

Points of Pride

- NHCS celebrated the groundbreaking of a new school, Porters Neck Elementary, as part of the \$160 million bond referendum that passed in November 2014. Other projects from the referendum have begun and are on schedule.
- The district scored above the state average in Grade Level Proficiency, College and Career Readiness Standards including ACT Scores, and Percent of Schools Meeting or Exceeding Growth Expectations.
- · Isaac Bear Early College High School and Wilmington Early College High School had 100% graduation rates for the 2014-2015 school year. This was the fourth consecutive year that Isaac Bear achieved this distinction and the first year for Wilmington Early College.
- The New Hanover County Board of Education approved a new scholarship policy, Policy 1660- Board of Education Student Scholarships for future teachers. The policy awards four \$28,000 scholarships to selected students pursuing careers in education at an accredited North Carolina college or university.
- NHCS has approximately 375 National Board Certified teachers, with new teachers certified each year.
- Superintendent Dr. Tim Markley was named the 2015 Regional Superintendent of the Year.
- Wendy Kraft, Supervisor of Online Learning, was named the first annual North Carolina Virtual Public Schools (NCVPS) 2015 E-Learning Coordinator of the Year.
- Dr. Robin Hamilton, Principal at Parsley Elementary School, was named the 2015 Regional Principal of the Year.
- · Katie Snyder, a history teacher at Hoggard High School and the district's Overall Educator of the Year, was named the 2016 Southeast Regional Teacher of the Year.
- · Kelly Crowley, a third grade teacher at Pine Valley Elementary School, was named the 2015 STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Mathematics) Educator of the Year by Corning and Wilmington Business Development.
- Jay Robinson, a Home/Hospital Teacher for NHCS, was named the 2015 New Hanover County Exceptional Children's Teacher of Excellence by the North Carolina Department of Public Instruction.
- The 2015-16 school year kicked off with many high school sports accomplishments: Ashley High School Varsity Men's Soccer made it to the second round of the state play-offs; Ashley High School Girls Volleyball made it to the state play-offs; Greg Maranich, Men's Soccer Coach, was named the North Carolina Soccer Coaches Association Regional Coach of the Year. New Hanover High School Football made it to the final four of the 2015 State Conference and New Hanover High School Men's Soccer Team was Regional Runner-up. Carolina Cahill from Laney High School was named the Individual Runner Up at the Women's Golf State Conference; and Laney High School's Men's Soccer Team was the 2015 East Regional Champion and State Runner-up.
