WASHINGTON TERRITORY—ITS SOIL, &c.

CHALKS RIVER, Lewis Co., W. T., June 3d, 1862.

Lying between the Columbia River and the forty-ninth parallel of north latitude is a district of country embracing the extreme northwest portion of the Territory of the United States.

Viewed in a commercial point, Washington Territory must, at no very distant day, take the lead of all the States on the Pacific coast; for Puget Sound not only affords the best facilities for shipping, but there are also great inducements in the country adjacent to the Sound for the erection of extensive manufacturing establishments.

It has become pretty well fixed in the public mind that the national defence, both from foreign invasion and treason at home, demand the immediate construction of the Pacific Railroad; and the public mind is also beginning to look towards Puget Sound as the proper place for the western terminus of that road.

"Puget Sound (by which designation is included the whole body of waters flowing into the Pacific at the Straits de Fuca) is an inland sea equal in extent of shores to the Mediterranean—infinitely surpasses the Mediterranean in the safety of its navigation, in the number, capacity, and security of its harbors, and equally in the abundance and variety of its fisheries.

The Farmer's Corner.

How Weeds are Produced.

Professor Buckman, of England, has recently made some careful investigations as to the amount of weeds contained in seeds sold as clean and we will state a few of the results obtained, as they cannot fail, we think to interest our readers:

The Professor found in a pint of clover seed, 7,600 weed seeds; in a pint of cow grass seed, 12,000; in broad clover, 39,440; and in two pints of Dutch clover, severally, 25,560 and 70,400 weed seeds.

If this be true in relation to English farming, how much more so it must be in America, when it is well known much less pains are taken in preparing grain for market, as well as in the selection of seed and the general cultivation of the soil.

Peruvian Pigeon Towers.—The pigeon-towers, of (Ispahan) which are numerous in the fields and gardens on both sides of the river, are the most singular structures I have seen in this country.

THANKING FROM THE SHOCK.—It is never safe to put away wheat, thrashed out of the shock, in deep bins. It must first be spread out on a floor and thoroughly dried.
