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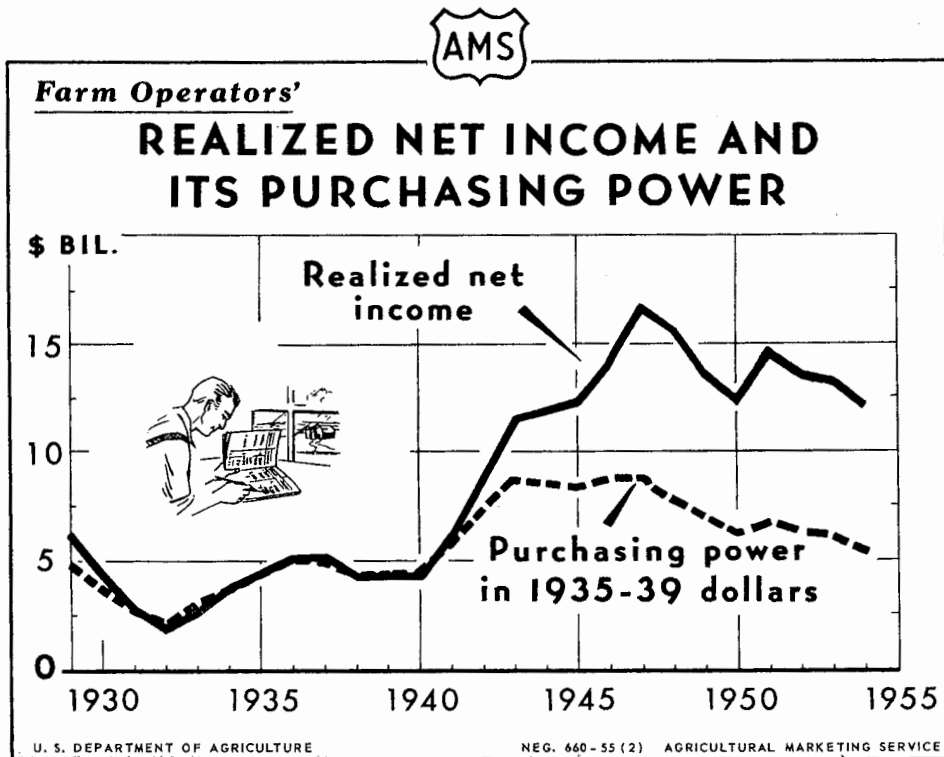
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The FARM INCOME SITUATION

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Farmers' realized net income totaled 12.0 billion dollars in 1954, 10 percent less than in 1953. Since prices paid by farmers for family living items averaged slightly higher

in 1954, the purchasing power of realized net income declined 11 percent from 1953 and was lower than in any previous year since 1940.

THE FARM INCOME SITUATION

NET FARM INCOME IN 1954

Summary

Farmers' realized net income in 1954 is now estimated at 12.0 billion dollars, down 10 percent from the 1953 figure of 13.3 billion, on the basis of more complete information on farm marketings and farm production costs last year. The decline was due to lower average prices of farm products accompanied by only a slight reduction in farm expenses.

If inventory changes are included, the decline in net income from 1953 to 1954 was only a little over 1 percent. Much of the income farmers realized in 1953 was the result of inventory liquidation, principally of corn and hogs, while in 1954 they sold less than they produced, building up their inventories of both crops and livestock.

Net income after the adjustment for inventory change, which represents the net value of farm output during the year, was 12.3 billion dollars in 1954. Adding farm wages of 2.1 billion dollars and 5.7 billion of income from nonfarm sources gives 20.1 billion dollars as the total income of the farm population. Although this was 3 percent below 1953, the farm population was down 3.5 percent, so that total income per capita of the farm population actually rose slightly from 1953 to 1954.

Revised quarterly estimates

Table 1 gives revised quarterly estimates of farmers' realized gross income, production expenses, and realized net income in 1954. These quarterly estimates are in terms of seasonally adjusted annual rates. The new annual totals for 1954 appear in table 2. It should be noted that because of considerable variation in the seasonality of farm marketing patterns, these quarterly estimates are not to be considered as accurate as the annual estimates.

