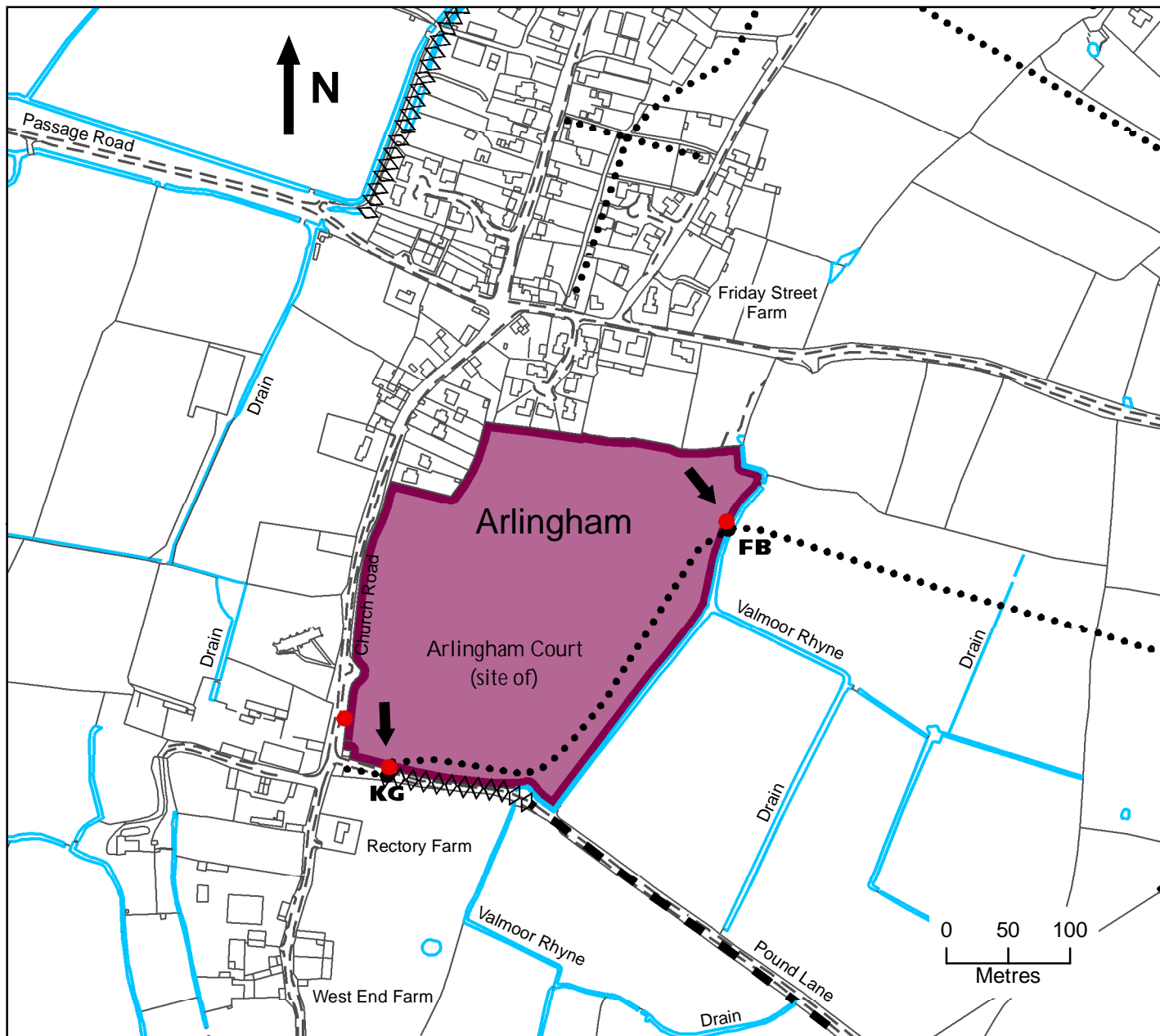


PERMISSIVE ACCESS

The site of Arlingham Court lies across the road from Arlingham Church, fifty metres beyond the field wall. Built as a baronial hall about 1327, around the same time as the church, the building fell into disrepair and was finally pulled down in the 19th Century. The entire field is permissive open access provided through the Environmental Stewardship Scheme. The site is linked to the Severn Way by footpaths to the north and south.
