In its 15th season as a division of IMG College, the Michigan Sports Network represents one of the largest and most-listened to college sports network in the Midwest. Anchored by WWJ-AM (950) in Detroit, the Michigan IMG Radio Network is comprised of 40 affiliate stations in Michigan and Ohio during football season. In addition, U-M football can be heard on American Armed Forces Radio and satellite radio (Sirius 84/XM 84).

Wolverines and Hoosiers

This will be the 65th meeting between Michigan and Indiana. The Wolverines have a 55-9 advantage in the all-

time series and are 37-7 in Ann Arbor against the Hoosiers (32-7 at Michigan Stadium). U-M has won 20 straight games against IU and has claimed victories in 35 of the last 36 contests; last setback came in 1987.

Michigan vs. Indiana at the Big House

The Wolverines have been dominant against the Hoosiers at Michigan Stadium, winning the past 18 games at home. Michigan has compiled a 32-7 record all-time against Indiana at the Big House.

U-M to Honor Seniors Prior to the Game

The University of Michigan will honor 43 fourth- and fifth-year seniors prior to today's game against Indiana. The class includes 15 fifth-year seniors and 28 fourth-year seniors.

Michigan-Indiana Series History

- This will be the 65th meeting in the all-time series with Indiana
- Michigan's .859 winning percentage against Indiana is the program's highest versus any conference school
- The Wolverines lead the all-time series, 55-9, and have won 20 straight games against the Hoosiers
- Michigan has won 34 of the past 35 games between the two schools
- The last U-M loss, a 14-10 setback in Bloomington, came in a match-up of top 20 teams during the 1987 season

Michigan vs. Indiana at Michigan Stadium

- The Wolverines have dominated the series with the Hoosiers at Michigan Stadium, posting a 32-7 all-time mark
- The Wolverines have won 18 straight games at the Big House, including a 34-10 victory during the 2014 season
- The last home setback was a 27-20 loss during the 1967 season

Michigan - Indiana Connections

- Michigan's roster features two Indiana natives: freshman RB Chris Evans (Indianapolis) and freshman QB Brandon Peters (Avon)
- Indiana's roster features one Michigan native: sophomore LB Kenny Arnold (Canton)
- Indiana's offensive line coach, Greg Frey, coached the offensive line at the University of Michigan (2008-10); The Wolverines racked up a school record and Big Ten-leading 6,353 offensive yards (488.7 per game) in 2010
- Michigan freshman QB Brandon Peters was high school teammates at Avon with Indiana freshman DL Joe Belden

Michigan When Ranked vs. Indiana

- This will be the 41st time that Michigan enters a match-up with Indiana ranked in the top 25 of the Associated Press national poll
- The Wolverines have compiled a 38-2 record in those contests, with their only setbacks coming in 1954 and 1987
- Michigan is a perfect 22-0 against Indiana when ranked in the top 10 of the national polls
- U-M has compiled a 2-1 record against the Hoosiers when both teams enter the game listed in the top 25 of the AP poll, winning games in 1968 and 1988 and suffering a loss in 1987

Big Ten Conference Season

- U-M heads into its final home game of the season with a 6-1 mark in Big Ten play
- The Wolverines are 4-0 at home and 2-1 on the road this season in conference

- U-M has compiled a 497-201-18 record all-time in conference action, tops in Big Ten history
- Michigan has a 12-3 mark in Big Ten action under second-year head coach Jim Harbaugh
- Harbaugh's only setbacks in the Big Ten came against Michigan State and Ohio State last year and lowa this season

U-M Ranked Fourth in National Polls

- Michigan ranks fourth in the Associated Press and Amway Coaches polls this week after listing as high as second for three polls
- U-M ranked third in the College Football Playoff Rankings for the first two rankings
- It was the first time that the Wolverines were listed No. 2 in the country since the 2006 season
- This is the 11th straight week that U-M lists in the top five of the national polls
- The Wolverines started 2016 listed No. 7 in the AP poll and No. 8 in the Amway Coaches poll; it was the first time since 2012 that U-M began the season listed in the top 10 of polls
- Michigan won a 14-7 contest against No. 8 Wisconsin on Oct. 1 to collect its first victory over a top 10 team since 2008 (27-25 win over No. 9 Wisconsin)

Michigan in November

- The Wolverines will look to collect their 312th all-time victory during the 11th month of the year against lowa
- U-M has compiled an impressive 311-134-20 all-time record in November
- The Wolverines have a 4-2 mark in the 11th month of the year under head coach Jim Harbaugh
- U-M has won 35 of its last 61 contests in November

