ARISTIDA PURPURASCENS Poir Purple Triple-awned Grass

- FAMILY: Gramineae (Poaceae)
- HABIT: Herbaceous caespitose perennial, 3-10 dm.; flowering August-October.
- SIMILAR SPECIES: The genus *Aristida* is distinctive. This species is somewhat similar to other members of the genus; however, *A. purpurascens* is notably taller and has wider leaves than other species.
- TOTAL RANGE: FL to TX, n. to MA, and in the interior n. to s. Ont., s. MI, WI, MO, and e. KS.
- STATE RANGE: There are post-1980 records from Adams, Erie, Fulton, Henry, Holmes, Jackson, Lucas, and Pike counties. There are pre-1980 records from 5 counties: Fairfield, Hamilton, Pickaway, Ross, and Wood.
- HABITAT: Usually in full sun on dry, sparsely vegetated sandy soils; barrens, prairies, glades, and meadows.
- HAZARDS: Subject to grazing before the maturation of the hard-pointed fruits. Also, overshading by woody species as a result of succession.
- RECOVERY POTENTIAL: Good in the Oak Openings region of northwest Ohio and barrens of Adams County; fair elsewhere.
- INVENTORY GUIDELINES: Mature flowering material is needed for identification.

 Collect the underground parts and note density of basal tufts.
- COMMENTS: *Aristida purpurescens* is rather distinctive grass and its distribution is likely close to being known in the state. Populations may be discovered in Oak Openings, Adams County and southcentral Ohio.
