SPIRANTHES LUCIDA (H.H. Eaton) Ames Shining Ladies'-tresses

FAMILY: Orchidaceae

HABIT: Herbaceous perennial, 1-2.5 dm.; flowering May, June.

SIMILAR SPECIES: All members of the genus Spiranthes in Ohio are similar and are distinguished by floral characters. However, Spiranthes lucida flowers earlier than other members of the genus in Ohio.

TOTAL RANGE: N.B. to s. Ont. and MN, s. to N.S., ME, NJ, PA, OH, MI, IN, IL, MO; s. in uplands to VA, KY, TN, and NC.

STATE RANGE: There are post-1960 collections from 7 counties: Cuyahoga, Lake, Lorain, Pike, Ross, Seneca, and Summit. There are pre-1960 records from 9 other counties: Adams, Champaign, Franklin, Greene, Lucas, Mahoning, Medina, Portage, and Trumbull.

STATE STATUS: 1980-1987: Threatened, 1988 to present: Potentially Threatened.

HABITAT: Usually calcareous soil in areas where water supply is abundant: moist banks, wet meadows, lakeshores, damp woods and marshes; often in pastures.

HAZARDS: Trampling and compaction of soil; casual picking; drying of habitat.

RECOVERY POTENTIAL: Unknown, but the species can tolerate moderate disturbance.

INVENTORY GUIDELINES: Collect mature flowering material; avoid over-collecting.

COMMENTS: This early-flowering Spiranthes may be more frequent in Ohio than the records indicate. It should be sought throughout the state.
