Mizzou will be looking to replace the stellar production by departed linebacker Kentrell Brothers, who led the nation in tackles in 2015, with 12.7 per game. He became the first Tiger to ever win the NCAA tackles title, and he's the first Tiger to lead the nation in any stat category since WR Danario Alexander led the nation in receiving yards in 2009 (137.0 avg.).

Mizzou has won conference division titles in five of the last nine seasons, including winning consecutive SEC Eastern Division Championships in only its second and third years in the league. The only other Power 5 schools to match those five division titles from the 2007-2014 timeframe were Alabama and Florida State, with five apiece.

Mizzou's defense – which returns eight starters from a year ago, and 150 career starts overall – finished the 2015 season ranked among the nation's top 10 in five major categories, including tackles for loss (2nd), points allowed (5th), passing yards allowed (5th), total defense (6th) and first downs allowed (7th).

Mizzou has won 81 games since the start of the 2007 season, a mark that is 16th nationally among programs that have been in BCS-AQ or Power 5 leagues during that stretch of time.

Mizzou returns 100 percent of its production from its defensive line in 2015, and also hopes to have back the services of DT Harold Brantley, who sat out the '15 season due to injury.

Ready to guide the next era of Mizzou Football is Barry Odom, who was selected as the 32nd head coach in MU history when he was introduced by Athletic Director Mack Rhoades on Dec. 4, 2015.

A longtime fixture at Mizzou, Odom, 39, takes over a program he has been immersed in at every level for some 14 years – including six in an administrative capacity (2003-08), four as a coach (2009-11, 2015) and four as a highly-successful student-athlete (1996-99). He has spent the past four seasons as a defensive coordinator, including three at Memphis (2012-14) and one at Missouri, where his units were considered among the best in the nation.

“We are extremely excited to announce Barry Odom as the new leader of the Mizzou football program,” Rhoades said. “We had the opportunity to visit with a number of excellent coaches throughout our search. At the conclusion of that process, Coach Odom was the clear choice to serve as our next coach. He is a man of high integrity and possesses all the qualities you look for in a successful head coach. He has an undeniable passion for Mizzou, a strong track-record of success at each level of his career and a clear vision to mentor our student-athletes and lead our program to even greater heights.”

Odom recently finished up an outstanding season as first-year defensive coordinator for Mizzou and retired coach Gary Pinkel, as his Tigers ranked ninth in the nation in total defense, allowing just 302.0 yards per game. Since the NCAA began tracking defensive statistics in 1978, this marks the first time in MU history that Mizzou has had a top-10 defense. Odom’s defense was also ranked seventh nationally in scoring defense (16.2 avg.), seventh in pass defense (169.2 avg.) and second in tackles for loss (8.8 avg.).

Prior to that, Odom became one of the more highly sought-after coordinators in the country due to three stellar years directing Memphis’ defense from 2012-14. His 2014 defense was a key component of Memphis’ 10-3 season, as his unit finished the regular season ranked fifth nationally in scoring defense (17.1 avg.) and 22nd in total defense (343.3 avg.). That marked an impressive incremental improvement under Odom’s watch, as Memphis ranked 117th nationally in total defense the season prior to his arrival. In his first season at Memphis, the defense improved to 50th nationally (383.6 avg.), followed by a jump to 39th in 2013 (370.7 avg.). Memphis earned a share of the 2014 American Athletic Conference title, giving them a conference championship for the first time since 1971.

“I’m tremendously honored to have this opportunity,” said Odom. “It’s something I’ve thought about for a long time as I’ve made my various stops leading up to this point. I understand the responsibility we have to not only carry on the tradition of excellence that Gary Pinkel has built here, but also to help this program reach new heights. Mizzou means the world to me and to my family, and we couldn’t be more proud and excited to be in this position. There are so many people I am thankful for from throughout my career – they are responsible for allowing me to learn and understand all the facets of building a program – that I couldn’t name them all. I’m grateful to Chancellor Hank Foley, President Mike Middleton, the Board of Curators and Mack Rhoades for their faith in me, and to Gary Pinkel for his support over the years. I can’t wait to get started.”

A true son of Mizzou, Odom, a Maysville, Okla. native, played under former Coach Larry Smith, and starred as a linebacker from 1996-99. He ended his playing career with



362 tackles, which still ranks as seventh-most in school history. Odom was a captain for his senior year of 1999, and was a key figure on the Missouri teams which reached bowl games in 1997 and 1998, ending a 14-year postseason drought for Tiger fans.

Success followed Odom's career path at each future stop after his playing days. After earning his undergraduate degree in December of 1999, he served as an intern with Mizzou's Tiger Scholarship Fund while he worked on his Master's in Education from the University of Missouri (which he would earn in May of 2004). He returned to his home state of Oklahoma in July of that year to serve as an assistant football coach for his alma mater Ada High School, which finished that season as runners-up for a state title. Odom was quickly back in his adopted hometown of Columbia, Mo., the next spring, as he took over as head coach at Rock Bridge High School. He quickly built the Bruins into a power, as they went 6-4 in 2001, and won a conference championship. He followed with an 8-4 campaign in 2002 that saw Rock Bridge reach the semifinals of the state championship playoffs.

Running a college program became a focal point next, and Odom began that path by joining the Mizzou staff, first as an administrative graduate assistant for Gary Pinkel in 2003. He spent the 2004 and 2005 seasons as Pinkel's director of recruiting

as the staff assembled a core group which would help lead Mizzou to consecutive Big 12 Conference North Division titles in 2007 and 2008 which consisted of 12-win and 10-win seasons, respectively.

From 2006-08, Odom helped run Pinkel's program administratively as his director of operations. In that role, Odom oversaw coordination of the team's budget, travel plans (including bowl trips to the Sun, Cotton and Alamo bowls during that stretch), compliance issues, facilities operations and scheduling, as well as assisting with recruiting operations and managing the day-to-day overall operations of the program.

As director of football operations, he coordinated all public relations activities and community service events that required the presence of Mizzou's football student-athletes, and also played a key role as part of the design and planning team that oversaw the expansion and renovation of the Mizzou Athletics Training Complex, which opened in February of 2008.

Born Nov. 26, 1976 in Lawton, Okla., Odom and his wife Tritia (Tia) were married in July of 2000. Tia is a native of Kahoka, Mo., and is a graduate of MU's College of Human Environmental Sciences. The couple has three children – sons James Trump and Garyt Robert, and daughter Anna Lockwood.

Andy Hill has coached 20 seasons at Mizzou, making him the longest-tenured coach on the Tiger football staff. In fact, only two other assistant coaches in MU football history have enjoyed longer tenures at Mizzou: Clay Cooper (29 seasons) and Chauncey Simpson (21), who Hill will match this season.

In 2016, Hill will transition back to coaching the wide receivers, a role that gained him some well-deserved recognition from 1999-2012, coaching some of the best players in Mizzou history. He spent 2013-15 coaching Mizzou's quarterbacks, including mentoring freshman starter Drew Lock in 2015.

Regarded as one of the top recruiters in the country, Hill also has a long-standing track record of coaching success at Mizzou, as he helped develop three 1st-Team All-Americans in a span from 2007-2010 -- WR Jeremy Maclin, WR Danario Alexander and TE Michael Egnew.

Seven of Hill's receivers caught double-digit passes in 2012, and they were led by junior wideout Marcus Lucas, who had a team-high 46 catches for 509 yards, while adding three touchdowns. Freshman WR Dorial Green-Beckham showed flashes of why he was considered one of the top recruits in the entire nation in 2012, as he ended with 28 receptions for 395 yards and a team-best five TDs.

Hill coached several of the most prolific pass catchers in the nation, as well as in Mizzou history. In 2010, junior TE Michael Egnew emerged as the nation's most productive receiving tight end, as he won consensus 1st-Team All-American honors, and was a Mackey Award finalist, for a year that saw him catch 90 passes for 762

yards and five touchdowns. That was an astounding progression for Egnew, who caught a combined seven passes in his first two years as a Tiger. Another great story in 2010 was the development of sophomore WR T.J. Moe into one of the nation's most prolific receivers as well. Moe burst onto the scene by catching 92 passes for 1,045 yards and six touchdowns, a year after he caught two passes as a true freshman in 2009. Moe's play won him 2nd-Team All-Big 12 honors.

