IF PRICE HAS BEEN AN IN-FLUENCING FACTOR, AND IT IS REASONABLE TO EXPECT SUCH TO BE THE CASE, FLUID MILK GEMAND HAS UNCOUBTEDLY ABSORBED QUITE A OF MILK WHICH CRDINARILY WOULD BE CON-TENSED FOR THE DIFFERENCE BETWEEN CON-DENSERY PRICES AND MARKET MILK PRICES IN SOME SECTIONS HAS BEEN RECENTLY RUNNING AS MUCH AS 15 TO 20¢ GREATER PER CWT. THAN DURING THE SUMMER MONTHS. PRODUCERS LOCATED FAVORABLY FOR TAKING ADVANTAGE OF SUCH A CONDITION HAVE IN MANY CASES CONE 80.

THE FACT THAT A GOOD MANY BUYERS OF WHAT MORE PROMISING FROM A MANUFACTURER'S STANDPOINT. AND MORE RECENTLY, THE UPWARD TURN OF THE BUTTER MARKET IS AN ADDEC SUPPORT.