As shown in table 1, realized net income in the final quarter of 1953 was at an annual rate of 13.0 billion dollars. Prices of farm products rose temporarily in the first quarter of 1954, and marketings on a seasonally adjusted basis also increased slightly. As a result, the annual rate of cash receipts rose about a billion dollars. Only half of this rise was offset by an increase in expenses, which mainly reflected higher property taxes and interest charges applicable to the new year, and realized net income rose to 13.5 billion dollars in the first quarter of 1954.

In each of the next 3 quarters farm-product prices dropped, and by the fourth quarter they had reached their lowest average level in almost 5 years. The rate of marketing also declined later in the year as the smaller 1954 crops started to market. These two factors were largely responsible for a decline of almost 2 billion dollars in the realized net income rate between the fourth quarter of 1953 and the fourth quarter of 1954.

Income totals for 1954

The annual farm income account is summarized for 1954 in table 2, along with comparisons of changes in farm and nonfarm incomes. These estimates are preliminary, based on information available as of February 15. It will be another six months before sufficient new information is available to justify revision of the estimates.

The realized net income of farm operators is obtained by subtracting total farm production expenses from realized gross farm income. Realized gross income was down 4.5 percent to 33.9 billion dollars in 1954, while production expenses were down only 1 percent to 21.9 billion dollars. This resulted in the 10-percent decline in realized net income.

Realized gross farm income includes the value of farm products sold or used in the farm home during the year, plus Government payments to farmers and the rental value of farm dwellings. The value of products sold, or cash receipts from marketings, declined 5 percent to 30.0 billion dollars in 1954. Smaller cash receipts from wheat, cotton, dairy products, and eggs accounted for practically all of the 1.5 billion-dollar decline in the total. The volume of farm marketings in 1954 was nearly the same as in 1953, but prices received by farmers averaged somewhat lower.

The value of farm products used in the farm home declined by approximately 150 million dollars to 1.9 billion dollars in 1954. This was a larger relative decline than occurred in cash receipts. It was

due to lower prices for dairy products and poultry and eggs, which are most important in home consumption. The rental value of farm dwellings was also slightly lower in 1954. Government payments, the smallest component of gross income, were up about 20 percent.

With farm production costs remaining high as gross income declined, farmers retained as net income in 1954 only 35 percent of their realized gross farm income, the smallest percentage in 22 years. Small declines occurred for most expense items, including hired labor, fertilizer, seed, motor-vehicle operation, and capital depreciation charges. Rental payments, which are mostly share rents, were also a little smaller than in 1953. But expenditures for purchased feed and livestock were up slightly, and farm property taxes and farm mortgage interest charges continued their upward trend.

Realized gross and net income do not include the value of any increases or decreases during the year in farm inventories of crops and livestock. Inventory changes are excluded from this primary calculation so as to provide a measure of the income actually "realized" and available for farm family living and other nonfarm expenditures during the given year. However, such changes in inventories are subsequently added in to obtain total net income of farm operators for purposes of comparison with nonfarm income, which includes changes in nonfarm business inventories. Realized net income is the net value of farm products sold or consumed during the year; total net income is the net value of actual output during the year.

Farmers sold or consumed 1 percent less than they produced in 1954, building up their inventories of hogs, cattle, soybeans, and oats. In 1953, on the other hand, they sold or consumed 2.5 percent more than they produced, reducing their inventories of corn, hogs, wheat, and cotton. Thus, farmers' holdings of crops and livestock were reduced by 796 million dollars in 1953 compared with an increase of 318 million dollars in 1954. Subtracting the inventory decline from farmers' realized net income in 1953 gives a total net income of 12.5 billion dollars for that year. Adding the inventory increase in 1954 gives 12.3 billion dollars for total net income, a decline of only 200 million dollars or 1.5 percent. This contrasts with the drop of 1.3 billion dollars, or 10 percent, in farmers' realized net income.

Net income of the farm population from farming was 14.4 billion dollars in 1954. This includes the wages received by farm laborers living on farms in addition to the total net income of farm operators. Income from nonfarm sources added 5.7 billion dollars more, bringing the total income of the farm population from all sources to 20.1 billion dollars, 3 percent less than in 1953.

Total income of the nonfarm population in 1954 was almost equal to the 1953 level. Total national income, including income of the farm and nonfarm populations combined, was down slightly.