The 2013 season marked an exciting shift in duties for Hill, as the Mizzou grad took over quarterback responsibilities, after working with Tiger receivers since he joined the staff in 1996. He was also awarded in December of 2012 with a promotion to Associate Head Coach.

Hill's work with the Tiger signal callers was outstanding in 2013, as he helped guide senior James Franklin and redshirt freshman Maty Mauk to stellar play which keyed MU's run to the SEC Eastern Division championship.

Franklin was one of the top producers in the country as he averaged just under 300 yards of total offense in his 10 starts which saw him post a 9-1 record. Mauk took over the reins for a crucial four-game stretch in the heart of SEC play when Franklin went out with a shoulder injury sustained in a win at 7th-ranked Georgia in October. Despite his inexperience, Mauk helped navigate Florida, South Carolina, Tennessee and Kentucky to the tune of a 3-1 record in those starts. Mauk earned SEC All-Freshman honors for his inaugural season, which included an 11-to-2 TD-to-INT ratio.

Danario Alexander's 2009 season saw



him lead the NCAA in receiving (137.0 yards per game), as he shattered school records for receptions (113), receiving yards (1,781) and receiving touchdowns (14). Alexander twice won Big 12 Offensive Player of the Week honors during his incredible 2009 season – making him the first receiver in the talent-rich tradition of the Big 12 Conference to win the honor twice in the same season. Alexander won 1st-Team All-American honors for his efforts in 2009, and he ended his career holding the MU career record for receiving yards (2,778).

The 2009 season saw senior punter Jake Harry IV turn in an outstanding season which included honorable mention All-Big 12 honors. Harry ranked 29th nationally in punting average (42.77), and he helped Mizzou rank 4th in the country in team net punting (40.48) – the highest MU has ever finished in the national standings in the category.

The 2008 season saw Hill work to develop sophomore Jeremy Maclin into arguably the most dynamic player in the nation. Maclin set an MU single-season record with 102 catches, 1,260 yards and 13 touchdowns receiving, and he also led the NCAA in all-purpose yardage, with his per-game average of 202.4 yards. The game-changer won consensus 1st-Team All-American honors for his play, as well as being named a finalist for the Biletnikoff Award, given annually to the nation's top receiver. Maclin chose to bypass his final two years of eligibility at Mizzou, and was taken with the 19th overall selection in the 2009 NFL Draft by the Philadelphia Eagles.

Hill's group produced in record numbers during the Tigers' 10-4 season in 2008. As a team, Mizzou's passing attack shattered school records for receptions (404), receiving yards (4,625) and receiving touchdowns (41). Mizzou's passing attack ranked 4th in the NCAA in 2008, with a per-game average of 330.36 yards. In addition to Maclin's many exploits, another pupil of Hill's had a strong close to his Tiger

career. Former walk-on Tommy Saunders developed into one of the Big 12's most underrated receiving threats, as he caught 72 passes for 833 yards and seven scores in 2008, and he ended his career ranked among MU's top-10 in both receptions and yardage.

Thanks in no small part to Hill's work with the receivers, Mizzou's offense set myriad records in 2007, as the passing attack ranked 9th in the NCAA, averaging 314.07 yards per game. Two of his pupils, senior Will Franklin and freshman Jeremy Maclin, earned all-league honors for their outstanding play in 2007, including Maclin, who was a consensus 1st-Team All-American for his exploits as both a receiver and return man, in addition to being named 1st-Team All-Big 12 and Big 12 Offensive Freshman of the Year.

Under Hill's tutelage in 2006, the Tiger receiving corps was instrumental in helping Mizzou develop into a passing attack that ranked 10th in the country, averaging 276.15 yards per game. Four Tiger wideouts had 25 or more catches, including Franklin (48), Perry (37), Brad Ekwerekwu (32) and Tommy Saunders (25). Franklin earned honorable mention All-Big 12 status for his breakout year. Perry, a true freshman, developed quicker than anticipated, as Hill coached him to honorable mention freshman All-American honors.

Hill also doubles as a highly-successful recruiter, primarily in the Kansas City and mid-Missouri areas. He was named by Rivals.com as one of the top-10 recruiters in the Big 12 Conference for 2007.

Hill helped develop Gage into one of the top receivers in the Big 12 Conference and one of the premier wide outs in the country. After converting from quarterback in the spring of 2000, Gage caught 200 passes for 2,704 yards and 18 touchdowns in three seasons – all MU career receiving records. Gage left after 2002 holding virtually every game, season and career receiving mark



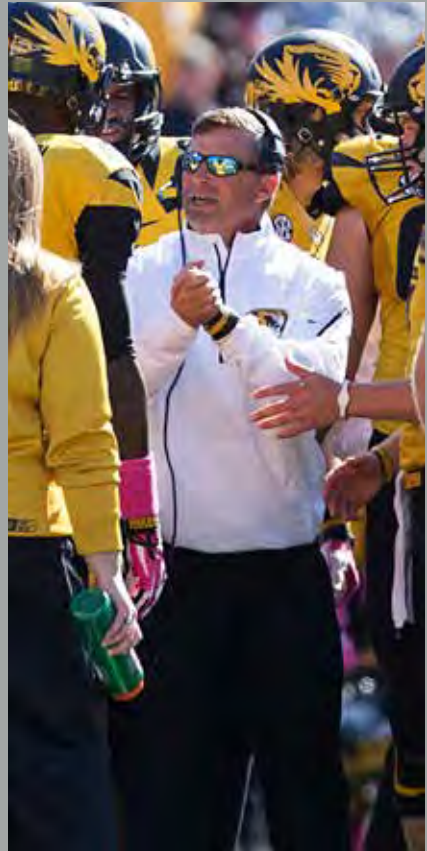
on the Mizzou books, and made an impact professionally, where he was the Tennessee Titans' leading receiver in 2007 and 2008.

Five of Hill's receivers are among 13 Tigers all-time to accumulate over 160 receiving yards in a single-game, with Gage holding the school record of 236 yards (accomplished twice). Missouri has had 16 different receivers go over 100 yards in a single game during Hill's tenure.

Previous to Missouri, Hill was the head football coach at Hutchinson (Kan.) Junior College. Hutchinson went 18-6 under Hill, including a 10-2 record in 1995 when it won its first Conference title since 1969 and ranked ninth in the final NJCAA national poll. He was named the conference Coach of the Year. Hill was the offensive coordinator at Hutchinson in 1992 and 1993 after serving as a graduate assistant at SMU in the spring of 1992.

Hill is a Mizzou grad who walked on the Tiger football team in 1980 and eventually earned a scholarship. He lettered in 1980, '81, '83 and '84 and played on Missouri teams that earned trips to the Liberty, Tangerine and Holiday Bowls. In his career, Hill caught 51 passes for 946 yards and scored seven touchdowns. As a senior, he caught 25 passes for 445 yards and three scores. Following his playing days at Missouri, he spent time in the training camps of the Kansas City Chiefs and Calgary Stampeders in 1985 and '86.

Hill and his wife Sarah are the parents of a daughter, Patricia Ryan, and son Andrew. He earned his Bachelor of Arts degree in economics from MU in 1985.

Cornell Ford

Asst. Head Coach/Running Backs

Cornell Ford is in his 16th season at Mizzou and is entering his first working year with the Tiger running backs. Previously, Ford spent 12 years coaching the Tiger cornerbacks, after he focused on MU's outside safeties his first three years. Ford is also the Tigers' chief recruiter in St. Louis, where he has signed some of the very best players in the state who have been critical to Mizzou's success over the years.

Mizzou's defense was a key to its 2014 SEC Eastern Division title run, and the pass defense supplied by Ford's secondary played a big role. His corners contributed to a defense which ranked 2nd in the SEC in pass defense (185.8 yds/game) in league games. Led by sophomore Aarion Penton, who had three interceptions, Ford's corners accounted for 23 pass break ups combined, including a team-best 10 from Penton and nine from JUCO transfer Kenya Dennis in his first year with the Tigers.

Mizzou's secondary was one of the most impactful in the nation in 2013, as the Tigers led the SEC and ranked 5th nationally with 20 interceptions. Ford's corners tallied nine of those picks, including five by senior E.J. Gaines, who won 1st-Team All-SEC honors. Fellow senior Randy Ponder had a pair of interceptions, and freshmen Aarion Penton and John Gibson both grabbed one apiece, and gained valuable experience that bodes well for the future when Gaines was lost for two games to a leg injury sustained in a win at 7th-ranked Georgia in October.

