A good ol' whuppin!

Alberta's Carey thumps defending champs

S ometimes a good old-fashioned kick in the butt can work wonders for the recipient. Jennifer Jones and her Team Canada mates from Winnipeg were on the receiving end of such a kicking in the opening draw of the 2016 Scotties Tournament of Hearts, losing 12-5 to Alberta's Chelsea Carey.

It's not likely, however, that the whuppin' will do anything more than make Jones, third Kaitlyn Lawes, second Jill Officer and lead Dawn McEwen even more focused the rest of the week.

"It's the first game so we're okay," Jones said after a couple of narrow misses allowed Carey to steal four in the third game to take control of the game.

"It's not the way you want to start but if you're going to lose a game, we always say the first game is the one to lose."

Carey, who skipped a Manitoba team to a 10-4 record and a bronze medal in the 2014 Scotties, made her Scotties debut as an Alberta skip a successful one.

Carey took over the Calgary crew of third Amy Nixon, second Jocelyn Peterman and lead Laine Peters when skip Heather Nedohin decided to take the year off to spend time with her family.

There were questions of how Carey would fit in with the highly successful trio after her attempt to replace Laura Crocker in Edmonton didn't work out as planned. This one appears to be working just fine.

"The easiest part of the transition was the relationship between (third) Amy (Nixon) and I on the ice," Carey said.

"A lot of people were speculating because we're both pretty

intense and fiery, that it would be a disaster. It was the opposite. It was phenomenal right from the start."

The Alberta foursome stole four in the third end and then put an exclamation point on their win with five in the ninth.

"We sort of came in saying even if you lose it's not that big a deal," Carey said of her victory. "What we wanted to get out of today was figuring out the ice and feeling like we're communicating well.

"Everyone played really well. We had a couple of little miscues but the girls made it pretty easy on me for the most part. Winning is a great bonus."

Jones wasn't upset by the loss because of the way her team responded in the second half.

"If you're going to give up a steal of four, the first game is the one to do it in," she said. "I thought we played well in the second half of the game so there's lots of positives to take out of it."

Saying it was "kind of a kick in the butt," Jones added it was "not the way you want to start ... but I'm happy with way we finished."

Jones, who was nearly perfect in winning the morning's Ford Hot Shots final, was off a hair in Game 1 and it cost her big in the third end. Her first rock left Carey the opportunity to throw up a centre guard, forcing Jones to try a wide hit and roll against five Alberta counters.

The hit and roll was the one shot Jones didn't hit perfectly in the Hot Shots and she was narrow on this one, rolling through the house and letting Alberta steal four.

"It was a new path and it just curled a little more," she said of the shot. "I probably underthrew my second one a bit. End of the day we just missed by a quarter of an inch each time so it wasn't that bad. It just worked out really bad on the scoreboard."

FORD HOT SHOTS Near perfect performance Jones puts pedal to the metal

lympic champion skip Jennifer Jones of Winnipeg shot a nearly perfect 29 of 30 to win the 2016 Ford Hot Shot competition Saturday at the Scotties Tournament of Hearts.

Jones scored a perfect five points on five of the six shots — hit and stay, draw to the button, draw through port, raise and double take-out. She was inches from a perfect five on the hitand roll, scoring four.

Her 29 points easily beat Prince Edward Island third Robyn Green who scored only 13 after leading all semifinalists with 25.

"I already drive an Edge but I was looking at upgrading so this is perfect timing," Jones said of winning a two-year lease on a 2016 EcoBoost powered Ford Edge Sport SUV, with an approximate retail value of \$49,789.

Green said the \$2,000 she won as runnerup is a "nice bonus."

Jones, skip of Team Canada here who also won the Ford Hot Shots in 2011, had finished tied for second in the semifinal with Prince Edward Island lead Marie Christianson and won a draw-to-the-button shot to advance to the final. Christianson was \$1,000 as the thirdplace finisher.

The day began with eight finalists. Jenn

Brine of Nova Scotia, Quebec skip Marie-France Larouche, Selena Kaatz of Manitoba and Sarah Murphy of Nova Scotia were eliminated in the first playoff round.

Christianson and Nova Scotia second Blisse Joyce were eliminated in the semifinal.

The 22nd year of the annual competition saw curlers attempting six different shots: Hit and Stay, Draw the Button, Draw the Port, The Raise, Hit and Roll and Double Takeout. Each shot is awarded points on a scale from 0-5 depending on the end result of the shot.

Last year at the Scotties. Newfoundland/ Labrador's Heather Strong won her second consecutive Ford Hot Shots title. 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



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

CONTINENTAL CUP RETURNS TO LAS VEGAS

The Entertainment Capital of the World will get another chance to set curling attendance records when the World Financial Group Continental Cup returns to Las Vegas in 2017, it was announced Friday by Curling Canada in partnership with USA Curling.

The 2017 World Financial Group Continental Cup, presented by Boyd Gaming, curling's version of the Ryder Cup, will be for the second straight year, and third time in four years, at the Orleans Arena, Jan. 12-15.

This past January, a total of 62,498 fans attended the 2016 World Financial Group Continental Cup, shattering not only the event attendance record (which was set in Las Vegas in 2014), but also the record for any curling event ever staged in the United States.

"Our great fans have spoken loud and clear — they love watching curling in Las Vegas," said Hugh Avery, Chair of the Curling Canada Board of Governors. "Jon Killoran and his crew with the Las Vegas host committee have proven that they can put on a great show, and with our wonderful partnership with World Financial Group, we're confident that the 2017 WFG Continental Cup will be another memorable show." The 2016 World Financial Group Continental Cup featured the closest finish in the 12-year history of the event, with the host Team North America prevailing 30.5-29.5.