NFL Coaching Pedigree

- Michigan has 88 years of NFL experience among the 10 coaches on staff
- The staff has logged 41 years of NFL coaching experience and 37 years of playing experience
- Eight of Michigan's 10 assistants have coached in the NFL: Jim Harbaugh, Tim Drevno, Jedd Fisch, Jay Harbaugh, Greg Mattison, Brian Smith, Tyrone Wheatley and Mike Zordich
- Three of the Wolverines coaches played in the NFL, with each of those individuals logging more than 10 years in the league: Harbaugh (15 years), Tyrone Wheatley (10 years) and Mike Zordich (12 years)
- Those three coaches totaled 37 years of playing experience at the NFL level
- This does not include the seven years of NFL experience logged by strength and conditioning coach Kevin Tolbert and the 21 years of coaching experience gained by defensive analyst Dave Adolph

The Team, The Team, The Team

- The Wolverines list in the top six nationally in both scoring offense (6th) and scoring defense (1st)
- U-M has scored 37 rushing touchdown while allowing just three to the opposition
- Michigan is 14th nationally and third in the Big Ten in turnover margin (0.8 avg.)
- The Wolverines have gained 16 turnovers on the season (11 interceptions, five fumbles)

- The Wolverines have held possession of the football for an average of 32:58 per contest (18th nationally and third in the conference)
- U-M has won the time of possession battle in the eight of its 10 games; has held the ball for 35 minutes in three Big Ten contests -- 41:23 vs. Illinois, 35:49 vs. Penn State and 35:41 vs. Wisconsin
- The Wolverines typical starting field position is outside of their own 38-yard line while the opposition is averaging their own 25-yard line
- U-M is averaging 4.7 penalties per contest, ranking 16th nationally and fourth in the Big Ten
- Michigan is one of the least penalized teams in the nation with just 47 flags on the season (16th)

A Closer Look at the Roster

Notes on the Offense

- Michigan ranks in the top 25 nationally of nine (9) offensive categories: turnovers lost (5th), scoring offense (6th), interceptions (4th), fumbles lost (17th), rushing offense (19th), third down conversions (22nd), sacks allowed (22nd), pass efficiency (23rd) and first downs (25th)
- The offense leads the Big Ten in fewest interceptions (four) and lists second in seven additional offensive statistics
- U-M has been a balanced offensive unit this fall, averaging 236.3 yards per game on the ground and 231.5 yards passing; gained 2,363 rushing yards and 2,315 passing yards
- The offense has reached the end zone a total of 54 times this season (37 rushing touchdowns and 17 passing scores); the last time Michigan scored as many TDs was 2010 (58)
- The offense has turned the ball over only seven times through 10 contests; an interception on the first play of the 2016 season (vs. Hawaii), a fumble by Wilton Speight on a sack against Colorado, an interception during the third quarter against Wisconsin, a fumble by De'Veon Smith at Rutgers, a fumble by Jehu Chesson vs. Illinois and an interception at Michigan State
- Michigan is third in the Big Ten and fifth nationally in fewest turnovers (eight; four interceptions and four fumbles)
- The Wolverines are 51-of-56 on red zone chances this season, with 40 touchdowns and 11 field goals; had perfect efforts against Hawaii (6-6),

Penn State (6-6), Rutgers (8-8), Illinois (5-5) and Michigan State (6-6)

• Michigan ranks 22nd in the country and third in the Big Ten in third down conversions, moving the chains on 46.5 percent of its third down opportunities (60-129); was a perfect 7-for-7 on third down opportunities vs. Hawaii and went 11-of-16 vs. Penn State

Setting the Tone Early

- Michigan has set an early tone during the conference season, scoring on its opening possession in four of the seven games
- The Wolverines have tallied touchdowns on the opening series against Penn State, Illinois, Michigan State and Maryland
- The offense was forced to punt on its first possessions against Wisconsin, Rutgers and Iowa

First Half Dominance

- Michigan has jumped on its opponents early and often this season, outscoring teams 274-46 in the first 30 minutes
- U-M has outscored the opposition by a 115 to 28 margin in the first quarter this season; held eight of its 10 opponents without any points
- The only teams to score points in the first stanza are Colorado (21) and Michigan State (7); one of the Buffaloes'TDs was a defensive score
- Even more impressive is the Wolverines' second quarter domination, scoring 159 points while yielding just 18 to the opposition
- The only teams to tally points against U-M during the second stanza were UCF (touchdown), Michigan State (field goal) and lowa (safety and touchdown)