Gaines became the highest drafted Mizzou cornerback since 1983 when he was selected in the sixth round of the 2014 NFL Draft by the St. Louis Rams.

In 2011, Ford oversaw the development of Gaines into one of the nation's top young cover men. Gaines set a Mizzou record with 16 pass break ups in his first year as a starter, and tied for 5th nationally with 18 passes defended overall (including 2 interceptions). Gaines had a solid junior season in 2012, when he made 74 tackles, and led the Tigers with 11 pass breakups.

Both of Ford's starting cornerbacks earned All-Big 12 status for three straight seasons (2008-10), including Carl Gettis and

Kevin Rutland both in 2009 and 2010. The Tiger pass defense was a large reason for Mizzou's much-improved play in 2010, as MU led the Big 12 and ranked 6th nationally in scoring defense, allowing just 16.08 points per game. The Tigers also ranked 11th nationally in pass efficiency defense, with an opponent passer rating of 108.45.

Rutland's development earned him an invitation to the 2011 NFL Combine, and while he went undrafted, he was signed immediately by Jacksonville, and in the 2011 season made his first career NFL start.

In 2009, Gettis and Rutland were named honorable mention all-league by league coaches for their play. Gettis ranked 6th on the team in 2009 with 61 tackles, and led the team with 5 pass break ups, to go with having a hand in 4 turnovers in his third year as a starter. Rutland, in his first year as a starter, developed into MU's top corner, as he won honorable-mention all-league status and was named the team's cornerback of the year for his season, which included 47 tackles and a team-high 2 interceptions.

Both of Ford's starting cornerbacks earned All-Big 12 mention in 2008, with senior Castine Bridges and sophomore Carl Gettis winning honorable mention all-league acclaim for their play on the Tigers' 10-4 squad. Gettis further established himself as one of the top young defensive backs in the Big 12 Conference as he ranked 5th on the Tiger squad with 78 tackles, 4 pass break ups and 1 interception. Bridges closed out his Tiger career with 69 tackles and 1 interception, plus a team-high 7 pass break ups.

Mizzou's cornerbacks turned in a solid 2007 season overall, and were a definite reason that the Tiger defense was one of the best in the Big 12 Conference. True freshman Carl Gettis blossomed under Ford's coaching, as he became a starter early in the year and eventually won 2nd-Team Freshman All-American honors for his play. Senior Darnell Terrell was invited to the NFL Combine in the off-season, and later signed a free-agent contract with the Cleveland Browns.

The Tiger secondary was instrumental in MU's defensive improvement in 2006, and Ford's cornerbacks were a big reason why.



Led by junior Darnell Terrell, who earned honorable mention All-Big 12 honors from league coaches, the Tigers ranked 2nd in the Big 12 Conference, and 37th nationally, in pass defense, permitting 185.69 yards per game on average. That fact was even more impressive, considering that sophomore starting CB Domonique Johnson missed five games due to a knee injury midway through the season.

After losing his top performer from 2004 in Shirdonya Mitchell, Ford helped develop his cornerback unit into one that was dependable and steady in 2005. Mizzou ended the 2005 regular season ranking 4th in the Big 12 in pass defense, allowing an average of 212.55 yards per game.

Senior Marcus King blossomed into a big-play performer for the Tiger secondary in 2005, as he led the team with a career-high 13 passes broken up – including a record-breaking 99-yard interception return for a TD in the Independence Bowl win. King earned honorable mention All-Big 12 honors by both league coaches and media for his efforts, and he teamed with fellow senior A.J. Kincade to give the Tigers a dependable tandem. King later went on to earn a free agent contract with the NFL's Dallas Cowboys following the 2006 NFL Draft, and another Ford protégé, Calvin Washington, was invited to the rookie minicamp with Washington following the draft as well.

Just about every one of Ford's cornerbacks had career years under his coaching in 2004, and that performance was instrumental in Mizzou's substantial improvement in defense. Thanks in large part to his cornerbacks, Mizzou led the Big 12 Conference, and ranked 3rd nationally in pass defense in 2004, allowing an average of just 149.27 yards per game. His corners grabbed 8 of MU's 15 interceptions in 2004, which was a nice team improvement from a total of 9 in 2003 (including 3 from cornerbacks that year).

Senior Shirdonya Mitchell blossomed into a high-level cornerback in 2004 under Ford's direction, as he ranked 5th in the Big

12 Conference, and 33rd nationally, with his 4 interceptions. Mitchell earned honorable mention All-Big 12 honors for his play, in only his second year playing defense, and signed a two-year free agent deal with the Miami Dolphins following the 2005 NFL Draft. Juniors Marcus King and A.J. Kincade also had big years, as King tied for the team lead with four turnovers gained (2 interceptions and 2 fumbles) and led the team with 7 pass break ups, while Kincade had a career-high 2 interceptions, including a game-winning pickoff in overtime of the season finale at Iowa State.

In addition to his coaching duties, Ford has worked hard to earn a reputation as one of the most well-trusted recruiting presences in his area of St. Louis. His hard work and straightforward approach has paid off recently, as he has successfully attracted stars such as Will Franklin, Jeremy Maclin and 2008 signees Blaine Gabbert and Wes Kemp to Mizzou. In 2009, he landed Gateway Tech superstar Sheldon Richardson, who was one of the nation's top overall prospects, and this past February, MU signed a class which ranked 21st-best in the nation according to Rivals.com, and that was the highest ranking ever for a Tiger recruiting class. Ford was also successful in getting Missouri's foot in the door in other St. Louis schools where there hadn't been much Tiger success in recent years.

Ford spent five seasons at Toledo coaching the wide receivers. Toledo graduate Mel Long pulled in 175 receptions in his four-year career, 21 of those for touchdowns. He also held the longest active streak in NCAA Division I for consecutive games with a reception. Under Ford, Long became Toledo's all-time leading receiver.

Ford holds a bachelor's degree (1991) in physical education and a master's degree (1993) in sports administration from Toledo.

He and his wife, Dawn, are the parents of a son, Devin, and a daughter, Taylor.

DeMontie Cross

Defensive Coordinator/Linebackers
First Year at Mizzou
St. Louis, Mo.

One of Barry Odom's biggest recruiting achievements was adding Mizzou alum and successful veteran coach DeMontie Cross to his staff shortly after he became Mizzou's head coach in December. Cross will serve as Mizzou's defensive coordinator and linebackers coach.

Cross comes home to Mizzou after spending the past 18 seasons with numerous programs, including 12 years with Power 5 programs and five more in the National Football League. In all, he has been part of eight bowl teams and three conference championship teams since beginning his coaching days as a graduate assistant/outside linebackers coach at Mizzou for Larry Smith (1998-99).

Cross has spent the last three seasons at TCU as linebackers coach, and in 2015 he added the duties of co-defensive coordinator. The 11th-ranked Horned Frogs are 10-2 this season and are preparing to face 15th-ranked Oregon Jan. 2nd in the Alamo Bowl. Cross will join the Mizzou staff shortly after the conclusion of the bowl game.

TCU opened the 2015 campaign as the only school in the nation without a linebacker who had ever made a collegiate start. When the regular season ended, Cross had coached up converted safety Travin Howard to All-Big 12 recognition, while former high school quarterback Ty Summers was named the Walter Camp National Defensive Player of the Week after his 23 tackles in a win over Baylor. Summers also received honorable-mention Big 12 Defensive Freshman of the Year accolades, as the Horned Frogs' defensive unit led the Big 12 and ranked 7th nationally in third-down defense, allowing opponents a conversion rate of only 28.0% on the season.

In the 2014 season, Cross' pupil Paul Dawson won Big 12 Defensive Player of

the Year and consensus first-team All-America honors. Dawson was the only player in the nation with at least 100 tackles, six sacks and four interceptions. Dawson (136) and Marcus Mallet (100) combined to make 236 tackles as TCU's starting linebackers in 2014. Dawson was a third-round draft pick of the Cincinnati Bengals.

Prior to TCU, Cross spent one year each as linebackers coach at Kansas (2012) and as special teams coordinator/safeties coach at Wisconsin (2011), the latter which featured an 11-3 season and Big Ten Conference title and Rose Bowl appearance for the Badgers, who finished that season ranked 10th nationally in the final polls.

