They fire at appropriate forces. roll angles so the missile is automatically guided throughout its flight.

Because of its light weight, MAW is particularly desirable in airborne and airmobile operations. And in situations where terrain is difficult to negotiate for wheeled and tracked vehicles-such as assault river crossing operations, heavily wooded or mountainous areas-MAW emerges as the most effective weapon in infantry operations for assault and anti-tank roles.

Deployed at the platoon level, MAW as a defensive weapon will cover armor approaches into the platoon area; offensively, it may be used against soft or hard targets.


Command Contracts \$5.9 Million For Hawk Manufacture

The U. S. Army Missile Command has awarded a \$5.9 million contract to Nortronics, a division of the Northrop Corp., for manufacture of mobile launchers for the Hawk air defense missile sys-

Work under the contract will be performed at Nortronics' facilities in Anaheim, Calif.

Hawk is a 17-foot-long supersonic missile that can reach out and destroy attacking high performance aircraft or airbreathing guided missiles at low altitudes. The missile "homes in" on the target by following a reflected radar beam.




