

## Satisfaction and support for the NL Liberal Party has improved in past quarter

- Support for the Liberals has increased, while support for the NDP has decreased
- A majority of residents continue to be dissatisfied with the performance of the Liberal government, although to a considerably lesser degree than three months ago
- Support for Premier Dwight Ball has increased this quarter, while preference for NDP leader Earl McCurdy has decreased

**HALIFAX, NS December 7 2016:** Despite low performance approval ratings, the Liberals are currently the most preferred provincial political party in Newfoundland and Labrador, according to the most recent survey conducted by **Corporate Research Associates Inc.** 

Specifically, four in ten decided voters back the governing Newfoundland and Labrador Liberal Party (42%, up from 34% in August 2016), while one-third support the Progressive Conservative Party (34%, compared with 33%), and one-quarter prefer the New Democratic Party (23%, down from 32%).

Three in ten residents are undecided (28%, up from 23%), while one percent refuse to state a preference (compared with 2%), and five percent either support none of the parties or do not plan to vote (compared with 7%).

Satisfaction with the performance of the Liberal government has improved and currently stands at 33 percent (up from 17% three months ago), while six in ten are dissatisfied (59%, down from 81%), and six percent do not offer a definite opinion (compared with 2%).

With regards to leader preference, support for Premier Dwight Ball has improved and currently stands at 27 percent (up from 17% three months ago), while one-third of residents support Paul Davis of the PC Party (35%, compared with 32%). Preference for NDP leader Earle McCurdy has declined and currently stands at 17 percent (down from 24%). Meanwhile, one in ten prefer none of these leaders (10%, compared with 13%), and another one in ten have no definite opinion at this time (11%, compared with 14%).

These results are part of the **CRA** *Atlantic Quarterly*®, an independent telephone survey of Atlantic Canadians, and are based on a sample of 803 adult Newfoundland and Labrador residents. The survey was conducted from November 4 to December 1, 2016, with overall results for the province accurate to within ± 3.5 percentage points in 95 out of 100 samples.