The 2017 edition will also mark the seventh year of title sponsorship by World Financial Group.

"We are thrilled to be returning to Las Vegas for the 2017 WFG Continental Cup," said Rick Williams, President of World Financial Group Canada Inc. "The athletes and the great venue, combined with the energy of the city, make Las Vegas the key destination for this event and for all curling fans. The Canadian teams for the 2017 World Financial Group Continental Cup will be the champions at the 2016 Scotties Tournament of Hearts and the 2016 Tim Hortons Brier, along with the men's and women's champions at the 2016 Home Hardware Canada Cup.

The U.S. teams will be announced by USA Curling leading up to the event, while the composition of the World Team also will be announced later.

Every Grande Prairie residents, you'll have to forgive Jenn Hanna; she was still a little shocked herself when she made this comment, in jest: Who wouldn't want to go to Grande Prairie in February?

Hanna, here as the Ontario champion chasing the 2016 Scotties Tournament of Hearts title, scored a stunning upset of Rachel Homan's team in the Ontario final. If there was one team everyone expected to be here, it was Homan ... the best women's team in the world this year.

But strange things happen in sports. And that's why Hanna was a little taken aback when asked about going to Grande Prairie, just moments after beating Homan in the Ontario final.

"I had never even let myself get to the point thinking that we might win Ontario, until Sunday morning," the 36-year-old said. "At that point I said to somebody, "Where are the Scotties anyway?" I had no idea.

"So when we won (Ontario) I was so tonguetied to say anything in the interview. I had no idea what to say. I'm really sorry if that came out as an insult. It certainly wasn't meant to be."

Hanna and her sister Stephanie, playing

second, are back at the Scotties after an 11-year absence that included Jenn's three-year hiatus from the competitive side of curling.

Hanna won Ontario in 2004 and 2005 and was a major player for a number of years after that until life got in the way. When she gave birth to her third child, Hanna found there weren't enough hours in the day for competitive curling, full-time work and being a mother of three young children.

"It was a necessary decision and one I wanted to make because I wanted to be home with the kids," she said of her decision to step away from curling. "I'm never going to get back the years of them being little so I didn't want to spend every weekend on the road and I didn't want to use up my vacation time for curling. I wanted to be able to spend time with them. And I have a husband who tends to travel a lot for work."

Once she knew they were through having children and she returned to work a year ago after a prolonged maternity leave, she realized something was missing.

"My family building years are over, here I am back at work and what about me? I kind of lost myself a bit. It's very easy to identify myself as a wife, as a mother, as an employee, but I lost Jenn in the mix."

And when her six-year-old daughter said she wanted to grow up to be a "mommy, just like you" Hanna also realized she was sending the wrong message to her children. So curling again became a big part of her life. The Hanna sisters hooked up with Brit O'Neill and Karen Sagle to form the rink that showed curling in like riding a bike, you never forget how.


"We're a first year team so our expectations

weren't, 'We're setting out to win the Ontario Scotties.' That's more of a life dream. To do it in our first year together is pretty unbelievable.

"It was emotional for Steph and I because we had won it back in 2005 and since had taken a few years off competitive curling and got to a place where family is first in our lives and curling has slipped down the list a little bit. Qualifying win Simply 'amazing' B.C. grabs final Scotties spot

arla Thompson of British Columbia scored three in the fifth end and then held off veteran Kerry Galusha of the Northwest Territories 8-5 Saturday to win the pre-qualifying final and earn a berth in this year's Scotties Tournament of Hearts.

"It feels amazing right now, I'm not going to lie," Thompson said after she and her Kamloops team of third Kristen Recksiedler, second Tracey Lavery, lead Trysta Vandale, alternate Sasha Carter and coach Gary Van Den Berghe had finished celebrating their win. "I don't know if it felt better to win B.C.

or that game so we're on a high right now." Thompson had a tough time of it in the

evening, losing 10-2 to Kerri Einarson of Manitoba by giving up three in the second end and steals of two in the sixth and four in the seventh.

While six other teams were playing their first games in the main round robin, knowing it was just Game 1 and they had another six days of curling, B.C. and the Territories knew it was win or go home.

And they played it tight, blanking the first and fourth ends and trading singles in the second and third. It wasn't until the fifth end that either team showed a crack.

Thompson's crew managed to hide two counters behind guards and Galusha's last rock raise was inches wide, bumping a B.C. rock to second counter. Thompson drew inside the four foot to count three.

"The end was looking really great, set up nice," said Thompson. "I remember Kerry had an unfortunate (shot), didn't quite curl

enough and we just capitalized, made the draw at the end."

Galusha's Yellowknife team came right back with two in the sixth, an open draw after Thompson missed on her angle raise takeout attempt left the Territories sitting one.

The Territories pulled even at 5-5 with more in the eighth but B.C. countered with a pair in nine and one more in the 10th.

"We've got a good handle on the ice and we got rid of some nerves. Hopefully that continues," Thompson said of having already played four games before even getting into the main tournament.

They lost their first game 8-7 to Nunavut but then won three straight, including two in a row over the Territories.

Galusha and her teammates were a swamp of tears after the loss.

"We felt really good this year," said Galusha, fighting back tears. "You work so hard to get here and one shot makes a huge difference. It's tough."