"DeMontie is an outstanding addition to our staff," said Odom. "He's really established himself as one of the top defensive minds in college football, and he's had success at every stop he's been at over the years. I've witnessed him on the road recruiting, he's relentless and has done a great job of establishing meaningful relationships in a number of geographic areas. I know he'll be a great mentor and leader who will relate well with our guys. I expect DeMontie to bring some great ideas and concepts defensively to us that will build on what we've been able to do this past year. Obviously he has great enthusiasm, excitement and passion for Mizzou, and we're proud to have him back here," Odom said.

Odom and Cross were teammates for one year at Mizzou, when Cross was a senior free safety and Odom a true freshman linebacker in 1996.

"I'm so excited to have this opportunity to work with Coach Odom and contribute to a place that has given me so much," said Cross. "Mizzou is in my blood, it's the place that made me the man and the coach that

I am today. It's also a dream come true for me to work alongside a guy I've known for so long. Coach Odom and I have had a strong bond on and off the field, and I'm excited to come in and support him and his vision in every aspect imaginable. I'm honored he's put his trust in me this way. Mizzou has already established a good reputation on defense, so all I'm looking to do is come in and put my own twist to it and try to make it even better. My players will know that a sense of urgency, attention to detail, and playing with enthusiasm and energy are the things that are most important to me. I think people enjoy watching a defense that plays that way," he said.

Cross spent five seasons (2006-10) in various positions with the NFL's Buffalo Bills. He joined the Bills as a defensive staff/special teams assistant in 2006 and was then promoted to assistant linebackers coach/special teams for three seasons, after which he was promoted again in 2010, taking over as the Bills' inside linebackers coach.

He made the jump to the NFL after spending the 2001-05 seasons as Iowa State's outside linebackers coach and special teams coordinator. Cross' unit was a major contributor to the Cyclones' record-setting defenses and four bowl game appearances during his stint. He helped develop Jeremy Loyd into an All-Big 12 performer and future St. Louis Ram.

Cross spent the 2000 season coaching a defensive backfield at Sam Houston State that ranked second nationally in the FCS. The Bearkats' pass defense was led by free safety Keith Davis, who was the Southland Conference Defensive Player of the Year. Davis went on to play six seasons and start 31 games for the Dallas Cowboys.

A St. Louis, Mo. native and 1997 Missouri graduate with a degree in business management, Cross was a standout safety for the Tigers from 1994-96. Despite playing at MU for just three years, Cross ended his career holding the school record with 415 career tackles (he now stands second on the list) after leading MU in stops as a junior (145) and senior (132). He was a second-team all-conference selection in both the Big Eight (1995) and the Big 12 (1996) conferences.

Cross enjoyed a standout prep football career at Hazelwood East High School in St. Louis, and initially attended Illinois on a football scholarship before transferring to Mizzou. Cross is married to Jessica and he has three daughters: Jady, Sheridan and Olivia.

Josh Heupel

The first outside hire for brand new Head Coach Barry Odom was to get Josh Heupel – one of the most recognizable and successful names in college football – to join his ranks at Mizzou. It was announced on Dec. 17, 2015 that Heupel will serve as Mizzou's offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach.

Heupel brings with him an impressive track record of success, including four national championship game appearances, seven BCS bowl games and coaching oversight of two Heisman Trophy winning quarterbacks. He has 13 years of coaching and recruiting experience at the highest level, including the last five seasons as offensive coordinator and play caller at Oklahoma and Utah State. Heupel finished his first season as assistant head coach/offensive coordinator/quarterbacks coach with Utah State.

Heupel has been part of 13 bowl games and six conference championship teams since beginning his coaching career in 2003, including 11 seasons on staff at his alma mater Oklahoma (2003-04, 2006-14). During his coaching tenure at OU, the Sooners played in three national championship games (2003, 2004 and 2008 seasons), and Heupel helped mentor two Heisman Trophy winning quarterbacks in Jason White (2003) and Sam Bradford (2008), while a third, Landry Jones, won the Sammy Baugh Award in 2010 as the nation's top passer. Heupel's name also carries a lot of clout in recruiting circles due to his prowess as a quarterback during his playing days, when he led Oklahoma to the BCS National Championship in 2000, while finishing as the Heisman runner-up that season.

"I'm really pleased to have someone the caliber of Josh Heupel join our staff," said Odom. "I've known him for a long time and have always respected him highly, as a player, a coach, a recruiter and a coordinator. I've been impressed by the offenses that he

runs, they're very difficult to defend, and his achievements speak for themselves. He's a high-character person who has the type of leadership abilities that will be outstanding for our program, and he's exactly what we're looking for. We're excited to have him on board," said Odom.

"I am very grateful to Coach Odom for this opportunity," said Heupel. "First and foremost I believe in the person Barry Odom is and what he stands for. I believe in the vision that he has for this program. I have a lot of respect for Mizzou and the football program, as someone who's seen it from an outsider's perspective for a long time. I believe this is a special place that has just scratched the surface of what it can be, and it's a program that is capable of winning championships on a consistent basis. I want to be part of that. I think it's a great time to be at Mizzou, and I'm excited to get there and to go to work," he said.

Utah State reached a bowl game in 2015 despite losing all-star quarterback Chuckie Keeton to a season-ending knee injury after just three games. Despite that loss, Heupel's Aggie offense improved to 60th nationally in scoring (29.7 ppg), up from 81st in 2014, prior to his arrival there.

In his final season at Oklahoma, the Sooner offense led the nation in fewest sacks allowed (0.69 pg), and led the Big 12 and ranked 10th nationally by averaging 261.2 rushing yards per game, which was the best output by OU since 1991. OU also ranked third in the Big 12 and 20th in the nation in scoring (36.4 ppg), and fifth in the Big 12 and 23rd nationally in total offense (464.7 ypg).

With Heupel calling the signals of a balanced Oklahoma offensive attack in 2013, the Sooners led the Big 12 by averaging 223.9 rushing yards and 423.0 yards of total offense. Despite three different quarterbacks seeing action over the course of the season, the Sooners registered an 11-2 campaign, culminating with a 45-31 win



against Alabama in the Sugar Bowl.

In 2012, Oklahoma ranked fifth in the nation in passing (336.5 ypg) and 12th in total offense (497.9 ypg) as Jones became the Big 12's all-time leader in passing yards and total offense. Jones also finished his career third all-time in passing yards (16,646) and fifth all-time in touchdowns (123) in FBS history.

In 2011, Heupel's unit finished fourth nationally in both total offense (512.3 ypg) and passing offense (349.4 ypg). Jones ranked third in the nation in total offense that year after finishing second in the nation in passing yards in 2010 when he won the Sammy Baugh Award as the nation's top passer. Jones led all FBS freshmen with 26 touchdowns after Bradford was lost to injury in the 2009 season opener.

In 2008, Heupel tutored Bradford, who won the Heisman Trophy, Davey O'Brien and Sammy Baugh Awards, after throwing for 4,720 yards and 50 touchdowns with just eight interceptions and leading the nation in passing efficiency.

Prior to being a full-time assistant at Oklahoma, Heupel spent the 2005 season as the tight ends coach at Arizona. He began his coaching career as a graduate assistant at Oklahoma as he helped the Sooners to the 2004 (Sugar Bowl) and 2005 (Orange Bowl) national championship games. A native of Aberdeen, S.D., Heupel began his collegiate playing career at Weber State where he played in four games as a redshirt freshman in 1997. He then spent his sophomore season at Snow College in Ephraim, Utah, where he earned All-American honors as he

passed for 2,308 yards and 28 touchdowns.

Heupel then transferred to Oklahoma for his final two seasons, and he was the runner-up for the Heisman Trophy as a senior in 2000 while leading the Sooners to an undefeated regular season and a national championship victory against Florida State in the 2001 Orange Bowl. As a senior, Heupel was named the Associated Press Player of the Year, the Walter Camp Award winner, the Archie Griffin Award winner and a consensus All-American. Overall, Heupel was OU's first consensus All-America quarterback and first Oklahoma quarterback since 1971 to earn All-America honors.

During his two years at Oklahoma, Heupel posted a 20-5 record as the starting quarterback as he passed for 7,456 yards with 53 touchdowns. Overall, Heupel still ranks among the top three quarterbacks all-time in school history in passing yards (7,456), completions (654) and touchdowns passes (53) despite playing just two seasons.

Following his collegiate career, Heupel was drafted in the sixth round of the 2001 NFL Draft by the Miami Dolphins.