Income averages for 1954

The number of persons living on farms declined by 3.5 percent to 21.9 million in 1954 compared with the decline of 3 percent in the total income of the farm population. As a result, per capita farm income rose slightly to \$918 in 1954. On the other hand, the nonfarm population continued its upward trend while the total income of the nonfarm population remained almost the same, so per capita nonfarm income dropped 3 percent to \$1,836.

The number of farms in the United States was 1 percent smaller in 1954 than in 1953. Since farmers' realized net income was down 10 percent, realized net income per farm dropped 9 percent to \$2,209. Farm operators' total net income per farm, including the inventory change, was down less than half of 1 percent to \$2,268. Compared with the post-Korea high in 1951, farmers' total realized net income was down 18 percent, but with 3 percent fewer farms realized net income per farm was down 15 percent. On a per-farm basis, realized net income in 1954 remained slightly higher than in 1950, the low point of the postwar period.

CASH RECEIPTS FROM FARM MARKETINGS IN 1954

Summary

Farmers' cash receipts from marketings in 1954 are estimated at 30.0 billion dollars, 5 percent less than in 1953. The decline was due to lower average prices, as the total volume of farm marketings remained practically unchanged.

Receipts from livestock and products totaled 16.7 billion dollars, 3 percent below 1953, as marketings rose 3 percent while prices averaged 6 percent lower. Crop receipts last year are estimated at 13.3 billion dollars, down 6 percent from the previous year, with marketings down 6 percent and prices showing little change on the average.

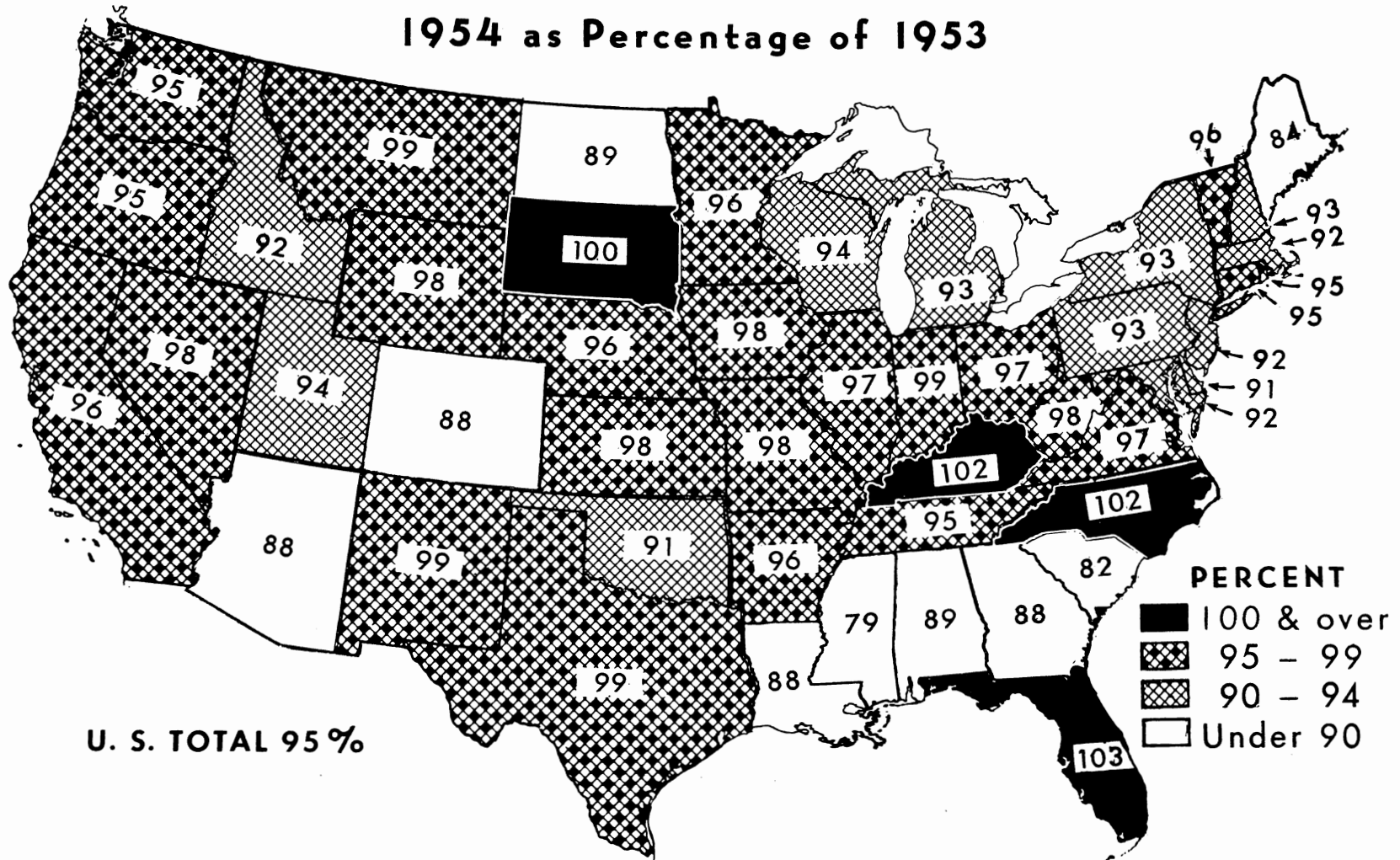
Cash receipts in 1954 were below 1953 in 44 States. The other 4 States showed small increases. The largest percentage decline was 21 percent in Mississippi, and the largest gain was 3 percent in Florida. (See the accompanying map chart.)

