Dear Mr. Casey:

This is in response to your letter of November 29, 1983, regarding the level of services provided by the General Services Administration (GSA) to the Central Intelligence Agency (CIA), and the letter of September 8, 1983, regarding the Standard Level Users Charge (SLUC) [redacted]

Although we strongly disagree with your contention that the management and service have been inadequate, we acknowledge that we have had continuing difficulty providing the staffing levels required by CIA because of the problems associated with finding personnel who can pass the CIA security clearance process.

During the past year, we have successfully tested the concept of delegating certain operational responsibilities directly to the agencies we serve. This program is being expanded and we invite you to participate. Specifically, such a delegation will permit your agency to operate, maintain, repair, alter (up to \$100,000), and protect the property. The delegation would permit your agency to furnish certain services normally provided by GSA as part of the SLUC assessed your agency under Section 210(j) of the Federal Property and Administrative Services Act of 1949, as amended, (40 U.S.C. 490(j)). Although we would continue to assess the SLUC in accordance with established procedures, a transfer of funds, personnel, records and property to carryout the aforementioned functions would be effected. The scope of such a delegation would include all present and planned buildings at the agency's headquarters location. Our National Capital Region staff will be glad to meet with your Office of Logistics staff to draft a Memorandum of Understanding to implement the delegation.

With respect to [redacted] by letter dated August 31, 1981, the CIA was delegated authority to operate, maintain, repair and alter [redacted] and you were advised that our staff would be available to discuss an appropriate adjustment to the then current SLUC. Section 210(j) of the aforementioned act directs the Administrator of General Services to charge anyone furnished space and services at rates (SLUC) which shall approximate commercial charges for comparable space and services. While exemption from SLUC may be granted if such charges would be

infeasible or impractical, we are unable to justify such an exemption [redacted]. For your information, at no time did GSA grant a use permit to operate and maintain the building. For these reasons, we have a statutory duty to collect an appropriate user charge for the space furnished to CIA [redacted].


In addition, the Master Plan for [redacted] contemplates its eventual redevelopment by GSA as a major Federal Center. We believe, in the interest of overall economy and efficiency, that [redacted] should remain under the charge, custody and control of GSA.

Regarding the other issues of procurement, supply, transportation and major construction, GSA will continue to meet your needs in these areas.

If you are agreeable to this proposal, my staff is prepared to work out the details and formalize the delegation.
