

# DAYLIGHTING TIBBETTS BROOK

Once upon a time, Tibbetts Brook flowed freely into the Sputyen Duyvil Creek (which today is the Harlem River). Like a fairy tale, we can imagine what this section of the Bronx used to be like hundreds of years ago. Change to Tibbetts Brook first came around 1690 when the Van Cortlandt Family dammed the brook to power their grist mill which cause the area upland to flood creating what we now know as Van Cortlandt Lake. Then in 1912, New York City decided that the land south of Van Cortlandt Park was too wet for development and therefore forced what remained of Tibbetts Brook into the sewer system.

Currently, the water from Van Cortlandt Lake enters the Broadway sewer at a rate of 4 to 5 million gallons of water per day -- and that's on a dry day. This water is then treated - for no reason- at the Wards Island Stormwater Treatment Plant. Then when it does rain, the combination of sewage, street runoff and the brook enters the combined sewer,



bypassing the treatment plant and flowing directly into the Harlem River. This one Combined Sewer Overflow (CSO), WI-056, connected to the Broadway sewer makes up more than half of the CSO water entering the Harlem River. This clean water needs to be removed from the sewer to reduce CSO occurrences on the Harlem River and help with flooding issues along Broadway and other areas of the Tibbetts Brook Watershed.

The Friends of Van Cortlandt Park support NYC Parks efforts to study and plan for daylighting within Van Cortlandt Park by enhancing and enlarging the wetlands southwest of Van Cortlandt Lake to hold more water and therefore reduce the amount of water entering the sewer. However, this is a minor step in the right direction. NYC Parks needs obtain the CSX land between Van Cortlandt South and West 230th Street in order to properly daylight Tibbetts Brook. We support NYC Parks efforts to continue this along the trail southward past 225th Street to a place along the Harlem River waterfront.

Daylighting Tibbets Brook is a key project in the Van Cortlandt Park 2034 Master Plan. We are dedicated to helping make this dream become a reality and are actively planning for it. The Friends of Van Cortlandt Park are working with the Bronx Council for Environmental Quality and NYC H2O to organize a Coalition for Daylighting Tibbetts Brook. 
