Economy In Brief

The State's seasonally adjusted unemployment rate, at 5.4 percent in September, was unchanged from August's revised rate and was below the year-ago rate of 6.1 percent.

National Rate - 5.0 percent.

Nonagricultural Wage and Salary employment equaled 1,969,900 in September, which represented an over the month increase of 300 jobs. Increases were observed in government; trade, transportation, and utilities; education and health services; and construction. Over the year, there was an increase of 18,000 jobs. The gains occurred in trade, transportation, and utilities; education and health services; manufacturing; financial activities; leisure and hospitality; other services; professional and business services; and information.

The average manufacturing workweek rose by 1 hour and 18 minutes in September. Over the year, the workweek increased by 1 hour and 36 minutes.

Goods-Producing Employment

The Goods-Producing sectors dropped by 300 jobs this month. The employment level declined due to manufacturing sector, but mining and logging remained unchanged. Over the year, the employment level was stagnant at 351,600. Gains in manufacturing were cancelled by losses in the construction and mining and logging industries.

Durable Goods decreased by 700 jobs this month. Some of the decreases occurred in primary and fabricated metal manufacturing along with computer and electronic product manufacturing. Over the year, employment rose by 800 jobs due to the wood product manufacturing and transportation equipment manufacturing sectors.

In Non-Durable Goods, employment increased by 200 over the month. Over the year, the industries gained 3,500 jobs. Some of the increases occurred in food manufacturing and in plastics and rubber products manufacturing.

Service-Providing Employment

The Service-Providing sectors grew by 600 jobs over the month. This was due to growth in government; trade, transportation, and utilities; and educational and health services. The information sector remained unchanged. Annually, Service-Providing gained 18,000 jobs. The gains occurred in trade, transportation, and utilities; education and health services; financial activities; leisure and hospitality; other services; professional and business services; and information.

Total Private

Total Private employment decreased to 1,593,500 over the month from 1,599,000 in August. Over the year, the employment level gained 18,100 jobs.

Average Weekly Hours increased by 12 minutes over the month and improved by 12 minutes over the year.

Average Weekly Earnings, at \$775.37 in September, were up by \$4.00 from August. Average Weekly Earnings were up over the year, gaining \$31.62.

Average Hourly Earnings, at \$21.78 in September, decreased by 1 cent over the month and increased by 77 cents over the year.

Resources for LMI

American Community Survey (ACS): The ACS is an ongoing survey that provides data every year by giving communities the current information they need to plan investments and services. Information from the survey generates data that help determine how more than \$400 billion in federal and state funds are distributed each year.

<u>Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS)</u>: The Bureau is a division of the U.S. Department of Labor and functions as the principal data gathering agency of the federal government in the field of labor economics. The BLS collects, processes, analyzes and disseminates data relating to employment, unemployment, the labor force, productivity, prices, family expenditures, wages, industrial relations, and occupational safety and health.

<u>Census Tract:</u> A small relatively permanent statistical subdivision of a county delineated by local committees of census data users for the purpose of collecting and presenting census data. It is worth noting that census tract conform to county lines (that is they are always sub-sets of a county), but may not follow zip code lines.

<u>Civilian Labor Force:</u> The civilian labor force comprises the total of all civilians age 16 and older classified as employed or unemployed, or seeking employment. This gives employers a measure of the labor pool.

Consumer Price Index (CPI): A measure of the average change in prices over time for a set group of goods and services. The Bureau of Labor Statistics publishes CPIs for two population groups: (1) for all urban consumers (CPI-U) which covers approximately 80 percent of the total population and (2) for all urban wage earners and clerical workers (CPI-W) which covers 32 percent of the total population. Among the CPI components are the costs of housing, food, transportation, and energy. While the CPI is not technically a cost of living index, it is often used to indicate changes in the cost-of-living.

<u>Current Employment Statistics (CES) Survey:</u> A monthly survey of nonfarm business establishments used to collect nonfarm payroll employment, and worker hours and earnings by industry and area. Through the Federal/State cooperative effort, these data are used to compute current monthly employment, and hours and earnings estimates, by industry, for the nation, the 50 states and the District of Columbia, and over 250 Metropolitan Statistical Areas (MSA's).

<u>Current Population Survey (CPS)</u>: A monthly household survey of the civilian non-institutional population of the United States. This BLS survey provides labor market statistics (e.g., employment, unemployment and wages) by industry, occupation, and demographic characteristics. The Bureau of the Census collects data for this survey in cooperation with BLS.

<u>CES Employment:</u> A count of all persons who worked full or part time or received pay from a nonagricultural employer for any part of the pay period that included the 12th day of the month. Because this count comes from a survey of employers, persons who work

for two different companies could be counted twice. Therefore, non-farm payroll employment is really a count of the number of jobs rather than the number of persons employed. This count is also based on where the jobs are located, regardless of where the workers reside. Non-farm payroll employment data are collected and compiled by Current Employment Statistics (CES) Survey.

<u>Labor Market Information (LMI)</u>: A body of knowledge that includes a variety of economic, social, and demographic information. This information describes current conditions and forecasts employment conditions at a future date. LMI is comprised of population data, labor force data, industry data, occupational data, general economic trends, and career data.

North American Industrial Classification System (NAICS):

A system of identifying industry activity, NAICS is replacing the U.S. Standard Industrial Classification (SIC)system. NAICS will reshape the way we track our industries. NAICS was developed jointly by the U.S., Canada, and Mexico to provide new comparability in statistics about business activity across North America.

Occupational Employment Statistics (OES): A federal state cooperative program, which collects detailed occupational data by industry in a three-year cycle. The Occupational Employment Statistics (OES) survey is an annual mail survey measuring occupational employment and occupational wage rates for wage and salary workers in nonfarm establishments, by industry. On a national level, the survey samples approximately 400,000 establishments per year, taking 3 years to fully collect the sample of 1.2 million establishments.

<u>Seasonal Adjustment:</u> A statistical technique applied to monthly data to eliminate changes that normally occur during the year due to seasonal events such as weather, major holidays, shifts in production schedules, harvest times, and the opening and closing of schools.

Standard Industrial Classification (SIC): An industry classification system underlying all establishment-based Federal economic statistics classified by industry. The SIC defines industries in accordance with the composition and structure of the economy. It was developed for use in the classification of establishments by type of activity in which they are engaged.

<u>Note:</u> This was replaced by the North American Industry Classification System (NAICS).

Standard Occupational Classification (SOC): This is an occupational coding system that was presented by the Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) to replace and consolidate several previous coding systems used to classify occupations. The consolidated coding systems include the Occupational Employment Statistics (OES), the Dictionary of Occupational Titles (DOT), and the grouping of occupational titles used by the Census based on survey responses.

<u>Unemployment:</u> An estimate of the number of persons who did not have a job, but were available for work and actively seeking work during the calendar week that includes the 12th day of the month.



The Consumer Price Index for All Urban Consumers (CPI-U) increased 1.5 percent over the last 12 months to an index level of 241.428 (1982-84=100). For September, the index increased 0.2 percent prior to seasonal adjustment.

The Consumer Price Index for Urban Wage Earners and Clerical Workers (CPI-W) increased 1.2 percent over the last 12 months to an index level of 235.495 (1982-84=100). For September, the index increased 0.3 percent prior to seasonal adjustment.


