You are reading this letter because you are thinking about standing for an **exciting** and **important** position on the National Executive next year.

We are inspired that you wish to commit yourself to BBYO and help our movement grow. For over 75 years, BBYO has inspired, empowered and developed Jewish Youth and contributed to growing the Jewish community in the UK & Ireland. Serving on the National Executive is one of the many opportunities that BBYO offers and we hope it will shape you as an individual and help propel you into a life of Jewish communal influence and impact.

Spending a year on the BBYO National Executive may be one of the most rewarding experiences of your life. If you do your job well, you will play a vital role in ensuring that the grass roots of BBYO, the chapters, are well attended with high membership and a high standard of programming. You will work with some of BBYO's most talented and interesting Bogrim to run fantastic National and Leadership events. You will also make your mark on the movement with your own creative projects enhancing membership, attendance, BBYO's finances, education and programming.

However, spending a year on the National Executive is also a very **big commitment**. It involves a serious amount of work including regular visits to chapters, regular National Executive and event tzevet meetings, training sessions, organising programmes for chapters or programmes and equipment for events.

In this pack you will find important deadlines, as well as the required forms and details of the standing process.

Please read the National Executive Job Description for all the positions and the contract of commitment. You should only stand for the National Executive if you are sure that you will be able to fulfil the commitments outlined.

If you are sure that you will be able to make the commitment, then **what are you waiting** for?

We ask for your parents' details so that we can speak with them briefly prior to you standing for National. It is important that they understand the commitment that comes with the position, and that they endorse your candidacy.

We are also asking for you to write a manifesto. Your manifesto should have three distinct sections: One section outlining why you are standing for your position, one section outlining why you are a good candidate for that position and one section outlining three specific policies you would enact if elected. You must also include a passport photo with your manifesto.

Please also create a 60-90 second YouTube video briefly outlining why you should be voted for and perhaps a little about you as a person. It should demonstrate your top idea and should be **fun** and **exciting**. This is so that members can decide who they want to elect based on more than just a speech.

There will also be an informal hustings on National Veida where attendees will have the opportunity to ask you questions in small groups.

You have the opportunity to have posters and flyers for yourself on National Veida. You will be allowed to put posters up in specific areas around the site and there must be no more than eight posters per candidate. Flyers should be handed out at National Veida. Flyers and posters must be checked by the office before they are put up on the event: no rude language or negative campaigning will be tolerated. You have the following maximum allowance for flyers and posters: -

- 120 flyers (max size A6 that's 1/4 of an A4 sheet)
- 6 A4 posters
- 2 A3 posters

Details of the election process at National Veida will be sent to candidates upon the office receiving the required documents

Very Important: In order to stand for the National Executive, you must have attended DLTC. There will be no exceptions made to this rule, as voted upon by the members and general body of BBYO UK & Ireland.

Please remember that, as of 2013, standing for Election for the National Executive is a confidential process up until the deadline for form submission. This means that you cannot announce your candidacy or tell your peers that you are standing before the start of National Veida. Additionally, the process of Nominations has been removed for this election*

The BBYO National Executive is elected by the members of BBYO to run the movement. This is an in incredibly important task and one which should be taken seriously. We hope that this elections process reflects this, so thank you for your co-operation and we look forward to working with you next year as part of the National Executive or otherwise.

OFFICER RESPONSIBILITIES

All Officers of the 2016-17 National Executive will:

- Commit their entire term, from September 2016 September 2017, to advance our movement and continue to build BBYO UK & Ireland.
- Visit chapters on a regular basis.
- Represent BBYO to the wider community.
- Build and manage a grassroots membership campaign.
- Engage in publicity on behalf of BBYO.
- Strengthen members' Jewish identity and Israel engagement.
- Meet all deadlines.
- Organise and attend National Executive meetings with the movement workers.
- Maintain regular communication with the movement workers.
- Represent BBYO on our global platform.
- Remain well informed and up to date on BBYO's important issues as part of their role as an officer of the National Executive and therefore an informal educator.
- Take part in continuous training with the movement workers.
- Deliver continuous training to Chapter Executive Officers.
- Adhere to any additional responsibilities that the National Executive and Office Staff deem worthy

Position Specific

The 2016-17 National President will:

- Ensure the National Executive work together as a team.
- Chair National Executive meetings throughout the year.
- Attend Youth Commission meetings and decide, in consultation with the movement workers, which other National Exec member should attend based on the agenda.
- Co-ordinate recruitment strategy for each event in conjunction with the movement workers.
- Ensure that an agenda is produced for every meeting and the meeting is correctly minuted along with the National Administrator. The minutes will be sent to all National Executive Officers, the Movement Workers and the Chair of the Youth Commission.
- Ensure that outgoing Chapter Executives effectively handover to incoming Executives, together with the Administrator.
- Be part of the tzevet organising and running DLTC.

The 2016-17 National Vice-President will:

- Co-ordinate and enact a grassroots membership campaign with the National Administrator.
- Co-ordinate recruitment strategy for each event in conjunction with the movement workers and National President.
- Together with the Programmer, ensure that each chapter programme is read over for educational quality and to ensure it will be enjoyed by members who will then return the next week.
- Co-ordinate the collation of content for member newsletter and stakeholder communication with the National Administrator.
- Co-Rosh New Members' Weekend with a boger and be responsible for the tochnit creation and logistics on the event.

