AN ACTIVE BUYING DEMAND WHICH HAS AB-SORGED QUITE READILY OFFERINGS OF BOTH CON- DISPOSING OF THEIR OUTPUT. THIS INCLUDES DENSED AND EVAPORATED MILK KEPT THE MAR-KETS ON THESE PRODUCTS VERY FIRM DURING NOVEMBER, THE PRINCIPAL FEATURE OF THE MONTH WAS THE SCARCITY OF SUPPLIES, WHICH AT CERTAIN DISTRIBUTING POINTS WERE SO SHORT THAT SOME DISTRIBUTORS HAD DIFFICULTY SHORT THAT SOME DISTRIBUTIONS AND STATES AND STATES A STATISTICAL REVIEW OF MARKET CONDITION OF LIGHTER PRODUCTION, WHICH IS PERHAPS A STATISTICAL REVIEW OF MARKET CONDITION OF PRINCIPAL ELEMENT OF INFLUENCE AT THIS TIONS SHOWS THAT TOTAL STOCKS IN MANUFACTIME, DEMAND HAS BEEN GENERALLY GOOD, AND TURERS HANDS ON NOVEMBER I WERE AT A LOWER

POINT THAN AT ANY TIME SINCE 1920 WHEN MAR KETS WERE BURDENED WITH SUCH HEAVY SURPLUSES, FOLLOWING THAT PERIOD MANY MANUFACTURERS ADOPTED A POLICY OF CURTALLING PRODUCTION TO THE MINIMUM, CARRYING THIS POLICY THROUGH INTO THE CURRENT YEAR, AS A RESULT WHEN THE SURPLUS WHICH EXISTED EVEN DURING THE PAST SUMMER WAS SUDDENLY CLEAN-ED UP AND A SHORTAGE BECAME APPARENT, CON-DENSERIES FOUND THEMSELVES IN A TIGHT PLACE SO FAR AS PRODUCTION WAS CONCERNED, FOR IN THE MEANTIME BUTTER AND CHEESE MAR KETS HAD REACHED FIRM POSITIONS AND HAVE REVAINED SO, AND FURTHERMORE, IN SOME OF THE CONDENSERY DISTRICTS WHERE OPERATIONS WERE REDUCED, DAIRYMEN HAVE BECOME ACGUS-TOMED TO SELLING CREAM FOR BUTTER MAKING AND FEEDING THE SKIMMILK, SO LONG AS DUTTER AND PORK REVAIN AT THEIR PRESENT HIGH LEVELS, THESE CONDENSERIES WILL APPARENTLY HAVE THE PROBLEM OF SECURING MILK TO FACE. COUPLED WITH THE FACT THAT PRESENT SUPPLIES ARE SHORT, AND THAT CON-DENSERIES ARE ALREADY DEHIND ON PRODUCTION, DENSERTES ARE ACREAD TO SOME THAT THERE IS IT IS THE FEELING OF SOME THAT THERE IS APPARENTLY NO CHANGE TO CATCH UP ON PROPERTION UNTIL THE NEW SEASON OPENS.

PRICE TENDENCIES HIGHER

Under the conditions which have been mentioned selling prices have made further advances, but they are still below those of a year ago regardless of the fact that prices paid producers are somewhat higher. The high level of selling prices however, has been reached without unfavorable effect upon demand, because of the scarcity of supplies. Some export interest exists also at the higher prices, although export figures for October which are the latest available indicate that shipments were scattered among numerous countries. Exports to Russia constituted approximately half of the combined total of condensed and evaporated during October. Shipments of evaporated milk continued to be very much heavier than condensed, 12,537,000 pounds as compared with 3,529,000 pounds during October.
