CASH RECEIPTS IN THE FIRST HALF OF 1950

Monthly Summary

Cash receipts from farm marketings in the first half of 1950 are expected to total 10.6 billion dollars, or 9 percent less than receipts in the same period last year. First-quarter receipts of 5.5 billion dollars were down 7 percent from the first quarter of 1949. Receipts in the second quarter will probably amount to around 5.1 billion dollars, or 12 percent under a year earlier.

The monthly distribution of these totals is given below, along with percentage declines from corresponding months in 1949. Estimates for May and June are tentative. The estimate for April has been substantially lowered from previously published indications. The percentage declines have also been increased a little by upward corrections in the estimates for April and May of last year.

Cash Receipts in June

Farmers' cash receipts from marketings in June are likely to total about 1.8 billion dollars, nearly the same as in May but 14 percent below receipts in June of last year. Prices are expected to average about the same as in May, and little if any below the level a year ago. But the volume of marketings is expected to be somewhat smaller than the volume marketed last June, when large quantities of wheat were delivered under the purchase-agreement program.

Receipts from livestock and livestock products may be slightly higher than in May and little if any smaller than a year ago. June receipts from meat animals and from poultry and eggs are expected to be about the same as in May; but dairy receipts will probably be up a little as a result of seasonally larger marketings. As compared with June a year ago, receipts from meat animals may be somewhat larger because of higher prices; lower prices will probably bring slightly smaller receipts from dairy products; and receipts from poultry and eggs will be down considerably because of lower prices.

Crop receipts in June will almost certainly be down from May, largely because of the closing of the corn loan program. They may be as much as a third lower than last June, as crop marketings, including loans and purchase-agreement deliveries, are expected to show a marked decline. There may be a slight seasonal rise in receipts from wheat as harvesting starts in some Southern States. Wheat receipts will be down from a year ago, however, because of a smaller crop and smaller deliveries under the purchase-agreement program. Receipts from vegetables are likely to show some seasonal gain, with early potatoes from southern producing areas and larger quantities of truck crops marketed. But vegetable receipts are expected to be smaller than a year ago because of lower prices. It is expected that receipts from corn will be lower than in May because marketings, including loans, will not be so large. Marketings of deciduous fruits are increasing seasonally but citrus is declining somewhat. Although prices in June may average slightly higher than in May, receipts from fruits will probably be much the same as in the previous month.

Cash Receipts, January-June

With prices averaging about 6 percent lower, and the volume of marketings also down a little, cash receipts from farm marketings in the first half of 1950 will be around 9 percent less than receipts in the first half of 1949. The estimated total of 10.6 billion dollars includes 7.0 billion from livestock and products and 3.6 billion from crops, down 6 and 15 percent respectively.

Declines are evident for most of the important commodities. They are relatively small in the livestock group, except for poultry and eggs, which show a drop of 20 percent. Most of this decline is occurring in eggs, but receipts are down somewhat for all items in the poultry group. The 6-month total of cash receipts from meat animals may be about 4 percent less than last year, as lower prices of hogs are only partly offset by increased marketings. Dairy receipts will also be slightly below 1949 because larger marketings are not entirely offsetting lower prices.

Receipts from wheat and cotton will be down substantially in the first 6 months of the year because of lower prices and smaller marketings (including quantities going under loan). Declines in receipts from vegetables and oil-bearing crops are due to lower prices. Receipts from fruit are about the same as in the first half of last year, with lower prices balanced by larger quantities. Receipts from tobacco are up a little.