Heupel earned his bachelor's degree in business marketing from Oklahoma in 2001. Heupel and his wife Dawn have one daughter, Hannah (7), and one son, Jace (5).

Continuing with the Mizzou coaching staff for his second season is Ryan Walters, who came to MU with Barry Odom in February of 2015 when Odom was announced as the defensive coordinator.

Now Mizzou's head coach, Odom of course kept Walters on board for his second season coaching the safeties. Thanks to his outstanding work on the field, as well as in recruiting circles, Odom named Walters Co-Defensive Coordinator this off-season.

Walters was a key factor in Mizzou's 2015 defense that finished in the top 10 nationally in total defense, scoring defense and pass defense.

He also developed senior Ian Simon and sophomore Anthony Sherrills into two of the top safeties in the SEC in 2015.

Walters, 30, came to Mizzou after spending the 2014 season as cornerbacks coach at Memphis, where he worked with Odom. At Memphis, the pair oversaw a defense that was among the most improved in the nation. Memphis went 10-3 in 2014, thanks in large part to its defense which ranked fifth nationally in points allowed (17.1 ppg) and 22nd in total defense (343.3 ypg) in the regular season.

Walters, a Los Angeles, Calif. native, played collegiately at Colorado, where he was a standout safety for the Buffaloes (2004-08). He began his coaching career as a student assistant at Colorado working with the secondary in 2009, and then spent two years on staff at Arizona, where he was a

graduate assistant in 2010, before being promoted to defensive backs coach for the 2011 season.

From there, Walters moved to the Oklahoma staff as a graduate assistant cornerbacks coach in 2012, as the Sooners went 10-3 and played in the 2013 Cotton Bowl. He moved to North Texas for the 2013 season, where he coached corners and helped lead UNT to a 9-4 record in its first year in Conference USA and a win in the 2013 Heart of Dallas Bowl. The Mean Green defense that season ranked fourth in the nation in turnovers gained (34), eighth in points allowed (17.8 ppg), 13th in interceptions (18) and 17th in total defense (348.3 ypg).

"I'm really pleased that we are able to attract someone of Ryan's caliber to join our team," said Defensive Coordinator/Linebackers Coach Barry Odom. "I've known him for a while now, and had the chance to work together last year and he made a big impression on me. He's a loyal and tireless worker who I see as a great technician and fundamentals coach. He was very sought after this past season, so we're excited to recruit him to Mizzou," he said.

Odom first met Walters as part of a trip the Mizzou coaching staff took to Arizona to share best practices in 2010, and recruited Walters on the staff at Memphis when he had an opening for the 2014 season.

As a player, Walters had a standout career at Colorado as a safety. He started in 33 games and played in 46 contests for the Buffaloes. He earned



honorable mention All-Big 12 honors from the Associated Press and first-team All-Colorado honors from the state's National Football Foundation his senior year.

A team captain for the Buffaloes in 2008, Walters was also picked by his teammates the team's MVP. He had 87 tackles, two sacks, seven pass deflections, three fumble recoveries and two interceptions his senior year. His 20 career passes defended rate No. 15 in Colorado history and his 223 career tackles were No. 45 all-time.

During his playing time, the Buffaloes played in the Houston Bowl, Champ Sports Bowl and Independence Bowl.

Walters earned his degree in history from Colorado in December, 2008 with dual majors in History and Ethnic Studies. Walters and his wife Tara have a son, Aaron.

Veteran coach Greg Brown joined the Mizzou coaching staff on Jan. 4, 2016. Brown will serve as Mizzou's cornerbacks coach, and he comes to MU with a long resume of success coaching the secondary at both the collegiate and professional levels, including defensive coordinator stints at both Arizona and Colorado. Two of his pupils (1992-Deon Figures/Colorado and 2014-Gerod Holliman/Louisville), have won the Jim Thorpe Award, given annually to the nation's best defensive back, while a third he coached for three years won the same award the year after he moved to another job (1994-Chris Hudson/Colorado).

Brown is a 36-year veteran of the coaching profession who has spent the last 10 years at Power Five schools coaching defensive backs, which preceded a 12-year run coaching the secondary with five different NFL franchises. In all, Brown has 18 years of college coaching experience (15 with Power Five schools) and 17 years of professional experience (15 NFL, two USFL) to his credit.

He's coming off a very successful two-year stint at Louisville, where he coached the secondary and served as recruiting coordinator for the Cardinals, who have gone to a pair of bowl games after posting records of 9-4 (2014) and 8-5 (2015).

"Greg's experience is unmatched around the country, and the success he's had with the guys he's coached at every level is so impressive," said Odom. "He always produces very well-coached players who compete at the highest level, and he's got a tremendous track record of developing guys to play at or above their top level. His experience and leadership will be great assets to add to our staff. I've known him for a long time, and he's recognized as one of the best in the business at what he does. He'll bring a tremendous amount of knowledge and respect to our program and university," he said.

"I'm really excited to be part of the University of Missouri and to go to work with Barry Odom and the talented staff that he's putting together," said Brown. "I've been very impressed with the success he's had throughout his career, and I can't wait to get in and help build on the great defense he put together last season. I've always been aware of the great tradition at Mizzou, and that dates back a long time. I've seen what kind of passion Mizzou's fans have for their program, and I'm looking forward to being part of that," he said.

Brown joined Louisville for the 2014 season, and both of his starting safeties ended up as NFL draft picks. James Sample, who led the Cardinals in tackles that year, was a fourth-round pick of Jacksonville, while safety Gerod Holliman tied an NCAA record with 14 interceptions, and was a seventh-round pick of Pittsburgh.

Brown guided Holliman, who was a consensus All-American, to the Jim Thorpe Award for the nation's top defensive back. He was also a finalist for the Bronko Nagurski Award, given to the country's top defensive player. Brown came to Louisville after coaching the secondary at Alabama in 2013 under Nick Saban and tutoring Ha Ha Clinton-Dix, a first round pick of the Green Bay Packers that season.

In his accomplished career at the collegiate and pro level, Brown has mentored some outstanding players in the secondary, like All-Pro Rodney Harrison with the San Diego Chargers and outstanding NFL players like Scott Case, Lance Shulters, Kevin Ross, Merton Hanks, Samari Rolle, Blaine Bishop and Marcus Robinson. During one of his three stints at Colorado, Brown guided Deon Figures to the Jim Thorpe Award in 1992. Overall, he has coached five all Big Eight or Big 12 performers, six draft picks and 15 NFL All-Pro performers.

He also tutored a pair of young cornerbacks in Jimmy Smith and Jalil Brown, with Smith a two-time All-Big 12 performer. In 2005, Brown wrapped up his fourth and final year as a defensive assistant with the NFL's New Orleans Saints under coach Jim Haslett. The Saints 2005 pass defense ranked third in the entire NFL, allowing only 178 yards per game.

Brown, who spent the 2011-12 seasons as the defensive coordinator at the University of Colorado, also was the co-defensive coordinator at the University of Arizona in 2010. Brown was part of a resurgence of the Wildcat football program into the top 25 rankings for the first time in a decade and helped lead the Wildcats to an appearance in the Alamo Bowl. Under Brown's tutelage, the Wildcats were ranked 33rd in the nation in total defense and held five opponents to 14 points or less during the year.

Brown spent four years in Boulder (2006-09), the last three as the passing game defensive coordinator. It was his second stint at Colorado, following and preceding National Football League jobs with six different teams for 15 years.



Brown joined the CU staff under new coach Dan Hawkins following the completion of the 2005 National Football League season. In his first two seasons at Colorado, he helped tutor Terrence Wheatley, coaching him to first-team All-Big 12 honors and a second round NFL draft pick by the New England Patriots. In his final year he coached Cornerback Cha'Pelle Brown to second-team All-Big 12 honors, with three other secondary players earning honorable mention status.

Brown rejoined the Atlanta Falcons as secondary coach for the 2000 and 2001 seasons after spending the 1999 campaign as the defensive backs coach for the San Francisco 49ers.

He spent the 1995-96 seasons as the secondary coach for San Diego, with the Chargers finishing in the top five both years in fewest yards allowed per completion, where he came in contact with Harrison, who eventually would become one of the league's top safeties. He moved on to the Tennessee Oilers, coaching the secondary in both 1997 and 1998.

