Executive Order 2015-03

Executive Order Renewing the "State Council on the Education for Military Children" Amending and Superceding Executive Order 2012-05

WHEREAS, military families encounter significant obstacles when dealing with enrollment, eligibility, placement, and graduation of their children, due to frequent relocations in the course of service to our country;

WHEREAS, currently, 11,617 children from military families attend Arizona K-12 schools;

WHEREAS, Arizona strives to be the most military friendly state in the country;

WHEREAS, Arizona, along with forty-three other states entered into the "Interstate Compact on Educational Opportunity for Military Children" (Compact) to remove barriers to educational success imposed on children of military families because of frequent moves and deployment.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Douglas A. Ducey, Governor of the State of Arizona, by virtue of the authority vested in me by the Constitution and laws of this State, hereby establish the State Council on the Education for Military Children (Council) and order as follows:

- 1. The Governor shall appoint all members. Membership shall include but is not limited to, the following:
 - a. The State Superintendent of Public Instruction or designee
 - b. A superintendent of a school district with a high concentration of military children or designee
 - c. The commander, or their designee, from each of the following military installations:
 - i. Davis-Monthan Air Force Base
 - ii. Fort Huachuca
 - iii. Luke Air Force Base
 - iv. US Army Yuma Proving Ground
 - v. Marine Corps Air Station Yuma
 - d. The Adjutant General or designee
 - e. A representative from the Legislative Branch
 - f. A representative from the Executive Branch
 - g. A teacher of a school with a high concentration of military children
 - h. The President of the Arizona Board of Regents or designee
 - i. A parent of a military family stationed in Arizona
- 2. The Governor shall select one member of the Council to serve as Chairperson.
- 3. The Council shall, pursuant to ARS 15-1911, provide for the coordination among agencies of local government, local education agencies and military installations concerning the state's participation in, and compliance with, the Compact and the "Interstate Commission on Educational Opportunity for Military Children" activities.
- 4. The Council shall provide a forum for military families to discuss the unique issues that their children face in school.
- 5. The Council shall provide recommendations to the Governor on ways to assist military families and their children with the goal of easing their transitions during deployments and relocations.
- 6. Members shall serve at the pleasure of the Governor.
- 7. The Chairperson may form an executive committee or other committees, as necessary.

- 8. The Council shall meet to conduct its affairs at least two times each year.
- 9. The status of the Council shall be reviewed no later than December 31, 2016 to determine appropriate action for its continuance, modification or termination.

Background on MIC3

- Interstate Compact on Educational Opportunity for Military Children
- Goal: replace widely varying policies affecting transitioning military students with consistent policy in every school/state
- Not intended to impact curriculum or local standards
 - Recognizes responsibility of states and LEAs

Background on MIC3

- Addresses key transition issues (in public schools):
 - Enrollment
 - Educational Records
 - Immunizations
 - Kindergarten & First Grade Entrance Age
 - Placement and Attendance
 - Course & Educational Program Placement
 - Special Education Services
 - Placement Flexibility
 - Absence Related to Deployment Activities
 - Eligibility
 - Eligibility for Student Enrollment
 - Eligibility for Extracurricular Participation
 - Graduation
 - Waiving courses required for graduation if similar course work has been completed
 - Flexibility in accepting state exit or end-of-course exams, national achievement tests, or alternative testing in lieu of testing requirements for graduation in the receiving state
 - Allowing a student to receive a diploma from the sending school instead of the receiving school

Background on MIC3

Background

- Developed by DoD with assistance of Council of State Governments
- Implemented nationally by Military Interstate Children's Compact Commission (MIC3)
- Governing Commission first meeting Oct. 2008
- All 50 states and District of Columbia have adopted Compact

MIC3 State Governance

Each State has:

- State Commissioner
 - Primary point of contact for all Interstate business
 - Ensures compact mission & purpose are promoted
 - Ensures State Council is functioning
- State Council
 - Advisory and advocacy body
 - May be tasked with development of policy concerning operations and procedures of the Compact within that state
 - Promote and advocate the Interstate Compact
- Military Family Education Liaison
 - State Council appoints liaison to assist military families and the state in facilitating the implementation of the Compact

MIC3 in Arizona

- State Commissioner Jim Buchanan, ADE (Superintendent's Designee)
- State Council Arizona State Council on the Education for Military Children
 - Arizona adopted Compact in 2008 with enactment of A.R.S. § 15-1911
 - State Council was established in 2012 under Executive Order 2012-05 pursuant to A.R.S. § 15-1911
 - Mission: To resolve transition-related issues that military families face through coordinated efforts of Arizona's education leaders and military installation commanders
 - Council renewed by Governor Doug Ducey with <u>Executive Order 2015-03</u>

MIC3 in Arizona

Council Purpose

- Ensure no military child residing in Arizona is placed at an undue educational disadvantage in relation to their non-military peers
- Council Responsibilities (per EO 2015-03)
 - Coordinate local government, LEA, and military installation participation in, and compliance with, the Compact
 - Provide a forum for military families to discuss unique issues their children face in school
 - Provide recommendations to the Governor on ways to assist military families and their children with the goal of easing their transitions during deployments and relocations
 - Meet twice a year

MIC3 in Arizona

Study Topics

- Educational outreach of Interstate Compact in Arizona
 - How to engage school Superintendents, Principals & guidance counselors to achieve greater awareness and understanding of Compact throughout the state
- Valedictorian selection
 - Military graduating seniors facing challenges when in the running for class
 Valedictorian
 - Some districts do not have a written policy on how Valedictorians are selected (authority given to individual LEA)
 - Should there be district-wide or statewide policies?
- Recruiting and retaining highly qualified teachers in heavily impacted military classrooms
 - With highly mobile lifestyle, military children benefit from consistent teachers who act as role models
 - Many classrooms being taught by long-term substitute teachers

Study Topics

□ IEP service issues

- Upon arriving in Arizona, schools should honor military student's previous IEP until they reevaluate the student
- Families reporting gaps in service schools not sticking to their IEPs, students not getting services
- How to ensure quality, comprehensive new IEPs are created in Arizona LEAs

Teaching certificates for military spouses

- Military spouses find fulfilling certification requirements overwhelming due to different requirements between states
- What can be done to facilitate the process for military spouses willing to teach in a district that struggles to keep teachers

Open Enrollment & School Choice

Military families trying to enroll students in schools of their choice outside of normal enrollment period have difficulty accessing educational options

Informational Topics

- How inconsistency in education requirements/ standards/ policies impact military families
- Impact of assessment tool changes on incoming and outgoing families
- Why Arizona's College and Career Ready Standards are important for military students
- Military Flag Status for outset of 2016-17 School Year