The 2016-17 National Administrator will:

- Co-ordinate grassroots membership drive with Vice-President.
- With the President, ensure that an agenda is produced for every meeting and the meeting is correctly minuted and the minutes sent to all National Exec members, the Movement Workers and the Chair of the Youth Commission.
- Ensure that chapter execs effectively handover to incoming execs, together with the President.
- Co-ordinate the collation of content for member newsletter and stakeholder communication with the Vice-President.
- Co-ordinate the organisation of member-driven National Fundraising events with the SACO.
- Co-ordinate the organisation of member-driven educational events with the JZA.
- Together with the programmer, administer the national programming bank.

The 2016-17 National Programmer will:

- Facilitate activist projects and social action through with the National SACO
- Together with the Vice ensure that each chapter programme is read over for educational quality and to ensure it will continue to retain members.
- Ensure every chapter takes part in a project for Mitzvah Day and JServe.
- Together with the administrator, administer the national programming bank.
- Work with chapters and movement workers to organise the 'Big Bang' chapters launch for the year.
- Help chapters develop and run strong quality programmes on a weekly basis

The 2016-17 National Jewish and Zionist Awareness Officer (JZA) will:

- Co-ordinate the delivery of Jewish and Zionist content via chapter programming and while on National events
- Produce and distribute an educational update sheet for chapters with the National Social Action and Causes Officer.
- Constantly review and update BBYO's National and Chapter level customs and traditions relating to Israel and Judaism and make sure that they are adhered to.
- Work alongside BBYO's Israeli Shinshin (should there be one) to strengthen Israel engagement across BBYO
- Engage with the local community to ensure a BBYO presence at all Jewish festivals and holiday celebrations

The 2016-17 National Social Action and Causes Officer (SACO) will:

- Produce and distribute an educational update sheet for chapters with the National Jewish and Zionist Awareness Officer.
- Facilitate activist projects and social action with Programmer
- Work with the programmer to ensure every chapter takes part in a project for Mitzvah Day and JServe.
- Co-ordinate the organisation of member-driven National Fundraising events with the Administrator.
- Co-ordinate the organisation of member-driven educational events with the JZA.

I will rededicate myself to the service of my chapter. I am, beyond any Executive position I have held, a member of BBYO. My commitment to BBYO and its principles will not waiver and I am dedicated to the principles of BBYO; my upcoming election will not alter this in the least.

Dear Parent(s)/Guardian(s) of a BBYO National Executive Officer candidate,

Every year, members across the UK & Ireland convene for National Veida to unite and decide the future leadership and direction of our movement. One of the highlights is the election of the National Executive, BBYO UK & Ireland's national leaders.

This letter is intended to provide you with some understanding of what it will mean for your family if your son/daughter is elected to the National Executive. We encourage you first, to read through the pages of this packet. While it is geared primarily toward your son/daughter, it will help you to better understand what the National Executive is all about. It is important that you are an active participant in helping your son/daughter decide whether or not running for the National Executive is the right decision for him/her. Should he/she choose to run, you will be obligated to sign this form and give your consent to them doing so. Without your consent, your child will not be allowed to run.

There are six positions on the National Executive: National President, National Vice-President, National Administrator, National Programmer, National Jewish and Zionist Awareness Officer and National Social Action and Causes Officer. The specific responsibilities of each position are detailed in this packet, but the main responsibility is communicating with counterparts on a chapter and country level and with BBYO members via email, phone and online. National Executive candidates must have attended DLTC in order to stand for election and, if elected, must attend National Executive Training Course 2016, CLTC 2016 and Choref 2016. They are also strongly encouraged to actively participate in all other BBYO programmes. This is all in addition to weekly projects, activities and deadlines that must be met.

As can quickly be determined from the above paragraph, being on the National Executive is a lot of work and a major time commitment. Though it is certainly possible to serve on the National Executive and succeed in school, sometimes extra-curricular activities must be sacrificed. It is imperative that each member has the support of their parent(s)/guardian(s). Many National Executive Officers are able to remain involved in school activities and recreational sports, but each young person's ability to do so is unique to them and depends upon their time management abilities.

On a personal note, putting aside the worries you may have about late nights and stress, we must tell you: this is one of the most incredible opportunities that a young Jewish person can have! You just have to ask someone who has taken on this responsibility before to find out. You can also see what some previous National Executive Officers have said about their time at the end of this packet.

Serving successfully on the National Executive is an amazing experience. During the year of service, the National Executive Officers are pushed to grow as individuals and educators. They are challenged by movement workers and given incredible opportunities to achieve something special. After the year of service, their continued involvement in the movement will help them to grow into rounded individuals and really make them stand out when applying to positions of responsibility in the future.

Best of luck to you and your son/daughter in working together to decide whether running for the National Executive is the right decision, and a tremendous thank you to your son/daughter for their obvious, and significant commitment to BBYO.

I have read the above letter and discussed the upcoming National Elections with my son/daughter.
