## MUHLENBERGIA CAPILLARIS (Lam.) Trin. Hairgrass

FAMILY: Graminae (Poaceae)

- HABIT: Herbaceous caespitose perennial, 5-10 dm.; flowering September- October.
- SIMILAR SPECIES: Many members of Muhlenbergia require technical characters for identification. In the field, this may be confused with *Eragrostis spectabilis*, as they both have open, purple inflorescences.
- TOTAL RANGE: FL to e. TX, n. to MA, NJ, e. PA, s. OH, KY, s. In, s. IL, MO, and KS; W.I. and e. Mex.
- STATE RANGE: PORTAGE CO.: JACKSON CO.: ----, 1933, <u>L. Pontius</u> (BHO); Liberty Twp., 1 Oct. 1933, <u>F. Bartley & L. Pontius</u> (OS, 3 sheets); rocky ridge near Limerick, 8 Sept. 1934, <u>L. Pontius & F. Bartley</u> (OS); rocky ridge neare Limerick, 24 Sept. 1934, <u>F. Bartley</u> (BHO); Jackson Twp., Sept. 1934, <u>L. Pontius & F. Bartley</u> (US).

HABITAT: Sandy soil, rocky woods, clearings.

- HAZARDS: Unknown, but possibly grazing, as many species of *Muhlenbergia* are important range grasses.
- RECOVERY POTENTIAL: Presumed good due to the availability of suitable habitat.
- INVENTORY GUIDELINES: Mature flowering material with underground parts needed for identification. Note density of basal tufts.
- COMMENTS: This grass may still be extant in southern Ohio and should be looked for in suitable habitats