In his first stint at Colorado, Brown helped Colorado lead the nation in pass completion defense and the Big Eight in pass defense in 1992. Brown joined the CU staff days after the Buffs won their first national championship (January 7, 1991). He returned to the NFL in 1994, joining the Atlanta staff as defensive backs coach. The Falcons finished second that season in the league with 23 interceptions.

Brown started his coaching career in 1981 as a graduate assistant at the University of Texas-

El Paso, his alma mater, where he worked with the secondary. The following year, 1982, the Arvada, Colo. native came back to his home state, serving as a defensive coach at Green Mountain High School in Lakewood.

His first stint in the professional ranks came the following spring, with Brown joining the staff of the Denver Gold of the United States Football League (USFL). He coached the secondary for the Gold for two seasons (1983, 1984) before moving on to the NFL for the first time in the summer of 1984, joining the Tampa Bay Buccaneers staff. For the Bucs, he coached three different positions: defensive quality control (1984), offensive quality control (1985) and the U-backs/tight ends (1986). Brown returned to the college game in 1987, coaching the defensive backs for two seasons at the University of Wyoming before doing the same at Purdue for the 1989 and 1990 campaigns. He then returned home to Colorado for a second time in joining McCartney's staff in 1991.

He graduated from UTEP in 1980 with a bachelor's degree in education (history/physical education). At UTEP, Brown lettered twice at cornerback. He earned his A.A. degree from Glendale (Ariz.) Junior College in 1978. Brown graduated from Arvada (Colo.) High School, where he lettered in both football and track.

His father, Irv Brown, is a long-time Denver radio personality and the former head baseball coach and one-time assistant football coach at the University of Colorado. He is married to the former Stacie Bible, and the couple has two daughters (Hannah and Grace).

University of Missouri Head Football Coach Barry Odom added Glen Elarbee to his new coaching staff, as announced Jan. 11, 2015. Elarbee will serve as Mizzou's offensive line coach, a position he has coached successfully for the past six seasons at several programs, including the last two while also serving as co-offensive coordinator at Arkansas State. In 2015 the Red Wolves went a perfect 8-0 in Sun Belt Conference play to win the league championship and earn a bid to the New Orleans Bowl, thanks largely to an offensive line which paved the way as ASU ranked 12th nationally in scoring offense (40.0 avg.) and 15th in the nation in rushing (231.3 ypg).

Two of his pupils this past season at ASU earned first-team All-Sun Belt honors (T Jemar Clark and G Colton Jackson), while a third (C Robert Mondie) was a third-team all-league pick. In all, the Arkansas State offense averaged just under 440 yards per game of total offense this past season, which ranked 37th nationally. Details of Elarbee's contract will be released once fully executed, along with the completion of human resources procedures.

"I've had a chance to coach against Glen in three of the last four seasons, and after every game we played I came away with a lot of respect for how his group played," said Odom. "He's been around a lot of very successful offenses that from my first-hand experience play with great toughness and attention to detail. Glen also has strong recruiting relationships in areas that are important to us – he grew up in Georgia and has recruited there and in the southeast region heavily, as well as in Texas, and that will bring value to our staff. I know Glen is excited to get going here, and we're excited to have him," he said.

Odom faced off against Elarbee this past season when Mizzou won at Arkansas State. The two also matched wits in 2012

and 2013 when Odom was at Memphis, and while Elarbee was at Middle Tennessee (2012) and Houston (2013).

"I'm really grateful for this opportunity," said Elarbee. "I've seen Mizzou firsthand several times at various stops and have always been impressed with the support they have and the environment their fans create. Obviously, I had a chance to go up against Coach Odom several times recently, and I have the utmost respect for what he's done defensively. I thought each time he was always one of the biggest challenges we faced schematically. Personally, I've gotten to know him on the road recruiting and am really impressed with the kind of person he is. Having a chance to work with a guy like him is a no brainer, and I'm excited to get up there and get to work with this staff," he said.

Despite having to replace four starters in 2014, Elarbee's first season at A-State saw his offensive line pave the way for a school-record 6,194 yards of total offense, averaging 476 yards per game that ranked 20th in the nation. He quickly molded the group into a unit that produced record-breaking results as ASU established new school standards for points (477) and touchdowns (65). The Red Wolves' offense ranked among the top 25 teams in the nation in numerous statistical categories while working behind the line, including scoring offense (No. 18), total offense and rushing offense (No. 25).

Behind Elarbee's line, which included just two senior starters, A-State recorded at least 300 yards in every game, over 400 in nine contests and at least 500 in five outings. The Red Wolves exploded for a school and Sun Belt Conference record 764 yards total offense in their regular-season finale against New Mexico State, which was also the seventh most in the nation for a single game.

Prior to A-State, Elarbee most recently



spent the 2013 season as the offensive line coach for the University of Houston, helping lead the Cougars to an 8-5 record and an appearance in the BBVA Compass Bowl. Elarbee was part of the offensive staff that helped the Cougars average 420 yards of total offense, including 280 passing yards per game that ranked 26th in the nation. Houston also ranked 38th in the nation scoring offense with 33.2 points per game.

His lone season at Houston saw him tutor starting left tackle DeAnthony Sims, who earned all-league recognition from the American Athletic Conference after playing a total of 899 offensive snaps with 36 knockdown blocks. Sims was part of an offense that ranked second in the AAC in scoring and fourth in sacks allowed.

Elarbee served as Middle Tennessee's offensive line coach in 2012 before joining the Houston staff. The Blue Raiders' offensive line ranked second nationally in fewest sacks allowed under Elarbee, giving up just seven on 344 pass attempts. The group, which included All-Sun Belt performer Micah James, also helped lead the way for three different 100-yard rushers.

Prior to his time at MTSU, Elarbee spent two seasons at West Georgia, first as the offensive line coach in 2010 before being elevated to offensive coordinator in 2011. At UWG, wide receiver and return specialist Denarius Appling earned All-America honors in 2011 and was one of three offensive players to receive all-conference honors. The 2010 season saw offensive tackle Brandon White named the Gulf South Conference Freshman of the Year.

The Carrollton, Ga., native has additional experience coaching in bowl games as he spent the 2008 and 2009 seasons as an offensive graduate assistant at Oklahoma State and the 2007 campaign in the same role on the staff of an LSU team that captured the BCS National Championship. The 2008 Oklahoma State offense ranked among the top 10 teams nationally in rushing, total offense, scoring and pass efficiency while the 2007 LSU squad scored at least 40 points in seven games.

Elarbee spent the 2006 season as the offensive line coach at East Central Community College in Decatur, Miss., after a year as Middle Tennessee's tight ends coach in 2005. Elarbee began his coaching career as a graduate assistant for his alma mater MTSU in the 2003 and 2004 seasons, when he worked alongside current Arkansas State Head Coach Blake Anderson, who served as the Blue Raiders co-offensive coordinator at the time.

As a collegiate offensive lineman, Elarbee played in 35 career games at Middle Tennessee, starting his final 23, and earned all-conference honors as a junior and senior. A four-year letterman, Elarbee was a member of the program's first Sun Belt Conference championship team in 2001. He had 91 knockdowns on 735 snaps as a senior.

Elarbee earned his bachelor's degree from Middle Tennessee State University in 2003. He and his wife, Holly, have one son, Griffin.

University of Missouri Head Football Coach Barry Odom has added Joe Jon Finley to his new coaching staff, as announced today. Finley will serve as Mizzou's tight ends coach, a position in which he was an all-conference performer in his playing days for the Oklahoma Sooners and has helped coach for several seasons at the Power Five level. He spent the 2015 season on the coaching staff at Baylor, where he worked extensively with the tight ends as an offensive quality control specialist.

This past season, the Baylor offense was among the most potent in the nation, as the Bears led the country in both total offense (616 ypg) and scoring (48.1 ppg), while ranking in the top-25 nationally in numerous other categories, just a few of which included rushing (2nd – 327 ypg), passing efficiency (3rd – 171 rating), fewest sacks allowed (15th – 1.1 per game), 3rd down percentage (16th – 46.7%) and passing yardage (24th – 290 ypg).

Finley's appointment rounds out the hiring of Odom's full-time coaching staff. Details of Finley's contract will be released once fully executed, along with the completion of human resources procedures.