U-M's Passing Game Provides Consistency

- The offense has thrown for more than 200 yards in seven of the 10 games, including a pair of 300yard passing efforts (Maryland and UCF)
- U-M has a 17:4 touchdown to interception ratio
- As a team, Michigan has completed 177-of-280 passes for 2,315 yards with 17 touchdowns
- The offense is second in the Big Ten and is 23rd nationally in pass efficiency (149.84 rating)
- The Wolverines have a passing touchdown in eight games; did not toss a TD at Michigan State or lowa
- U-M passed for a season-best 387 yards and three touchdowns against Maryland
- The Wolverines threw for 328 yards and four touchdowns against UCF; a total of 10 different players caught passes against the Knights
- The Wolverines are second in the Big Ten and are 27th nationally in completion percentage at 63.2 percent on the season (177-of-280)
- Amara Darboh leads the offense with six receiving touchdowns; Jake Butt is second with four TDs and Jehu Chesson has collect two scores

U-M Grounding out Yards

- The offense has gained 2,363 rushing yards on 445 carries (5.3 avg.) and scored 37 rushing TDs
- Four running backs have rushed for 400-plus yards this season: De'Veon Smith (592), Chris Evans (508), Karan Higdon (415) and Ty Isaac (411)
- Michigan has gained more than 200 yards rushing in five contests and surpassed 300 yards on three of those occasions
- The Wolverines have rushed for 300-plus yards in three contests this season: 306 yards vs. Hawaii, 326 yards vs. Penn State and a 481-yard effort on 56 attempts are Rutgers

- The Wolverines' 78 points at Rutgers were the most in a conference game since scoring 85 points against conference foe Chicago in 1939

While he's not a great blocker, he faces a lot of challenging matchups in Michigan's pro style system, and there are a number of impressive blocks on tape."

Steve Palazzolo of Pro Football Focus Top NFL Draft Prospects at Each Position for 2017

• "Butt is an instinctive football player. Playing tight end is more about feel, awareness and subtlety than pure speed and athleticism. He's a skilled technician with excellent spatial awareness. He knows how to create separation at the top of his routes. He uses his body to lean on defenders and he snaps out of his break without wasting steps. He is deployed in-line, in the slot as well as split out wide. He routinely beats safeties and even cornerbacks locked in man coverage. He beat an Indiana cornerback up top on a stutter-go route. That's not something you see very often from a big tight end. He has outstanding hands. He attacks the ball in the air (see TD vs. Utah) and wins a lot of 50-50 balls. After the catch, he lacks elite speed but he's nifty to make defenders miss and he has the power to run through tackles. He doesn't go down easily."

• "Butt is a natural pass-catcher that understands the nuances of route-running and creating space. He catches everything and has the potential to be a dominant red-zone weapon. He reminds me of Tyler Eifert coming out of Notre Dame. Both have outstanding size, ball skills and instincts."

• "It is hard to find an old-school tight end in today's game, but Butt is a throwback with the size, soft hands and route-running skills to terrorize defenses between the hashes. He overpowers defenders to establish position and uses his length to expand the strike zone for quarterbacks. Although Butt does most of his work at short-to-intermediate range, he flashes enough quickness and burst to run away from defenders on sail routes (15-speed outs) to the boundary. Given his impressive work on critical downs and situations (third-down and red zone), Butt has all of the tools to thrive as a TE1 on any level."

• "At 6-foot-6 and 250 pounds, Butt has very good speed and fluidity for his size. He will be able to stretch the seam in the NFL -- and make tough catches in traffic. He needs to get stronger as a runblocker, but he gives solid effort in that area. Butt -- who has the versatility to play in line, flexed out or split out wide -- comes with big, reliable hands."

• "Yet another Michigan defensive lineman to highlight, Charlton was extremely productive on his 389 snaps (in 2015). He was solid against the run with a 79.2 mark, while his pass rushing took a huge step forward at 82.6. After compiling only 11 pressures on 120 rushes in 2014, Charlton notched six sacks, nine QB hits and 26 hurries (41 total pressures) on 229 rushes last season. The Wolverines' defensive line is top heavy with most of their returning talent at defensive tackle, and while Charlton is certainly not slight at 6-6 and 275 pounds, he brings the best edge rushing dynamic on the team. Look for Charlton to play at least 600 snaps this season while continuing to develop into the naton's best edge rushers."