Cash receipts by commodities

Cash receipts from most of the principal commodities in 1954 were down from 1953. All the major livestock items were lower except hogs and cattle and calves. Receipts from cattle and calves, estimated at 5.1 billion dollars, gained 5 percent because of larger marketings. Receipts from hogs at 3.7 billion were practically the same as in 1953. The largest decline in cash receipts in the livestock group was a 21-percent drop for chickens (excluding broilers). Marketings of chickens were up 4 percent,

but prices averaged 24 percent lower than in 1953. Cash receipts from eggs were a close second, with a drop of 19 percent to 1.8 billion dollars. Larger egg production resulted in an increase of 5 percent in marketings, but prices dropped 23 percent. Cash receipts from broilers declined only 4 percent because increased marketings largely offset a 15-percent decline in prices. Marketings of turkeys rose 8 percent, but prices averaged 15 percent lower, so cash receipts fell 8 percent. The number of milk cows declined slightly during 1954, but average milk production per cow increased enough to bring about a gain of 2 percent in total milk production. However, increased marketings only partly offset lower prices, and total dairy receipts were down 6 percent to 4.1 billion dollars. Both marketings and average prices of sheep and lambs were down slightly, and cash receipts declined 3 percent. Receipts from wool were also down slightly.

Cash receipts from most of the important crops were lower in 1954 than in 1953. The changes ranged all the way from a drop of 77 percent for mung beans to a gain of 145 percent for sorghum grain. The acreage curtailment programs were partially responsible for a decline in the marketings of some of the major crops like cotton and wheat. Acreage taken out of these crops was shifted to other crops such as sorghum grain, barley, rye, and soybeans, marketings of which increased. Cash receipts from cotton in 1954 were down about 20 percent, and from wheat about 15 percent. The volume of marketings was down 22 percent for cotton and 18 percent for wheat, while prices averaged slightly higher in each case. Cash receipts from sorghum grain, barley, rye, and soybeans, were all up substantially. Other crops for which cash receipts in 1954 were above the previous year include rice, oats, dry field peas, oranges, avocados, cherries, figs, grapes, peaches, pears, plums, almonds, filberts, and walnuts. Most of the gains were slight, but a few, like those for oranges, almonds, and pears, were rather substantial. Receipts were down for corn, hay, cottonseed, flaxseed, peanuts, tung nuts, mung beans, potatoes, sweet-potatoes, truck crops, lemons, limes, apples, cranberries, apricots, and pecans.

Marketings of several other important crops were larger than last year, but the decline in average prices was greater, and cash receipts dropped. Potato marketings increased 2 percent, prices declined 10 percent, and cash receipts dropped 8 percent. Marketings of dry edible beans were up 2 percent in 1954, but prices were 8 percent lower, and cash receipts declined 6 percent. Apple marketings rose 14 percent, average prices declined 20 percent, and cash receipts from apples dropped 10 percent.

