

Average per capita income of the farm population was slightly higher in 1954 than in 1953, and only a little below the all-time high reached in 1951. Total income of the farm population from all sources, farm and nonfarm, was 20.1 billion dollars in 1954, 3 percent less than in 1953. There were

3-1/2 percent fewer people sharing in the total, however, so that per capita income rose from \$914 in 1953 to \$918 in 1954. As compared with the post-Korea high in 1951, total income was down 14 percent, but there were 9 percent fewer people on farms, and income per person was down 5 percent.

THE FARM INCOME SITUATION

FARM INCOME IN 1955

Summary

Farmers' gross income, expenses, and realized net income may all be a little lower in 1955 than they were in 1954.

With further acreage restrictions on cotton and wheat this year, a moderately lower price support level for 1955 crop wheat, and considerably lower prices for hogs now than in the first half of 1954, cash receipts from total farm marketings, the principal component of farmers' gross income, are not likely to equal those of 1954. However, cash receipts from most farm products except cotton, wheat, and hogs should hold fairly close to last year's levels. In a few instances, such as broilers, eggs, and oil-bearing crops, cash receipts in 1955 may well be larger than they were in 1954; and final returns to growers for the 1955 wool clip, partly to be received in 1956, will be substantially larger than returns on the 1954 clip.

With prices paid by farmers for production items, including interest, taxes, and wage rates, slightly higher this year than last, total farm production expenses are likely to be reduced only a little, primarily reflecting lower feed costs and smaller rental payments. Farm operators' realized net income may be about 5 percent lower in 1955 than in 1954.

Cash receipts from farm marketings in the first quarter of 1955 were 5 percent smaller than in the same period last year. The total volume of marketings was about the same, but prices averaged 5 percent lower.

Estimates for the first quarter

Farmers' realized net income in the first quarter of 1955 was at an annual rate of approximately 11.9 billion dollars, up substantially from the low rate of 11.1 billion dollars reached in the fourth quarter of 1954, and only slightly below the total of 12.0 billion dollars estimated for 1954 as a whole (table 1). However, the increase in the first quarter rate was due almost entirely to a temporary increase in the rate of marketings on a seasonally adjusted basis.

Farmers' realized gross income in the first quarter was at an annual rate of 34.0 billion dollars, 4 percent above the fourth quarter rate for 1954 and a trifle higher than the annual estimate for 1954. Farm production expenses also rose on an annual rate basis, but the first quarter rate was up less than 3 percent from the fourth quarter. Consequently, realized net income rose 7 percent in terms of seasonally adjusted annual rates.

The first quarter rise in realized gross income was due entirely to a 5-percent increase in cash receipts from farm marketings on a seasonally adjusted basis. Prices of farm products averaged less than 1 percent higher in the first quarter of 1955 than in the fourth quarter of 1954, so most of the increase in seasonally adjusted cash receipts was due to a less-than-seasonal decline in the volume of farm marketings in the first quarter. Marketings of hogs, soybeans, oranges, and apples were larger than usual; but a large volume of crops going under CCC loan, even though a little smaller than last year, was the principal factor underlying the larger-than-seasonal rate of marketings.

The proceeds from CCC loans are counted as cash receipts when the loans are made. If the crops are later redeemed and the loans repaid, such repayments are treated as an offset to cash receipts when they are made. Loans on corn represented more than half of the total value of CCC loans in the first quarter. Some of this corn will probably be redeemed later on and fed to livestock. In the meantime, however, the loans go to expand the rate of cash receipts, and this was particularly important in the first quarter.

The rise in the production expense rate was due to an increase of 2 percent in the first quarter average of prices paid by farmers for production items, together with even larger increases in interest, taxes, and wage rates. Wage rates were up 4 percent on a seasonally adjusted basis, and interest and tax payments applicable to the first quarter of the new year were each about 5 percent above the previous year.

Prospects for the year

The outlook for 1955 as a whole remains approximately as indicated at the Outlook Conference last October. Present prospects are for some

decline in farmers' gross income. With the total volume of farm marketings likely to be a little smaller than last year, and with prices probably not averaging quite as high, farmers! cash receipts from marketings will probably be down a little from 1954. Farm production costs may also be lower this year, but the chances are that any reduction farmers can make in their expenses will not fully compensate for the expected decline in gross income. Consequently, realized net income is likely to be down from last year's figure of 12.0 billion dollars, probably around 5 percent.

Marketings of livestock and livestock products will remain large in 1955, and may exceed last year's record volume. Similarly, cash receipts from livestock and products may, on the whole, compare rather favorably with last year. Lower cash receipts from hogs are likely to be largely offset by increases for some of the other livestock items, notably eggs. On the other hand, crop marketings, assuming average yields, will probably be from 5 to 10 percent smaller than last year, and total crop receipts may be down in about the same proportion. Most of the decline will be in cotton and wheat for which acreage has been our tailed. Cash receipts from corn will also be down, however, as most of this year's marketings will be from last year's smaller crop.

Farm property taxes and farm mortgage interest payments are continuing their upward trends this year, and farmers may also spend more on purchased seed than they did last year. No further increases are expected in any of the other expense items, however, and some are likely to be down a little. The largest decline is expected in rental payments, which are mostly share rents. The net result will probably be only a small reduction in total production expenses.

CASH RECEIPTS, JANUARY-MARCH 1955

Cash receipts from farm marketings in the first quarter of 1955 totaled approximately 6.4 billion dollars, down 5 percent from last year. The total volume of marketings was about the same as a year ago, but prices averaged 5 percent lower. First-quarter livestock receipts of 3.8 billion dollars were down nearly 10 percent because of lower average prices, but crop receipts of 2.6 billion were practically the same as in the first quarter of last year.

Cash receipts in February

Cash receipts in February totaled 1.9 billion dollars, down seasonally from January and 4 percent less than cash receipts in February of last year. Receipts from livestock and products were 1.2 billion dollars, down 10 percent from a year earlier, and crop receipts were 0.7 billion, slightly higher than in February of last year.

Cash receipts in March

The preliminary estimate of cash receipts in March is 1.9 billion dollars, about the same as in February but 4 percent lower than a year earlier. March receipts from livestock and products are estimated at 1.3 billion dollars, crop receipts at 0.6 billion.