• "NFL Scouts are very excited about some of the flashes coming off the tape from Charlton. Regardless, it's his attacking nature in the run game combined with the athleticism in coverage that makes Peppers a unique player. Defensive Tackle Chris Wormley

• "Wormley has the versatility to line up both inside and outside, allowing Michigan to run a hybrid front in base and sub-packages. He is an athletic mover with the lateral quickness and range for a 300-pounder to contain and chase. Wormley closes with a head of steam without slowing down through contact, showing tremendous balance to stay controlled before, after and while engaged on blocks. He reads his keys quickly and rarely is fooled by eye candy, extending into blockers with arm length and leverage to drive blockers into the pocket. Wormley also breaks down well in space for a man his size once he stacks the edge to finish tackles. Bottom line: if Wormely can translate all his flashes into snap-to-snap consistency then there is a great chance he lands in the first round next spring."

Michigan Stadium -- 1927-2016 (90 Years)

The football program is in its 90th season in the "Big House" in 2016, with a 419-127-15 all-time record at Michigan Stadium. The largest college football stadium in the country, it was completed in 1927 at a cost of \$950,000, initially seating 72,000 fans. Michigan won the first game played at Michigan Stadium, defeating Ohio Wesleyan, 33-0, on Oct. 1, 1927. The stadium was officially dedicated on Oct. 22, 1927, with a 21-0 shutout over Ohio State.

Since that inaugural season, the capacity of Michigan Stadium has been altered 10 times to its present capcity of 107,601. The Wolverines have led the nation in attendance 38 times in the past 40 years, and reestablished the NCAA single-game attendance record at 115,109 fans during the 2013 Notre Dame game.

Michigan has drawn crowds of 100,000-plus for 272 consecutive games. On football Saturdays in Ann Arbor, Michigan Stadium ranks as the fourth-largest "city" in the state of Michigan, surpassing the population of Ann Arbor itself.

Michigan Stadium was the first college-owned football facility with a video scoreboard above both end zones and was also the first stadium to use electronic scoreboards for official time when, in 1930, two were installed.

CAPACITY: 107,601 -- the largest college-owned structures of its kind designed solely for football -- closer to the playing field with no running track -- no posts or other obstructions.

COMPLETION: 1927 --- at a cost in excess of \$950,000 to seat 72,000 spectators.

Capacity raised to 84,401 by addition of temporary wooden bleachers until 1949 when permanent steel stands replaced the wooden bleachers, increasing the capacity to 97,239. Seating capacity then raised to 101,001 in 1956, 101,701 in 1973, 102,501 in 1992 and 107,501 in 1998.

FIRST GAME: October 1, 1927 -- Michigan led by Captain Bennie Oosterbaan, defeated Ohio Wesleyan, 33-0. LaVerne (Kip) Taylor, Michigan end, scored first in the stadium on a 28-yard pass from halfback Louis Gilbert.

DEDICATION GAME: October 22, 1927 -- Michigan defeated Ohio State, 21-0. **REDEDICATION GAME:** September 4, 2010 -- vs. Connecticut.

ATTENDANCE: Since 1927 -- 48,977,056 fans have watched the Wolverines play 561 games. Stadium attendance record of 115,109 was set on Sept. 7, 2013 against Notre Dame.

FIELD: 360 x 160 feet -- Installed new FieldTurf in 2010. The original FieldTurf surface was installed in 2003, returning Michigan to an artificial surface for the first time since the 1990 season. Installed Prescription Athletic Turf in 1991, giving Michigan its first natural grass field since 1968. Field was also lowered 3-1/2 feet allowing better sightlines for those seated in the lower rows.

100,000-Plus Crowds at Michigan Stadium

The football program has played 272 consecutive home games in front of crowds in excess of 100,000. The last time Michigan did not have 100,000 in attendance in Michigan Stadium was on Oct. 25, 1975 vs. Indiana. A crowd of 93,857 was on hand for the 55-7 Michigan victory.

Since then, Michigan has set numerous NCAA attendance marks and the Wolverines have led the nation for 38 of the past 40 seasons in attendance.

Jim Harbaugh was named the 20th coach in University of Michigan football history on Tuesday, Dec. 30, 2015. He becomes the sixth former Michigan football player to be named the leader of college football's winningest program.

Harbaugh comes to Ann Arbor after an impressive four-year run in the National Football League with the San Francisco 49ers. He led the franchise to the NFC Championship Game in each of his first three seasons, winning the George Halas Trophy as NFC Champions in 2012. Harbaugh tallied a 49-22-1 overall record that included a 5-3 mark in the postseason as 49ers head coach.

