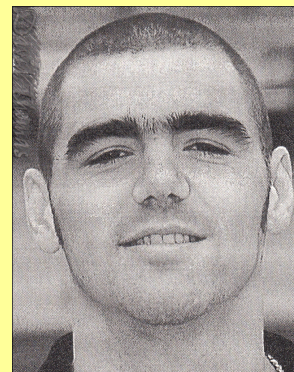

He said he didn't like being called 'Dai', but that was how he was known. There was a foretaste of troubles to come when he was sent off in a pre-season friendly in Finland just after he joined the club. An aggressive and determined striker, he wasn't able to hold down a first-team place, and returned to Wales after one season at Vicarage Road. In July 2000 he was suspended by Cardiff City on full pay, pending investigation into why he was filmed among fighting yobs before the England v Germany match in Charleroi in the European Championship finals. He'd been arrested and deported, and got off with a club fine of two weeks' wages, the maximum allowed. It got worse. He was gaoled for 60 days and banned from all football grounds in England and Wales for six years after being involved in crowd disorder at the Cardiff City v Leeds United FA Cup tie in January 2002.

A bulky centre-forward of the old-fashioned type who joined Watford for what was then a club-record fee for one player, and made his début in mid-season with, remarkably, six other new signings. 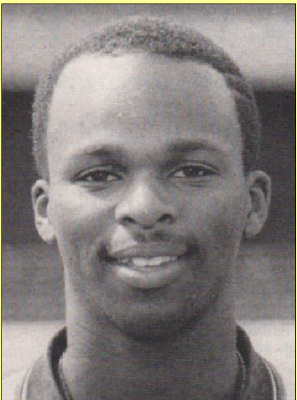

Once a schoolboy prodigy (he played for Brent Schools with Barry Ashby) Rod Thomas scored Watford's extra-time winner in the 1988/89 FA Youth Cup Final, more than a year after making his Football League début at Highbury as a trainee. A darting, dribbling winger, short in stature and with an extremely low centre of balance, he failed to fulfil his early promise but had a good Football League career and was a member of Carlisle United's promoted sides of 1994/95 and 1996/97. Cyril Thompson's tally of 25 Football League and FA Cup goals in 1951/52 was Watford's peacetime best for 17 years. 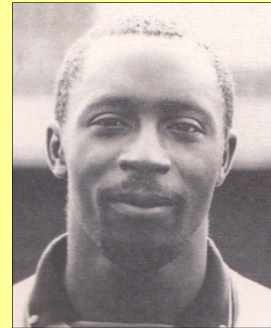

A prodigious worker who was quick to spot danger, George Toone, whose father kept goal for England, was a half-back whose strengths were defensive ones, as borne out by his goals tally. 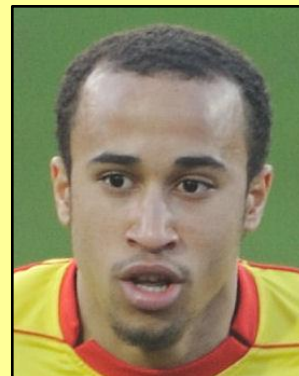

Possessing pace and talent, loan-spell specialist Andros Townsend had Football League experience with eight clubs before ever appearing in the FA Premier League with his employers, although there were a few Tottenham appearances in other first-team competitions. From the very start of his Watford début as a loan player, Dániel Tözsér was on the field for every minute of the 20 matches to the end of the 2013/14 season. He demonstrated a fine reading of the game from a deep midfield position and was always making himself available to receive the ball and dictate the play with skilful left-footed passes, both short and long, and powerfully driven free kicks.

Inexplicably, the club brought this poor chap down from Castle Douglas for one game, in which he scored twice – and this after travelling on the overnight train and reaching Watford at 8 o'clock in the morning – but decided to show no further interest. His partner in the right-wing pairing was his former Douglas Wanderers colleague, George Badenoch. Trainer was described as “frail in build, not yet filled out”, but the same description applied half a century later to Barry Hartle, whom the club, with infinitely more sense on that occasion, set about building up physically and reaped the rewards.

He came to Vicarage Road on loan and went straight into the first team, but after sixty minutes of action he was substituted, and Marcello Trotta's Watford career was over. After doing nothing beyond training for the next few weeks he was sent back to Fulham. All this happened soon after a more productive loan spell with Wycombe Wanderers, where his eight goals in eight games included a hat-trick. Trotta was the culprit in an incident of the highest drama when Brentford lost to Doncaster Rovers in their final third-tier game of 2012/13, in which the result guaranteed to secure automatic promotion for one of them. After four minutes of added time, with the game scoreless, Brentford were awarded a penalty kick. Kevin O'Connor had been instructed by his manager to take the kick, but Trotta grabbed the ball, ignored the manager's instructions and fired the penalty kick against the crossbar. The ball rebounded into play and Doncaster raced downfield to score, thereby winning the match, promotion and the championship, and leaving Brentford to face the Play-offs. They were beaten in the Final at Wembley.

A début goal and a cartilage injury which ended Jimmy Trotter's career were all Watford got for their money. During his time at Hillsborough he topped the Second and First Division scoring lists in consecutive years, twice scoring five times in a match, and altogether accumulated 166 goals in 262 Football League appearances with his four clubs. He went on to be England's sponge-man on many occasions, and after an extremely long Charlton Athletic stint under his former Sheffield Wednesday colleague Jimmy Seed he succeeded him as manager.