"Joe Jon brings great energy and enthusiasm to our program, he is a winner who has proven himself in a short time to be a valuable asset offensively in run game organization, concepts and teaching," said Odom. "He has great experience working with the tight end position at a couple of very successful programs, and he's gone from playing that position at a very high level to carrying that over into coaching. I'm excited about his experience with tempo, as well as his deep ties with recruiting in Texas, where both his father and brother have been high school coaches. His knowledge of that area, as well as his prior relationships with our staff make him a great fit for what we're looking for," he said.

Finley has ties to three members of Odom's new staff at Mizzou, as his time at

Oklahoma as a player (2003-07) and staff member (2012-13) overlapped with current MU offensive coordinator/quarterbacks coach Josh Heupel (coached at OU from 2003-04, 2006-14), current MU defensive line coach Chris Wilson (coached at OU from 2005-09) and current MU safeties coach Ryan Walters (coached at OU in 2012).

"I'm thrilled to have this opportunity at such a great university and with a program that I believe is going to do big things," Finley said. "I'm very excited to get to work with Coach Odom and the staff he's put together. I've known of Coach Odom for a long time, I'd heard about him and his family growing up and I'm very excited to be part of his team. I can tell he's going to bring great energy and work ethic to the table for this staff and program. I'm also looking forward to working again with Josh Heupel. I know what kind of worker he is and the mind he has, he's done nothing but win everywhere he's been. It's a great step for me at a great place and I can't wait to get to work," he said.

Following his playing career at Oklahoma, Finley spent parts of five seasons with the San Francisco 49ers (2008-10 practice squad), Detroit Lions (2010-11) and Carolina Panthers (2012 training camp). He was activated to the 53-man roster for the Lions during the 2011 season. After being released from the Lions in 2011, he started his coaching career at Los Fresnos (Texas) High School, where he assisted with the offensive line under head coach and older brother Clint. After spending time in training camp in 2012 with the Carolina Panthers, Finley got back into the coaching side, as he became an offensive graduate assistant (quality control) for his alma mater Oklahoma.

At OU, he assisted the tight ends/tackles coach in every facet of the job, and assisted in game planning for Heupel as the Sooners posted a 10-3 record, shared the Big 12 title and earned a berth in the Cotton Bowl as part of the 2012 season. Oklahoma followed



with an 11-2 season in 2013, which included a 45-31 win over #3 Alabama to cap the season in the 2014 Sugar Bowl. He spent the 2014 season back at Los Fresnos High School, before joining Baylor for the 2015 campaign. Los Fresnos reached the third round of the state playoffs in 2014, marking the deepest post-season run in school history.

Finley was a standout tight end at Oklahoma, where he was a four-year letterman for the Sooners, and part of three Big 12 championship squads (2004, 2006 and 2007). He totaled 775 yards and 10 touchdowns on 62 career receptions in 50 games. He captained OU's 2007 Big 12 championship team which finished ranked 8th nationally, and was on the 2004 Big 12 title squad that played in the BCS Championship Game. He earned All-Big 12 honorable mention acclaim as both a junior and senior, and went on to earn a Bachelor of Arts degree from OU in 2008.

Finley played high school football at Arlington (Texas) High School under his father, Mickey, from 1999 to 2002, where, as a senior quarterback, he threw for 1,626 yards and 12 touchdowns and ran for 897 yards and nine touchdowns as a senior. Finley and his wife Caylee are the parents of two children, daughter Blakely and son Knox.

Jackie Shipp begins his first year as the defensive line coach for Mizzou. Shipp, who has coached defensive line for all but one year of his accomplished 25-year-career, has coached in four national championship games, including the 2001 Orange Bowl, where his alma mater Oklahoma won the BCS National Championship.

Shipp comes to Mizzou after spending the last three seasons (2013-15) mentoring the defensive line at Arizona State, where the Sun Devils reached bowl games each year. Prior to that, Shipp annually guided some of the nation's most disruptive defensive lines at Oklahoma from 1999-2012, during which the Sooners reached BCS title games four times overall (2001, 2004, 2005 and 2009). He also spent the 1998 season at Alabama as defensive line coach. Each of his teams from 1998 through 2015 have reached a post-season bowl game, giving him an active streak of 18 consecutive seasons having coached in a bowl.

Shipp is a former recipient of the All-American Football Foundation Mike Campbell Top Assistant Coach Award and has been named by Rivals.com as a Top 25 recruiter nationally. Details of Shipp's contract will be released once fully executed, along with the completion of human resources procedures.

"I'm thrilled that we have the opportunity to welcome Coach Shipp to the Mizzou family," said Odom. "He has had great success throughout his career and that includes developing some of the best defensive linemen in college football. I've seen him recruit with relentless energy and have always been impressed with how he gets his players to play the game. I'm most excited about him leading and mentoring our student-athletes and providing them with a platform for success in life," he said.

"I'm very excited for this opportunity," said Shipp. "I grew up in Stillwater, Okla., and I played in the Big Eight and coached in the Big 12, so I'm very aware of Mizzou's tradition. I think back to greats like Phil Bradley, James Wilder, Leo Lewis and

all of those teams, and I always have had great respect for Mizzou and their history. Now, it's the SEC which we all know is considered the best league by so many, and Mizzou has already played for two league championships in a short time which is really impressive. I'm excited to come to work with a great staff that Coach Odom has put together, it is a great situation all around to have success with. I'm impressed with the track record that Coach Odom has already established, you look at what he's achieved at every level, and this is a guy who is going to make a great head coach. I'm looking forward to helping him achieve big things," he said.

This past season, Arizona State's defense was very disruptive, as the Sun Devils led the nation in team sacks (3.54 per game), and ranked third nationally in team tackles for loss (8.5 p/g), while ASU also ranked 20th nationally in rushing defense (125.9 avg.). In 2014, Shipp mentored Marcus Hardison to Second-Team All-Pac-12 honors. That year, the ASU defensive line finished with 39 sacks (13th in the nation) and 98 tackles for loss (11th in the nation). In 2013, Shipp continued the development of defensive lineman Will Sutton, one of the Pac-12's most dominant interior linemen in recent memory. Sutton would go on to be named the Pac-12's Pat Tillman Defensive Player of the Year for the second consecutive season. Sutton, who was drafted by the Chicago Bears in the third round of the 2014 NFL Draft, was also a two-time Morris Trophy Award winner and AP All-American.

Before arriving at ASU, Shipp, a former NFL linebacker who helped lead the Miami Dolphins to the 1985 Super Bowl, spent 14 years coaching the defensive line for head coach Bob Stoops at the University of Oklahoma. Shipp was hired by Stoops on his original staff at Oklahoma in 1999 and proceeded to coach with the Sooners in their 2001 National Championship win (13-2) over Florida State.

Shipp's Oklahoma defensive fronts



consistently ranked near the top of the NCAA and the Big 12 in rushing defense. From a player development standpoint, he mentored three All-Americans at OU, including two-time recipients Tommie Harris (Lombardi Award recipient in 2003) and Gerald McCoy (Lombardi Award finalist in 2009) and, numerous all-conference performers and a host of NFL players, including a pair of Pro Bowlers. Under Shipp's tutelage, Oklahoma ranked in the top 16 nationally in quarterback sacks five of his last eight seasons. During that same stretch the Sooners ranked in the top 17 nationally in tackles for loss.

Shipp played collegiately at Oklahoma (1980-83), where he was a standout linebacker, starting on Sooner squads that posted a combined 33-14-1 record, won two bowl games and captured the 1980 Big Eight Championship. Shipp earned All-Big Eight Conference honors as a junior and senior and was selected as an All-American by The Football News following his junior campaign. He still holds the all-time OU record for tackles in a single game with 23 and tackles in a single season with 189 (12 games as a sophomore in 1981). In the 1982 border clash with Texas, Shipp set the school single-game record with 23 tackles. He still ranks second in career tackles at OU with 489.

A first-round draft pick who was the overall 14th player selected by the Miami Dolphins in 1984, Shipp played five seasons in Miami and helped the team to a 48-31 record, including an AFC Championship in 1984. The Dolphins made two playoff appearances and advanced to the 1985 Super Bowl. Shipp was the Dolphins' leading tackler with

79 in 1987 and finished his career in Miami with 231 tackles. He would later play one year with the Los Angeles Raiders in 1988.

Shipp's coaching career began at Langston University in 1991 where he served as linebacker coach. In 1992 he moved to Central Missouri State University, where he began his distinguished career coaching the defensive line. After one year coaching the defensive line at the University of Tennessee at Martin (1993), Shipp was hired to coach the defensive line at Southern Illinois University in 1994, where he stayed three years. During that time Shipp also completed coaching internships with the NFL's Green Bay Packers (1994) and Minnesota Vikings (1995-96).