Harbaugh led the Niners to a 13-3 regular season record and to the NFC Championship Game during his first season in 2011, earning the AP NFL Coach of the Year award. He followed up with an 11-4-1 regular season mark in 2012, culminating with an appearance in Super Bowl XLVII. Harbaugh's 49ers lost a back-and-forth affair, 34-31, to the Baltimore Ravens and his brother, John, in the only match-up of brothers as head coaches in NFL history. He helped guide San Francisco back to the NFC title game after a 12-4 regular season record in 2013 and posted an 8-8 mark during the 2014 season.

Prior to making the jump to the 49ers, Harbaugh established himself as a leader of young men at the college level. He turned around a Stanford program that went 1-11 prior to his arrival. The Cardinal improved each of his four seasons, culminating with a 12-1 campaign and FedEx Orange Bowl victory over Virginia Tech in 2010. Harbaugh finished his tenure at Stanford with a 29-21 overall record (.580) and 21-15 mark in Pac-10 Conference play.

After 4-8 and 5-7 records his first two seasons at the helm, Harbaugh led the Cardinal to an 8-5 record and a tie for second place in the Pac-10. The appearance in the Sun Bowl following the season was Stanford's first bowl game since the 2001 season. The program continued its ascension in 2010, posting a 12-1 overall record and 8-1 mark in the Pac-10. Stanford was selected for a BCS bowl game, and proceeded to defeat Virginia Tech, 40-12, to claim the FedEx Orange Bowl in Harbaugh's final game with the program. The

Cardinal finished the 2010 season ranked fifth in the national polls and Harbaugh was named the Woody Hayes Award as the nation's top coach by the Touchdown Club of Columbus. He accepted the 49ers head coaching position on Jan. 7,

In his first head coaching experience, Harbaugh led the University of San Diego to a 29-6 record during his three seasons directing the program (2004-06). In his first year, the Toreros posted a 7-4 record after winning their final five games of the season. The team proceeded to post 11-1 marks during the 2005 and 2006 seasons, claiming the Pioneer Football League Championship each season.

Harbaugh spent the 2002 and 2003 NFL seasons as the quarterbacks coach with the Oakland Raiders. He worked with the guarterbacks, helping guarterback Rich Gannon lead the organization to Super Bowl XXXVII after posting an 11-5 regular season record and the AFC Western Division title. Gannon won the 2002 AP NFL MVP award and was selected to the 2003 Pro Bowl.

He began preparing for a career as a coach during his professional playing days. Harbaugh spent eight years as

an NCAA-certified unpaid assistant coach for his father, Jack, at Western Kentucky (1994-2001). He worked as an offensive consultant and recruited for the Hilltoppers during that time. Harbaugh's effort helped his father's team capture the 2002 Division I-AA National Championship.

Harbaugh played for five different organizations during his 15-year NFL career (1987-2001). He completed 2,305-of-3,918 passes for 26,288 yards and 129 touchdowns in 177 games. Harbaugh made 140 career starts. He was named the AFC Offensive Player of the Year, the NFL Comeback Player of the Year and a Pro Bowl selection after leading the Indianapolis Colts to the AFC Championship Game in 1995. He was inducted into the Colts Ring of Honor in 2005.

As a collegiate player, Harbaugh was one of the most efficient passers in NCAA history. In 1985, he led the nation in pass efficiency and finished as the runner-up in 1986. His career pass efficiency rating was the NCAA's top mark for over 12 years. Harbaugh won the Chicago Tribune Big Ten Most Valuable Player award, earned first-team All-America honors and finished third in the balloting for the Heisman Trophy following the 1986 season.

He completed 387-of-620 passes for 5,449 yards and 31 touchdowns during his career, with all four statistical categories still listing among the top-12 in school history. He also added 12 rushing touchdowns during his career, including eight scores as a senior. Harbaugh became the first Michigan quarterback to ever throw for more than 300 yards in a single game (310 vs. Wisconsin) and eclipsed the 200-yard passing mark 12 times. He led the Wolverines to a 21-3-1 record as a full-time starter during his final two seasons, including a pair of victories against rivals Michigan State and Ohio State.

Harbaugh and his wife, Sarah, have two daughters, Addison and Katherine, and a son, Jack. He also has three children, Jay, James Jr., and Grace.

He is the son of Jack and Jackie Harbaugh. Jack was an assistant coach at Michigan from 1973-79. Harbaugh's brother, John, is head coach of the Baltimore Ravens and his sister, Joani, is married to Indiana University men's basketball coach Tom Crean.