Cash receipts by States and Regions

Total cash receipts in 1954 were down from 1953 in all but 4 States. The changes varied from a 21-percent decline in Mississippi to a 3-percent increase in Florida. Livestock receipts ranged from 12 percent below 1953 in Delaware to 7 percent above in New Mexico, with receipts running 1 to

10 percent below 1953 in 33 States. Livestock receipts were about the same or a little larger in 13 States. Crop receipts ranged from 20 percent below 1953 in Colorado to 9 percent above in Kentucky. In 22 States there were declines of from 1 to 10 percent, and in 11 States crop receipts ranged from about the same to 7 percent above the previous year.

Changes in total cash receipts for most States were not large. Crop receipts in wheat and cotton growing States were generally lower because of smaller acreage. Lower prices for dairy and poultry products depressed livestock receipts in the Northeastern sections. Receipts from meat animals were fairly well maintained at 1953 levels over the country as a whole.

Cash receipts in each region in 1954 were below 1953, but the changes were not large. The greatest difference was in the North Atlantic Region, where total receipts were 7 percent below 1953, with livestock and products down 8 percent and crops down 6 percent. Receipts from dairy products and poultry were lower in nearly all States in the region because of lower prices, and lower prices also held receipts from potatoes down in Maine.

In the South Central Region, total receipts dropped 6 percent from 1953, with livestock and products down 2 percent and crops down 9 percent. Smaller planted acreage resulted in substantially lower cash receipts from cotton. Crop receipts were lower in 7 of the 8 States in this region, ranging from a decline of 26 percent in Mississippi to 3 percent in Texas and Arkansas. Only in Kentucky, where receipts from tobacco were up, were total crop receipts above 1953. Receipts from livestock and products showed small declines in most States of this region.

Total cash receipts in the South Atlantic Region were down 5 percent, with declines of 4 and 5 percent, respectively, for livestock and products and for crops. Smaller receipts from broilers in Delaware, Maryland, and Virginia, and from cotton in South Carolina and Georgia, accounted for most of the decline.

The Western Region also showed a drop of 5 percent in total cash receipts, with livestock and products 2 percent lower and crops down 7 percent. Receipts from livestock and products were maintained at about 1953 levels in most States, but smaller receipts from dairy and poultry products in the Pacific Coast States brought livestock receipts down 5 or 6 percent in that area. Smaller wheat acreage reduced crop receipts in most States. Lower prices for apples, sugar beets, and potatoes also pushed crop receipts down in some States.

Total cash receipts were down only 3 percent in both the East and West North Central Regions. Receipts from livestock and products declined slightly in all States in the East North Central Region, with lower prices for dairy and poultry products. Larger receipts from soybeans held

crop receipts above 1953 in Ohio and Indiana, but smaller wheat marketings accounted for slight declines in crop receipts in Illinois and Michigan, while smaller potato marketings held crop receipts down in Wisconsin. Changes in total cash receipts in the East North Central Region varied from 1 percent below 1953 in Indiana to 7 percent below in Michigan.

The small decline in total cash receipts in the West North Central Region was due mostly to lower receipts from wheat, particularly in North Dakota and Nebraska. In Minnesota, lower prices for butterfat also contributed to the decline.

When the States are ranked on the basis of total cash receipts in 1954, California and Iowa stand first and second, as they have in every year since 1949. Illinois was third and Texas fourth, the reverse of the previous year. Total cash receipts in California last year were 2.5 billion dollars, down 4 percent from 1953. Receipts in Iowa were 2.3 billion dollars, 2 percent below the previous year. Total receipts of 2.0 billion dollars in Illinois showed a decline of 3 percent from 1953, while Texas, at 1.9 billion dollars, was down 1 percent.

MONTHLY ESTIMATES OF CASH RECEIPTS, 1954-55

Cash receipts in January 1955

Farmers received about 2.4 billion dollars from marketings in January, down seasonally from December and 10 percent below the corresponding month of 1954. Crop and livestock receipts each totaled approximately 1.2 billion dollars, with crop receipts down 8 percent and livestock receipts 11 percent from a year earlier.

Revisions for 1954

The monthly estimates of cash receipts in 1954, which were published currently throughout the year, have been revised to take into account the latest information available on production and disposition of the various farm commodities. The new estimates are given by commodity groups for the United States in table 3. The changes are generally small, their net effect being to reduce previously published estimates by less than 100 million dollars.

These revisions are carried through by States in the monthly estimates given in tables 5-7. Changes in previously published estimates are relatively larger for some States than for the national estimates, but are quite small in most cases. Revisions were generally larger for the crop component than for livestock and products.
