BEEN SO-CALLED REGULAR BUSINESS. NO FUTURE EXPORT BUSINESS OF NOTE IS BEING TALKED OF EXCEPT POSSIBLY SOME 10,000 CASES FOR RELIEF SHIPMENT AROUND THE FIRST OF JULY, BIDS FOR WHICH WERE OPENED THE LATTER PART OF JUNE. HEAVY EXPORTS DURING JANUARY AND FEBRUARY, TOGETHER WITH COMPARATIVELY LIGHT EXPORTS SINCE THEN, MAKE THE TOTAL FOR THE YEAR THROUGH MAY EXCEED THE SAME FIVE MONTHS IN 1923 BY 19,000,000 LBS., THE EXPORTS OF CONDENSED AND EVAPORATED COMBINED BEING 77,311,000 LBS, DURING THIS

PERIOD IN 1923 AND 96,389,000 LBS. IN 192

THE PEAK OF THE SEASONS PRODUCTION WAS EXPECTED BY MANY OF THE TRADE TO BE REACHED BY THE LATTER PART OF JUNE. BY THIS TIME IT WAS ALSO EXPECTED THAT DEMAND WOULD SHOW SOME INCREASE, PARTICULARLY WOULD SHOW FOR BULK GOODS FROM THE ICE CREAM TRACE. THE EFFECT OF THE LATE, COCSEASON HAS BEEN FELT KEENLY BY DISTRIBUTIORS.
