PENSTEMON PALLIDUS Small Downy White Beard-tongue

FAMILY: Scrophulariaceae

HABIT: Herbaceous rhizomatous perennial, 3-8 dm.; flowering May, June; fruiting June, July.

SIMILAR SPECIES: Most Ohio specimens of *Penstemon* are superficially similar, but this species is most similar to *P. canescens*. Distinctions between these two species are sometimes very vague. *P. pallidus* generally has narrower, firmer, more pubescent leaves than *P. canescens*. In addition, *P. pallidus* generally has a white corolla with purple lines inside. *P. canescens* generally has a pink to purple corolla that is larger than that of *P. pallidus*.

TOTAL RANGE: ME to MN, s. to VA and AR.

STATE RANGE (as of 2008): Post-1980 records are from Athens, Fulton, Gallia, Jackson, Lawrence, Montgomery, Vinton, and Washington counties.

HABITAT: Fields, roadsides, and open woods.

HAZARDS: Overgrowth by woody species through succession.

RECOVERY POTENTIAL: Unknown, but probably good due to its rhizomatous habit and tolerance of disturbance.

INVENTORY GUIDELINES: Collect mature, flowering specimens. Note whether the corolla is open or closed, and press some flowers spread open to reveal floral characters.

COMMENTS: Not all specimens of this extremely variable genus can be identified with certainty. Flower color, a diagnostic character traditionally used in keys, is extremely variable and unreliable, and may be affected by available sunlight. Hybridization between *Penstemon* species may cause some of the variation.

There are very likely more populations of this plant in Ohio. It is easily misidentified. It should be sought throughout the state.