In 1997 Shipp became the defensive line coach at Northeast Louisiana University (now Louisiana-Monroe) and then was hired in 1998 as defensive line coach at the University of Alabama. After one year with the Crimson Tide Shipp was lured back to his alma mater as defensive line coach.

Shipp was just shy of earning his undergraduate degree from Oklahoma when his playing days concluded there, and after his professional career ended, he finished up his degree work at Langston University, where he earned a degree in economics and finance in 1992. He later did master's level work while coaching at Central Missouri State. He graduated from and played football for Donart High School in 1980 in Stillwater, Oklahoma, where he was raised.

Shipp has two children, a son Christopher and a daughter Kaitlin.

Barry Odom has recruited Rohrk Cutchlow (pronounced ROAR-k) to join his new staff at Mizzou in the vital role of Director of Athletic Performance. Cutchlow will oversee all aspects of the Mizzou Football strength and conditioning program.

Cutchlow is a 17-year veteran of the athletic performance industry, and he's regarded as one of the top coaches in the trade. For the past 12 years, he's directed athletic performance for football programs, including the last four at his alma mater Memphis, where he's played a big role in Memphis developing into one of the top programs in the American Conference. The Tigers won the AAC and finished 10-3 overall in 2014, and followed up with another strong 9-4 season in 2015, spending much of the season ranked in the top-25. During his time with Memphis, Cutchlow aided in the development of Memphis quarterback Paxton Lynch, a Johnny Unitas Golden Arm Award finalist and projected first-round NFL draft pick.

"I'm very excited to have Rohrk be part of our program at Mizzou," said Odom. "He's a guy who is highly sought after and has had several other opportunities. He made a big impression on me in my time at Memphis, so our relationship goes back through a rebuilding project there that allowed his influence to make a huge difference in our program. He's very well-respected nationally, and he instills great toughness and leadership with his teams. Rohrk will be a great asset to our coaching staff, in the way that he touches our players every day, as well as the results he will get. He will be very challenging and demanding of our players, but they will respond and appreciate his approach and his ability to get them into the best physical and mental condition that they can be," he said.

"I'm excited to have the opportunity to join the Mizzou family," Cutchlow said. "I have a tremendous amount of respect for Barry Odom and believe strongly in his vision for the Mizzou Football program. I also feel very fortunate to work for a prestigious institution like the University of Missouri and to be entrusted with the responsibility of directing the strength and conditioning programs for our football student-athletes. I can't wait to get to Columbia and get started," he said.

Prior to Memphis, Cutchlow served the 2011 football season as the director of strength and conditioning at Tulsa, where he oversaw a program that won eight games and played in the Armed Forces Bowl. Before that, Cutchlow directed football strength and conditioning at Illinois State for seven seasons (Nov. 2003-Feb. 2011). He served as the Redbirds' strength and conditioning coordinator his first three football seasons (2004-06), before being promoted to assistant athletic director for sports performance (July 2007). During his career, Cutchlow has worked with over 25 players who have gone on to sign NFL contracts, multiple Big 12 Championship teams, 15 All-Americans and an Olympic Gold Medalist. He was one of five finalists for the National Strength and Conditioning Association (NSCA) College Strength and Conditioning Coach of the Year in 2006.

From 2001-03, Cutchlow was the head strength and conditioning coach for Olympic sports at Iowa State, where he directed programs for 17 sports, including men's basketball and wrestling. In 2001, Cutchlow earned his master's degree in higher education administration from Iowa State.

A native of Littleport, Iowa, Cutchlow attended and played baseball at Memphis, where he was a three-year letter winner and a two-year starter at catcher for the



Tigers from 1996-98. He graduated with a bachelor's degree in education, with an emphasis on exercise and sports science. He then pursued a professional baseball career, where he started at catcher for two years, one each for the Dubois County Dragons (1998) and the Evansville Otters (1999) of the Frontier League. He later would go on to serve two seasons (2002-03) as the strength and conditioning coach for the Chicago Cubs Triple-A affiliate, the Iowa Cubs.

A Certified Strength and Conditioning Specialist (CSCS) through the NSCA, Cutchlow holds additional Level 1 certification from USA Weightlifting and Functional Movement Systems (FMS). He is also a member of the National Association for Coaching Equity and Development.

Cutchlow, 41, and Cecilia Olivares have two children, daughter Memphis and son Grayson.

Making a return to the school where he got his first Director of Op's position is Mike McHugh, who will serve as Director of Football Operations for Head Coach Barry Odom. McHugh was the first-ever Director of Football Op's at Mizzou, when the position was created for him in 1994, under Coach Larry Smith. Since then, McHugh has turned in over 22 years of experience in the crucial role of ops director at the Power Five Level.

In the role, McHugh is involved in a wide variety of important administrative duties that support the Tiger program. Some of the many duties are related to overseeing the coordination of all team travel, oversight of the football budget, handling compliance and academic issues, scheduling of facilities, assisting with recruiting operations and managing the day-to-day functions of the program.

He returns to Mizzou after spending the 2014-15 seasons in the same position at the University of Washington. Before that, McHugh spent the 2013 football season in the same role at Fresno State, when the Bulldogs turned in an 11-2 record and won the Mountain West Conference championship.

He'd spent the 10 prior seasons (2003-12) as Director of Football Operations at the University of California, where he helped oversee the construction of the Bears' \$150-million High Performance Center.

A native of Boyertown, Pa., McHugh started his playing career at Potomac State College (Keyser WV) in 1976 and 77 and was the team's leading receiver and elected team captain for the 1977 season. McHugh was elected to the Sports Hall of Fame in 2016. McHugh continued his playing career at the Findlay University in Ohio, where he was a member of the Oilers' 1979 NAIA Championship team. He led Findlay in receiving in 1981 and earned a bachelor's degree in health and physical education in 1983.

McHugh served as Findlay's head women's track & field coach in 1982 before going on to a football coaching job at Liberty Benton High School in Findlay, Ohio, that same year. He took an assistant football coaching position at Northmor High in Galion, Ohio, for the 1983 season and then became head coach from 1984-87. McHugh was also Northmor's girls' track coach in 1984 and 1985.

McHugh moved to the college ranks in 1989, working as offensive line coach at Eastern Michigan in 1989 and 1990 before moving to recruiting coordinator in 1991 and defensive line coach in 1992. He earned a master's degree in physical education from EMU in 1993.

In 1993, McHugh was named Video Coordinator/Recruiting assistant at Missouri, and became the Director of Football Operations in 1994, position he held through the 1998 season, and he was part of Smith's Holiday Bowl (1997) and Insight.com (1998) bowl teams. After six seasons at MU, he joined Mike Bellotti's staff at Oregon for the 1999 and 2000 seasons. He then spent two seasons as an offensive assistant coach with the Detroit Lions in 2001 and 2002 before taking the operations job at California, where he worked for head coach Jeff Tedford.

Mizzou Head Football Coach Barry Odom has added former Mizzou standout and NFL tight end A.J. Ofodile (owe-FAH-delay) to his staff, as announced today. Ofodile, who has been a successful head coach at Columbia's Rock Bridge High School since 2003, will serve as the football program's Director of Recruiting Operations. Details of Ofodile's appointment will be released once finalized, pending the completion of human resources procedures.

Ofodile, 42, served as an assistant coach and offensive coordinator for Odom at Rock Bridge during Odom's head coaching stint there from 2001-02. After Odom joined Mizzou's coaching staff prior to the 2003 season, Ofodile took over as the program's head coach. In 2013, his Bruins were state runners up, reaching the state championship game for the school's first time since 1993.

A first-team All-Big Eight selection in 1993 for Mizzou, Ofodile was a three-year letterwinner (1991-93), and finished his Tiger career with 73 receptions for 851 yards and six touchdowns. After an outstanding 1993 season which included 55 catches for 589 yards and four TDs, he was drafted in the fifth round of the 1994 NFL Draft by Buffalo, and spent six years in the league with Buffalo, Pittsburgh and Baltimore through 1999.

A Detroit, Mich. native, Ofodile earned his bachelor's degree in General Studies from Mizzou in August of 2001. His family includes wife Dianna, daughter Jasmyne and son Alex.
